Revised School Budget

On July 9, Bethlehem residents will vote on a revised 1969-70 school budget.

The tax rate for the reduced budget is approximately \$8.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation versus the \$11.26 rate for the original budget which was voted down in the June 12 election.

During two 6 hour meetings last week, the Board of Education debated the various courses of action open to the school district in view of the recent budget defeat.

The Board was unanimous in their determination not to move immediately to a "contingency budget" as other schools in the Albany area have done. As pointed out by Superintendent, Richard Mommaw, the district has no control over items which are eliminated in a contingency budget; and operating the schools under a contingency budget for even one year would seriously jeopardize the schools' long-range planning and programs.

The Board therefore decided to make selected cuts in the original \$7.3 million proposed expenditure. After consideration of each budget category, a total of \$33,886 was trimmed by the Board. Of this amount, \$15,150 was cut from maintenance and repair of buildings; \$8,562 related to reductions in the Youth Center budget; and transportation costs were lowered by approximately \$8,000 by increasing the walking distance for grades 9-12 from 1 mile to 1 1/2 miles next year. The additional driver training teacher for the summer program was also eliminated from the budget.

Following extensive debate, \$100,000 from unexpended balances was added to the

receipt column, to provide a further reduction in the proposed tax rate increase.

Copies of the revised budget are now being prepared for mailing to all residents prior to the June 9 vote; and a public hearing will be held in the Sr. High School auditorium on June 8 at 7:30 p.m. Any resident with questions related to the new budget is invited to call the Superintendents office at 439-4921.

Cited For Bravery



A Glenmont soldier, who despite wounds from combat fire, charged and destroyed an enemy bunker in Vietnam, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroism.

Spec. 4 Ronald M. Murray of the 1st Battalion, Airmobile, of the 5th Cavalry, was cited for his action on Feb. 24 while serving as a rifleman during a reconnaissance mission.

According to the citation accompanying the medal, Specialist Murray "upon spotting an enemy soldier inside a bunker, immediately warned his fellow soldiers and began to play fire on the bunker."

"While assaulting the emplacement," the citation continued, "Specialist Murray was wounded but he continued his charge on the bunker until it was destroyed."

The citation concluded: "His display of personal bravery and devotion to duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army."

The New York City Ballet launches the fourth annual season of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, Thursday evening, July 3 with George Balanchine's charming full-length ballet, "A Midsummer Night's Dream," at 8:30 P.M. It will be repeated Friday and Saturday nights, July 4 and 5 at 8:30 P.M. and Sunday afternoon, July 6 at 3:30 P.M. in the Amphitheater of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center

located in the Spa State Park, Saratoga Springs, New York, Exit 13N on the Northway (Int. 87).

"A Midsummer Night's Dream," which inaugurated the first Saratoga Festival in 1966 and being repeated by popular demand, is the famous Shakespearean comedy of prankish antics and love in a "never-never land" one midsummer night. The ballet, set to the incidental music of Mendelssohn, is one of 31 repertoire works being done by the New York City Ballet during their month-long stay at their summer home. 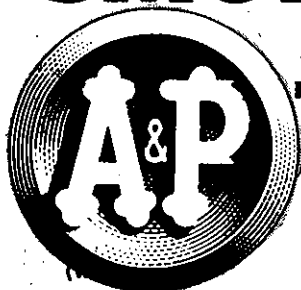

New Teacher Approved by Board

Justification for an additional business teacher in the year of state wide budget austerity was offered by Supervising Principal Dr. Frank Filippone Tuesday night as he claimed business training was the only vocational training within Ravena-Coeymans-Silkirk Schools.

Though the junior high school language programs are being cut, and the class size in other departments will rise with the additional students but no additional staff, the business department was a special case, he told the school board meeting.

"If we don't have small enough classes, we won't do a good job," he told board members who objected to any new staff. He pointed out that a change in the English honors program had cut the English staff by one person so one new business teacher was a replacement of staff in the budget.

Final Approval

Board members finally approved a motion to hire the teacher.

The cloudy water at the Jerico school has resisted all efforts to clear it and the school board was told that a new well might be the only solution.

The custodial staff has been pumping the well at Jerico on weekends but to no avail. One of the possible problems is that the casing is leaking and Charles Emery, purchasing agent, told board members that "teachers, parents and students are all upset — they are tired of drinking dirty water."

Filters are being changed five times a month instead of the normal once.

Money

The board was told that there is no money in the budget for a new well but they might well consider adding it.

