

Iris Sale

The Empire State Iris Society, a unit of the American Iris Socity, will hold its annual auction of surplus irises at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Irwin A. Conroe, Font Grove Road, Slingerlands, on Sunday, August 13. Each year iris growers donate their surplus stock to the Society which sets up bargain tables and auctions thru out the state for the purpose of encouraging flower growers to secure, at minimum cost, some of the beautiful, new and improved irises. The more expensive rhizomes will go on the auction block. These rhizomes, as iris root stalks are known, constitute the scarcer and newest varieties. The more prolific and less expensive irises will be available on bargain tables at prices as low as twentyfive per cent of market value. Thus a prospective iris grower may secure for around two dollars a collection of five or six irises of different colors, hues and shades. Irises will be available in all colors: blue, purple, black, red, orange, yellow, white,



The auction will begin promptly at 2 P.M. However, irises will be available on the bargain tables as early as 11 A.M. It is expected that several hundred rhizomes will be available for buyers' selections. Aside from the bargain collections other irises will be sold at half price.

Preceding the auction, picnic facilities will be available for all who wish to bring a picnic lunch and enjoy it on the spacious grounds of the auction site. Tables and beverages will be furnished by the Society without cost. Spokesmen for the Empire State Iris Society stress the point that the picnic, the bargain tables and the auction are available to anyone, regardless of whether or not he is an irisarian.



Study

Success of the Cancer Prevention Study in the New York State Division, American Cancer Society, was indicated today, when it was revealed that of the 55,006 men and women enrolled in the study only 588, or 1.07 per cent, were "lost" after six years of follow up.

The six-year, nationwide Cancer Prevention Study was launched in the fall of 1959 by the American Cancer Society to learn why some people are more likely to get cancer than others.

In the 54 upstate counties comprising the Society's New York State Division, more than 3,500 volunteer researchers participated in the Study.

The Study was the largest medical statistical survey ever conducted in the United States.

It was further revealed today that there were approximately 4,000 deaths reported in the six years of the Study in the New York State Division, and death certificates have been obtained for all but 34.

Statisticians of the American Cancer Society investigated the cause of each death reported.

Nationwide, the Study covered more than 1,000,000 people in 1,121 counties in the United States. Some 68,116 volunteer researchers participated.

The report of the Study shows that Erie County (Buffalo) which had the largest number of participants (9,232) "lost" only 85, or 0.92 per cent. Onondaga County (Syracuse), which had 4,591 participants, "lost" 36, or 0.78 per cent.

"Through participation in the Study, we helped to provide some of the answers, or at least some of the clues to the cancer puzzle," Dr. Samuel Sanes, President of the New York State Division, said.

In 1959, the 55,006 participants in the Study furnished many details about themselves and their pattern of life. They filled out questionnaires answering 250 carefully framed questions that might lead to determining if those who develop cancer differ in some ways from those who don't, with respect to environment, habits, exposures, and way of life.

During the six year period, the volunteer researchers reported on participants who had died, and, at times, questioned all survivors as to illnesses they may have had. At other periods, they asked questions on air pollution in their home and work areas.

Much of the data upon which the Surgeon General's report on the health hazards of smoking was based was uncovered through this Cancer Prevention Study.

It was also confirmed, among many other things, that certain cancer danger signals had a high relationship to deaths for specific sites of cancer. It was found that certain general physical complaints such as loss of appetite, shortness of breath, and a tendency to fatigue easily were related to the cancer death rate.

"A Study like this could not have been done without volunteers", Dr. Sanes said. "The cost would have been prohibitive."

"The volunteers who made this saving of dollars possible were doing their share to help bring cancer eventually under control."


2nd "Teen Time"





Japanese Beetle Grubs

The word from the outlying territories has reached us, thanks. to Mrs. P of West Bayberry Rd, Mrs. B of Saybrook Drive and Mrs. M of Weiser Street. Qne of the worst enemies this summer is the Japanese beetle, millions of them. They quickly knocked off their favorite delicacies: grape leaves, marigolds, crabapples and small shade trees. and then went after lesser delicacies in the vegetable garden: corn silk and bean foliage. With so many adults on the wing, the chances seem good for a heavy population of grubs in the lawn next Spring. This could be troublesome, for the grubs feed on the grass roots, killing large areas of the lawn.

Grub-nix or Cope are particularly well suited for knocking out the Japanese beetle grubs and other soil insects that infest

What Kind of Cow Is This?

Milk from a cow named Marie cannot be made into cheese.

Now under intensive study by scientists of the U.S. Depart-, ment of Agriculture, she is the only cow of her kind in the United States that produces such "defective" milk.

The trouble seems to lie in the fact that Marie's milk lacks certain kinds of amino acids, protein building blocks in milk, according to a Cornell University scientist.

"Trouble might occur in the future," said Prof. John W. Sherbon, N.Y. State College of Agriculture, "if a large majority of cows in a particular area have the same inherited tendency to produce milk that cannot be made into cheese."

In cooperation with USDA scientists, Sherbon and other Cornell researchers examined milk samples from nearly 200 normal cows to pinpoint factors affecting the cheese-making ability of milk.



Applications mailed in "early" will receive no preference in the selection process.

A party of hunters selected for a party permit may take a single deer-of-either-sex in addition to the one antlered deer legally allowed to each individual member of the party.

This year each member of a party must obtain a 1967 big game hunting license before the party applies for its permit. Each party member must enclose the "Party Permit Stub" from his license with the application when it is mailed in for selection.

The party will indicate its choice of an area on the application. There are no alternate choices. If the number of valid applications for one number of applications for that area exceeds the quota, a computer will select, at random, enough applications to fill that quota.

Leaders of parties selected will be notified about September 20, and will receive at that time additional instructions concerning paying the party permit fee and validating the applications.

A person owning 50 or more acres in one parcel within a party permit area may use the special landowner application, also available at all Conservation offices and license-issuing agencies, to secure a party permit without going through the computer selection process. Up to 50 per cent of the quota in each area is available for qualified landowner parties.

This year a landowner application may be filed at the same time as other party permit applications — from the date of availability through Sept. 5. Applications postmarked Sept. 6 and later will not be accepted. Landowner applicants will be notified of approval about Oct. 1 after ownership records have been checked. Landowner parties in the Adirondacks and Catskills will have two members; in western New York, three members.

Each of the 15-party permit areas established this season has been assigned a quota of permits based on biological studies of herd and range conditions, and designed to maintain a stable, healthy herd.

Complete information about applications, quotas, party size, permit areas and hunting with a party permit are contained on the information sheet that accompanies each party permit acplication. Applicants are advised to read this sheet carefully and to follow all instructions. They should also check the 1967 edition of the "Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide" for information about the big game season.
