The fire officers Association of the Town of Bethlehem takes pride in announcing its activities for the week of October 9-15, National Fire Prevention Week. Visits to the area schools with men and apparatus are planned. Free home and business inspection for fire hazards may be had by simply contacting your local Department.

A Report:

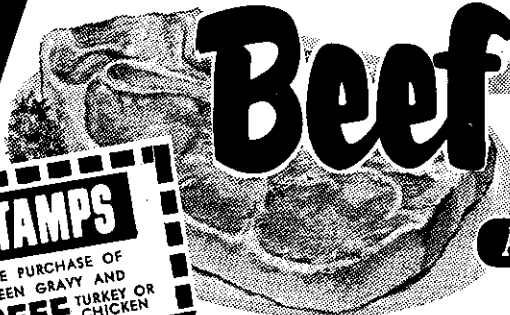
The Town of Bethlehem Historical Association is now a reality, and has been since March of 1965. It has gained the Town's wide support for its plan to convert the old Cedar Hill School building into a museum and meeting room.

The purpose of the organization is four fold: to stimulate an appreciation of the historical heritage of the Town of Bethlehem; to discover, collect and preserve any materials which may help to illustrate the history of the Town; to bring about the preservation of other historic buildings, monuments and sites;

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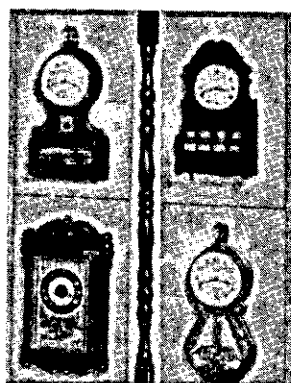
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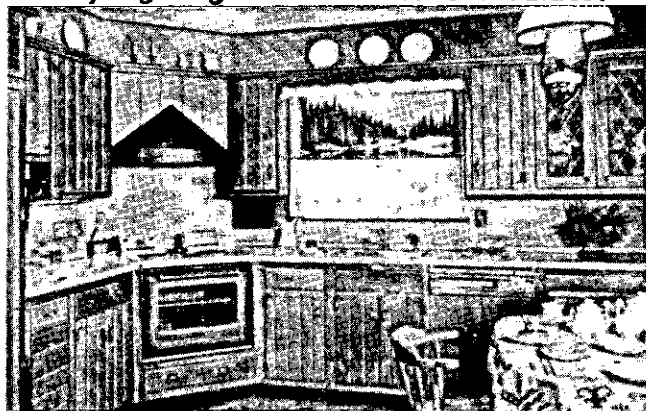

and to disseminate historical information.

In April of 1965, after the election of officers and an approval of the Constitution and By-Laws, The Bethlehem Historical Association was well on its way to a very full and eventful year.

After a busy summer we were ready in October to hold our first House Tour with several homes in the Hudson River area open to the public. A reception and art display by artists of the Bethlehem area was held in December at the school, in honor of Mrs. Paul Dickinson of Delmar, retiring historian of the Town of Bethlehem.

Our monthly meetings were followed by interesting programs. Edward Frisbee gave a lecture about the Cherry Hill mansion. Mrs. Walter Houghtaling of Delmar displayed an antique doll collection. Mrs. Crosby Rutenber discussed antique buttons. Vernon Haskins of the East Durham museum project lectured. And former students of the Cedar Hill School presented a program of their reminiscences of school days. In May a collection of antique clocks was on display. Also a display of Early American Decorative Arts was held at the school; Mrs. Harold White was hostess and supervised the interesting display. During the months of June and July, there was an excellent display of old farm and household tools loaned by several interested members. In August, under the auspices of the Historical Association, there

was a tour of the Edward Buyck Studio in Slingerlands. Mr. and Mrs. Donald Stahlman of Glenmont presented a very interesting program on Antique Cars at the September meeting.

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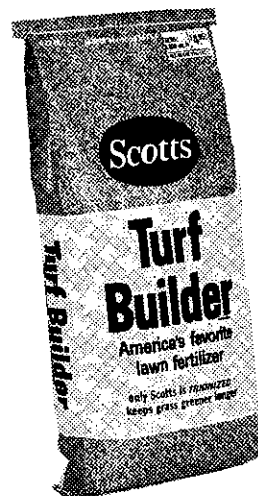
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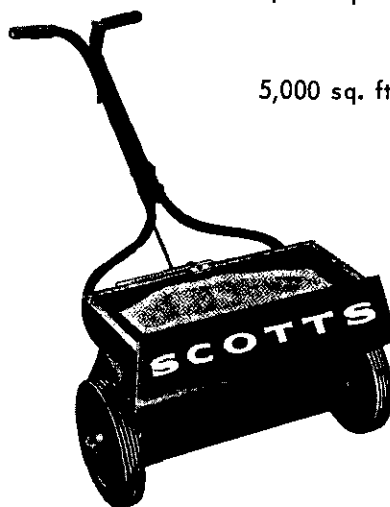
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Shaw as both the clown and the philosopher. Bramwell Fletcher gives two pictures of Shaw, one his early boyhood in Dublin, the other his mature years.

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Chairman. Besides serving as a contribution to this worthy cause, the students are gaining much from the opportunity to organize and complete a large job.

Too Late to Seed Lawns?

Most people will agree that the ideal time to seed a lawn is between August 15 and September 15. Unfortunately, it is not always possible to get all the work done during that period. Then what? Professor John F. Cornman, Turf Specialist at Cornell has said: "Under most circumstances it seems reasonable to keep on planting grass seed any time in the autumn until the ground is frozen, rather than to wait until spring."

He reasons that lawns seeded before mid-September will usually germinate and become established before growth stops. On the other extreme, grass may be seeded so late so that no germination takes place in the fall. As long as the seed does not wash away during the winter, it will germinate promptly in the spring, much earlier than a spring seeding could be made. In either case, the autumn seeding is far more likely to produce a turf that will withstand the hot, dry summer weather than is a

spring planted lawn.

The problem lies between the extremes of early seeded and dormant seeded lawns. Some seed will get planted early enough to germinate but late enough so that the new seedlings have only a few small roots. Alternate freezing and thawing in the fall and spring can pull these plants from the soil and they dry to death. It is impossible to predict when this problem period will occur. It varies each year with the autumn growing conditions and on how late winter comes.

Professor Cornman is aware that his recommendation to seed whenever possible in the fall involves a period when the results may not be good. He considers this a calculated risk worthwhile because of the great benefits of getting the lawn started ahead of the usual late spring planting time.


