

Viewers of this special will see Telephone Hour cameras pan over flaming blast furnaces...rolling green hills...pre-Revolutionary buildings...and explore Bethlehem's famous Bach Festival.

Now in its 68th year, the Bach Festival draws international artists such as Metropolitan Opera stars Judith Raskin and Cesare Siepi. Viewers will see them perform the Bach hymn, "It is a Precious Thing," with the Central Moravian Church Choir. The Festival also draws an international music audience to Bethlehem. At its concerts, many of the same men who stoke the steel furnaces sing sacred music in the Festival choirs.

will affect New York's agriculture through the effect it will have on prices and supplies of major ingredients of poultry and dairy feed and on government land retirement programs and storage policies.

District also revolved around re-education of the press by a "Code Green" concept. This is a mechanism which would signal the innovator and rejector alike that a new idea is being presented. Mrs. Switzen hopes that within four years "AP and UPI wire services will use this code green on their dispatches to say we don't understand the story, it doesn't make sense, to alert people (the 1 in 4) who will understand."

In practice, the maxi-mini school operates in addition to the regular school programs. The vestpocket school would serve voungsters in a Head Start program during the day as a place to study, play and socialize. In the evening and throughout the night the store-front school would be open to teen-agers and adults. Equivalency tests for college credits would be given so that people could convert accumulated experience and knowledge into recognized accomplishments in pursuit of degrees or general individual advancement.

Mrs. Switzen said she was instrumental in the formation of the Office of Economic Opportunity's national Head Start program, originally conceived by her as a "cradle start" effort. An advocate of infant genius or, as she terms it, "kid power," she promotes giving children responsibility and even an allowance as early as 2 years of age.

Spring Hunting

"New York State hunters are being offered a truly unique opportunity," according to State

Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne. "For the first time," he went on, "there will be a limited spring season on wild turkeys."

Bearded wild turkeys only will be in season in five western counties - Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung and Steuben - from May 6 through May 11, 1968, Holders of 1967-68 hunting or hunting-fishing licenses may participate in the hunt only after obtaining a free spring turkey hunting permit. These are available by mail or personal application to Regional Game Manager, New York State Conservation Department, Room 409, Exchange National Bank Building, Olean, New York 14760. Applications will be accepted until May 7.

Each application shall state the name, home address and hunting or hunting-fishing license number of the applicant. Each application made by mail must include a stamped, self-addressed number 10 envelope (at least 4 1/8 x 9 1/2 inches).

The spring hunt is subject to the following regulations. Hunting hours will be sunrise to 10 a.m. The use of dogs, electronic callers or baiting is prohibited. Only a long bow or shotgun loaded with number 2, 4, 5, or 6 shot may be used. The spring season limit is one bearded turkey, so a person may apply for a permit even if he took a bird during the regular fall season.

Conservation Department game biologists explained that the dates of the hunt were timed to coincide with the peak of the incubation period when nesting hens are least likely to be disturbed. The early morning hunting hours also serve to protect brooding hens because they ordinarily do not leave their nests until midday.

Old gobblers are the most expendable segment of our turkey flocks simply because they are polygamous. One tom will serve several hens and, by the time of the spring hunt, he will already have served his biological function.

Observation and experience in other states indicate that low hunting pressure may be expected during this initial spring hunt. Experience also shows that the more hunters afield, the more difficult it becomes to lure a gobbler with a call.

Spring turkey hunting is a quality sport. It is a game of camoflage and calling, and above all, one demanding great patience. If you have the good fortune to call up a strutting tom with his full fan displayed, the experience may well be your greatest hunting thrill.







Mr. Dowling, in renewing Niagara Mohawk's annual safety plea, pointed out four basic safety rules that everyone should observe while flying kites:

- 1. Fly Kites ONLY in open fields, away from electric wires and away from traffic.
- 2. Never use string having wire or tinsel in it.
- 3. Make sure the string is dry. Wet string, like wire, can conduct electricity.
- 4. Don't climb electric poles, towers or substation fences. If a kite becomes entangled in wires or in a tree through which wires run, let it go.

Mr. Dowling said that flying model airplanes near electric wires also is hazardous because many of the models are controlled by wire leashes, which are good conductors of electricity.

Your Income Tax

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q — As a result of large itemized deductions I'm due a big refund this year even though I'm taking all my withholding exemptions. Is there any way I can reduce my withholding so that next year's refund won't be so big?

A — You may be able to decrease your withholding if the size of your itemized deductions exceed certain amounts. Details on this are contained in Schedule A, Form W-4. To obtain this schedule send a post card to your IRS district office.

Q - I think the figures are wrong on the W-2 statement my boss gave me. What should I do?

A – Ask your employer to check the accuracy of the figures and issue you a corrected W-2 if necessary.

Q — Can I deduct the Social Security taxes I pay for my maid?

A - No, Social Security taxes paid for domestic employees are not deductible.

Q — If I pay someone to prepare my return, won't he be responsible for its accuracy?

