## Vision Test

Through the sponsorship of the Pre-school Parents' Organization there will be a vision screening on March 10 and 11 between the hours of 9 A.M. and noon. The need is still present to screen 3, 4, and 5 year old pre-schoolers for the presence of amblyopia or, "the lazy eye" as it is more commonly known. Through the guidance of the Albany Branch of the Association of the Blind, volunteer mothers will be trained in the approved technique of vision screening for this eye malady.

These screenings will take place Monday, March 10, at the Coeymans Reformed Church; they will be held Monday, March 10, and Tuesday, March 11, at Selkirk Fire House #1, South Bethlehem Fire House, and the Ravena Congregational Christian Church. The importance of these screenings cannot be stressed enough. If your child participated in a similar program last year, it is beneficial to have it done once again this year. Only through annual screenings can this condition be detected, thereby enabling corrective treatment to be instituted.

## U. S. Grant

Bethlehem Central High School has been awarded a \$15,000 federal grant for use in developing a model library resource center for study of nonwestern countries and areas.

The funds will be used to purchase books, films, magazines, newspapers, and video tapes related to eastern, middle-eastern, African, and other non-western cultures. All materials will be chosen to emphasize man and the human aspects of the cultures — rather than stressing history and governmental institutions. The feeling is that by learning to understand the people, students will develop a more meaningful and appreciative understanding of the problems they face and the institutions they have created.

Application for the grant, which was received under the Elementary & Secondary Aid to Education Act of 1965, was motivated by a concern that students do not know enough about non-western cultures because most high school classes in art, history and literature tend to stress only western traditions and contributions to man's advancement. Mr. Gordon Molyneaux, who helped prepare the application together with Mr. Frederick Pickett the High School librarian, is particularly concerned about the teaching of non-western cultures. He and Mr. DeCecco, an-

other member of the social studies department, have instituted a course in Eastern Studies for students this year and other special area studies courses are in the planning stages.

While the new materials will be used extensively by students enrolled in the Eastern Studies course, a much more comprehensive use program is planned by the library and school district. In-service workshops will be conducted to acquaint all teachers with the non-western library acquisitions, and to provide them with background information necessary for teaching about these areas. All materials will be cataloged as to their usefulness for presentations to all grade levels — from kindergarten to high school. If an elementary teacher wishes to cover some aspect of non-western culture with her class, a special kit of materials will be sent out to her from the special resource center. High school students will be encouraged to perform independent research projects making use of the resource center, and a student written newsletter — describing new materials as they are acquired — is also planned as a class project for students taking the special area studies courses.

All of the new materials will be placed in a specific area of the newly enlarged High School library so they will be easily accessible to all students and teachers in the district.

Bethlehem school administrators and teachers are attempting to obtain federal and state grants whenever possible in order to expand the program and educational opportunities for district children without placing a greater burden on local tax payers.

Coeducational in its evening, Saturday, and graduate programs since the 1940's, Saint Rose currently has more than 125 men enrolled as graduate students. Full-time undergraduate enrollment is 750 women, divided about evenly between resident students and commuters.





These services, in whole or in part, he continued, are made possible through the voluntary contributions of individuals, business and industry. In no significant way will the various public tax-supported health and welfare programs or the federal gov-

ernment's anti-poverty program reduce the continuing and expanding need for the Joint Appeal, its agencies and services.

### New Exhibit

A collection of more than 100 items of American Indian artifacts has been prepared for public viewing at the New York State Museum. Describing the installation, G. Carroll Lindsay, Museum Director, explained that although these widely diverse examples of the craftsmanship of the first Americans span a period of roughly three hundred years, they are harmoniously exhibited against a background of an art-form as new as tomorrow - that of dynamic display techniques. Mr. Lindsay commended two Museum designers, Theodore Weyhe, senior exhibits designer, and Michael Gutbezahl, exhibit design supervisor, for their success in "blending the old and the new into effective concord, and at the same time enhancing the beauty of the individual pieces." He added that lighting, close viewability, coherence of placement within space limitations, and flow of traffic are some of the many considerations a modern museum must face.

