Moving In

The new academic wing at Bethlehem Central High School was opened for student use on April 14. This school addition, which has been under construction for the past year, provides 37 new classrooms, including two art rooms and two rooms equipped for teaching homemaking classes.

Desks, Chairs, and larger pieces of equipment were moved into the rooms by school custodians over the Easter vacation. How-

ever, teachers and students returned from vacation to face the typical "moving day" dilemma — organizing cupboards and unpacking and putting away the classroom supplies and materials.

The enlarged high school cafeteria was opened in December, and other portions of the newly constructed areas are scheduled for use at various times during the next few months. The school additions are necessary to accommodate increased enrollment and the 9th grade students who will move to the Senior High facility next September.

At a meeting last week, the Bethlehem Board of Education voted to re-schedule the dates for the annual meeting and vote on the 1969-70 school budget. The annual meeting will now be held on June 10, with voting on June 11 - rather than May 7 and 8 as originally planned.

Bethlehem Superintendent, Dr. Richard Moomaw, said two factors had led to this decision to postpone the vote. First, is the extreme difficulty of arriving at a final budget figure this year, due to the critical revenue situation and second, the Board wanted to allow ample time for distributing information to district residents prior to the voting date.

The color film illustrated touch dialing, both on the normal desk telephone and with the slim-line telephone; use of direct long-distance dialing, including the use of area codes and the area-code director; and re-emphasized the proper methods of answering a telephone and dealing with the information of a call.

Mrs. Mary Elliott, FBLA advisor, and Robert A. Pierson, DECA advisor, used the information for extended discussion of good telephone manners.

New Heart Aid

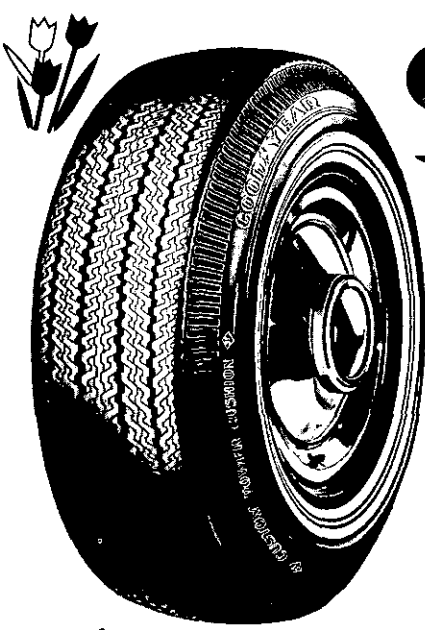
A heart specialist in Albany can now receive an electrocardiogram by telephone from a hospital in Ticonderoga 100 miles away.

Interpreting the ECG - a graph of the heart's pulses - used to take a day because technologists at Moses - Ludington Hospital mailed the electrocardiograms to Albany, where a specialist read them.

Now, it's done in a matter of minutes.

A special telephone known as a Data-Phone data set connects the Ticonderoga hospital's portable electrocardiograph machine with one in the office of Dr. John F. Filippone, clinical professor of medicine and attending cardiologist at Albany Medical Center Hospital.

In his office on Providence Street, Dr. Filippone can watch the heartbeats of a cardiac patient 100 miles away. He can use the same phone to talk to Moses-

Ludington staff members before and after the ECG is sent.

At the hospital, officials noted that it isn't possible for anyone to describe the tracings of the electrocardiograph well enough for a distant specialist to make a diagnosis.

"The specialist must see the electrocardiogram to determine the required treatment," said Mrs. Joan Newhall, assistant administrator at Moses-Ludington. "A swift diagnosis is often vital."

The hospital's portable electrocardiograph machine, smaller than a standard typewriter, traces the heart pulses on a paper tape. The Data-Phone data set that links this machine to the Albany cardiologist's office is slightly larger than a desk model phone and weighs only about six pounds. Six buttons over the dial control the transmission of electrical pulses that carry the ECG over regular telephone wires.

The portable data set was in-

stalled by New York Telephone. It can be used in Moses Ludington's Emergency Room in conjunction with a telephone extension from the hospital switchboard or with an extension phone that can be plugged into any one of 18 hospital rooms.

Data-Phone data sets have many uses in business and government to help speed the transmission of increasing volumes of dates. They transmit teletype information and shift information from computer to computer, letting these machines "talk" to each other over telephone lines at speeds up to 2,400 words a minute.

"This remarkable hookup in Ticonderoga is literally a life line for heart patients in this region," says J. F. Lawson, president of the hospital's board of directors. "It could be the forerunner of similar communication links in remote areas, where a cardiologist is not easily available."