July 9 Voting

Ravena-Coeymans-Silkirk vote on their budget July 9.

Since the board has determined to eliminate most of the field trips in the central school to permit budget cuts, Dr. Filippone made a special request to the board to support the annual fall trip of the Future Teachers of America club to Cortland State University.

Since school will not be in session there will be no need for a substitute teacher, he told board members, and the board agreed to the trip if the students found their own way home at night from the school. They felt this would save money on the cost of busing.

The school's first year-around exchange student has been an honor student in all academic subjects and the principal recommended that he be granted an honorary RCS diploma and asked to speak at the graduation ceremonies. The board approved the motion.

Rice Gains Nod

Robert H. Rice, the candidate backed by the Bethlehem Republican organization, narrowly defeated Thomas H. Jeram Tuesday in a GOP primary for justice of the peace in the town. The final vote was 1,382-1,255.

Appraising the 127 vote

victory, Rice said that Jeram "did a very good job" in what he described as a "hard-fought campaign."

40 Per Cent Vote

The total vote of 3,637 was about 40 per cent of the enrolled Republicans eligible to go to the polls in what had been billed as a test of the regular GOP organization.

Rice had the backing of the town Republican committee and Albany County Chairman Joseph Frangella, and the closeness of his triumph was a major surprise.

In door-to-door campaign that gained momentum in the final weeks, Jeram hammered away at the charge that Rice was a close associate of a current town justice—Harry B. Rezzemini.

Assertion Made

Jeram asserted that Rice is a law partner of Rezzemini and said that statements by Rice supporters that he would be able to work together with the judge were "exactly what is wrong." He said that a judge should be able to act independently.

Rice countered that he shared offices with the judge but that he was not a partner.

Nevertheless, the issue appeared to have some appeal in the overwhelmingly Republican town. The Republican nomination is considered tantamount to victory in the fall election.

