


#### **Open Letter**

# What is Nathaniel Adams Blanchard Post?

Post #1040, American Legion, is a Bethlehem Community Post. It is made up of nearly 800 men who have served their country in the cause of freedom. Its Ladies' Auxiliary serves side-by-side with them in carrying out worthwhile community projects.

The Post has outgrown its present building and plans new headquarters which not only will be a credit to the Town of Bethlehem but to the neighborhood in which it is to be located.

#### ... And What Does It Do For The Town Of Bethlehem?

Among many things, it sponsors by itself, or gives financial and manpower aid to many community projects. The enlarged and improved facilities now planned will enable the Post to expand many of the activities, such as:

Bethlehem Committee that Cares: Vietnam; Boys' State and Girls' State Projects; Americanism Project; "Indoor Sports" Entertainment and Party for the Physically Handicapped; Memorial Day Parade and Services; "Go To Church" Breakfasts; American Flag Donation Program; Annual Decoration of Graves; Community Ice-Skating Party: Boy and Girl Scout Projects; Veterans' Hospital Programs; the Community Children's Christmas Party; Bethlehem Lions Club (including support of Eye Bank and Sight-Saving Projects); Red Cross Blood Bank; National Oratorical Contest (won this year by an Albany County youth); Sports Activities - American Legion Ball, Little League, Pop Warner League.

# **Council Formed**

The Town of Bethlehem, acting under a law passed by the 1968 New York Legislature, has created a Narcotics Guidance Council. In announcing the formation of the guidance council, Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke stated that under the law the council shall develop a program of community participation regarding the control of the use of narcotics and dangerous drugs at the local level.

The state law requires the council to direct itself, among other things, "to make immediately available to the community basic knowledge acquired in the field of drug use, especially by youth; create a climate in which persons seeking assistance in coping with narcotics problems can meet, without embarrassment, with responsible individuals or agencies in a position to render assistance; cooperate with other narcotic guidance councils and with the state and federal narcotics commissions and agencies in bringing local and community trouble areas to their attention."

The council must consist of not more than five members and shall include at least one clergyman, one attorney and one physician in accordance with the statutory mandate.

Mr. Kohinke has announced the appointment of Dr. Roger T. Drew, Rev. Paul H. Gassmann, Edward J. Grogan and John A. Boykin. Chairman of the council is Mr. Grogan. Dr. John J. Lyons, Albany County Health Commissioner and Dr. Frank C. Maxon, Jr., Bethlehem Health Officer, have been advising the council and were instrumental in its creation.

The Town of Bethlehem Narcotics Guidance Council is presently in the process of organizing committees and in seeking the cooperation of various civic, school, religious, service, veteran and fraternal organizations, as well as interested members of the community.



# Moving Day!



In last week's issue of this publication, students were urged to take home "The Guidance Newsletter" every Monday to share it with their parents.







are permitted in C-Commercial zones under the Bethlehem zoning statutes.

. The zoning request was approved by a 3-1 vote. The dissenting vote was cast by Paul Dickenson.

Mr. Dickenson pointed out that the board rejected a request of Donald Halsforf for permission to construct a car wash at 333 Delaware Avenue because of the traffic congestion it would create on Delaware Avenue. "I can see no significant difference in this request," he declared.

The board also rejected a highly controversial car wash proposal planned for Delmar about two years ago.

Charles Fritts, board member, pointed out that the entrance and exit of the Main Bros. proposed automatic car wash would be on Hallwood Road, a side street.

"Since they are going to build a car wash there anyway, we may as well permit them to have the stacking space and the best facility possible at that location," said Board of Appeals President William Johnston. "The zoning ordinance permits them to have the car wash."

Without the additional space, there would be stacking space for only 20 cars, the board was told.

Mr. Dickenson contended that all the cars eventually were going to "pile up" on Delaware

Avenue regardless of their ingress and egress via Hallwood Road.

The request was approved with several conditions attach ed: that the car wash not be opened before 7 a.m. and close no later than 7 p.m.; that it be closed on Sundays and holidays; that a fence two feet high be erected on the Delaware Avenue side of the property, and that the car wash be attended during all hours of operation.

# Budget

Bethlehem's \$1.3 million budget proposal was the target of only one complaint at a public hearing conducted before the Town Board.

William Buchanan of Delmar criticized the board for not sending copies of the budget to residents of the community so citizens might have an opportunity to examine the budget before attending the hearing. He said he recommended this same action at last year's hearing.

Copies of the budget were given to all of those attending the hearing last night.

Approval of the budget was recommended by nine residents, including Scott Prothero of Elsmere, Robert J. Wiggand of Glenmont, Walter Eck of Slingerlands, John Flannigan of Slingerlands, Howard Paddock, chairman of the Bethlehem Planning Board, and Jesse Turner of Delmar.

Action on the budget will be taken at a future meeting. The proposals calls for a \$1.72 tax increase per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The preliminary budget represents a \$94,000 increase over the current budget.
