



From "The Guidance Newsletter" of Bethlehem Central Senior High School

Community Colleges of The State University of New York

Because many students do not realize the variety of opportunities for further education that exist in our system of locally sponsored two-year Community Colleges under the program of the State University of New York, we are devoting a major part of this and next week's issue of The Guidance Newsletter to an explanation of the role of these colleges in higher education in New York State.

The first Community Colleges were established in 1950 at Jamestown and Middletown, New York, and the growth of the Community College has bee so phenomenal that today, less than twenty years later, there presently exist in a broad network extending from Long Island to Buffalo over thirty Community Colleges. In our local area, Hudson Valley Community College has been operating since 1953, and Schenectady Community College, a newly-established institution, will open its doors to its first class in September 1969.

Although the concept of the Community College is a community-oriented one, that of providing a college to which area students can commute while furthering their education, students are not restricted to attending the institution in their immediate area. Rather, our graduates may apply to any of our Community Colleges throughout the state, and if accepted may attend at a tuition fee ranging from \$240 to \$400 per year depending on the particular college. A few Community Colleges, such as Mohawk Valley Community College in Utica, have dormitory facilities so that a student may live on campus, and all these colleges have college-approved housing in the community in which they are located, usually within easy travel-




