



Early on the evening of Saturday, September 7, 1968, at the Kiwanis Club of Delmar Community Chicken Barbecue being held at Sunny Acres Day Camp, Elm Avenue, before an estimated attendance of over 1,000 spectators, Gil Lewis and Ed DeCausemaker, both of Elsmere, will ascend in the Montgolfier type Balloon, "Golden Bear II," (weather permitting) with assistance provided by the members of the Northeast Balloon Ascension Club. Bert Kohinke, the Town Supervisor, is in charge of the Kiwanis Committee for the Balloon Ascension.

The Balloon was manufactured by Don Piccard of Newport Beach, California, and it was recently flown by Mr. Piccard and Johnny Carson of the TV Tonight Show. It was also the inspiration for the song "Up, Up and Away" made famous by the Fifth Dimension singing group. It is a rare opportunity to see a manned Balloon Ascension in these days of jet airplanes and orbiting satellites.

Dear Editor:

I've noticed that for the past few years you've been very good about printing a great deal having to do with the Charlatans Summer Arena Theater. You have kept the public informed beautifully about their excellent productions. I myself wouldn't miss one. What I am asking now is that perhaps you would do the same for the student summer theater group that I am connected with. It's our first year of existence and we would appreciate any cooperation you can offer us.

Let me tell you more about us, because we're really rather unique. We are called the Dionysians and are a Drama Club from the Voorheesville High School. We were founded by Richard Weeks, who you may know of as one of the directors for the Slingerlands Players. He has directed three productions for us, but sadly, he is leaving us this fall for Milne High School. We were left high and dry until I came up with the

"brilliant" idea of getting the members together for a summer theater group that we could operate completely free from adult help. (By 'adult help' I mean an adult director . . . we've relied a great deal on the interest of adults already). We have been in continuous operation since the end of school and have 24 active participants.

Because our school auditorium was not available for use during the summer, we've rented the Social Hall of the Methodist Church here in town. It's a beautiful pine-paneled, raftered place.

The play we chose to produce is "Blithe Spirit" by Noel Coward and our production date is September 6. I'm the director and last year's president, Karen Sotherland, is the production manager. She will be a college freshman and I will be a senior in high school.

We are having an arena, or three sided theater and are borrowing our lights from the Slingerlands Players.

I hope that I've convinced you by now that we are worth a write-up in the Spotlight. The play is extremely funny and the cast is terrific. We need at least an audience of 200, because we plan to use our profits to send underprivileged children to Heldeberg Workshop. Thank you for your attention.

Lila Lee Geer, 81 Devon Rd., Delmar, is one of 79 students enrolled in Beaver College's London Semester Program established in cooperation with the City of London College. Leaving on September 7 from New York's Kennedy Airport via BOAC for eighteen weeks of study, the group will be under the direction of Dr. David M. Gray, director of International Programs at Beaver and Mr. Charles A. Lindquist, assistant professor of government at Beaver and field director for the London Semester.

Open to both men and women, Beaver's London Semester Program is designed to provide American students with the opportunity to pursue their college studies while broadening their education through participation in a different cultural, social, and educational environment.

Upon arrival in England, the students will spend one week of orientation at Oxford University. Following orientation they will live with British families for a week before going to London. The students will begin classes at the City of London College on September 23. They will take five courses for a total at 16 credit hours. The subjects offered will cover the areas of history, economics, literature, political science and sociology.

The program of study will also include trips through southern England; to St. Albans, Cambridge, Colchester, and Canterbury. In addition, students will attend sessions of the House of Lords, the Magistrates Courts, Royal Courts of Justice, Old Bailey, and visit The Stock Exchange, Lloyd's of London, and a variety of government departments. 

Bethlehem

Building Boom

Residential and commercial development in the Town of Bethlehem is big business, and if the drawing boards are any indication, the spark for an even greater building boom is set to flash in the near future.

During the years 1965-67, a total of \$21 million was spent for residential, commercial and industrial development in Bethlehem. And, according to Robert Collins, Bethlehem building inspector, about \$3.5 million has been invested in Bethlehem construction through the first seven months of this year.

Projects totaling more than \$13 million are known to be in

the planning stages now. These plans include provisions for more than 700 apartment units.

During the last 15 years the number of building permits issued by the town building inspector has increased about 150 per cent. The 1955 records show that 127 permits were issued compared to 315 in 1965, 357 in 1966 and 334 in 1967. Through July of this year 198 building permits had been granted.

From 1965 through 1967, 66 apartment buildings containing 273 units were constructed. This period has also seen 35 industrial and commercial buildings completed. The major contributor to this development has been the General Electric Co. at Selkirk and the Penn-Central Railroad yards at Selkirk.

The banner year in the town's expansion came in 1965 when \$8.7 million was spent on industrial and residential construction.

