from 3% to 7% on student loans guaranteed by the New York Higher Education Assistance Corporation, contact this agency, at 159 Delaware Avenue, Delmar or your local bank.

**No More 3% Loans:** As of April 1, 1969, students borrowing money for college under the program of the New York Higher Education Assistance Corporation will have to repay their loans at the full interest rate of 7% instead of at the 3% rate which had been in effect since the founding of this corporation.

The result of this legislative change, which, to quote the *New York Times* of June 4, was "passed by the Legislature in the rush of the closing days of its session", will make it more difficult for students from low and middle income families to attend college, especially in view of constantly rising college tuition and fees.

Again, borrowing from the same article in *The New York Times*, "The little noticed change, just now coming to light, was approved last month by Governor Rockefeller, who signed into law a bill eliminating the subsidy". The "subsidy" referred to is the 3% which the government contributed to the lending institution on behalf of the student-borrower, who also paid 3% interest.

As before, students will not have to begin paying back their loan until nine months after graduation from college and may take as long as six years to repay it.

**SENIORS - Notification of Colleges To Which You Have Been Accepted For Admission:** Occasionally, students unthinkingly do not advise colleges which have accepted them for admission, which they do not plan to attend, of their intentions. While this is understandable because of one's preoccupation with the college which he intends to enter, it causes many problems for college admissions officers regarding the size of their entering freshman class and reflects on both the student concerned and on his high school. If you find yourself in this situation, we urge you to contact these colleges now informing them of your plans.

## Pool Opening

The Capital District State Park Commission announced the opening of the swimming pool complex at John Boyd Thacher State Park on Saturday, June 14, 1969. The pool will be open daily, from 11:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M., through Labor Day. Thacher Park is located on Route 157, 15 miles southwest of Albany, situated on the scenic Helderberg Escarpment.

The beautiful Olympic size swimming pool, one of the park's main summer

attractions, can accommodate over 2,000 people during peak use periods. Adjoining the pool is a well developed games area with modern out-door courts for tennis, handball, horse-shoes, and table tennis. Nearby are softball diamonds, picnic areas and refreshment stands.

There are fourteen developed picnicking areas within the nearly 1,400 acres of the park. These areas have picnic tables, fireplaces, charcoal grills, modern, clean comfort stations and parking areas.

Widely known among geologists and paleontologists, the Helderberg Escarpment is one of the richest fossil bearing formations in the world.

# Military Exhibit

## STATE MUSEUM PRESENTS MILITARY HISTORY EXHIBIT

Military history came to life this week when "Musket, Sword, and Haversack" opened at the Albany Institute of History and Art. The exhibit, which traces military life in New York State from the early 17th century up to the Civil War, will run through summer.

The display of more than 350 artifacts was produced by the technical staff of the New York State Museum from a design by George Wood, museum exhibits designer. Clothing, weapons, equipment, musical instruments, and graphic arts—representative of the changing military needs and tastes of New York State in the past—are joined in an impressive phantasmagoria of artistic craftsmanship and military utility.

The opening coincided with the annual meeting of the Company of Military Historians scheduled this year in Albany. A member of the Company brought for loan to the exhibit the gold sword which was presented in 1831 to Oliver Hazard Perry as a token of appreciation for the American

victory on Lake Erie. Made by Albany silversmiths Shepherd & Boyd, who worked from 1806 to 1830, the sword is being lent by the Rhode Island Historical Society.

A focal point of the exhibit is a selection from the renowned Fox collection of miniature soldiers, now in the collection of the New York State Museum.

Music—as important to the soldier as the evolutions of

drill—is an integral part of the exhibit. The early soldier quickened his step to the sound of a martial band, or listened for orders via the shrill notes of the fife or bugle over the din of battle.

Examples of these instruments are included, as are four over-the-shoulder sax horns—designed to carry notes back to the foot soldiers following the band. A deep drum, carried in a horizontal position and struck on both sides with beaters of unequal length and weight for an alternating cadence effect, is part of the display.

Items for the exhibit were chosen for comprehensive representation and chronological coherence by Michael Winey, museum senior curator for history. "There should be something here to satisfy the special interests of everyone who

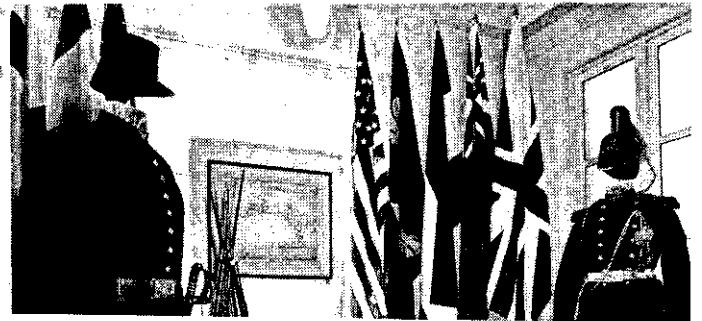
wants to know more about New York State's historical past," Mr. Winey said, "including the are connoisseur."

