

NEW ROAD IN SLINGERLANDS — The dotted line represents the proposed relocation of Kenwood Avenue in Slingerlands, Town of Bethlehem, by the State Transportation Department. Designed to ease traffic conditions in the congested area, the new road would also provide an outlet for Slingerlands to the Slingerlands Bypass when the latter highway is extended west. The first phase of the project would allow motorists to cross between the Kenwood Avenue and New Scotland Road without having to encounter the existing, hazardous intersection. It would also eliminate the necessity to use an obsolete bridge on Bridge Street, said Frank J. Fuller, District 1 engineer.

Mrs. Alvin Lange, chairman, announces four sittings: 4:00, 5:15, 6:30, and 7:30 P.M. A takeout service is also available.


Meeting





Douglas Marone, a Players veteran, will play Sandor Turai,



He is currently a director of the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce, treasuror of the Bethle hem Opportunities For Growth, Inc., and a state officer for the New York Jaycees, serving as district president for Albany and Rensselaer Counties.

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P-TA Meeting

At their first meeting of the year, the Slingerlands P-TA heard a panel discussion on the new Social Studies Curriculum in the Bethlehem schools. The panel members were Professor Donald Van Cleve, Sociologist of SUNY, Mrs. Grace Erkson, Principal of the Glenmont School, and Mrs. Ruth Bates, 3rd Grade Teacher at Slingerlands.

Both Mrs. Bates and Mrs. Erkson, who work on the committee setting up the new curriculum, outlined the many trends in experimental teaching and explained that the committee is continuing to experiment and are open to suggestions from all the teachers. The aim of the new curriculum is to change the social studies program into one of doing, thinking, and discussing. They clarified for many of the parents present just what social studies encompasses, covering history, geography, political science, economics, sociology, and others. The program begins at the kindergarten level and goes right through

Meeting to grade 12 in various phases.

Professor Van Cleve said that social studies is probably most under scutiny by fellow citizens. His one comment on the new curriculum in Bethlehem was not to neglect some of the important professor ociologist Erkson, – because he feels that good citizenship cannot begin at too early an age.

After the panel discussion, Bertram E. Kohinke, Town Supervisor, who had been invited to give the Town views on the Slingerlands P-TA request for sidewalks on New Scotland Rd, and Kenwood Avenue where none exist, spoke to the parents. He said it was definite that there would be a walkway on New Scotland Rd. extending from Southwood, where it now ends, to the Cross driveway. He said there were problems preventing the walkway on Kenwood Avenue from McKinley to Union Avenue; however, he did say that perhaps the walkway could go as far as Orchard on Kenwood, then over the back way to school. He promised to have the Town Engineer study the matter, and advise the P-TA.

The P-TA has requested the walkways as a safety measure for those children who walk to school from the Kenaware section and out in the New Scotland section. Mr. Kohinke promised further to have the town engineer look into the possibility of extending the New Scotland Rd. walk to the town line inasmuch as that is an extremely dangerous section of highway, especially for walkers and cyclers.



Tebbutt said that the 16 mm. sound-and-color film entitled "The Child Molester" stresses the importance of adults alerting — without alarming — children between the ages of 4 and 14 to the dangers of molestation. It also reveals how an education program can be successfully and safely taught to the children of a community.

The film was produced by the Highway Safety Foundation of Mansfield, Ohio, in conjunction an actual child molestation crime. The case history was taken from Ohio police files. Mr. Tebbutt is making the film available for showing to church, school and civic groups in conjunction with his distribution of "This Is Your Secret" booklets to area youngsters.

The "Secret" booklet is designed to appeal to children, and is written in a language and at a level they can easily comprehend. Colorfully illustrated, "Secret" helps prepare children for the hours they must spend away from home by showing them how to tell "Good" people from "Bad" people. A distribution program of these booklets is being carried out currently by the Tebbutt firm. Mr. Tebbutt said that reservations are now being accepted for a showing of "The Child Molester" film. further complicated by the fact that each has many local names - numerous ones applying to more than one member of the family. The northern pike, for instance, has over 40 names to its credit.

Before man started moving fish, pickerel were primarily in southern and eastern New York. and pike in the northern and western parts of the State. The muskie had much more limited distribution in the St. Lawrence and Chautauqua.

These fish are all voracious eaters and therefore are good at helping to maintain a controlled population of perch and other warm-water fish that often get out of hand. It has been estimated that a pike will eat onefifth of its weight in fish every day.

Although the muskalonge, northern pike and chain pickerel are difficult to identify, the surest way to separate these three members of the pike family is by the scaling on their cheek and gill cover. The chain pickerel has scales covering all of its cheek and corresponding portion of the gill cover. The muskalonge has scaling only on the upper half of its cheek and gill cover. The northern pick as might be expected, is halfway between. It has scaling on all of its cheek, and only on the upper half of its gill cover.

If the scaling on the lower cheek of a pike is obscure, a further separating feature between pike and muskies is the number of sensory pores on the underside of the lower jaw. A pike has 5, while the muskie has 6-9.







Bulbs

The spring flowering bulbs, especially the earliest ones like crocus, cloth of gold, and snow drop, are the harbingers of spring. But in order to have these messengers bring color to your garden the bulbs must be planted now.

The first bulbs to flower, usually in March, are the early crocus, cloth of gold and winter aconite. These are followed by Crocus, Siberian Squill, and Glory of Snow. Then come the hyacinths, daffodils and tulips. A well planned bulb garden can have blooms for about ten weeks.

Most bulbs should be planted in soils with good drainage and plenty of sun. Of course, there are exceptions, Scilla Siberica (Siberian Squill), Crocus, winter Aconite and snow drops (Galanthus) will give satisfactory performance under trees. Camassia is an exception that will do well in wet or almost swampy soils.

For best results, plant bulbs early in the fall. October is the best month to plant all spring bulbs. Tulips, Narcissi and daffodils can be planted until the ground is frozen hard, but earlier planting is preferred.

The bulb garden should be prepared by working the soil to a depth of about eight inches. When working the soil, work in three pounds of 5-10-5 or one and a half pounds of 10-10 or similar fertilizer for each 100 square feet of garden. Soils that are very clayey or sandy can be improved by working in organic matter, such as compost or peat moss. Use about 5 bushels of organic matter for each 100 square feet. Do not use fresh animal manure as this may injure the bulbs.


