


Mr. Swantek also told his audience that every year in the United States approximately







MEMORIAL TO PIONEER GEOGOLOGISTS

By Allison P. Bennett Bethlehem Town Historian Citizens of the Town of Bethlehem have been making history since Colonial Days, but some more recent history came to my attention a few weeks ago after an interview with a charming lady, Mrs. Chris A. Hartnagel who lives out on New Scotland Road in Slingerlands and has been one of our Bethlehem residents for many years. Her husband, now deceased, was our State Geologist, and the

object of our story was accomplished with his assistance and inspiration.

The particular piece of history we mention is not located in the Town of Bethlehem, but several Bethlehem residents were responsible for project and carried out the planning and work. Back in 1933 the members of Tawasentha Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Slingerlands, believed that a suitable marker should be placed in the Helderberg area to honor the pioneer geologists who came there from many parts of the world for study and research. The Helderberg area is one of the world's richest grounds for fossil hunters and the many exposed layers of rock and its remarkable geological formations tell the earth's story to the knowledgeable. Researches began here in the early nineteenth century because of the easily recognized arrangement of the rock formations, traceable in chronological sequence and characterized by different species of fos-

Consequently, Mrs. Hartnagel, Regent of Tawasentha Chapter in 1933 and Chairman of the project, with a fine committee to assist her, had designed and dedicated a beautiful bronze plaque which is in place today on the Helderberg Escarpment for all to see. The State of New York was very interested in this project and helped finance it with State Aid. The plaque is located in John Boyd Thacher Park, on the face of the rock beside the summit of the old Indian Ladder Road, near the entrance to the Indian Ladder Trail. The names of the early geologists who came to the Helderbergs to study are inscribed and some of the more familiar names to the layman are: Amos Eaton who was first President of RPI in 1824, James D. Dana, well-known geological explorer and Louis Agassiz, famed Harvard professor. The

border of the plaque is wrought with eighteen fossils modelled in relief and these fossils typify those in the formations of the successive geologic ages exposed on the Helderberg cliffs and arranged in approximately chronological order as one reads from the bottom up. The artist who designed the memorial was Henry J. Albright of Glenmont, an internationally known sculptor and painter. Other prominent people who participated in the dedication of the marker were former State Historian Dr. Alexander C. Flick, whose son now resides in Slingerlands, and Dr. Winifred Goldring, at that time Asst. State Paleontologist, who also resides in Slingerlands.

It is interesting to note that a very special Dedication Program was held on Sunday afternoon, November 5, 1933 at the New Salem Reformed Church, at which time the plaque was formally dedicated. After the ceremony the entire group went to the Park for the unveiling of the Memorial with Senator Frank L. Wiswall accepting the plaque for the people of New York and the John Boyd Thacher Park.

The ancient Helderbergs or "Clear Mountains" as they were called by our early Dutch settlers are at the back door of the Town of Bethlehem and throw a sheltering arm over us to protect our Town from some of the worst of nature's snows and violent storms.

The next time you are at Thacher Park, take the time to walk the old Indian Trail and stop and study the lovely memorial tablet put up to honor scholars and scientists by the public spirited women of one of the many community organizations of our Town of Bethlehem.


