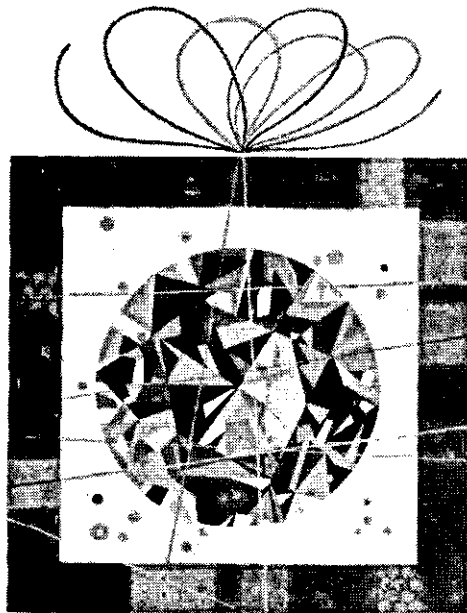

Thinking of Denmark, one is inclined to picture a fairy tale country made famous by Hans Christian Andersen. A student of geography might see it as a country of islands stretching from Germany to the far north. An educator would point to it as one of the most literate countries in the world. How do we in Bethlehem see it? More important, how will we see it a year from now when we have been privileged to view it through the eyes of Bethlehem's

Community Ambassador, for it is to Denmark the young person chosen to represent our community, will go in 1968.

In the years since its inception in 1955, Bethlehem has sent 13 Ambassadors to as many different countries on 5 different continents. Our 14th Ambassador will be the first to visit a Scandinavian country, although we have had incoming Experimenters from Finland and Sweden.

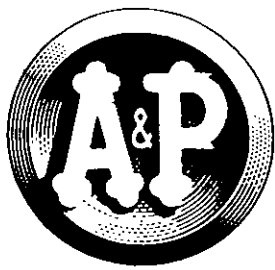

Delmar Pushing More Refined

"Detraining" their children so they don't push and shove their way into lines is the peculiar problem facing an Elsmere couple returned from Beirut, Lebanon.

Gordon Molyneux and his wife, Barbara, found their two children became aggressive in small ways during their year stay in the Middle East. Mr. Molyneux, a Bethlehem Central High School teacher, received a research and study grant for an Arab Studies Graduate Training program at the American University in Beirut.

Standing in line awaiting his turn is not a characteristic of a Middle Eastern native, Mr. Molyneux explains.

In Beirut where the Molyneux's considered the cost of living for an American to be higher than in Delmar, the couple found themselves inept in bargaining. Even airline tickets are subject to bargaining and shopping is done in bazaars.

"I can now see my own way of life from a new perspective," Mr. Molyneux commented during an interview in the Bethlehem Central "Highlights" this month. "I am convinced that one can best understand his own culture if it is contrasted against another."

Mr. Molyneux observed that social groups in Lebanon tended to be formed on religious or family lines rather than on race or color. Economically categories

were the "very rich" and the "very poor" although a "middle Class" in the Western sense is growing in Lebanon.

Bethlehem Approves Slingerland Project

The Bethlehem Planning Board has approved the plot plan for the first subdivision development of more than acre lots in the town.

J. Woodrow Beauregard hopes to start the necessary grading and minimal tree cutting for the 10 lot development in back of Southwood Subdivision in Slingerlands. House construction - with price tag of \$50,000 and up - would be started in the spring, according to Mr. Beauregard.

The lots range in size from 1.4 acres to five acres. Plans call for retaining the wooded and hilly terrain. Mr. Beauregard would build a cul de sac street, Devonshire Drive through the 24 acre tract. Provision was made for the street to have a connection that would open up adjacent land owned by Mrs. Dudley Mattice.

No objections were raised at a public hearing prior to the meeting where the planning board took action on the project.