A - No, the taxpayer is legally responsible for the accuracy of the return. For this reason, make sure you get dependable tax help. Avoid anybody who offers to split the refund with you, asks you to sign a blank return or prepares it in pencil or who suggests that a refund be sent to his address.





This label can be lifted off the form mailed you and placed on another Form 1040 if necessary. If the information on the label is incorrect, it should be corrected to facilitate prompt processing.

Q — I owned stock in a company that split three for two last year. Do I have to pay tax on the shares of stock I received?

A — No, stock splits are usually considered tax free distributions.

Q — Do I have to put my wife's number on our return? All she has is a little interest income.

A — Your wife's Social Security number is required on a joint return, if she had wages subject to withholding, interest, dividends, commission income, prize income, or income from any other source.

Q — What records should I keep on my charitable contributions?

A — Your records should be sufficient to establish that you made a charitable contribution for the amount listed on your tax return. Cancelled checks, receipts and other records will be helpful in providing this substantiation.

ity. Otherwise, you will have no record of the gift.

Q - My son is working his way through college. If we continue to provide over half his support. can we still claim him as a dependent?

A - Yes. As long as you provide more than half his support and he is a full-time student, the amount of his income will not disqualify him from being claimed as a denendent

If your son is required to file a return, he may also claim his personal exemption. This is one exception where the same exemption may be claimed on two tax returns.

Q - I loaned some money to a friend of mine so he could go into business. The business failed and he can't pay me back. Can I deduct this loan as a loss?

A - If you have taken reasonable steps to collect the loan and if there is no likelihood that the debt may be recovered even by going to court, then you may deduct the amount of the debt as a shortterm capital loss. Report it on Schedule D of Form 1040.

Should you recover any part of the debt at any time in the future it must be included in your income, subject to special rules. Note that loans to children and certain other relatives are presumed to be gifts.

Q - I'm a widow. How long can I file a joint return?

A - You can file a joint return for the year of death. However, you may file as a "surviving spouse" using joint return rates for the two years succeeding the year of your husband's death if



Q — I'm in the Army and sold my home when I was transferred last year. Is there any way I can avoid taxes on any profit I might have?

A — A tax is postponed on profits from the sale of a home if another costing the same or more than the "adjusted sales price" of the one sold is purchased within one year of the sale. This also applies if construction is begun on another house before the sale or not more than a year afterwards and it is occupied not later than 18 months after the sale.

For Armed Services members on active duty, taxes on the profits from a home sale may be postponed for up to four years from the date of the sale.





Arrests Climb

Traffic arrests by the New York State Police climbed 3.9 percent in 1967, rising to 527,735 compared with 507,596 in 1966, Superintendent William E. Kirwan reported today.

Emphasis continued to be placed on the apprehension of drivers committing hazardous moving violations. The State Police official noted that 78.2 percent of the total arrests were for violations of this type.


Arrests for speeding, the top factor in accidents, totaled 251,534 and accounted for 47.6 percent of all traffic arrests. In 1966, motorists received 243,750 speeding summonses. Radar was used in 66.9 percent of the speeding cases last year, compared with its use in 64.6 percent of the similar 1966 cases.



Superintendent Kirwan reported that the number of fatal accidents investigated by State Police dropped from 739 in 1966 to 696 last year, a decrease of 5.8 percent. The number of persons killed in these accidents totaled 837 last year as against 900 in 1966, a percentage decline of 9.3.

Increases over 1966 were recorded in personal injury and property damage accidents. Personal injury accidents were up 2.1 percent for a total of 15,462. Ac-


cidents involving only property damage came to 26,692 an increase of 3.9 percent over 1966.

In fulfillment of a statutory requirement to inspect cars on the highways, troopers conducted 2,236 road checks at which 370,884 vehicles were inspected. These resulted in 31,322 arrests for various violations, an average of one violation for every 11.2 vehicles inspected.

Arrests for overweight trucks dropped slightly during 1967. A total of 88,887 commercial vehicles were checked by loadometer (scales) personnel, with 23,486 actually weighed. Arrests were made for 8,484 found overweight. In addition, 6,253 arrests for other violations were made.

The motor vehicle inspection phase of the State Police operation, conducted by 76 troopers, resulted in 55,018 routine inspectations among the 9.951 licensed inspection stations. In addition, 1.168 concealed inspections were made in which the station operator was not aware that the "customer" was a trooper. A total of 465 arrests were made for illegal. inadequate or improper inspections, Fifty-four percent of the concealed inspections resulted in some form of enforcement action, including warnings, hearings and arrests.

Troopers attended 2,575 hearings conducted by the Department of Motor Vehicles to determine whether licenses should be suspended or revoked. These included 864 involving refusals to submit to tests in drunken driving cases, 927 involving accidents and 635 involving alleged violations at motor vehicle inspection stations.

