



Final Forum

The final session of the Community Forum on Vietnam will be held at 7:30 p.m. this Sunday, January 28, in Fellowship Hall of First Methodist Church, which is located at 428 Kenwood Avenue, Delmar.

"Possible Alternatives to Present U.S. Policy in Vietnam" will be the subject of the panel discussion which will be moderated by Dr. DeWitt C. Ellinwood, professor of history, SUNY at Albany. Panel members will be: Dr. Levon Bedrosian of Elsmere, a physician practicing in Albany; John A. Daniels, Religious Society of Friends, Albany Monthly Meeting; and Dr. Richard A. Kendall, professor of history, SUNY at Albany and a specialist in the history of American foreigh policy.

In commenting on the series, Rev. Robert B. Thomas, senior pastor of the Delmar church which is sponsoring the Forum, observed: "The sessions so far have attracted a sizeable audience of concerned citizens who are interested in a chance to increase their own understanding of the very complex and tragic Vietnam situation. They clearly appreciate this opportunity to share their own questions, information and judgements about it. The tradition of freedom of expression is a precious one for us as Americans and as Christians, but we must remember that it

carries with it an obligation for each citizen to act intelligently and responsibly rather than in ignorance or prejudice. If this Forum adds to our understanding and awareness, it is serving its purpose."

Life Saving

An American Red Cross Senior Life Saving course will be held at the Bethlehem Central Senior High School swimming pool beginning Tuesday, February 13, according to Carl Gardner, chairman of Water Safety for the Albany Area Chapter, American Red Cross. The course which is a prerequisite to the Water Safety Instructor course, will meet from 7 until 10 P.M. for eight consecutive Tuesday evenings.

Chairman Gardner said there is no charge for the instruction.

He said all applicants must be able to swim at least 400 yards and be at least 16 years of age.

Enrollment will close after the first meeting of the class on February 13.

Diving Course

A Nationally Certified course in Skin and Scuba Diving, for men and women, will be held at Bethlehem Central High School, 700 Delaware Avenue, beginning Monday, January 29, at 7 P.M. Those interested may register at this time in room 20. Classes will be from 7-10 P.M. Mondays for 12 weeks. The fee for the course is \$25. A deposit of \$10 is required for registration. Students must furnish mask, fins and snorkle, but it is suggested they do not purchase these items before the first class, as some types are not recommended. Only a bathing suit is needed at the first class. The course will be conducted by the Adirondack Underwater Diving Instructors Organizations. AUDIO will provide for the use of SCUBA and issue work books to each student.

This program will be directed by AUDIO president Ronald Hems of Melrose, Vice President James O'Connell of Glenmont and secretary treasurer Anthony Zotto of Troy. Hems, O'Connell and Zotto are certified and registered nationally as Scuba Instructors with the Conference for National Co-operation in Aquatics. They will be assisted by other instructors, leader examiners, and certified divers throughout the course.

The course will consist of 14 hours of diving theory and technology and 18 hours practical water work. Those who successfully complete the course will be certified as skin diver, ages 14 through 16, or Scuba Diver age 17 and over. CNCA membership includes the Red Cross. 



Appointment

Governor Rockefeller has pulled the political surprise of the year — he named his official secretary to the Thruway Authority.

He thus slammed shut the door against political importuning for the \$17,000 a year part time position.

And he put one of the truly bright lights in the state administration, Alton G. Marshall, of Glenmont on the three-member authority.

Mr. Marshall will not leave his \$32,265 a year post as official secretary to the governor — and will not receive a \$17,000 Thruway Commission salary. Actually, he was sort of "state manager," the man who handled all the programs and details.

Governor Rockefeller said that the appointment was tied into the "massive overhaul of our transportation and highway system. Our programs, the most extensive in the nation, demand the utmost skills and talents in its planning and execution.

"Al Marshall brings to bear those skills and talents in enormous measure."

Under the law, Mr. Marshall can hold both positions, but he cannot draw a salary from the Thruway Authority.

Meeting

765-7301 Methodist men of the Slingerlands Methodist Church after hearing Dr. Harry Hamilton, assistant professor of atmospheric sciences at State University of New York at Albany, on Elsmere resident, and Mrs. Helen Ackerman also of Elsmere.

The two speakers showed slides "It's Your Move" on the problems an Albany Negro family encountered last year when they tried to find housing. The family followed leads on 25 houses in Albany and such socalled suburban areas as Delmar and East Greenbush.

Mrs. Ackerman said about 15 Negro families live in the Tri-Village area and there has been no appreciable increase in five vears. Albany has 18 per cent non-white home owners, a low percentage in the state she added.

The particular need in Negro housing is in the \$8,000 to \$13,000 bracket, Dr. Hamilton, a Negro said.

Several of the Methodist Men asked the speakers to inform the men's club if a Negro family sought housing in Slingerlands and was rebuffed. They knew of no such instances of rejection.

