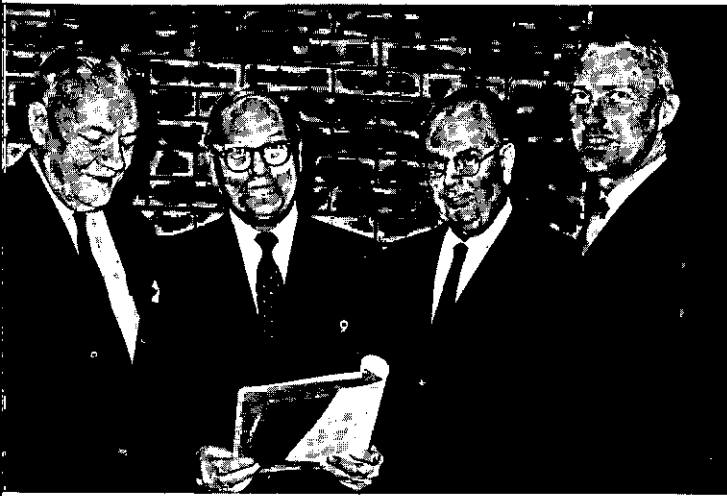

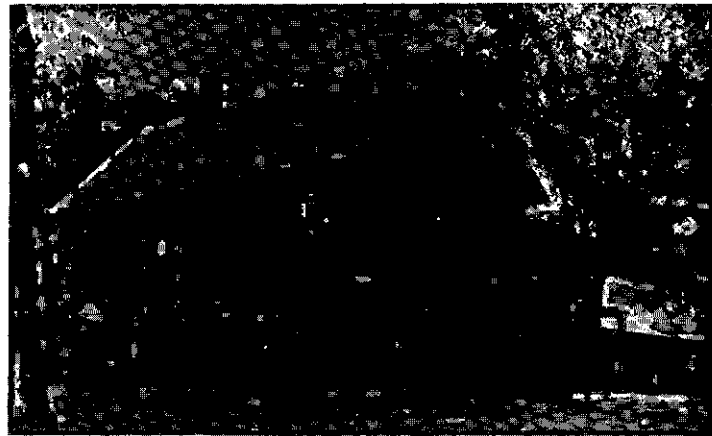

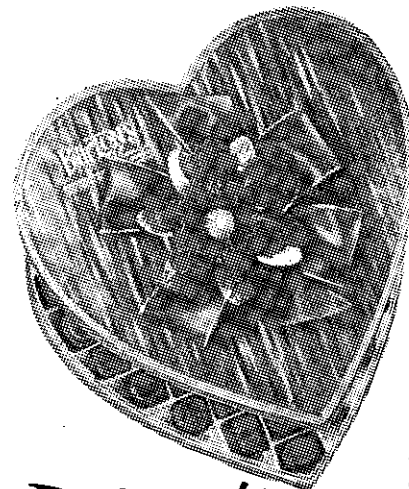
Exhibit Material Needed

Cornell University - Advanced Placement Program for Talented High School Juniors

Again this summer Cornell University will conduct an Advanced Placement Program for talented college-bound high school juniors, which will give students the opportunity to earn advanced placement credit in subjects which are not available for such credit in high school.

This program, extending from June 25 to August 8, 1969, will

include the following courses: Anthropology, Biological Science Chemistry, Contemporary American Politics and Economics, Geological Sciences, Foreign Language, Mathematics, Physics, and Psychological Studies.

To be eligible for this summer study at Cornell, an applicant must have completed his junior year by June 1969 and be scheduled to graduate from high school by June 1970. Only these students who have demonstrated superior academic ability and initiative will be considered.

The cost for each participant in the program is \$500, which covers room and board and all fees, exclusive of books.

are now planning for the new Intermediate School scheduling which will go into effect next fall. Under the Intermediate School program, 9th graders will become part of the Senior High School student body; and the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades will be grouped together at the Junior High building.

One series of workshops was conducted for teachers during the recent break for end of term examinations, and additional sessions will be scheduled during the Spring semester.

Creativity was the keynote of the initial planning sessions. To fully tap the creative ideas of teachers, Dr. Edward Sargent of the SUNY Education Department, presented a lecture and demonstration on group creativity entitled "The Art of Brainstorming." According to Dr. Sargent, "In group situations there is often so much emphasis placed on the process of critical thinking or logical thought that creativity is killed before it really gets started."

