Mrs. Winn has loaned several of her oils, water colors and acrylics to the library for the month of February. As the daughter of the well-known area artist, Virginia Grubb, Mrs. Winn has always been exposed to art. From earliest childhood she has been trained to evaluate color, composition, perspective, to know and recognize what is good and why. The home atmosphere fairly reeked with the smell of paint. In 1963 he went to Ethiopia to open a new mission field there. He and his wife, Lavina, were assigned to the Mesengo tribe, a



only entrance requirement for area young people is a desire to learn and a tuition fee of \$25. Bus transportation is provided.

With the exception of the teaching staff, the Heldeberg Workshop is a completely volunteer project. Hundreds of men and women have worked to make the three-week summer school a success, leaving the teachers free to do their job: Teach.

When the 270-acre Crouse farm is purchased, the permanent headquarters will make possible an expanded year-round schedule of weekend, evening and after-school classes, seminars, workshops and enrichment activities for both student and teachers. In the past, hundreds of prospective pupils have been turned away because of lack of facilities.

Workshop officials envision the land as a beautiful campus, with new and converted buildings arranged in harmony with the cliff, rock outcroppings, woods and meadows. Buildings will include a theater, amphitheater, dormitory and classroom shelters, art studio and gallery, and junior science building.

Leased last year with funds provided by the Junior League of Albany, the land site was used during the summer of 1967 by 200 students. Volunteers cleared access trails, built a bus road, cut brush, built eight outdoor classrooms and erected two 20-foot-high tepees. The additional 500 students who attended classes at Voorheesville High School, the Delmar Library, the State Capitol, Hudson Valley Community College and an archeology site on the Norman's Kill visited the land for curriculum-related study.

The Heldeberg Workshop calls its program "Adventures in Learning," and it has grown increasingly more popular — with children, parents, and staff participants — during the seven years of its existence. With a permanent home, it expects to do much more in the way of using the vast educational resources of the Capital District to augment regular school curriculums for area youngsters.



performing once more — this time at Basin St. with Duke Ellington. Thus, Don Shirley returned to the field of his earliest endeavors.

He is not only a fine musician and scholar; he has traveled throughout the world and studied many languages — those of the Middle East. With so diversified a background, Don Shirley cannot be simply described. His concert will surely be an exciting one on the 27th of February.

the Adequate Wiring Bureau of Eastern New York, announced today that February 11 through February 17 has been chosen National Electrical Week.

The theme of the week is "Electricity Powers Progress." The dates for the week were chosen to include the 121st anniversary of Thomas A. Edison's birth, February 11.

"National Electrical Week gives us an opportunity to recognize the numerous ways that electricity serves us daily in our homes and on our jobs to help make our lives more comfortable and productive," Mr. Borst said. "Electricity's part in the life and economy of the nation, and its indispensable role in our future growth and progress is enormous.

Electricity is one of the best bargains available to the American family. While the cost of living has increased 121 percent in the last 25 years, the cost of electricity has decreased 44 percent. For a penny's worth of electric power you can: toast 40 slices of toast, operate a radio or sewing machine for seven hours, a vacuum cleaner for one hour or a 100-watt lamp for five hours."

Mr. Borst continued, "during the past 10 years, the typical American family has doubled its annual use of electricity, and the trend is expected to continue. From 1967 to 1985 residential use of electricity is predicted to rise 226 percent, commercial use 250 percent and industrial use 193 percent.

Electricity works side by side with the American farmer to help him be by far the most productive in the world. Electricity is now available to nearly every farmer in the United States, and performs hundreds of jobs formerly done by manual labor. One American farmer produces enough to supply the food and fiber requirements of 34 other Americans. In Russia, one farmer supplies the needs of only 5 others."

"Ten years ago," Mr. Borst explained, "only 300,000 homes in the United States were heated electrically. Today, the figure is close to 3 million and by 1980, the Federal Power Commission

estimates that the number of electrically heated homes will total 19 million. The electrical industry credits improvements in equipment and lower rates for the soaring demand.

The United States leads the world in the production of electricity. This nation with only 6 percent of the world's population has 36 percent of the total electric power capacity. The capacity is greater than the next five countries combined - Russia, Japan, United Kingdom, West Germany and Canada," Mr. Borst concluded.

Good Year

New York farmers can expect another reasonably good year in 1968 with net incomes about the same as in 1967, a Cornell University economist predicts.

Total receipts will be up, but farmers will face higher operating costs which will bring net income to the 1967 level, says Prof. C. A. Bratton, N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell.

Bratton and other Cornell economists made these and other projections in the 1968 New York Economic Handbook which takes a comprehensive look at



what's ahead for Empire State farmers during the next 12 months.

Nationally, farm prices were about five per cent lower in 1967 than in 1966. However, prices received by New York farmers in 1967 were about the same as the year earlier. This is mainly because higher prices for milk helped to offset the lower prices for eggs and grains.

Dairy and poultry are two important enterprises in New York. In 1968, milk prices and production are expected to be up a little. Egg prices, which were unusually low during 1967, are expected to average two to three cents per dozen higher this year. However, egg production may be down some during the year, the Cornell economists forecast.

Record-shattering crops of

wheat, corn, grain sorghum, and soybeans have led to substantial price declines for these commodities during the past year. Thus, farmers can count on lower feed prices and large grain supplies in the months directly ahead.

To avoid further additions to carryover stocks and to strengthen prices later in the year, the government is planning to reduce plantings of wheat and feed grains by seven to ten per cent in 1968.

Although the U.S. will be in a strong competitive position to increase the volume of exports in months ahead, good crops in Europe and record food grain output in India, among other developments, will limit potential demands abroad.

Discussing the over-all U.S. economy, Cornell economists see a continued rise in Gross National Product, the dollar value of all goods and services produced in the nation. It is expected to grow by about six to eight per cent in 1968, with inflation accounting for about three per cent of this expansion. The national economy has been expanding steadily for the seventh straight year, the longest period of uninterrupted economic expansion in U.S. history.