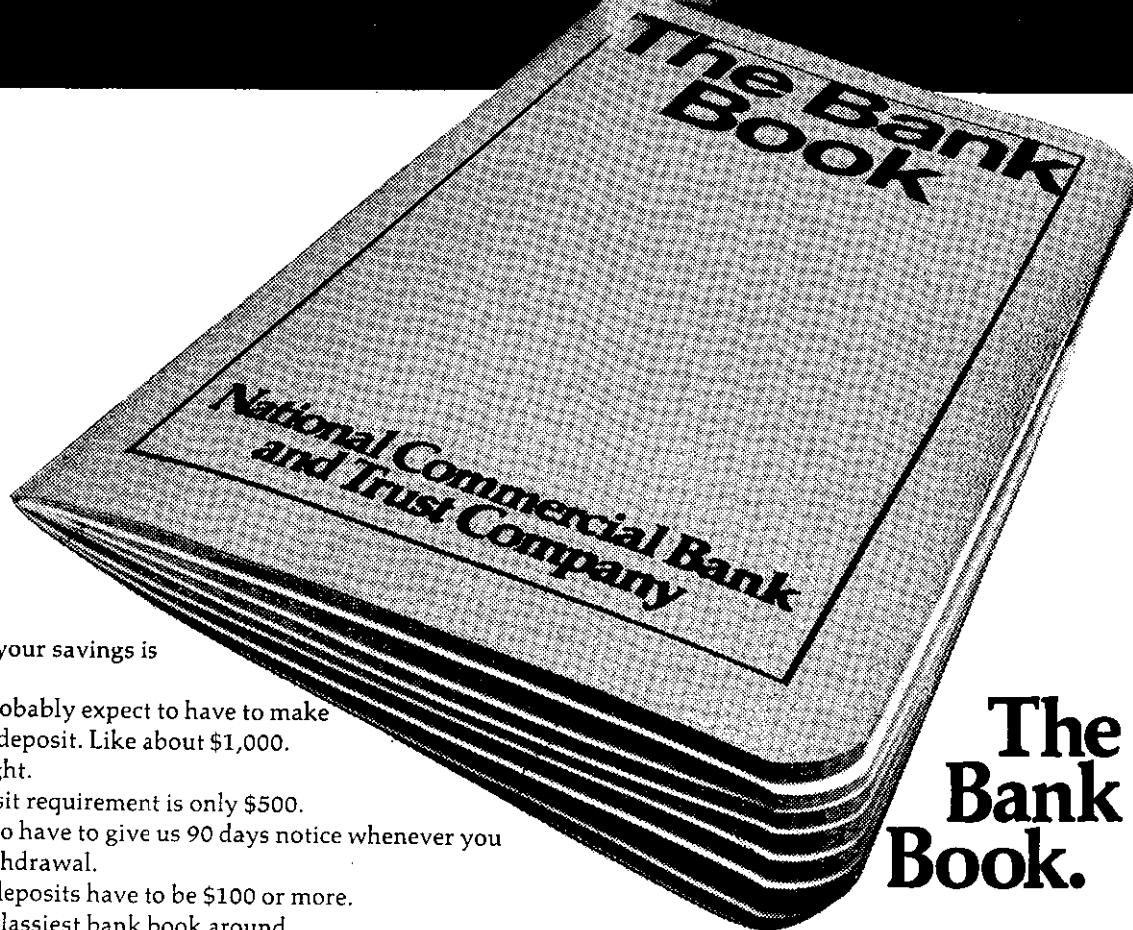

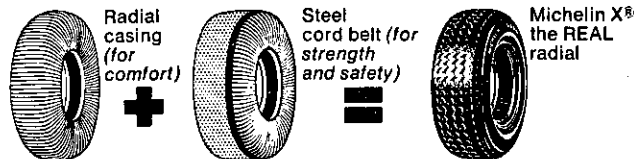
A plumbing contractors' association consisting of 28 member plumbing firms in the Syracuse area allegedly

School Of Art

The Malden Bridge School of Art will open for its fifth season on July 7. Applications for either day students or resident students are now being accepted.

This school, located on the site of a former summer playhouse, just 17 miles southeast of Albany is unique. Students come from all states of the union. They range in age from 17 to 70. They include rank beginners and professional artists there for refresher courses. There are housewives who see art as a hobby. There are commercial artists there to learn the fine arts.

Art Show And Sale

The Old Chatham Improvement Association will sponsor their Second Annual Art Show and Sale in two historic village homes on Sunday, July 6; between 1 and 6 pm. Paintings, sculpture, ceramics, jewelry and photography by professional artists will be on exhibit.

The homes that will be used are: The Samuel Wilbor house now owned by Thomas H. Quinn on the village square, and the Richard Schneider house. The are will be exhibited both inside these homes and on the surrounding grounds.

The Samuel Wilbor house was built around 1775 and known as the "Manor House", having been the center of vast landholdings with a sawmill and gristmill on the waterfall just across the

road. In 1934 this residence was chosen by the U.S. Department of Interior for inclusion in the National Survey of Historic Buildings. Also known as the Ernest Smith house, Mr. Smith's wife was a twelfth generation Wilbor, this stately home was included on the first house tour sponsored by the Old Chatham Improvement Association in 1961.

In 1824 the property on which the Richard Schneider house stands, was purchased by Philip F. Hurlbut from Almon and Harriet Ann Russel. A small shop may have stood on the site. Hurlbut built the present house. A blacksmith, he ran an iron foundry in partnership with Joel Page, opposite the Wilbor house. They manufactured plows.

Later, in the 1880's the house was the home of F.H. Timpson, owner and publisher of "The Excelsior", a weekly newspaper which was printed there. The house was changed in style with the addition of wood trim, to conform to the fashion of the Victorian Era.

Headstart Continues

Bethlehem Central School district, in order to secure state aid for a pre-kindergarten (Headstart) pilot program, has designated the Clarksville area as a "poverty-stricken, culturally-deprived, rural" community, it was disclosed at a

Board of Education meeting June 16 by member John McKenzie of Clarksville.

"This program is worthwhile because the teachers have been able to reach all but one of the disadvantaged or emotionally-disturbed children in the class this year," McKenzie told the board in quoting from a report by Ray Stephany, Clarksville principal.

Dr. Richard Moomaw, BCHS superintendent, said there are some 42 such experimental programs in the state "and we have one of them."

Last year's budget lists state aid as \$23,000. This money provides two teachers (for about 20 children), a social worker, supplies and transportation. State aid has been cut this year to \$16,000 with a resultant increase to the district's contribution. The program is not mandated and therefore was under discussion by the board as a possible budget cut. The board voted to keep it in after McKenzie's report.

Opinion

Dear Sir:

After reading in the Altamont Enterprise the article "Headstart Pilot Program continues at Clarksville", I was shocked! This program was presented to the Tax-Payers 3 years ago by the School Board as a Pre-Kindergarten program.

It is a well-known fact in the community that this program has been used as a convenient baby-sitting service, by some. As to the benefits derived from the program, presumably there have been many.

However, these are hardworking people that provide for their families and to be classed - quote - "A poverty-stricken, culturally-deprived rural community" - unquote, is an insult.

