
"They're Off!" at Saratoga Tonight

The starting gate now being used at Saratoga is the latest of the invention that revolutionized the sport of harness racing when it was perfected and fully introduced in 1946. Prior to that the starting of harness races was a long and often tedious task, perses and clever drivers to turn and pass a starting point in even alignment. The system was imperfect at best and recalls were frequent.

The introduction of the mobile starting gate brought precision starts, permitted precise scheduling and opened the way for the return of the sport's color and excitement.

"Happy Time"

The Slingerlands Community Players will present "The Happy Time," a comedy by Samuel Taylor, as its final production of the 1966-1967 season. The play will be given at Bethlehem Central High School on Friday and Saturday evenings, April 21 and 22, at 8:30 P.M.

The Dramatists Play Service describes The Happy Time as a "Comedy of Love in Three Acts." This it surely is. Love abounds in the wacky, heartwarming French-Canadian family, The Bonnards of Ottawa.

The Happy Time is primarily the story of Bibi, a 12 year old boy, living in Ottawa in the 1920's and rapidly approaching "La Puberte." He is aided, abetted, frustrated and confused in this process, by the rest of the Bonnard clan . . . Papa, the "Crazy musician", Uncle Louis, who consumes a goodly quota of the white wine inventory of Canada (from a portable water-cooler, yet!) Uncle Desmonde, the Canadian Casanova and traveling salesman par excellance and Gran'pere Bonnard, whose l'affaire d'amour with the Widow LaTouche is an example of the irrespressible optimism of this Gallic group of zanies. And then there is Maman, Bibi's Scotch-Presbyterian mother, who vainly strives to maintain a degree of sanity amid her French-Canadian family's natural and uninhibited dedication to "Joie de Vivre." Harlan Wilber, director, says of The Happy Time, "with all its humor, and there is humor aplenty, The Happy Time is a comedy of love and 'love is truth,' The inherent honesty of this play is guaranteed to leave you with a warm feeling of satisfaction, a refreshed and, perhaps, rejuvenated outlook on the larger 'Human Comedy' which we all live."

when the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, a unit of the Commerce Department, switched to the brand-new Department of Transportation recently.

Regional engineers like Mr. Swanson in the Bureau of Public Roads received the new titles, with expanded duties attached. Informed sources predicted that Mr. Swanson will, at a future time, receive permanent appointment to the post.

When the bureau, with headquarters at 4 Normanskill Boulevard, Delmar, changed its big blue sign to read "Federal Highway Administration," it continued to serve the New England states, New Jersey, New York and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Expanded responsibilities will deal with federal aid highway programs of the bureau, federal assistance for state and community safety programs under the National Highway Safety Bureau and motor carriers safety programs formerly administered by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Mr. Swanson, a native of Minnesota and a graduate of the University of Minnesota, joined the Minnesota Highway Department in 1931. He transferred to the Bureau of Public Roads in 1935, and in 1947 was sent on a special assignment to Manila in the Phillippines.

In 1950 he was hired as a United Nations consultant to develop and prepare a highway devel-

opment plan for nations of Southeast Asia and a highway plan for Thailand specifically.

He was appointed division engineer for Massachusetts in 1955, and two years later was promoted to his current post.

That same year, he received the Department of Commerce Silver Medal Award, the second highest departmental award, based on contributions of unusual value.

whom the dentist has his option.


The site must be developed by July 1, 1968.

The reconstruction of a portion
of Route 9W, Long Lane, Jericho

County is being planned by the

The proposed improvement will start at the end of the new reconstruction of Long Lane and extend easterly crossing existing Long Lane approximately 0.1 mile north of the existing Long Lane-Jericho Road Intersection. The project continues easterly north of and parallel to Jericho Road, crossing Jericho Road approximately mile west of the Jericho Road-Elm Avenue Intersection. The project continues southeasterly on new location crossing Elm Avenue approximately 0.25 mile south of the Elm Avenue-Jericho Road Intersection The project continues easterly north of existing Elm Avenue for approximately 0.25 where it joins Elm Avenue and continues generally along Elm Avenue to the intersection of Route 9W. The length of this portion is approximately 2.0 miles.

Also included is the reconstruction of approximately 0.7 mile of Route 9W on existing alignment from approximately 1300 feet south of Lasher Road to approximately 500 feet north of Elm Avenue.

Also included is another portion of Route 3W approximately 0.6 mile in length from approximately 1300 feet south of the Jericho Road Intersection northerly on new location to approximately 1500 feet north of Jericho Road. Jericho Road will be extended approximately 300 feet easterly to meet the new location of Route 9W.