Several Currier and Ives lithographs are displayed in addition to a miniature portrait of Solomon Van Rensselaer painted in water colors on an ivory brooch by Gilbert Stuart.

The exhibit's special display media are aimed at affording the viewer an opportunity for up-close inspection as well as an effectively dramatic over-all panorama of the collection.

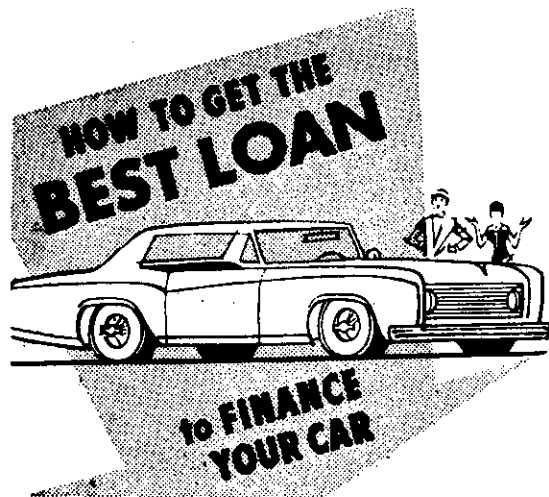
## Historical Association

Voting hours will be extended by five hours to accommodate the large voter turnout this year. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. in the Jr. High School Building. An open hearing will be held at the High School Auditorium on the evening preceding the election, July 8 at 7:30 p.m.

Due to defeat of the proposed \$7.3 million school budget on June 11, the Board is now making an item by item review of the entire budget to determine where cuts may be made with least negative effect to the educational program. Board President, Lindsay Boutelle, pointed out at a meeting on June 12 (the day following the budget defeat) that programs and staff must be cut in order to make any significant reduction in the amount. At this meeting, representatives from the Teachers Involvement Committee and several parents of school children made pleas to the Board to maintain educational programs and make cuts in non-educational services if necessary.

Some of the items now under consideration for elimination from the budget are: Drivers Education; the summer recreational programs; advanced classes for gifted students; some maintenance and repair of school buildings; and increase of the walking distances for secondary school children in order to reduce transportation costs.

The Board expressed a desire not to move to a contingency (austerity) budget if at all possible, but to instead cut out selected programs from the existing school plan. The revised budget is expected to be complete by the end of this week.

