Turkey Season

Eastern New York's wild turkey season will run Oct. 2 - 8 in Delaware, Greene, Otsego and Schoharie Counties, the State Conservation Department announced today.

A free, special permit is required for the week-long season in addition to a 1967-68 small game hunting license. Applications for a permit will be accept-

ed from Sept. 14 through Oct. 4 by mail or in person. Correspondence should be addressed to: Regional Game Manager, New York State Conservation Department, Stamford, N.Y. 12167. An applicant must submit his name, address and registration number from his 1967-68 small game hunting license.

This marks the fifth consecutive wild turkey season in the Catskill section of the state. In 1967 one hunter in 24 took a turkey.

Prospects for the 1967 season, according to regional game manager John J. Whalen, are "brighter than a year ago". More broods have been spotted and, despite a wet summer season, survival has been good. However, because turkey hunting requires a great deal of skill, few hunters are expected to come away with a Thanksgiving Day trophy.

Permits and an attached questionnaire must be returned to the Department's Stamford office following the close of the season.

In addition, a hunter fortunate enough to kill a turkey is required to send in one leg of the bird so the age and sex of the bird may be determined.

Because the Department is keeping close tabs on the success of its program to establish turkeys in the eastern part of the state, some birds have been banded while others have minature radios attached. Successful hunters are requested to turn in all research devices. A \$10 reward

will be paid upon surrender of a transmitter.

The wild turkey, America's largest game bird, has increased from near extinction 50 years ago to a point where many states have established hunting seasons

Because of its new importance as a game bird, scientific information on the various races, the bird's range, and latest population figures have been brought together in a book published by The Wildlife Society and edited by Prof. Oliver H. Hewitt, conservationist at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell University.

The 589-page book includes background and historical facts about turkeys, and how they have evolved; their biology and habits, population and distribution; and their management in the various geographical areas.

The book is designed for the sportsman, biologist, student, and general reader. Three color plates are included, taken from paintings by Louis Agassiz Fuertes, George Miksch Sutton and the Ned Smith. Also, numerous photographs, charts, and drawings illustrate the text.

Student Deferment

To the Editor: There have been many articles printed in recent months concerning the new Selective Service law. As a service to all college students in the area I feel one aspect of it should be brought to their attention. To be considered for a 2-S classification each registrant must submit a written request for deferment to his local board. A simple letter to the local board requesting a 2-S classification would suffice. It is each registrants' responsibility to submit this request to his local board.

Under the new law no registrant who has requested and received deferment as an undergraduate student will be eligible for additional deferment except for extreme hardship, graduate study or employment contributing to the national health, safety or interest. This change would be especially applicable when a registrant marries and a family is involved. He would no longer be automatically considered for deferment in class 3-A as a father.

Therefore, if any student in the area wishes to be considered or classification in class 2-S for the coming school year I would suggest he so inform his local board. They are more than willing to answer any questions a registrant might have concerning his student status if they are able to.