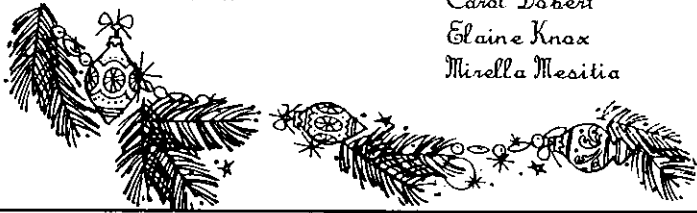

Bethlehem Gives Nod To Bargaining Group

In 30 minutes, the Bethlehem Central Board of Education completed routine business, including recognizing a noon hour aides association for wage negotiation, and adjourned to closed executive session.

Superintendent Richard Moonaw indicated the closed session would be focused on the Taylor Act and its implications for wage and other negotiation with school district employees. He added that closed sessions on this subject could be expected to be a pattern in the district.

The board has indicated a need for job description for employees with decisions on classification.

The board recognized the Bethlehem Central Noon Hour Aides Association as the exclusive negotiating representative for all school district noon hour aides. It also agreed to publish a legal notice announcing all the groups recognized. The Taylor

Act provides that employees can designate an organization to negotiate wages and other benefits.

FIRE HYDRANT

Del Everett, business manager, reported that the district architect, Henry Blatner of Blatner, Mendel, and Mesick will analyze whether a fire hydrant for the bus garage should be attached to the new water loop which is being installed around the building. The fire insurance rating organization is concerned this might drop the pressure in the main loop, affecting the return for the building, Mr. Everett said. He added that a larger main might be connected to the 16 inch line on Delaware Avenue.

The Bethlehem Cemetery Association's request that the district pay \$2,100 for fencing to separate school and cemetery properties will be "considered" but approval is highly unlikely, the board indicated. The sharing the cost of 1,400 feet of fencing was requested because children use the cemetery for "short cuts and other activity."

INSURANCE INSPECTION

Mr. Everett also reported that The Travelers Insurance Co. had inspected all school boilers and found them satisfactory under a normal load condition.

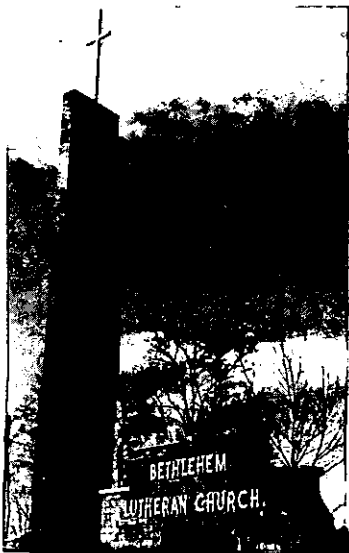

In addition to his church work, Dr. Brandt has been active in Masonic circles and currently

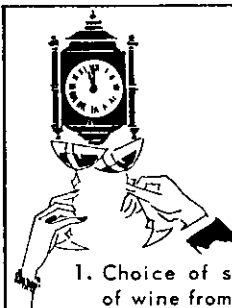

poses a serious problem that cannot be solved by stepping up bloodmobile donations, the medical director of the Northeastern New York Red Cross Regional Blood Program said today.

Dr. Albert H. Harris said many medical situations require the use of fresh blood, or components that are present in blood for only a short time after it is collected from the donor.

Bloodmobile collections, though they are essential in stocking blood banks in the 26 cooperating hospitals in the 10-county area, cannot supply the fresh blood many patients must have, Dr. Harris said.

Fresh blood contains platelets, which are very thin disks that aid blood clotting. Patients undergoing major surgery lose platelets in the blood they lose, and receive platelets to help their blood to clot, slowing down blood loss.

In any extensive surgery, where the patient is given four or more units of blood, one of each four must be fresh blood, Dr. Harris said.

Fresh blood is also essential for persons with severe liver disease, or undergoing liver surgery; for persons with some kidney disorders, especially those undergoing surgery or being treated with the artificial kidney; for persons with massive bleeding from injuries; for those with certain blood disorders, and for hemophiliacs who are bleeding.

