Local hot-air balloon pilot, Gil Lewis of 114 Dumbarton Dr., Elsmere, will participate in the annual St. Paul Winter Carnival National Hot-Air Balloon Races to be held in St. Paul, Minnesota on February 2. Co-piloting the balloon "Golden Bear II," will be Ed DeCausemaker, formerly of Elsmere and now residing in New Windsor, N.Y.

The event, which is co-sponsored by the Winter Carnival Association, the Minnesota Aerostat Society Balloon Club and Don Piccard of Newport Beach, California, will include 15 balloonists from all over the United States and Canada. dances is as follows: Boys must wear jacket and tie. No dungarees. Girls may not wear slacks. Regular shoes must be worn; no sandals.

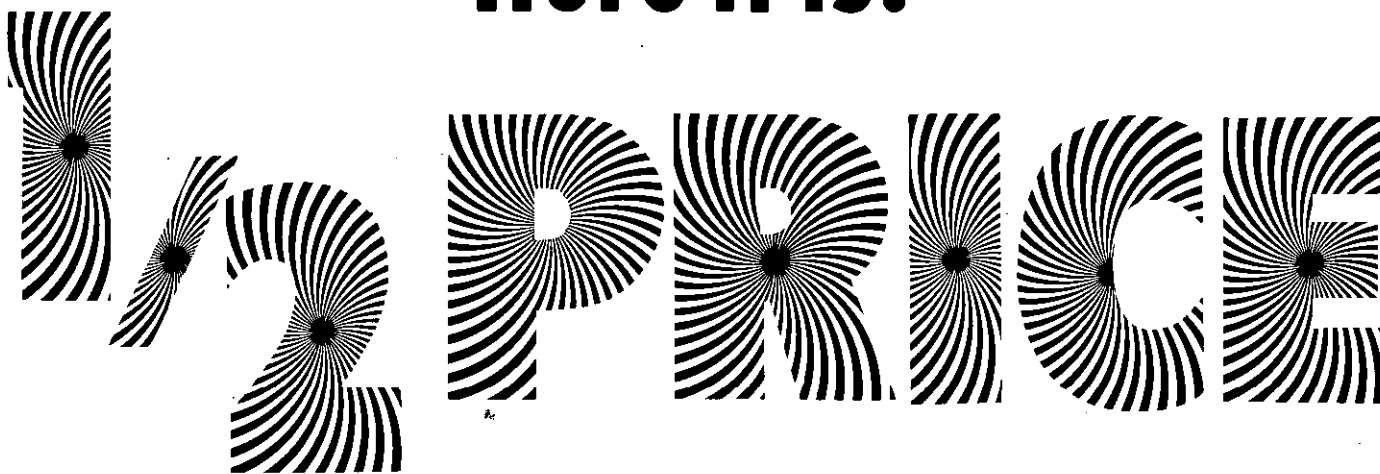
Boy Scouts

Sex Ed. Workshop

Bethlehem School District teachers attended a three-hour workshop on Monday, January 20, in preparation for teaching the "Sex and Family Life" segment of the district's new Health Curriculum.

Dr. Howard Netter, local Delmar gynecologist and a Fellow of the American Society of Clinical Hypnosis, presented a slide lecture covering the physiology of the human reproductive organs and development of the embryo from fertilization to birth.

Dr. Netter stressed to teachers the importance of creating a relaxed classroom environment in discussing these subjects so students will feel free to ask the questions which are really on their minds. He also gave the teachers a list of questions about sex and the reproduction process typically asked by children of various age groups.

The new Health Curriculum was instituted this year by Bethlehem schools, two years ahead of 1970 date set by the State Board of Education for compulsory Health Education instruction in all State schools. Dr. Netter commended the Curriculum Committee for the excellent job it had done in preparing the written materials for the new program. He said, "The Sex and Family Living" section is extremely successful in handling this very sensitive subject matter for all grade levels." This section was written by Mrs. Ruthann Cons, a psychologist for Bethlehem schools.

He figured in one of the daffiest of Aetna Life & Casualty's annual collection of bizarre insurance claim cases.

The young desperado approached a cashier in a San Diego grocery, inadvertently drew a ripe banana instead of his revolver, and boldly proclaimed a stickup. Thrown into a near panic when he discovered his mistake, the callow Clyde with the bonnie banana still managed to fumble out his real gun and split with \$745 before the laughter died.

