## "The Mousetrap"

The Slingerlands Community Players announced today that tickets are going fast for their long-awaited presentation of Agatha Christie's record-breaking mystery thriller, "The Mousetrap." They point out that, with the play scheduled to open in the BCHS auditorium on Friday evening, January 19, only a few more days remain to secure tickets; those who wait until the last minute, they state, are likely to be disappointed.

"The Mousetrap," in the opinion of Dick Weeks, who is directing the production for the Slingerlands Players, is one of the most gripping and spellbinding plays, as well as one of the most genuinely mystifying, in the present-day theatre. He states that, although Miss Christie plays scrupulously fair with the audience in setting forth her clues for everyone to see and observe, it will take the most ingenious kind of mind to beat her to the conclusion and come up with the identity of the killer (among a relatively small cast of char-

acters) before the play's smashing climax.

For those who may not be acquainted with the reputation of "The Mousetrap," it recently smashed the all-time long-run record of the London stage, where it is still running, and it is now creeping up on the Broadway record of 3,224 performances set a number of years ago by "Life With Father." If and when this latter figure is surpassed, "The Mousetrap," will become the longest running play in the history of the English speaking theatre.

The winter series of the Sixth Annual Film Festival presented by the Bethlehem Community Ambassador Project, is now underway. These films, thoughtfully selected for children, are presented under careful supervision on Friday evenings at 7 P.M. at the Bethlehem Central Jr. High School, for the nominal fee: 35¢.

The Community Ambassador Project, in existence in Bethlehem since 1955, has sent thirteen of our young people to represent us in communities in as many different countries abroad. Arrangements are made through The Experiment in International Living, Putney, Vt., the original personal exchange program in this country. Our community understanding of other countries and peoples has certainly been enhanced by the talks to local organizations by the returning ambassadors. In addition, each summer the community has been privileged to play host to groups of incoming Experimenters, adding to the number of countries with which we have had some personal contact.

Financing of this program has been through contributions of clubs and service organizations, some support from N.Y. State Adult Education, and special events arranged by the volunteer workers in the Project. Proceeds from the Children's Film Festival have been a very important part of this financing and will continue to be. Without the support of all these aspects of financing by the community, Bethlehem Community Ambassador Project could not hope to function.

## Appointed

Governor Rockefeller has selected Alton G. Marshall of Glenmont, one of his top aides, to fill a vacancy on the State Thruway Authority.

Marshall will continue in his capacity as secretary to the governor, a \$32,265 position, but will draw no compensation for the Thruway post which normally pays \$17,000 to members.

He succeeds Walter J. Mahoney, who was elected to the Supreme Court in November. His term will end Jan. 1, 1972.

The Thruway post, considered a choice patronage assignment, had been rumored for Erie County Republican Chairman James R. Lawley. He decided against it, reportedly because of fears of resentment from Republican colleagues.

Marshall, who also heads the state's negotiating team for bargaining under the Taylor Law, is a 20-year veteran of state service.

He has been deputy director of the budget, secretary of the State Public Service Commission, executive assistant to the chairman of the Public Service Commission and budget examiner in the Division of the Budget.

Marshall received the 1966 Charles Evans Hughes Award for outstanding service in public administration from the Capital District chapter, American Society for Public Administration.


Mr. Margison, a veteran of twenty years service with the FBI, began his career at Quanti-



occasions, during his FBI career, by Director J. Edgar Hoover, for outstanding accomplishments in his service to the government. Mr. Margison served in Knoxville, Tennessee, in the critical period following World War II, and played an important role in the Harry Gold espionage case.

A five-year veteran of World War II, he entered the ranks of the Bureau after his discharge as a Major from the Army Ordnance Corps. He was drafted as a private as a Second Lieutenant, and then served abroad in the China-Burma-India Theater as a General Staff Officer mapping out the planned invasion of Japan.

He has two daughters - Susan, a school librarian in New York City, New York, and Constance in Utica, New York. His mother, Mrs. Louis Margison, resides at 9 Manning Square

in Albany. He is a 1937 graduate of State University at Albany, where he earned his Master's Degree.

## Service Man Of the Month

Lloyd R. Wilson Jr., DT/2, U.S. Naval Reserve, now serving at a dental clinic in Phu Bai, Viet Nam, has been chosen as the Committee That Cares Service Man of the Month.

Lloyd, better known as Buddy, left for Viet Nam in February 1967, where he was stationed at a dental clinic in Chu Lai for 7 months. Later he was transferred to Phu Bai. The clinic is a "shed" serving both medical and dental patients including G.I.'s and natives. They have a crew of 1 M.D. and 3 technicians. Buddy says it's very gratifying work. 





serve town residents. One doctor plans to leave the area, another is not well, and a third does not want to take additional patients.

"We want to do something before a monster (of no medical coverage) is created," Mr. Pape explained.

"The situation in our community is not as bad as in many others," Dr. Lefevre said, "but why wait for it to get that bad?"

He suggested that the town and the area might do some things to prevent a severe problem. The community should be made aware of the situation, he believes.

Dr. Lefevre noted that Coeymans has fewer doctors now than it had 20 years ago although the population has increased. Medicare and Medicaid programs have increased the administrative demands on the doctor, Dr. Lefevre said. This takes time from actual patient care.

None of the physicians serving the Coeymans area is under 50 years old. Efforts have been made by the doctors in the community to recruit young doctors, he said, but they have not been successful.

Dr. Lefevre believes the shortage of doctors can be attributed in part to the fact that medical schools are training few physicians for general practice. This is partially because of the doctors' desire for a more lucrative, less time-consuming practice than a general physician might have. A young man may prefer his practice in a city rather than rural area.

Mr. Pape plans to get additional information offered by Dr. Lefevre as he studies possible courses of action.

## School Plans Are Studied

At a recent meeting, the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Board of Education members buried their heads in architect's plans for a new junior high school.

Architect Henry Blatner of Blatner, Mendel and Mesick asked the school administration to give him their views on the homemaking, art, music and science areas. He showed the board the large layouts of the junior high school, on which a bond issue vote is expected in the spring.

Mr. Blatner explained that the lower level of the building will fit requirements for fallout shelter space, making possible state reimbursement. The cost of making the second floor conform for fallout shelter reimbursement would not justify the cost, he added. The gymnasium and locker area also may be fallout shelter areas.

Herbert Holland, principal of the junior-senior high school, presented teachers' ideas on the plans.

Superintendent Frank Filipone questioned whether plans should call for larger science and preparation rooms. He indicated he will ask the State Education Department for advice.

"It's reduced and reasonable," board member Howard Engel said of the school plan. He said he thought it would be approved by the voters.

The board and administration have been openly cost conscious in studying the building plans. One member expressed the fear that residents will be concerned with predicted increases in state and federal taxes when they are
