When I leave a sitter to care for my two children, it costs me anywhere from \$5 to 7 dollars for refreshments for her. She has the use of my phone, plus watching colored television. These kids do not take this under consideration at all. My children are usually in bed when I leave, and all she really has to do is sit. eat, and watch TV. Most of the time I come home around 12:30 or 1:00 at the latest and this kid is sound a sleep. Maybe all sitters don't have it this easy. but mine is very lucky. When she told me her price was going up to 75¢ an hour, I told her she had to stav awake and she would just get chips and soda for refreshments, and she said she wouldn't sit any more.

So I have another now, but I just wanted to write my opinion on this subject.

How about some views from other parents. At least we are keeping these girls off the streets and out of trouble.

Dear Editor:

The Community Cultural Council did it again! After presenting the great Fred Waring aggregation in the Jr.-Sr. High School gym two years ago with disastrous results, the people who run the Council repeated the same mistake on Tuesday, October 29. There's no great crime in making a mistake but it sure is criminal to err a second time under the same circumstances.

Fred Waring has been on the show business scene for almost 53 years. He is one of the all-time greats in the field of modern music. His singers and instrumentalists are personally chosen with painstaking care. Then, under leadership that fairly quivers with enthusiasm and

know-how, he welds them into a 2 1/4 hour stage show that sparkles through every minute.

On October 29, some 1800 people (a capacity crowd) jammed themselves in the gym anticipating great moments in modern music. They were well rewarded — except that the gym's concrete walls must still be achoing from the onslaught of some 40 performers.

Just why is it necessary to kill the beauty of it all because the CCC won't present the program in a suitable place?

It is a great tribute to a great musician that he can turn out programs in gymnasiums with concrete blocks and echo chambers as the backdrop. And again this year, every person in the audience stood at the end and gave Fred a 10-minute ovation.

On top of all this, the CCC reserved some 200 seats in the middle section (almost all of it!) for the patrons. It's a shock to pay out \$4 for one of the best seats in the house only to find them parceled out to the patron list.

Good luck to the CCC — a few more disasters and mistaken judgments and the operators will need more than "luck."

#### Two Retire

The Delmar Community Orchestra is, in every sense, a community effort. This non-professional symphonic group is composed of members from the Town of Bethlehem and the surrounding area. It was formed in 1940 as a small group in the Methodist Church and performed at monthly dinners of the Men's Association. It soon grew to be a full-fledged Men's Orchestra.

In 1966 its membership was broadened to include women and to become a community-wide orchestra. It rehearses weekly, continues to perform at the local Men's Association dinners and also presents several benefit concerts during each year. On Monday evening, members of the Orchestra paid homage to the following area members of the Orchestra who retired at the end of the 1968 season:

Donald S. Dewire was a Director of the Delmar Concert Orchestra, founded in 1931 and which dissolved in 1940. This Orchestra gave annual concerts and accompanied Gilbert and Sullivan presentations in a number of communities in the Albany

area. He joined the Delmar Men's Orchestra in 1943 and served as Conductor from 1946 to 1958, following which he became a member of the percussion section. Mr. Dewire will shortly take up his residence in Florida for the winter and will spend summers in Wisconsin.

Albert (Bert) W. Clayton was also a member of the original Delmar Concert Orchestra, playing First Violin and serving as Concert Master. He joined the Delmar Men's Orchestra in 1944 and served as Concert Master until his retirement at the end of the 1968 season. Mr. Clayton will continue to reside in Elsmere. In recognition of their valued services to the Orchestra and to the entertainment of residents of the community, each man was presented with a plaque.

Dr. Samuel Kantor will replace Mr. Clayton as Concert Master of the Orchestra, which is under the direction of Samuel Bozzella, Chairman of the Music Department of the Bethlehem Central School District and Conductor of the local High School Band. The President of the Orchestra is Joseph Yungman, who is also a violinist in the Orchestra.

Serving table wines as apéritifs

No special implements or techniques are called for to use wines as apéritifs. A tray of generous-sized stemmed glasses, a corkscrew, and, of course, the wine (one bottle for every three or four guests for pre-dinner drinking) are all you need.

All of the white wines should be thoroughly chilled in the refrigerator before serving. Chilling will take at least an hour. It is better to start with the wine too cold than not sufficiently chilled-it soon warms up in the glass.

All wines served as apéritifs are the better for nuts, crackers. olives, or slivers of cheese served as accompaniments. Hostesses who have prepared elaborate canapés often find they are more appreciated with wine than with the usual cocktails. A word of warning: wine is a real appetizer. Trays of tidbits disappear with alarming speed. And the dinner bell becomes a sound more appealing than ever.





"You can not be in the middle of the road and get things done. You must become politically involved on one side or the other."