Tools, charms, and necklaces which have been painstakingly made from stone, bone, ivory, shell, and horn are included in the display. Clay pottery is represented, as is a large assortment of basketry. Some baskets were so tightly woven they could hold water and were used for cooking by the addition of hot stones.

A large variety of wooden implements, from bowls and spoons to canoes and paddles, are included in the display. Skin and cloth used for clothing and adornment are exhibited on mannequins.

The exhibit was conceived and planned by Jennifer Chatfield, Museum anthropology planner, who assessed the Museum's collection and chose the items which most represent the broad range of artistic ability and taste of the American Indians.

In explaining the show's title, "Lo! The Rich Indian," Miss Chatfield said her purpose was to direct attention to aspects of American Indian culture which were anything but poor. "This would include, for example, the diverse and distinctive artistic traditions which enable us to pinpoint an object's origin in relation to culture area or even tribe."

She pointed out that artifacts in the exhibit are grouped according to basic raw materials instead of tribe or type of item. "A visitor can see the stylized relief carving on a North Pacific coast wooden box near the beautifully simple form of an eastern woodlands burl bowl which has no surface decoration."

Commenting on the current exhibit, Mr. Gutbezahl said that "grouping ethnological elements according to their basic materials, rather than by culture groups, allows innovative configurations of display media to project a new visual impact," adding that the open design and dramatic lighting exemplify a new approach to the planning of informative museum displays. "At

this exhibition, the sophisticated museum-goer has an opportunity to preview the future while gaining fresh insight into the past," he said.

Mr. Gutbezahl is a graduate of Pratt Institute, School of Art and Design, and prior to joining the Museum staff, worked on design for the U.S. Pavilion at Expo '67, Montreal, with the New York City firm of Cambridge Seven Associates. Mr. Weyhe, a veteran with the Museum staff, has designed and supervised the installations of several of the newer exhibits including Paleontology Hall. He helped design "Dimensions of American Music" shown at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center last summer, and later at the State Museum.



Following the trend toward changing exhibits in modern museums, Mr. Lindsay said the display will be removed in late spring to make room for an exhibit of historic military objects. The Indian display will be put in storage to await completion of the South Mall Museum and Library Center where it will again be available for viewing.

## Pruning Shade Trees

Most tree experts, including Cooperative Extension's horticultural professors, recommend that most tree pruning be done in early spring. The reason for pruning between now and May, is that most trees will heal quickest at this time.

As is always the case with nature, there are exceptions to this general rule. Trees that 'bleed' or exude sap in spring, should be pruned in the summer. Maples, beeches and birches are among those that should be pruned in summer. Early flowering trees such as dogwood, ornamental fruit trees and red bud, are usually pruned after bloom so that the blossoms can be enjoyed. Most other shade trees are best pruned while they are still dormant.

Extension's horticultural professors say that shade trees should be pruned as little as possible to improve the health or appearance of the tree. All dead and diseased branches should be removed. Broken branches also need pruning. As in all pruning, prune back to healthy wood and a side branch or the trunk. Branches that cross and rub together also need care to prevent wounds from rubbing.

Often large trees need to have the lower limbs removed to improve a view or to improve an onlookers view of your house. These heavy limbs are best removed by professionals who are equipped to handle the heavy weights involved.

When making pruning cuts, try to end up with a cut that is almost flush with the trunk or branch. No stubs should be left as these are ideal places for har-

boring insects and diseases. However a cut that is made too close will leave a larger scar than necessary and will take longer to heal.

Wounds larger than two inches or more in diameter should be treated with a tree wound paint. Orange shellac is one of the best materials to use immediately after pruning. This seals the wound and the alcohol in the shellac disinfects the wound. Since shellac is not durable repeated applications are necessary. If you prefer, the shellac painted wound can be covered with a commercial tree wound paint or a linseed oil base house paint that contains lead and zinc.

Prepared tree wound paints can be applied directly to the cut area without first using shellac. Some of these will not stick well to a moist area and the shellac base often helps. The tree wound paints are usually more durable and are now available in spray cans to make the job easier.


