



Road Hearing

Elm Avenue and Jericho Road residents voiced doubt at a public hearing recently that proposed highway reconstruction in the area would alleviate commercial traffic problems.

Daniel Ruddy, district planning engineer for the State Department of Public Works, explained plans and showed maps for the \$1.2 million reconstruction of parts of Route 9W, Elm Avenue and Jericho Road in the Town of Bethlehem.


This improvement will only generate more traffic to already inadequate roads in the Village of Selkirk as trucks travel to the State Thruway, Garrett Geurtze of Selkirk said.

The closing of a private road at the New York Central Railroad yards has forced truck traffic to take Jericho Road, Elm Avenue, Route 9W to get to the Thruway.

John Riley of Elm Avenue whose farm would be taken for the highway construction, questioned the highway plans, noting the lack of use of the Delmar by-pass and construction on Rt. 32. This is the third time the road has been changed, he said. and maintenance on Jericho Road is inadequate.

Three men with interest in the Jericho Drive-in Theater said they objected to the highway plans because their theater driveway would be on Jericho Road, not Route 9W and their sign must not be seen from Route 9W. Mr. Ruddy promised them his design engineers would inform them whether the sign would be visible from the newly alligned Route 9W.

Others in the audience of about 45 people at the Jericho School testified that the other parts of



Route 9W were more hazardous than the section proposed for reconstruction. In long term plans, all Route 9W in Albany and Greene Counties will be widened. The design department of the DPW is working on plans for road improvement parallel to the New York Central Railroad tracks from the Thruway to Route 32. Mr. Ruddy indicated.

Final plans and recommendation for reconstruction will not be made before October, Mr. Ruddv predicted.

The Town of Bethlehem looks favorably on the proposed road construction. Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke said DPW studies of traffic pattern of commercial and passenger vehicles show the realignment and construction will relieve some of the rgads with heavy use.

"My hope is that the next extension will be from the end of this project at Route 9W so it continues through the undeveloped area to the Selkirk Interchange," Mr. Kohinke said. This would remove heavy commercial and passenger traffic pressure and give relief to Route 396 as it goes through the Village of Selkirk, he added.

Plans show that Route 9W will be rebuilt on a new location for six-tenths of a mile from the Jericho Road intersection north.


Jericho Road will be extended 300 feet east to meet relocated Route 9W. Route 9W will be rebuilt on existing alignment for seventenths of a mile, from south of Lasher Road to about 500 feet north of Elm Avenue.


Jericho road will be rebuilt on a new location between Long Lane and Elm Avenue, Elm Avenue would be moved on a new location between Jericho Road and Route 9W for a total length of two miles.

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

It is unique, and as a result has attracted considerable comment — and some criticism.

It is purposely designed not to do a hard-sell of New York State. Architect-designer Felix Stephen Gula of New York City

has employed many modern audio-visual techniques to create a subliminal effect on the viewer.


The pavilion, of blue and green canvas, and steel frame with a floating center platform, and a separate, two-story building composed of six conical towers.

Chic, bilingual hostesses in orange costumes and wide white hats answer visitors' questions about New York State and distribute travel and other brochures.




