

A New Ravena

A high density residential complex, a shopping center and off-street parking facilities have been proposed for downtown Ravena.

These are some of the recommendations that have been made by the Ravena-Coeymans Planning Board as a result of a study and evaluation of the downtown area. Formulation of the downtown program is another stage in the development of a master plan for Village of Ravena and the Town of Coeymans.

"A study and evaluation of the Ravena downtown area, more specifically the area from the railroad to the junction of Mountain Road and Main Street, leaves little doubt as to the inadequacies of the downtown area, in terms of being an aesthetically desirable element of the community on its investment," the report on the evaluation study says.

One of the proposals for the "long range" plans is the development of a high-density residential complex combined with some convenience facilities and a new restaurant on the north side of Main Street, east of Central Avenue. The area is presently occupied by stores and warehouses, many of which are in marginal condition according to the planning board.

The proposed residential complex, which would be located just west of the railroad tracks, could include housing for the elderly. According to planning board consultant Hans Klunder of Hanover, N.H. the over-all density could go as high as 40 families per acre in this residential area of the downtown redevelopment plan.

A new retail center coupled with a central office facility is recommended south of Main Street in a whole new complex in an area that would be served by two major parking facilities.

The recommendations call for the establishment of about two acres of off-street parking facilities, for about 300 vehicles.

According to the study, Ravena's central area is currently located along Main Street. It is recommended that a "circulation

route be established approximately 300 feet south of the present Main Street with a parallel facility located in a straight line fashion in the vicinity of the present Main Street."

The plan calls for the construction of a diagonal building complex at the corner of the proposed streets.

The report also states that it is important that "in the design of the downtown area consideration be given to the nearby low density residential area, particularly to the south of the proposed downtown area — taking into consideration landscaping uses generally complementary to residential areas, located on the outskirts of the proposed downtown."

"Ravena's downtown needs not only a physical change but it needs a change in identification and a change in the outlook of the area it serves," the report says.

"The downtown for Ravena should not assume the responsibility for regional centers but it should assume the responsibility for an attractive, desirable shopping and social focal point for its immediate service area, namely the Village of Ravena, the Town of Coeymans and the surrounding area.

"With many of the structures being marginal, and with the street layout being completely unacceptable to handle traffic necessary to sustain a sound economy in a downtown area, and with the community's ever-growing demand for such a focal point, a complete change for Ravena's downtown must be anticipated and should be planned for at this time."

Excerpts

Since an important portion of the excerpt from the last issue of "The Guidance Newsletter," entitled, "Nursing Student Loan Program," was inadvertently omitted from the December 19 issue of The Spotlight, we are printing here the complete article.

NURSING STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM

You are eligible to apply for a Nursing Student Loan when you have been accepted for enrollment into a school of nursing as a full-time student pursuing a course of study leading to a bachelor's degree, an associate degree or a diploma in nursing.

In determining the amount you may borrow, the school of nursing will take into account the degree of your financial need and the availability of money in the school's fund, granted to it by the Federal Government. However, the maximum amount which you may borrow for an academic year is \$1,000.

Loans are repayable to the school at 3% interest over a ten year period, which begins one year after you have completed your course of study.

In addition, up to 50% of your loan — plus interest — may be cancelled for full-time employment as a professional nurse in any public or non-profit private institution or agency. The rate of cancellation of your loan obligation is 10% of the total amount of the loan — plus interest — for each year up through five years that you are employed in this capacity.

Obligation to repay the loan will be canceled in the event of death or permanent disability of the borrower.

Further information and loan application forms are available from schools of nursing throughout the United States.