The State Police continued in 1967 to far exceed the criteria for an adequate traffic enforcement program as set by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the National Safety Council. By this standard, adequate enforcement is achieved when an average of 15 convictions for a hazardous violation is obtained for each fatal or personal injury accident. The State Police ratio was 24 convictions per accident.

hard to obtain. Under the stress of hunger they drift south until they find good mouse hunting.

The snowy owl is a native of the tundra north of the tree line all the way around the Pole. Brought up under these adverse conditions it is not surprising that when it moves south it selects windswept coastlines, airfields, or hilltops.

In the Arctic a hump of ground represents a high point from which the owl can watch for lemming, their primary food. Here they may still sit on the ground, particularly through the middle of the day, but take readily to the tops of fenceposts, telephone poles, runway lights, or other solid objects. Only rarely will they be seen sitting hawklike on the small limb of a tree.

Their nesting is dependent on the population fluctuations of the lemming which occur about every four years. Fortunately the cycle does not occur at the same time everywhere in the Arctic. During lows, the snowy owl may all but disappear from an area and no breeding will occur. They will congregate in areas of high populations, laying six or eight and even as many as a dozen eggs.

Another interesting mechanism to limit the nesting if there is lack of food is that normally the

male feeds the female from the time that the first egg is laid until the youngsters can reasonably protect themselves from their enemies. If the lemming population should crash or was marginal in the first place, the female must leave the nest to feed herself. In her absence the jaegers - gull-like predacious birds of the Arctic - take the eggs or

The open sites that the snowy owls select automatically restrict their prev to animals and birds of the open field. Almost inevitably they are found where the meadow grass is tall enough to offer protection to large populations of meadow mice, but windswept enough to keep the protecting snow from building up.

The snowv is about the size, or slightly larger than the great horned owl and without ear tufts. It is the only white owl, and will be readily recognized by cigar smokers. As with all the hawks and owls, the female is noticeably larger. The female snowy also has more conspicuous black barring on the feather tips, often resulting in a gray appearance at a distance. The cigar box owl is appropriately a male.

In the Arctic it has no cause to be afraid of man and can be readily approached while it is on watch for mice. In years gone by,

Midwest Stock Exchange Our One-hundredth Year probably very few of the owls ever returned to the Arctic, for most ended up in taxidermist shops or strung up on a fence by some hunter who thought he was protecting wildlife.

Their value as destroyers of rodents is now well documented and they are accepted, with the rough-legged hawk, as being one of the farmer's best friends. It was ten years ago this spring that the Legislature passed the law protecting all hawks and owls except when they are actually doing damage to domestic livestock. These two mouse traps were recognized and protected several years earlier.

The rough-legged hawk is also a hunter of the open country. living primarily on the meadow mouse while with us. About the same size as our native red-tailed hawk, its wings are not quite as broad and it cannot therefore soar quite as efficiently. They may hunt quietly from a convenient perce overlooking a meadow. but more commonly fly back and forth across the field. When activity indicating the presence of a mouse is noted, they may hover in one spot overhead and wait for it to appear.

There are both dark and light phased rough-legs, which leads to some confusion in their identification. Unlike the red-tailed hawk, which has a white belly and is our common winter hawk, the rough-leg has a black belly. In the dark phase the whole body may be nearly black. The underside of their wings is white with a conspicuous black patch at the bend of the wing or wrist, and the flight feathers are also tipped with black to outline the back edge of the wing.

The Year Of The Buffalo Bill

William F. Cody began his career as a messenger with wagon trains, and went on to become a driver, Pony Express Rider, guide, Chief Scout for the United States Army, Indian fighter and international showman. As Teddy Roosevelt once described him, "he embodied those traits of courage, strength, and self-reliant hardihood which are so vital to the well-being of the nation."

The legend of the American west is filled with the exploits of Colonel Cody and his rifle. On more than one occasion, the fates of both were importantly joined to help determine the outcome of what has come to be known as the American Odyssey — the opening of the last Frontier.

In 1874, "Buffalo Bill" Cody wrote to the Winchester Firearms people, stating he had tried and tested nearly every gun made in the United States, and for general hunting and Indian fighting, their improved rifle was "The Boss."

How fitting that "the gun that won the west" should play a small but important role in the establishment of the Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, Wyoming.

The Center houses the nation's most extensive collection of the records and momentos of Buffalo Bill, including the Congressional Medal of Honor. His most cherished honor however, was the name "Prairie Chief," bestowed on him by his conquered enemies, the Sioux. The Center also contains Indian, cowboy, transport material, and other artifacts of Western Americana. Most of the several thousand items are irreplaceable.

The Buffalo Bill Commemorative rifle is similar to the



early Winchester repeaters that were so much a part of his exploits on the plains. Reminiscent of his era, they are traditional 30-30 repeaters in both carbine and rifle styles, with bead-post front sight and semi-buckhorn rear sight. The hammer, trigger, loading gate, forearm tip and crescent butt plate gleam with nickleplate. The barrel and tang are inscribed respectively: "Buffalo Bill Commemorative," and in the colonel's script, "W. F. Cody — Chief of Scouts." Each of the rich American walnut




