

The owners of the pictured homes, and others similarly situated, are subject to fines of \$500 plus \$100/depuntil they stop polluting local waters, unless the Sewer District is extended to serve them or unless Selkirk constructs its own municipal treatment facilities. They also risk contracting such viral and intestinal diseases as infectious hepatitis, gastric enteritis and the typhoid-like salmonella infections.

The District Officials, after extensive engineering and financial studies, have concluded the most effective and economical solution to the pollution problems of the area is to extend the District and build a completely new and effective treatment plant and additional sewers. The taxpayers of the proposed extension will vote on the proposition on March 7, at the Bethlehem Central Senior High School.

LETTER

To the Editor:

As members of BEST (Bethlehem for Economical Sewer Taxes), we would like to call to the attention of every taxpayer in Slingerlands, Hamagrael, southern Delmar, the Murray Avenue area, Colonial Acres, Bethlehem Center, Glenmont and Selkirk the urgent necessity of voting on March 7 for the proposed Delmar-Elsmere Sewer District Extension. To vote, your name must appear on the tax roll; both husbands and wives may vote if both names are on the roll.

Your good health and your future are at stake. Not only do we want to avoid for ourselves and our children such diseases as infectious hepatitis, gastric enteritis and the typhoid-like salmonella infections, we also want to comply with existing state orders to stop polluting our waters. Our pollution problems are serious and increasing. If we don't solve them, we face severe legal penalties and fines as well as the increasing likelihood of disease.

By voting YES on March 7, we can take advantage of over three million dollars in state aid under the Pure Waters Program, aid which might well otherwise be lost. We can also insure the financially sound and physically healthy growth of our town.

If we fail, if the proposed extension is defeated, we risk our health and the soundness of our pocketbooks. In brief:

- ... Delay threatens us with severe health hazards;
- ... Delay will increase the cost for each taxpayer for what we must do anyway by law.
- ... By acting positively now, we insure that we as a community continue to grow, so that there will be each year more people to share the tax burden we assume.

When we vote YES on March 7, we show our individual, personal concern for the health of our children and ourselves. We show our financial good common sense. We show our confidence that our elected representatives share and will continue to have our future best interests at heart.

For goodness sake, as well as for economic reasons, vote *for* the extension of the Delmar-Elsmere Sewer District. The health we save may be our own.

Annual Report

Expansion plans costing almost \$450 million to meet the

growing demand for more and more energy in the next fouryear period were described by Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation in the company's annual report to shareowners, issued recently.

Additional electrical generating and transmission facilities as well as construction and improvements on Niagara Mohawk's natural gas system are included in the expansion program, which in 1969 will be highlighted by the anticipated completion of Nine Mile Point Nuclear Station on Lake Ontario, near Oswego. The plant will ultimately generate over 600,000 kilowatts and is expected to go into service in the fall.

The report notes that Niagara Mohawk filed new electric rates with the New York State Public Service Commission which, if approved, will increase annual electric revenues by about \$21.8 million. Presently the subject of public hearings, the increase is necessary, the report states, to help offset uncontrollable rises in costs including taxes, wages and the prices of materials and equipment.

In a foreword to shareowners, Earl J. Machold, chairman of the board, and James A. O'Neill, president state: "In our pending electric rate case, we are pressing for rates which will secure us earnings consistent with our operating costs." In connection with recent earnings decline, they state: "These higher rates, essential to offset increases in our operating costs, should enable our earnings to resume an upward trend."

New Brochure

Albany Savings Bank is making local banking history - with publication of a colorful 34-page brochure detailing the bank's activities during the past fiscal

- The number of depositors, at 92,887, and total bank deposits, at \$292.6 million, reached new highs in 1968.