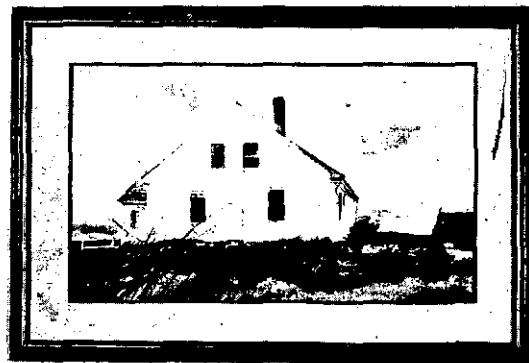

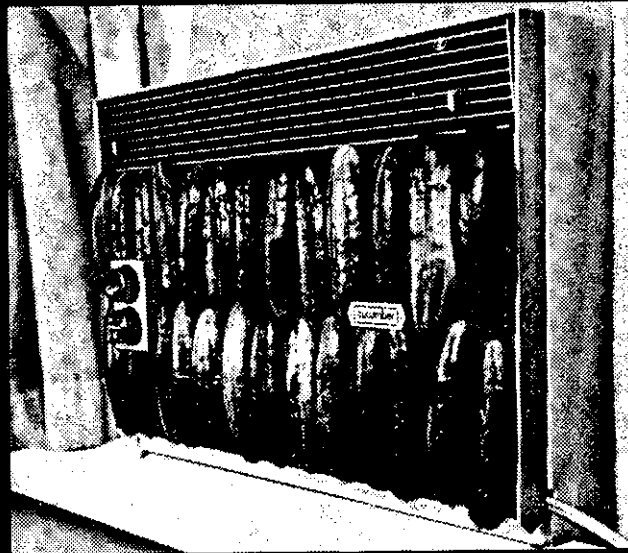

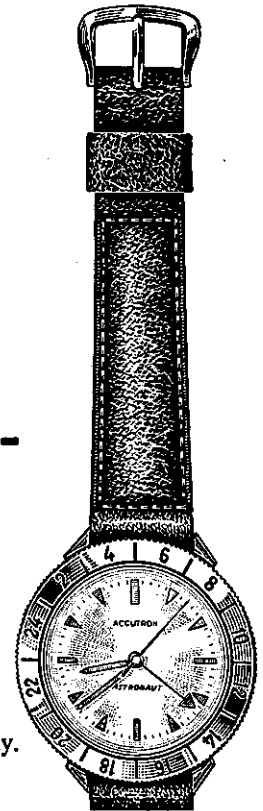

# Review Defeated Budget

The Bethlehem Board of Education met in a special session after its proposed \$7.3 million 1969-70 school district budget was defeated 2,739 votes to 2,039.

Incumbent Board Member John. H. Clyne of Elsmere defeated Mrs. Greta Powers in the Board race, the Bethlehem public library budget passed, Mrs. Florence Newell was reelected to the Library Board of Trustees, and Proposition Three of the school budget was approved, which will require sixth graders to walk one mile to school instead of a half-mile.

Mr. Clyne won reelection with a vote of 2,923 over the 1,837 votes received by Mrs. Powers. A total of 4,845 ballots were cast in the Board candidate election. of this number, 50 were void.

Voters turned out in record numbers in Bethlehem to cast their ballots at the Junior High School gym. By 7:30 p.m., the parking lot was jammed with cars and a line of voters extended from the ballot boxes outside as far as the flag pole in front of the building, observers noted. One school official expressed fear they would run out of ballots. So many townspeople voted (4,840 - a record number, it is reported) that the ballot boxes were stuffed. The polls in Bethlehem closed at 9 p.m. but the final tally was not determined until 1:15 a.m. the following morning.

The \$128,000 Bethlehem public library budget passed, 3,140 to 1,596. There were

4,406 votes to retain Mrs. Newell as a trustee, with 37 write-in votes for other candidates.

Proposition One to the school budget that would have authorized the hiring of 10 additional teachers in the school district at a cost of \$85,043 was

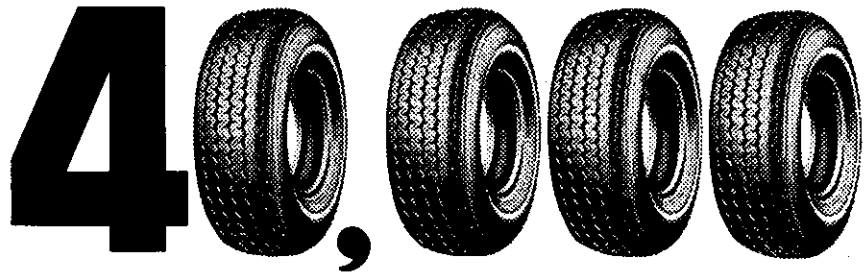
defeated 2,949 to 1,829.

Proposition Two, calling for the purchase of three school buses and the employment of drivers was defeated 2,647 to 2,125. It would have added \$52,761 to the school budget.

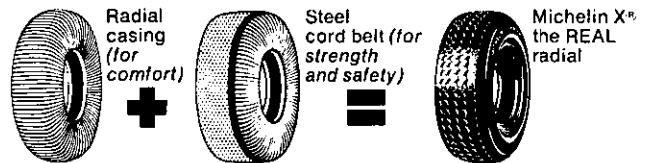

# Home Pool Safety

Thousands of families residing in northeastern New York State who count a swimming pool as part of home were given tips by the American Red Cross today on how to make the private pool a place of pleasure and not of discomfort or even tragedy.

"This is the time when you will want to clean the winter debris out of your pool, have the purification system put in working order, and make sure there are safety items at the poolside," said Carl Gardner, chairman of water safety programs for the Albany Area Chapter, American Red Cross.

Mr. Gardner said national figures indicate 575,700 inground home pools were in use across the nation during the 1967-68 fiscal year, an increase of 20,500 over the previous year. Suggested, will help keep

These precautions, he the home pool a safe, enjoyable place for the family and friends:

1. Consult your local health department about pool sanitation. Know how to test purity of water and how to maintain good chemical balance.
2. Be sure the pool deck is as slip-proof as possible. Rough cement or small tiles make a safer surface.
3. Clearly mark with bouy lines the shallow and deep parts of the pool.
4. Allow no one to swim alone.
5. Provide supervision for youngsters at all times.
6. Fence the pool and include a gate which can be locked when the pool is not in use.
7. Make provision for shade so pool users can get respite from the sun.
8. Install a Home Pool Safety Post, with ring

bouy, reaching pole, and list of emergency phone numbers. Your local Red Cross chapter can provide a poster that gives the specifications for setting up the post.

