Shopping carts that unload automatically? Incredible as it hay seem, a new check-out sysem that automatically unloads the shopping carriages onto the check stands has been installed in the great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company's Supermarket at 248 Delaware Ave., Elsmere.

All the customer does is wheel the car into position at the checkstand, then steps aside. The entire order is removed from the cart without the customer or clerk lifting an item!

Shopping carts used in conjunction with this new "Check-A-Matic" system differ from conventional carts in that the bottom of the vehicle is actually a conveyor belt. The customer places her groceries in the cart, pushes the cart to one of the special checkouts where it locks into the stand. When the proper connection is made, a green light appears to indicate all is in readiness for unloading.

The cashier presses a foot pedal, the front panel of the carriage slides up, and a roller on the counter engages the conveyor belt of the carriage. The carriage conveyor moves the merchandise forward slowly onto an incined conveyor system in the ccunter so that the various items move to the Cashier for checking.

When the cart is empty, the clerk pushes a button that releases the shopping cart from the stand automatically, turns it, and delivers it alongside the checkout.

What about the shopping carts that do double duty as in-store baby carriages? Each of the new carriages is equipped with a collapsible baby seat, so arranged that the child can remain in the carriage throughout the entire unloading operation, and be delivered, in the carriage, to the mother alongside the checkout stand

"The new checkout system is another step in A&P's continuing 'We Care' program aimed at constantly improving goods and giving speedier and more helpful service to our customers," a company spokesman said.

To: The Editor:

The time is pertinent to bring to the attention of the community this extract from The Student Handbook of the Bethlehem Central Junior High School:

To insure the safety of the large number of students who now walk to and from school these common sense rules should be followed:

- (1) Where there are sidewalks, use them. Do not walk in groups that block the way for other pedestrians.
- (2) Where there are no sidewalks, walk single file facing traffic. After dark, wear a light colored article of clothing or carry a flashlight so that you may be readily seen by motorists.
- (3) Do not walk in groups spread across the roadway so as to present a hazard to your own safety as well as unjustifiable interference to the drivers of cars.

Well worded, this cogent statement can only serve its purpose by all being made aware of it and its intent. That is to prevent accidents and obey the law. Before an accident occurs from a failure to abide by these "common sense rules," it would be well for all of

us to think about them and be guided by their direction.

Mrs. George Witt, a member of the nominating committee, presented the slate of officers







Surveying of about 40 acres for a park on the Hudson River in the Town of Bethlehem will start as soon as the weather permits and be finished by this summer.