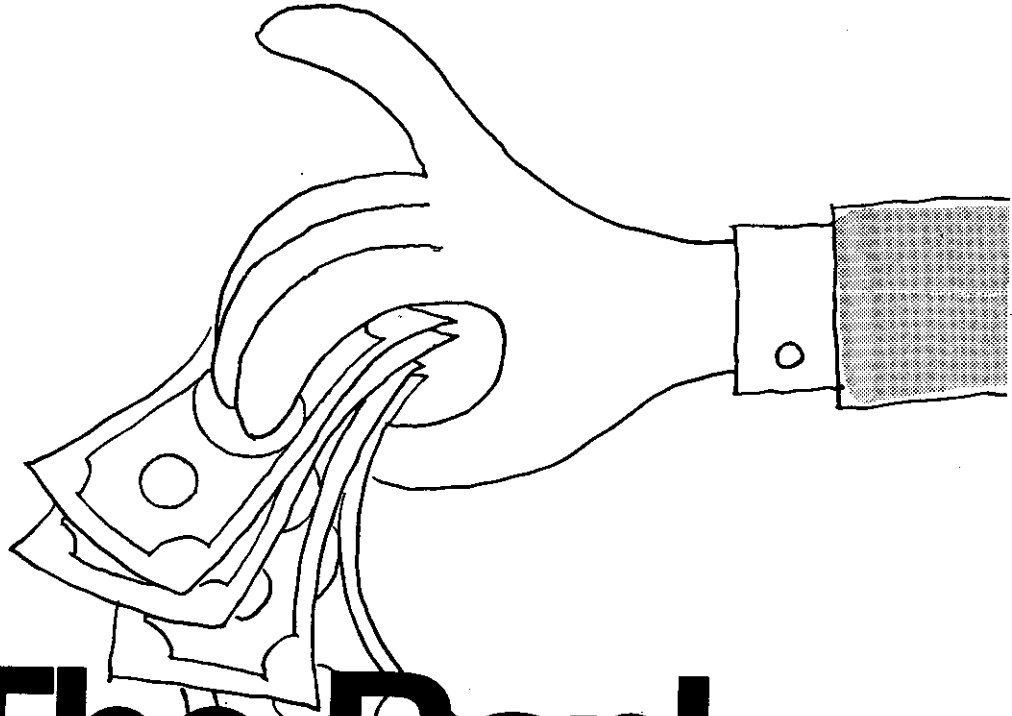

New Trails for Snowmobiles

The Capital District State Park Commission has announced the Development of ten miles of marked snowmobile trails at two State Parks in the Capital District State Park Region.

A system of five miles of marked trails, utilizing woods roads, is available at the John Boyd Thacher State Park located in Albany County, approximately fifteen miles south of the Tri-Cities area in the Heldeberg Mountains on State Route 157. Designated access to the trail system is available from a parking area at the Mine Lot Falls picnic area within the park.


Another five miles of trails, utilizing interior park roads and trails, is available at the new Moreau Lake State Park located four miles south of South Glens Falls in Saratoga County. Access to the park is from U.S. Route 9 via Old Saratoga Road. The park is one mile from Route 9 and may be easily reached from the Northway, Interstate Route 87, via exit 178.

The operation of snowmobiles at State Parks is permitted only within designated areas. Operators must possess a valid motor vehicle operator's license or possess a learner's permit and shall be at least sixteen years of age. Snowmobiles must be registered and insured for public liability for operation within any State Park in accordance with the provisions of the N.Y.S. Vehicle and Traffic Law.

Additional information and applicable regulations are available from the Capital District State Park Commission offices, Saratoga Spa Reservation, Saratoga Springs, N.Y., or from the resident Park Superintendents at John Boyd Thacher State Park and Moreau Lake State Park.

Mr. Gardner said this senior life saving course, which is a prerequisite for summer life guard employment as well as the basic course in life guard training, will include the safe handling of canoes and boats, as well as the teaching of safety in skin diving, and the use of mask, snorkel and fins.

This will be the first senior life saving course to be taught in the area under the new National Red Cross directive permitting good swimmers 15 years of age and over to enroll. In the past the age limit was 16.

Enrollment can be made by calling the Albany Red Cross Chapters at 462-7461 on or before Thursday, January 9.

New Privileges

Seniors at the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Junior-Senior High School will be the recipients of independent study privileges beginning on January 6.

The privilege will free all seniors from attendance requirements during their assigned study halls. Though seniors will be required to remain in the building, they will be allowed to spend their free time in various areas of the school. These areas will include the Instructional Materials Center (library), empty rooms, lobby (where tables and chairs will be provided) and various laboratory areas. The latter will include the science labs, art rooms, the mechanical drawing area, and the home economics and industrial arts area.

The responsibility of using the free time wisely will be left up to the seniors themselves. Though some students will waste some of their free time at first, it is felt that most seniors will learn to budget their time. This skill will be particularly valuable to college-bound students.

Herbert Holland, Junior-Senior High School principal, has discussed the program at length with the senior class and various other student groups. Mr. Holland is confident that the newly acquired privilege will not be abused by the seniors.

A second Latin American exchange student will begin her visit at Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk on January 3. Miss Christina Kibede, a 15 year old native of Santiago, Chile, will attend the Junior-Senior High School for the next ten weeks as part of the Open Door Exchange Program.

Her hobbies include playing the piano, listening to music, playing tennis and volley ball, swimming, reading and drama. She has also traveled extensively through Central America.