Hemophiliacs who are not bleeding but who need blood replenishment can be given fresh frozen plasma, which contains a component that combats their tendency to bleed.

"Fractionation of blood into various components permits more efficient treatment of more individuals," Dr. Harris said, "but the laboratory processes must be done within two hours at the outside from the time the blood is collected."

"When blood is donated at the Center, we take it to the laboratory at once. But it just isn't possible to do this with blood collected on most bloodmobiles."

tive director of the blood program, said that bloodmobile personnel have had to make a special trip back to the Center after the first hour of blood collecting so the blood could be typed and rushed to hospitals urgently needing fresh blood.

"This is an inefficient and costly operation, calling for an extra series of steps and extra personnel and vehicles," Braley said. "We have had to do it, but it was an emergency stopgap measure. It is not the answer to the problem and is only possible on nearby bloodmobile operations."

The program's quota for the Center, which is at the Bender Hygienic Laboratory at 136 South Lake Avenue, is from 35 to 50 units of blood for each of the three days a week the Center is open for donors, Braley said.

But the Center has been getting only five to 10 donors a day, he said.

"In the first five months of the program, we have had one good day at the Center," he added. "Usually the Center's staff members and volunteer workers, about 12 of them, outnumber the donors.

Braley said bloodmobile collections, at sites in Albany as well as throughout the sprawling region, have been generally satisfactory after a slow start in July.

"But the Center is our weak spot," he said. "We must get more individual donors and more civic and fraternal and religious organizations, to schedule their donations at the Center.

Oregon, heads up a team of USGS engineers and hydrologists at Albany who work closely with State and county agencies and officials on problems of water resources development. Some recent projects have included a preliminary investigation of flow and water quality in the lower Hudson River, and an appraisal of ground water resources in the Genesee River basin.

Parker received a B.A. degree from Central Washington College. Before joining the Survey, he completed 3 years of post-graduate work toward his Ph.D. in geology.

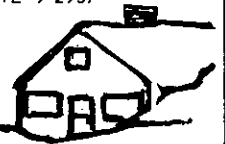

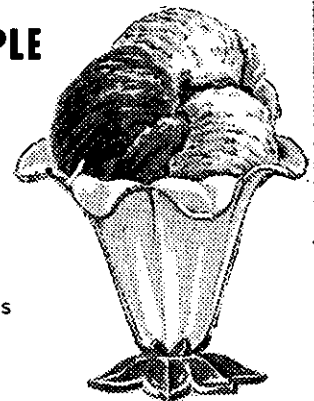

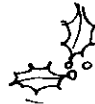

Fact Book

Important developments in the Capital District, including completion of the Adirondack Northway, deepening of the Port of Albany, construction of a multimillion-dollar railroad freight classification yard in Selkirk, and the \$500 million "South Mall" project, designed to make the area the most outstanding State-government installation in the nation, are highlighted in the 1967-68 edition of the Capital District Business Fact Book, publication of which was announced today by State Commerce Commissioner Ronald B. Peterson.

Commissioner Peterson points out that the district's fortunate location at the crossroads of the Northeast makes it a vital center of transportation, manufacturing, finance and government, as well as a major distribution center.

The Fact Book notes that the Capital District, comprising Albany, Rensselaer, Saratoga and Schenectady counties and largely rural Schoharie, Warren and Washington counties, is rich in historical, cultural and recreational advantages which thousands of tourists seek out each year. It indicates that industry is diversified but concentrated geographically, with more than five-sixths of the area's work force employed in the Albany-Schenectady-Troy metropolitan area.

Latest available information on the Capital District's manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade and selected services is reported in the Fact Book, as are data on the district's institutions of higher learning, newspapers, radio and television stations, medical and legal services, agriculture, real property taxes, public water supply and large industrial and commercial employers.