Clarksville is a quiet rural community comprised of State workers Lawyers, Educators, small business men, County workers and many prosperous farmers. Does this sound like a "poverty-stricken, culturally-deprived rural community"? Conservation Training

The 22nd annual 4-H Conservation Leadership Training Program is planned at Cornell University's 4,000-acre Arnot Forest near Van Etten July 6-12.

About 60 4-H boys 14-years old and over are expected to attend, announced Harold Carley, director of the week's program and extension leader at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell. The program is planned to give leadership training in agricultural conservation.

Professors from the college will give instruction in conservation of forestry, wildlife, soils, and water. Campers learn how to use forest tools, identify tree species, and learn how to measure trees and forest areas.

Also, they will learn the soil and water requirements of plants and observe results of experiments on different farm crops.

In wildlife instruction, the 4-Hers will be taught principles and practices of wildlife management and the interrelationships of wild animals with their environment. They learn how and who animal populations fluctuate and importance of wild animal populations to man.

Special instruction is given all campers on hunting manners and safety, water safety, and fire prevention and control. Free time activities include swimming, trap shooting, archery, softball, and horseshoe pitching.

Revised Budget

"Defeat the Budget" was the sentiment expressed over and over again in an informal survey conducted by Parents and Taxpayers (PATS) in the Bethlehem Central School District following the record turn-down of the first \$7,303,512 budget.

A revised budget will be presented to the voters on Wednesday July 9 at the Junior High School. Voters in the district are urged to attend either the next meeting of the Board of Education or the hearing on the budget. The Board meets in the Senior High Cafeteria on Tuesday, July 1. Discussion of the revised budget will be in the Senior High auditorium on Tuesday, July 8. Both meetings at 8 P.M.

Interviews with voters in all sections of the district indicate that budget cuts have not been made in the areas "where the

bug spending is". Most frequently mentioned were administration, Guidance ("we don't need all those psychologists"), small classes, social workers and reading teachers. Reading failures was a very sore point with voters interviewed. "They're not doing something right in elementary" was a frequent comment.

Fear of an austerity budget was not evident. "Everybody else has to do it. What's so different about Bethlehem? And with a contingent budget it will be easier to see where the big spending is," was one voter's response.

If defeated, however, a contingent budget is not the only alternative. The School Board can revise the budget further to comply with voters' demands, or, it can vote to adopt last year's budget which would effect cuts in every area, not just a few.

"Parents and Taxpayers will release the results of the survey with voter recommendations when completed", a spokesman said.

The duties of an assistant field director, Standish explained, involved counseling servicemen and women with personal and family problems, many of which are created or accentuated by separation. After successful experience in the states, assistant field directors are assigned to overseas installations.

"We are interested in finding individuals who enjoy working with people and who are resourceful in finding ways to help them," Standish said. "These jobs," he continued, "are not only good jobs in themselves, with many benefits, but they are also relatively unlimited in the career opportunity they offer in all phases of Red Cross work."

Referring to some of the benefits, Standish mentioned that those selected will participate in a retirement system, Social Security, group insurance, and liberal annual leave program. After a year of satisfactory service, employees may qualify for an educational incentive plan which provides financial assistance to the individual for further professional study and training as a means of advancement.

Indicating that he and other members of the Albany Red Cross chapter staff would like to talk with qualified candidates at any early date, Standish said that interested young people need only call the chapter at 462-7461 for an appointment.

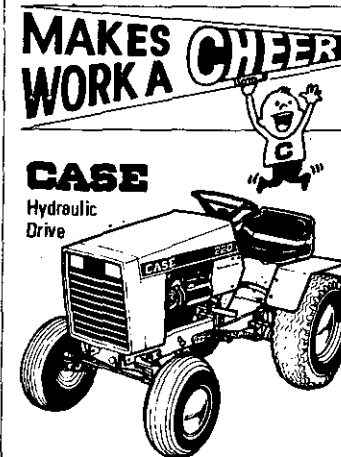

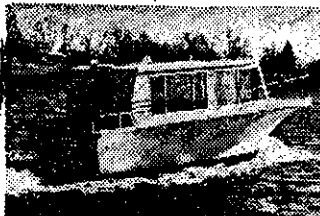

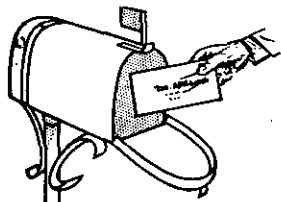