Christina has two older brothers. Her father is an economist affiliated with the United Nations.

While visiting at Ravena-Coeymans - Selkirk, Christina will be staying in the home of Debbie Miller, a Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk exchange student who visited Costa Rica last summer.

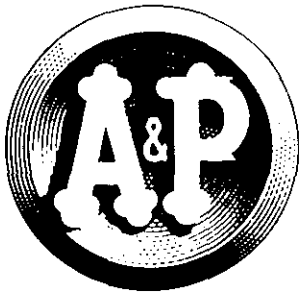

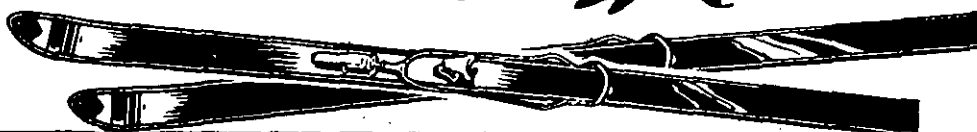

Winter Schools

The Cooperative Extension Association of Albany County announces plans for its winter schools for commercial farmers.

The first school to be held will be the Regional Vegetable Growers School to be held on January 14, from 9:30 to 4:00 P.M. at Valle's Steak House, Central Ave., in Albany. This annual event attracts vegetable growers from nine counties in the Capital District. Joseph E. Huth, Albany County Extension Agent said, "This year's school will emphasize the use of chemical weed control materials."

Professor Robert Sweet from the Vegetable Crops Department at Cornell, will lead a two hour discussion on that topic. Other speakers will include Professors Arden F. Sherf, Extension Plant Pathologist, Arthur A. Muka, Extension Entomologist and Mr. James Forbes, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The second meeting will be the Field Corps School. Keith Norton, Extension Agronomist, will discuss weed control in field corn and in alfalfa seedings. He will be emphasizing the hard-to-control weeds such as quackgrass, nutsedge and annual grasses.

Other topics at this school will be fertilizing corn and hay crops, and clear seeding legumes. The Field Crops school will be held on January 31 from 11:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. at a place to be announced.

Watering House Plants

Having attractive house plants is a sure sign of a "green thumb." Many factors determine the fate of house plants, and watering is one of the important ones. The need for water varies with the kind of plant, the potting soil, the pot, the time of year, and the plant's location in the home. These variables make watering more of an art than a science!

Watering plants during the winter months takes a watchful eye.

It is impossible to say water every day, or once a week or some other interval. During the short, dark days of winter, plants generally need less water than at other times of the year. However, the humidity in most homes is so low that water evaporates quickly from the soil and watering is necessary. You may have noticed that a plant in the living room will dry out faster than one in the kitchen where the humidity is higher. A plant near a radiator or in a draft will also dry out quickly. Plants in porous clay pots will dry out more quickly than those in plastic or glazed pots. And pots without a bottom

drain hole dry the slowest.

With all these complications, how can you determine when to water and how much water to use? To complicate the problem, too much water can be as bad or worse than not enough water.

The Cooperative Extension Association of Albany County offers these suggestions. First, and probably most important, don't water until the soil on the surface is dry. This means checking the plants frequently. If the plants start to wilt you have waited a little too long, but probably have not hurt the plants.

If the plants are in a loose, well

drained soil, and in a pot with a bottom drainage hole, the watering job is easier. Just water from the top and water until some water comes through the bottom hole. Or, if you prefer, you can bottom water these pots. Set the pots in a container of water for a period of about an hour. Then remove the pots from the water and let any excess water drain away. The pots should not be allowed to stand in water for more than a couple of hours (except during a short vacation).

