

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

"Serjeant Musgrave's Dance" To Be Presented by SCP

"Serjeant Musgrave's Dance" will be the Slingerlands Community Players second production of the season at Bethlehem Central High School on Friday and Saturday, January 20 and 21 at 8:30 p.m. Hailed by the New York Times at its New York opening in March this year as an "exceptional work" and "an outstanding play of its generation",

it is the best-known work of 36year old English playwright, John Arden.

The play is set in 19th Century England under Queen Victoria. Four British soldiers led by Serjeant Musgrave bring a buddy's remains home for burial but are actually deserting from the army. The 'Dance' in the title refers to their effort to convert the town to their antiwar attitude. The play takes off from the G. B. Shaw comedy with a similar theme, "Arms and the Man," and its musical version, "The Chocolate Soldier."

Frank Miazga, who directed "Becket" and "An Italian Straw Hat" last year at Albany Civic Theatre, is directing "Serjeant Musgrave's Dance" with the handicap of a true artist: he broke a leg during the performance of his last play and chose the cast of "Serjeant Musgrave" already wearing a cast.

The cast (of players!) is headed by Bill Heenehan (last seen as the lion in the Slingerlands production of "Androcles and the Lion") in the title role of Sergeant Musgrave. Co-featured are SCP favorites Ralph Smith, Charles Losacco, Doug Marone and Martin Barr. The distaff side is graced by Lyn Vooris, another loan from Albany Civic, and Gail Hogan, who has appeared with Arena Theatre at State U.

Other members of the cast are Victor Rosenberg, John Snyder, Steve King, John Hanks, Sam Freeman and Bill Morrison. ("Mary, Mary") Nugent is Assistant Director. The set design is by Bill Morrison and Don Forsythe is in charge of lighting. Authentic period costumes are being created by Ellen Heenehan and Joan Jamison.

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

Expo 67

Do When Due: Don't Overdue!

Know what the girls on the staff at the Delmar Public Library do every Thursday afternoon? They carefully search for each overdue book, periodical, pamphlet and record. After they are as sure as it is humanly possible to be sure of anything, that the hunted article is not in the Library, they begin a new game. They try to read the very individual and frequently indecipherable signature on every single card. Two or three hours pass, exhaustion sets in and other duties must be performed. But attached to the overdue card is a blue slip listing the name of the borrower, the date the book or whatever, was due and the date the notice will be sent.

Come Friday morning, the fun continues. Two staff members sharpen their pencils and their wits. They now must find the right address for the borrower by matching the signature on the book card with that on his registration card. This is a real test

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of endurance and eye-sight as they understand how frustrating it is for the wrong person to receive a notice asking him to return something he has never even heard about much less taken from the Library.

Four J. Beamishes sit contentedly next to each other in the registration file. Which is the correct one? Sometimes an educated guess must be made. After all, it hardly seems possible that 9 year old J. Beamish has suddenly begun reading Plato but it is perfectly probable that a much older J. Beamish is either signing out Peter Rabbit for a child or even perhaps a reference project. After thoughtful consideration, a decision is made and a third staff member begins the task of typing notice after notice after notice.

The staff is not rebelling or doing anything dramatic. It is

making a plea. Please, oh please, get your books etc. back on time. It takes a minimum of 22 hours weekly to search for overdue items and to get the notices sent out. Last Friday 245 cards were sent to individual borrowers. many having several items listed on the one post-card. Fines received in no way compensate for the cost of the labor involved and the mailing charges. Trotting miles around the Library is rough on the feet and a waste of time, money and effort. Take pity on the poor staff and make the overdues a memory.

Dieters beware! An "International Dinner" of irresistable magnitude is currently being planned by the Bethlehem Com-

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

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

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
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