Mrs. Ackerman remarked that several years ago a group of people in the Tri-Village area had conducted informal coffee sessions at which human rights and housing were discussed. An attempt to get enough signatures of residents supporting welcome signs and labeling Bethlehem a "fair housing community" failed miserably, she said.

She believes that a similar project should be attempted now.

The Methodist men seemed to believe that the Negro would find community acceptance as the Jew had. Ten years ago, they said, few Jewish families lived in the Tri-Village area but their numbers have increased to the point where they have a Tri-Village Jewish Association and are thought to be considering building a synagogue.



benefit of the hundreds in this area who remain to be helped and to continue support for the existing local Cerebral Palsy Affiliates.

Hot Seat

Landscapes hang on the office walls, name plates are changed, and another family portrait appears behind the desk — personal effects which mark the change in chief administrator at Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District.

But the community which knows Dr. Frank Filippone is awaiting to see whether the man will change and what this super-intendent's leadership will bring the school system. Dr. Filippone became superintendent Jan. 1 when Dr. Virgil Tompkins resigned and accepted a post with the Liverpool School District.

"Anyone with ideas and conviction wants to take a crack at the job of superintendent," Dr. Filippone observed although any school administration text calls this a "hot seat" which is getting hotter as teachers become more militant, parents and students demand more, and boards of education jealously guard their control

An administrator must be "in tune with his community," Dr. Filippone believes but as a leader he must look beyond, into the long range educational picture. "But you lead or you don't lead," the warmly responsive educator admitted. His standard, he added, is to "treat people with dignity" and even in difficult situations "leave them with a shred of dignity." Compassion is a trait he nurtures.

A "middle roader" according to his own estimate, Dr. Filippone will not jump on the pet hobby horse of current educational theory "I don't want to waste time in experimentation," he declared.

Since the earnest but easily smiling administrator believes that reading is the number one educational failure after the racial problem, this will be where his concentration will be placed.

He would like to see a reading coordination for the school system and another reading specialist at the junior-senior high school level. Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk now has two elementary reading teachers and another reading specialist at the junior-senior high and one high school specialist.

"I don't foresee the day we'll swing away from reading," Dr. Filippone observes. The trend toward independent study places more emphasis on reading ability.

The school system Dr. Filippone inherits is still rural in Character but it gets "good material to work with," the former junior-senior high school principal believes. They have "basis character" and present a minimum number of troublemakers, he said. "I used to tell my faculty they didn't know what good kids they had." Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk has had no severe vandalism. "I call some of the

kids "diamonds in the rough," Dr. Filippone commented with a laugh.

Centralization of the school district is only 10 years old. About 35 per cent of the pupils went to some form of higher education or training before centralization; now about 52 to 53 per cent continue — what Dr. Filippone calls "modernizing" the pupil to fit in the more complex world to which he graduates. The community college has played a particular role for Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk's graduate.


He likes conservative clothes and quiet ties.

"wanted to be a good teacher" and taught social studies for eight years at the junior high level.

He spent two years in the State Education Department working for the adult education field and became convinced he was geared to secondary school work. At Goshen he became assistant princinal.

The administrator recalls humorously the years in which he was part of the "dawn patrol."

These were the years when he and five other men would get up at 3 a.m. to drive to New York City for five hours of classes at New York University and Columbja University, He received his doctorate from New York University.

"We used to compare courses and talk about our work - maybe just to keep awake," Dr. Filippone recalls. His wife, Florence whom he had as a student

in a business English adult education class, typed the 600 pages of his dissertation comparing the careers and impact of three New York State commissioners of education.

To unwind and escape the pressures of his job, Dr. Filippone has what he calls "little escapes," He used his work in the Rotary and the Men's Association as diversion. 

cently on the recommendation of Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz is enacted into law.

The measure, which amends the Town Law and the Village Law, would eliminate sections of these laws requiring ownership of property as a qualification for election, appointment or continuance in certain offices and for voting on certain propositions.

"The sections of the Town Law which relate to property ownership as a prerequisite for holding office were declared unconstitutional by the state Court of Appeals last year and it is only proper that the law should be changed to remove these unconstitutional provisions," the Attorney General said.

"In striking down the provisions, the Court of Appeals stated that '... it is impossible today to find any rational connection between qualifications for administering town affairs and ownership of real property.'

"Such a requirement, moreover, is archaic in modern day society. In our rapidly growing towns and villages there are many former property owners who now live in rented premises and many young people who may be highly qualified to serve in public office but who do not as yet own real property. To deny them the right to hold public office simple because they rent is unfair," Attorney General Lefkowitz said. Villages and special districts, including fire districts, would seem to be in the same classification as towns where the Court of Appeals declared unconstitutional a property ownership requirement.

The bill would change the village law which now provides that certain propositions must be submitted at a village election upon the petition of "owners of real property". The amendment provides that the words "qualified voters" be substituted for "owners of real property."

School districts are not included in this bill because there are two alternatives to a property ownership requirement for holding office on such boards — that of being a renter of premises or the parent of a child in school.

The bill was introduced by Sen-