9. Keep a first aid kit on hand.
10. Be sure some member of your family knows how to administer first aid, especially artificial respiration. Your Red Cross chapter can tell you when its next first aid life saving course is scheduled.
11. Do not allow running or horseplay around the pool.
12. Do not allow bottles or glassware around the

pool.  
13. A diving board can be hazard. Caution swimmers to stay away from the area directly in front of the board.

14. Free swimming instruction is available through your red Cross chapter. It can also provide you with an illustrated booklet, "Teaching Johnny to Swim," costing twenty-five cents which gives step-by-step information for teaching very young children to swim. Additional information and safety tips can be provided by calling the Albany Red Cross water safety department at 462-7461.

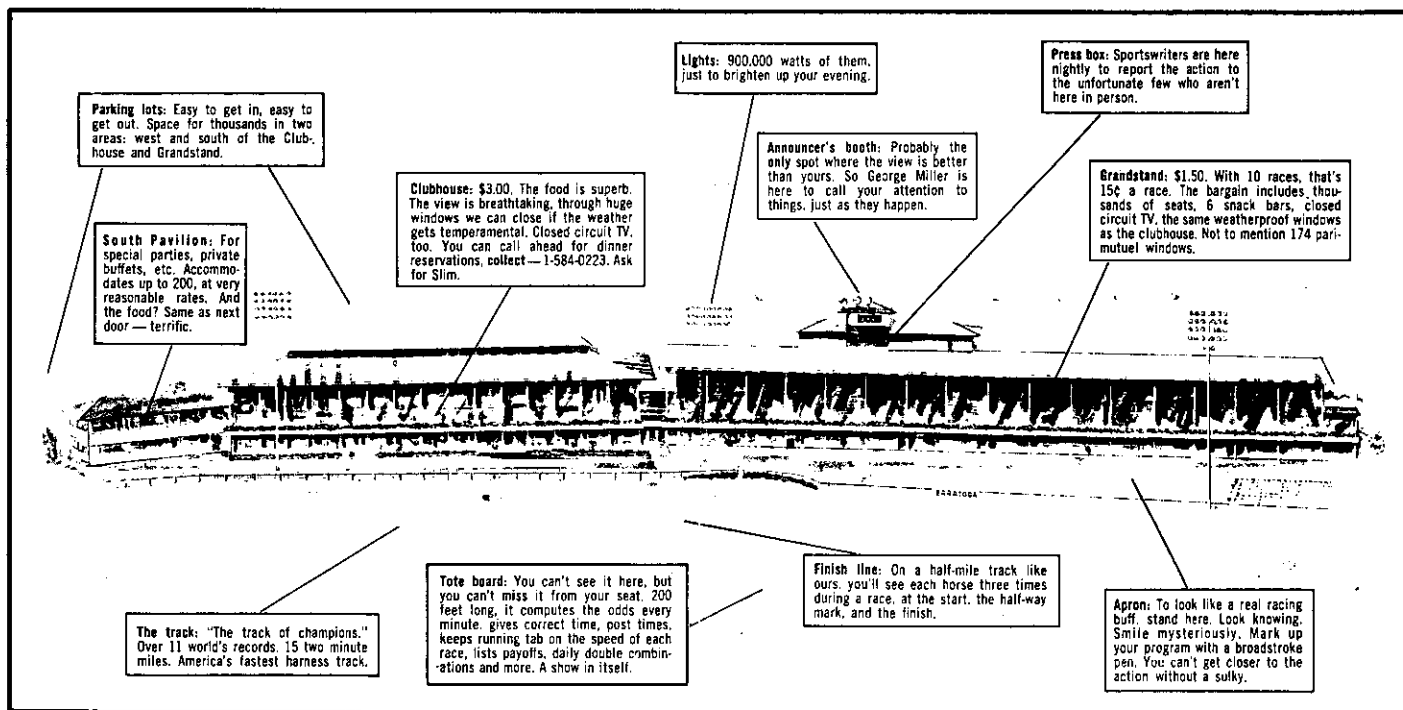

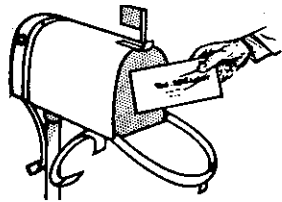
