
Library Notes


Second-place awards were earned by both Jeanne Biernacki, with her job interview and Christine Waggoner as a contender for the DECNY Sweetheart.



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

Bankers Meet

THE SPOTLIGH

The Annual Shareholders' Meeting of National Commercial Bank and Trust Company was held on Friday, February 3, at the Bank's Heartland Building, In his address to shareholders, Lester W. Herzog, Jr., president, noted that 1966 was a year marked by heightened economic activity and tight money conditions. Emphasizing the importance of customer ser vice, he pointed out the estab lishment of a new International Department and the introduction of Bancardchek service, as well as refinements in trust and in vestment services. 