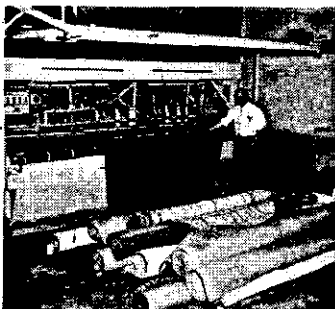

New Concept In Leadership

A definite need for family camp facilities exists today for the more than 8,500 Boy Scouts enrolled with the Fort Orange-Uncle Sam Council, Inc. of the Boy Scouts of America, according to Maj. Gen. John C. Baker, general chairman for the \$379,750 Scout Development Fund Drive now underway in Albany, Columbia and Rensselaer counties.

Gen. Baker said the Fort Orange-Uncle Sam Council must plan for the future if it is to adequately serve the youth of our area, particularly those from low income areas and inner-city locations throughout the Capital District. They must, he said, provide proper housing sites for volunteer leaders and their families in order to get more adult leadership and participation if we are to help in the character moulding of our younger generation.

Family camp units would allow unit leaders to bring their families along with them while they

provide the necessary leadership and guidance for our Scouting population. This will enable the leader to devote his fullest attention to the Scouts in his charge, and also spend some time with his family during evening hours. Such facilities would accommodate camping trailers and/or tents, and would be equipped with cooking, laundry, toilet and other facilities.

Gen. Baker said by establishing unit leader family facilities the Fort Orange-Uncle Sam Council believes it can attract more and better leaders to accompany troops to camp.

Six such units are planned for the Rotary Scout Training Center which is located 13 miles east of Troy in the Graffton Mountain Range. This center covers 535 acres and lies in a valley surrounding beautiful Devitt Lake.

Another six units are planned for Stratton Mountain Scout Reservation. This facility is located about 90 miles from the heart of the Capital District area, in the wildest parts of the Green

Mountains National Forest and spreads over 1,700 acres of dense forest, mountains and lakes.

Gen. Baker indicated approximately 1,100 Scouts used the facilities of the Rotary Scout Training Center and another 400 carried out Scouting Activities at Stratton Mountain Scout Reservation during 1968. This figure will grow in the years ahead as our population expands.

Youth, Gen. Baker said, is the most precious raw material on earth. The fiber of our nation depends on it. A boy's spirit, purpose and physical fitness depends upon the forces we adults direct to shape the destiny of this one critical raw material. The need for character building is greater than ever.

Scouting, he explained, teaches self-reliance and community spirit. It puts a boy on his own and inspires social responsibility. A boy begins to know himself and to respect others. Nature study creative skills and the sheer job of living come with camping such as is provided at our three area Scout camps. Camping is the heartbeat of Scouting.

Gen. Baker concluded with a plea to all residents of Albany, Columbia and Rensselaer counties to actively participate in the Scout Development Fund Drive. By investing in this program we will insure our future and prevent social decay.

Family Living

A Statement by Richard W. Moomaw, Superintendent of Schools, Bethlehem Central School District

The current health education curriculum, grades K-6, a revision of the 1959 curriculum, was placed in the hands of all elementary teachers last September. It specifically includes the required instructions according to Chapter 787 of the Education Law concerning drugs, alcohol, and smoking. It also includes a new section which contains instructional material concerning family living. This material is carefully graded for children, K-6. It is designed to teach children about themselves and the value of the home as the basic unit of society.

The Health Curriculum is a tentative one, subject to review and revision after a year's experience. Nevertheless, it is a good one and the Health Education Committee and the teachers are to be commended for the preparation and implementation of the program.

The entire curriculum and specifically the material on Family Living, prior to implementation, was thoroughly discussed with community groups such as the clergy, physicians, P-TA's and groups of parents invited to schools for this purpose. Responses and reactions from these groups were very favorable.

Meanwhile, the wide controversy over sex education has focused public attention in our community upon the Family Living materials in the health curriculum. Members and parents of our community who have not had the opportunity or availed themselves of the opportunity to gain first hand and complete information of what the schools are teaching, are asking many questions. Some of these questions are in the form of criticisms which are based upon misunderstandings and misinformation. However, most of the questions reflect a sincere desire for complete information concerning what is being taught the children of our community and how it is being taught. These are the questions we must answer.

The portion of the Health Curriculum dealing with Family

Living is now completed, or will be completed within the next few days. At the end of the year, the entire curriculum will be returned to the Health Education Committee for a full reassessment and re-evaluation.

I am asking the Committee to pay particular attention to the section on Family Living, to make sure that it is fulfilling the purposes for which it was designed. As a result of public interest, I am asking the Committee, the elementary principals, and the teachers to plan a complete program of information for parents this fall before this program, with whatever revisions have been made, is re-implemented.

Any school district parents who are interested in obtaining additional information on the Health Curriculum at this time are encouraged to talk with school principals and teachers to obtain answers to their questions.
