New Exhibit

Paintings in the Community Room of the Delmar Public Library are bringing forth much favorable comment from those who have seen them. The artist, Mrs. Lena C. Hartt of Albany, has loaned some of her works to the Library for the month of September.

Mrs. Hartt has had no formal training other than a few art lessons taken from a mail-order school specializing in commercial art. This was many years ago and was interrupted by the arrival of her first baby.

She has spent most of her life in the Delmar area and the lovely oils of scenes from other locales and countries have been either purely imaginative or inspired by a black and white newspaper or magazine clipping.

Mrs. Hartt has painted from an inner need to express herself. Most of her works now on exhibit are landscapes or still lifes. However, she is showing two portraits. One, of her mother, is charming. The other of a young girl developed from "a desire to see if I could make flesh tones look real-alive."

Oils predominate although her pastels and crayons are noteworthy. "House by the Side of the Road," a crayon, was completed in less than half an hour yet indicates a surety of technique.

"Old Hassbrooke House," an oil on glass, is particularly interesting as the colors are pure and the artist must paint backward, putting in detail first.

All in all, this is a delightful show painted by a descendant of one of the oldest families in the area - the Crounse family.