"We just can't sit around and say it is wrong; what is happening to the Negro," Mr. Miller continued. "You have to get the problem out in the open."

When asked how he would

compare the intelligent quotients of the black man and the white man, Mr. Miller responded, "An IQ test measures a person's comprehension of the American middle class culture.

"The white man learns his culture while the Negro is forced to learn two cultures, that of the Negro and that of the white man. When you speak of measuring intelligence, the question is intelligence to what."

#### Map Ready

Hunters who plan to be in the Catskill Mountains for the opening of the deer season November 18 may find themselves spending more time hunting a place to hunt than hunting their favorite game. The population boom, more posted areas, and urban growth are reasons hunters may find less open land readily available than in former years.

State conservationists point out that there is actually more than enough land to go around in the Catskills. But not all hunters know where to find it. To help these hunters, an Ithaca, N.Y. firm has published a "Sportsman's Map" that shows the location of some 250,000 acres of public hunting land in the Catskill Mountains.

Issued by Outdoor Publications, the map is intended to guide hunters to specific parcels of this free, open state land without trespassing on private property. Access to this public acreage is possible where parcels touch state, county, and township roads, and where state-maintained hiking trails originate on public land.

The map also shows public campsites, lean-to shelters, lookout towers, trout streams open to public fishing, ski centers and other outdoor facilities. It is printed in color and measures 22 by

employees and valued customers.







io and Champlain, the St. Lawrence and Hudson Rivers, and the waters of the Atlantic Ocean, Long Island Sound and the inland waters of Long Island. The regulations are already in effect in Lake George and Greenwood Lake.

This announcement follows the decision of the Department of Health that no sewage treatment

device now available for use in pleasure craft and small boats produces an effluent capable of meeting Health's requirements for purity.

Devices which provide complete treatment of a vessel's sewage may be approved in the future but macerator-chlorinators now available do not accomplish the minimum treatment required

The Conservation Department is charged with enforcing this regulation under the provisions of the law regulating the discharge of sewage from vessels.

The Department's Division of Motor Boats is already conducting research to establish standards for holding tanks and incinerators toward establishing a list of approved units which may be used in New York State.

#### Biafra Aid

In spite of the dangers and sometimes staggering obstacles, the International Committee of the Red Cross flew a record 144 mercy flights into Biafra during the month of September, it was reported in a statement released by the American Red Cross today.

Over 1,250 tons of food and medical supplies for the beleaguered population were delivered on these flights, and 431 foreign nationals were brought out of Biafran territory by the six ICRC planes and the additional aircraft leased by the Committee from commercial airlines.

Mercy flights from the island of Fernando Po were made on all but three nights during the month of September, the report states, and there were a number of other flights turned back because of military operations, mechanical difficulties, or weather conditions.

The Committee also has trucks and ships available for the mass transportation of relief supplies into the Biafran area as soon as agreement can be worked out with Nigerian and Biafran leaders. ICRC estimates some 20,000 tons of food and medical supplies are presently stored in Nigeria or en route to that country.

The Committee has assembled relief and medical teams from



#### Winter Burn

Now is the time to give your vergreen shrubs the protection ney need for winter. The broadafed evergreens, such as rhodoendrons, and newly planted narw leafed evergreens, such as xus, have the greatest need for inter protection.

According to horticultural pecialists at Cornell, evergreens arry their leaves all winter and re constantly giving up water the air. This water loss, calld transpiration, is reduced in inter but never stops. When vergreens are exposed to the inter sun and wind, this water ss may take place faster than he roots can replace the water. he result is 'winter-burn', shrielled wood and dried scorched


Prevention of winter burn conders both increasing the intake water through the roots and educing water loss from the aves. To increase the intake water, make sure that there plenty of moisture in the soil. During a dry fall water your evergreens thoroughly so the soil is moistened to a depth of at least 12 inches. This watering should be done just before the ground freezes.

Mulching your evergreens also helps increase water uptake. A mulch will reduce water loss from the soil, but more importantly, it will moderate soil temperatures and reduce the depth of freezing. Since root activity and water decrease at low temperatures and stop when the ground around the roots freezes, the mulch will greatly increase the amount of water taken up by the root.

Wind breaks and sun shades help to reduce the amount of water lost from the leaves. When the water loss is reduced, the roots don't have to take up so much water.

You could say that the prevention of winter burn is really a matter of keeping the water supply in the plants equal to the water demand caused by the loss through the leaves. To reduce the problem, increase the supply by watering and mulching, and reduce the demand by using wind breaks and sun shades.

The Cooperative Extension Association, Agricultural Division has two bulletins that will help you have healthier evergreens next spring. They are "Culture of Rhododendrons in New York State" and "Solving Cultural Troubles of Rhododendrons and Other Ericaceous