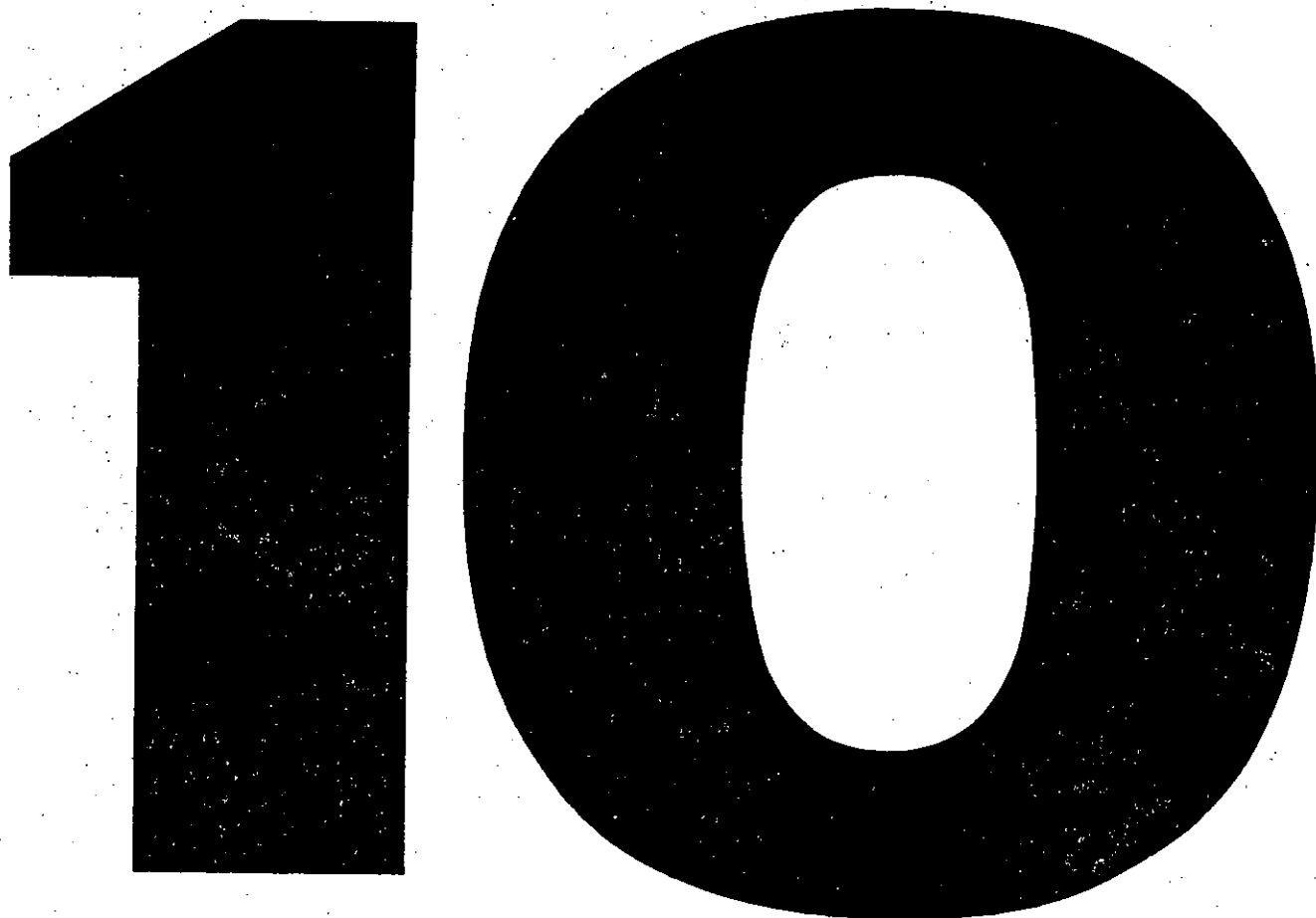
With a pot that does not have a drainage hole, watering is more difficult. Try watering a little, let the water percolate down,

then water more if needed. Stop watering before the soil appears flooded.

There is no one correct way to water. Any way to keep the soil moist, but not wet, will benefit the plants. For more information on watering request the free bulletin, "Care and Use of Plants in the Home." This is available from the Agricultural Division, Cooperative Extension Association of Albany County, 441 Broadway, Albany, New York 12207.

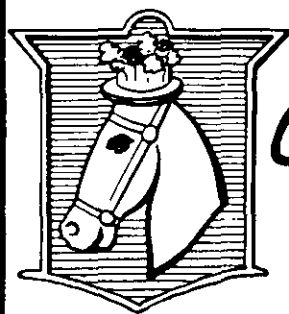

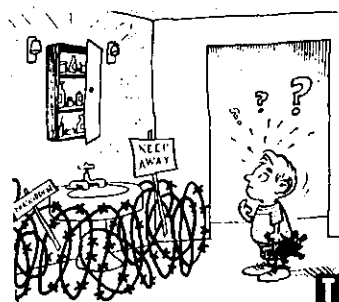

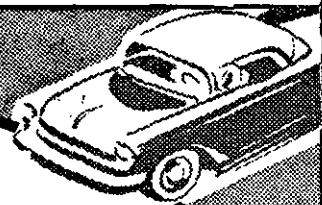