Here are some more of the best "weirdies" from among the 14 million claims handled by Aetna in 1968:

From Tucson comes another tale of ludicrous larceny. This one starred a shoplifter who bit an arm and leg of a vigilant drug store clerk in a mad gnash to freedom.

Dutch Elm Disease

The Dutch Elm Disease continues to take its toll of elm trees in this area. The cost from this loss of trees is almost unbelievable. The most obvious is the cost of tree removal. A less obvious cost, though probably a greater one, is the loss of real estate value and the intangible assets of tree-lined streets and parks.

This disease has been under study for many years by men who specialize in plant diseases. Unfortunately, no cure has yet been found. However, the spread for this disease can be controlled by community action.

To understand the control, it is first necessary to know the facts about this disease. Horticultural experts from Cooperative Extension have listed these basic facts about the Dutch Elm disease.

1. It is a fungus infection, fatal to elm trees, and there is no known cure once a tree has become infected.

2. Healthy trees get the disease when fed upon by elm bark beetles which have hatched out of infected elm wood nearby.

3. Once established, the disease will build up in a community, and can destroy all or most of the elms in the area.

4. The suppression of elm bark beetles populations by removing and destroying all recently dead or badly weakened elm wood is the main preventive control for this disease.

5. Spraying as an addition to sanitation can help control the spread of the bark beetles. However, spraying alone can not control this disease.

Until science can find a cure, the only control for this disease is to control the beetle that spreads it. To date, the best way to do this is remove and destroy all dead, dying, unhealthy elm wood. This wood must be destroyed before early April, when the beetles leave the infected trees and go to nearby trees.

This means that diseased trees must be removed and destroyed as soon as possible. Methods of destroying the wood and the beetle include burning the entire wood or removing and burning the bark and burying the wood at least a foot below the soil surface. If this wood will be used for fuel, remove and burn the bark first.

To really control the elm bark beetle, and the Dutch Elm disease, community action is required. It does little good for one person to try to control this disease if his neighbor does not. For more information on the disease and its control, request the Cornell bulletins "Dutch Elm Disease and it's Control" and "Municipal Decisions on Dutch Elm Disease Control." These are available from the Cooperative Extension Association of Albany County, Agricultural Division, 441 Broadway, Albany, N.Y. 12207.

The World's Championship events are sponsored by the Town of North Elba Park District, which will operate the bobsled run from Sunday, February 9 through Sunday, February 23.

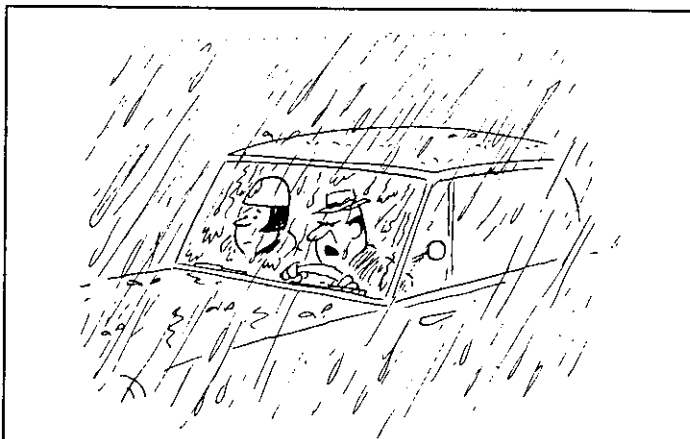

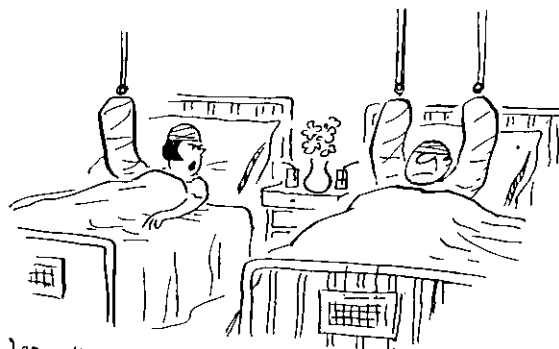

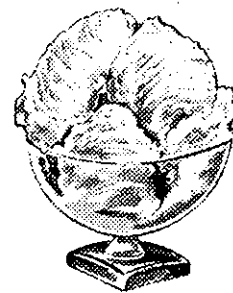