At the end of the lecture teachers were invited to open their minds and allow ideas to flow freely, without regard to implementation or critical analysis at this point. Over 150 ideas were generated on the problem of "How to create a feeling of school spirit for the new Intermediate School group." Other sessions will be devoted to evaluation and analysis of these ideas in order to pick those which have real merit for the new school program.

The emphasis on free creative thinking was carried over into other sessions of the workshop series as well. At the second session, Dr. Kathryn Bookbinder, a psychologist for Bethlehem schools, spoke to the teachers on "The pupil as a Person in our Midst." Dr. Bookbinder stressed the importance of making the child the center of focus in all program plans, and teachers were again asked to express their ideas in this area.

Another of the workshops was devoted to a report by a group of teachers conducting a pilot program in "Team Teaching" this year. Team teaching means that subject matter teachers are

grouped together in teams to work with a particular group of students. Each team includes one teacher from each of the subject categories at the school — English, Math, Social Studies, Science, etc. According to the pilot team members, there are two primary advantages to team teaching. First, by working as a team, the teachers can better coordinate the various segments of the curriculum so each subject complements and strengthens the others. Secondly, since the teachers are working with a specific group of students, they can more easily identify children with special learning or adjustment problems and work together to overcome these difficulties. Based on the success of the pilot project this year, team teaching will be fully implemented in the new Intermediate School program next fall.

The Delmar Dolphins Swim Club participated in the 1969 Mid-Winter Adirondack District A.A.U. Age Group Swim Meet which was sponsored by the Schenectady Swim Club and held at State University of New York on Sunday, January 26. Forty-one members of the Delmar Dolphins swam in the events which attracted swimmers from Plattsburgh, Canajoharie, Rome and Watertown as well as local clubs.

Medals were won by the following Delmar Dolphins: Angela Schiavo and Paul Lierheimer in the under 8 year class; Carolyn Bailey, Stephen Steele and Jim Clyne in the under 10 year class; and Jean Winchell in the girls' open class.

Jeanne Gorman won three medals in the under 8 year class in the 50 yard freestyle, breaststroke and backstroke and Kevin Goodway won three medals in the under 10 year class for the same events.

The relay team composed of Shawn Goodway, Kevin Goodway, Stephen Steele and Loren Elkins placed second in the 200 yard freestyle relay for boys 10 and under.

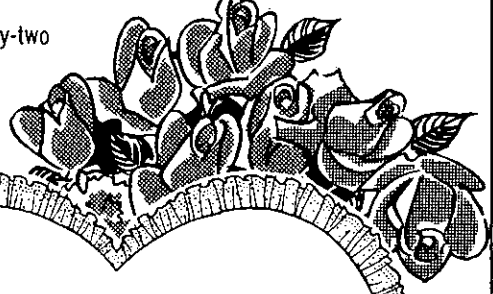

**Bethlehem
A White Ghetto**

The third of four programs on racism, as pointed out in the Kerner Report, will be held at 7:30 P.M. on Sunday, February 9, in Fellowship Hall, First United Methodist Church, 428 Kenwood Avenue. The topic for discussion at this session will be 'employment.'

The Kerner Report stated that the causes of recent racial disorders are imbedded in a massive tangle of issues and circumstances - social, economic, political, and psychological - which arise out of the historical pattern in America of Negro-white relations.

A traditional test of participation in American society is the capacity to obtain and hold a "good job." Steady employment with adequate compensation provides both purchasing power and social status. It develops the capabilities, confidence and self-esteem an individual needs to be a responsible citizen, and provides a basis for a stable family life. Daniel Moynihan has stated that "... for the Negro it is, and will continue to be, the master problem. The linkage between problems of employment and the range of social pathology that afflicts the Negro community is unmistakable. Employment not only controls the Negro's

present but in a most profound way, creates his future as well."

The program will explore the opportunities for employment and advancement of the Negro as they relate to the community; the efforts being made to provide or create more jobs; and some of the programs to train or retrain the unemployed. Participating in the program as discussion leaders will be Mrs. Barbara Chenault, Employment Counselor, panelist; C. Juhian Parrish, Div. of Equal Opportunity Unit, Department of Civil Service, Youth Opportunities Center; John H. Flandreau, Secretary to the New York State Pure Waters Authority; Roger Foskey, Employment Director, Urban League of the Albany Area Inc.; and Emil W. Kuhl Jr., Supervisor, National Food Management Service Inc. The moderator will be Robert E. Barron of the Commission on Social Concerns.
