




The smooth sheet of ice that looks so inviting for skating and sliding can be a death trap, warns James H. Carnahan, director of Health and Safety Services, Red Cross Albany, New York Chapte

An estimated 400-500 deaths occur each year from falls through ice, according to Carnahan

"The tragedy is that many of the deaths could be prevented if the victims or bystanders knew what to do," said Carnahan.

With the winter ice season approaching, he urged ice sports enthusiasts to heed these Red Cross safety precautions and rescue pointers:

— If you break through ice into deep water, don't try to climb out using your knees. Instead, extend both arms along the surface of the ice, extend your legs and kick vigorously. This will help you to squirm forward onto solid











roll to safe-

g sites, keep some scue equipment handy. A 30-foot coil of rope with a life ring at the end; a 12-foot plank, ladder, or reaching pole, or an old tire tied to a long rope.

- When rescuing someone who has broken through the ice, warn others away from the break. Lie down flat, to distribute the weight of your body, and push the 12-foot plank, ladder, or pole to the victim. Don't stand near the break and never attempt a swimming rescue.

Ask your American Red Cross for their 16mm, motion picture "Ice Rescue." It is available free of charge for club or school use.

Carnahan said the American Red Cross cites these precautions for skaters on ice-coated ponds, lakes, and rivers:

1. Never skate alone. Always

skate in supervised areas.

- 2. Skate only where the ice is three to four inches thick.
- 3. Don't build a fire on the ice or gather in large groups.
- 4. Shallow-water skating areas offer the safest and best conditions for skating. The water should not be more than waistdeep to the smallest skater.

"Remember, prologed freezing temperatures are necessary for the ice to freeze solidly and to a safe thickness," cautioned Carnahan.

He said extra care should be taken when crossing ice that has formed over running water, such as in a stream or river. The water currents can erode the ice from below and weaken it.

We next come to government payrolls.

In August of this year there were 11,245,000 people on federal. state, and local payrolls. This was an increase of 725.000

public payroll jobs in this coun-

try in one year.

The growth rate of the number of public payroll jobs was a shade below 7 per cent.

Let us recapitulate:

Private industry jobs, the basic source of the wealth from which we derive taxes, increase at the rate of 2.1 per cent a year.

Public payroll jobs, financed by these taxes, are increasing at a rate of 7 per cent a year.

For some years, most of the growth in government jobs could be attributed to state and local governments. In the past year the expansion of federal jobs has added to the dizzy pace.

Federal employment increased in one year from 2.631.000 to 2,804,000. Civilian employment in the Department of Defense was a big factor in this growth.

State and local government iobs increased from 7.889,000 a year ago to 8,441,000 in August of 1967.

The population explosion, the drift to the suburbs, the need for new public services, have all provided valid excuses for the growth in state and local payrolls for years.

But total population increases at a 1.15 per cent rate. For how long do state and local jobs expand at a 7 per cent rate before we are taking in one another's washing?

Manufacturing employment is a good measure for comparing the growth in public payroll jobs. Manufacturing, which employed some 19,480,000 workers in August of this year is the larFollow The Crowd To



Deer Checking

Deer checking stations in the Adirondacks will be operated on weekends at three major locations throughout the remainder of the deer season, the Conservation Department announced today.

One station will be on the

Northway at the Corinth rest area; another will be at Northville on Route 30; and the third will operate at the Trenton rest area on Route 12 north of Utica. Periodic road checks will also be made at various locations in the northern zone until the close of the season on December 5.

At last weekend's operation of

the checking stations, 252 deer and 11 bear went through the Northway station. At Northville, Department game specialists checked 119 deer and 2 bears, and 165 deer and 4 bear passed through the Trenton station.

Over the years, the checking stations have provided the Department with valuable information which is studied and used to improve game management programs and to design hunting seasons. Department game specialists and research personnel check the age, weight, sex and state of nutrition of deer and provide this information to the hunter. Additional data on bear is also taken and recorded.


Where?



for there are those which are not normal lows and represent very unhealthy conditions for the animal concerned. A prime example of this is the present status of our national emblem, the bald eagle, which is fast disappearing from its range south of Alaska.

A normal low population, that is one not caused by something like DDT or man's destruction of the habitat, will recover. In the case of some species of game, such as waterfowl, closed or reduced seasons can speed this recovery, while in others, such as grouse or cottontails, this appears to have little effect.

What causes a high population, such as the 1965 grouse population, to suddenly disappear? At one time it was felt that disease was the major decimating factor. At times this has been easily demonstrated. As the population density increases so does the opportunity for a sick animal to pass on the disease to a healthy animal. Rabies in our fox population a few years back is a good example of this. Disease as a factor is usually hard to document. for the animals just curl up and die and seldom are brought to the attention of a qualified pathologist.

Since the normal life span of most small animals is short, if adequate replacements are not made it isn't long before a reduced population occurs.

Weather can play a surprisingly important part in the survival of infant wildlife. Floods can be calamities to local populations, but more important to widespread areas are cold rains at critical times. The crash of the pheasant population in the early 40's was probably brought about by extended cold rains during the

animals a power to compensate for population density changes. As populations increase there is increased competition for food, territory, and cover, which creates friction between members of the population. This results in a lowering of the reproductive rate. When a low population density exists, food and good cover are more readily available and a higher reproductive rate develops.

Under the less complicated conditions of the Arctic, some of these actions and interrelationships are more easily demonstrated. The snowy owl reproduction, for instance, responds dramatically to the lemming population. During low years of the lemming cycle there is no breeding at all. As the peak approaches, the owls may breed and lay four or five eggs. When food is abundant during peak years of the cycle,


