
"Auntie Mame" and "Ah, Wilderness." She has, in addition, been active in the work of the New York State Community Theatres, serving for many years as a member of the Board.

He was nominated for this honor through Colgate's Student Senate and selected by a committee of students, faculty members and administrators.


Selection is on the basis of scholarship, participation and leadership in academic and extracurricular activities, citizenship and service to the school and promise of future usefulness.

To date, 21 arrests have been made.

You may have seen our ad last April outlining a plan for dealing with malicious phone callers.

Since then, 21 persons have been arrested for making criminal calls. There have been 17 convictions, with sentences ranging up to \$200 fines and, in one case, a jail term of 335 days. In addition, our Annoyance Call Bureaus have successfully handled more than 7,000 non-criminal cases. Progress is being made.

But what should you do if you receive a malicious or obscene call? The best thing to do is to hang up. Chances are the caller won't bother you again. But if the calls continue, please call your Business Office Representative or, at night and on weekends, the Operator. They will help you.

We are using new techniques and equipment to help identify the sources of these calls. We also have specially trained people who will work with you and the police in an effort to identify malicious and obscene callers.

The New York Penal Law makes it a misdemeanor to use the telephone to make obscene remarks to a woman or child, or to threaten to commit a crime against any person. The penalty can be imprisonment for one year and a \$500 fine.



We hope you never receive a malicious or annoying phone call.

But if you should, here is what <u>you</u> can do, and what <u>we</u> will do to help

We're deeply concerned that some people are receiving malicious or obseene phone culls. The majority of such harasting calls are made by minguided people. The best way to stop them is simply to hang up. But if the calls persist, please follow these suggestions:







As agriculture grew by leaps and bounds down through the years with phenomenal productivity and capital investment, a vast number of people have been brought into "farming."

agriculture may be measured by the fact that one out of every three workers in New York State is part of the vast chain of services that bring food to the dining tables of the state's 18 million people.

In other words, one-third of the state's working force is in agriculture and related businesses, even though the number of commercial farmers represents only about two per cent of the population.

In fact, this tiny "minority" is becoming increasingly important in years ahead as agriculture will continue to move on, growing and expanding in every direction.

So observe Cornell University agricultural specialities at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture. In a brochure entitled "Agriculture is More Than Farming in the Empire State," prepared by the Department of Communication Arts, they discuss the complexity of modern agriculture and its impact on the general economy of the state and the nation.

They see that agricultural growth will become even more dramatic in years directly ahead because there are no major food surpluses available. Internationally, demand for more food to combat hunger and misery in the underdeveloped countries will continue to increase in the

face of the population explosion.

Besides expansion, agriculture will be increasingly urbanized as it will continue to move into towns and cities in New York State as elsewhere. For that matter, most agricultural commodities are processed in urban areas throughout the nation.

The chain of services bringing food to the people ranges from farmers to factory workers, from scientists to salesmen, truck drivers to tractor dealers, from bankers to attorneys.

Farmers of 150 years ago were self-sufficient. They produced their own seeds, bred their own stock, and provided all the other raw materials needed for farming.

Each farm provided sustenance for one family and little more. But today's farmer is more or less a specialist, producing enough food for himself and a number of other people.

Major factors that changed the face of agriculture are research, extension work, machinery, and the growth of non-farm markets.

Some 26,000 commercial firms with sales of more than \$10,000 provide more than four-fifths of the food produced annually in New York State today. The total number of farmers with both large and small operations is only 66,500 — about one-fourth

of the number of farmers in 1900. Yet, agricultural production is one-third more than it was at that time, and today's farmers work only half as much land - about 12 million acres.

The farm income now tops \$1 billion a year with milk and dairy products leading the list of main sources of income, followed by

fruit and vegetable crops, poultry and poultry products, and horticultural specialities.

Working along with the commercial farmers are some 2,500 firms that sell them almost \$800 million worth of raw materials and services annually. Other firms that process, package, and transport farm products total 7,000 - a \$2 billion industry that employs more than 200,000 per-

Nationally, more than 10 million persons store, haul and merchandise farm products. Almost 1.5 million others work to produce farm supplies, and thousands provide services to farmers.

The bigness of American agri-

culture can be sized up with its capital investment totaling \$250 billion - an amount equivalent to three-fifths of the value of all the stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange or threefourths of the current assets of all the nation's corporations.

Any way one looks at it, farmers will continue to play a major role in creating even better life