Officials hope that the planned unit development district recently approved by the Town Board

will induce more large scale development in the area.

The largest development known to be in the planning stages in a \$10 million high-rent, apartment-residential development being proposed by Jason Minnick. According to Lindsay Boutelle, surveyor and civil engineer for the Minnick plan, Mr. Minnick is expected to submit his plan to the Town Board sometime this fall under the planned unit development district.

Mr. Collins has indicated that another three to four sizeable proposals are expected to be brought before the board under the planned unit development plan.

Bethlehem is the second community in the Capital District to initiate a planned unit development district. Guilderland approved such a district plan about a year ago.

The Minnick proposal calls for construction of eight-unit, garden-style apartments and town houses on a 125-acre tract surrounding Blessing Road in North Bethlehem.

The six-year development plans calls for construction of 500 apartment units, 75 townhouses and 80 one-family dwellings. The residents of North Bethlehem are anxious to see the development become a reality because of the potential \$2.5 million in assessed valuation it would bring to the area.

This would open the door for the area to bring town water facilities into the area. The present assessed valuation of the area is about \$650,000 and to finance the water extension, a rate of about \$57 per 1,000 assessed valuation would presently be required.

Another large apartment project is the proposal of William B. Strong of Elsmere. This \$1 million proposal calls for the construction of a 66-unit luxury-apartment house on Delaware Avenue, north of Grant Street in Elsmere.

Mr. Strong's initial proposal called for construction of an 80 unit apartment house. After the plan was rejected by the Bethlehem Zoning Board of Appeals,







Information contained on 7,260 questionnaires returned by sportsmen has been analyzed by the State Conservation Department working in cooperation with the IBM computer section at St. Bonaventure University. The survey provided these facts:

The reported kill of 122 birds indicates that 2.3% of the hunters were successful. 1,449 (27%) reported sighting a bird. Of these, 398 or 7% of the total hunters shot at turkeys. It is believed that because of the inexperience of the hunter and the wariness of the turkey, many of the sightings were made at great distances. Some credit should also be given to the majority of hunters that must have resisted temptation to shoot at birds on which they could not distinguish a beard.

Of the 5,282 applicants that actually hunted, 2,087 or 40% stated that they used calls in hunting. Of the hunters that actually bagged turkeys however, 73% used turkey calling devices in their hunt.

New York City and Long Island were represented by 51 applicants, Pennsylvania by 22, New Jersey by 13, Ohio by 4, and Florida by 2. As might be expected, a sizeable number, 2,261 or 31%, came from the five counties within the hunt area. 35% came from Erie County and 12% from Monroe County. 41 of the 55 upstate counties were represented.

Only one banded bird was taken during the hunt. That turkey was banded in January 1963 at which time it weighed 11 lbs. 1 oz. When taken during the 1968 spring hunt, it was about 6 miles from the trap and release site and weighed 24 lbs. 3 oz.

The degree to which the weather affected the hunter and his success can only be estimated. From observations in the field during the entire week, the only weather condition that seemed to affect hunting was the wind. It was noticed that because of wind, the gobbler sounded near then far away and sometimes his call was lost entirely.

The Conservation Department report prepared by personnel at Region 2 Headquarters in Olean concluded by saying "Regional personnel involved were unanimous in feeling the very close to 100% in enthusiastic support of the hunt. It is difficult to remember any program the Department has been involved in within Region 2 during recent years that has been so well received by the public."

The report noted that this enthusiastic response indicates a probable increase in the number of hunters participating in any future spring turkey hunts.




Railroad employees and several Church and civic groups in the area want to see the new building constructed on the site of the present facility.



ter to the attention of Governor Rockefeller.

"Since Mr. Rockefeller is the governor of the state and a Penn-Central stockholder, I think he could throw us enough support, to keep the building here," Mr. Thomas explained.

Top officials of the various railroad unions have written letters to Mr. Knight requesting that the YMCA building remain at its present location.

The railroad employees object to the move to the yards because of the living conditions that will surround them. They feel the noise and dirt resulting from the operation of the yards will be a nuisance.

According to Mr. Thomas the new motel in the yards would be a commissary undertaking and its use would be limited to certain railroad employees and it would not be available to the community.

He noted that the present 165 room facility provides low-rent living quarters for about 40 pensioners who are forced to live on low incomes. A 60-bed section of the YMCA is reserved for railroad employees and Mr. Thomas said most of these beds are used twice a day by railroad men going on and coming off duty.

Area residents are interested in retaining the YMCA as a community social and recreation center. The present facility has large auditorium which is used by civic groups and is equipped with facilities for stage plays.

The community also foresees the development of the large site into a community playground and athletic center. The baseball diamond at the YMCA is used often by area groups.


