

# Red Cross Bloodmobile in Delmar Friday

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Delmar at St. Thomas School on Friday, July 18, 1969, from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. This visit of the Bloodmobile, sponsored by the Altar-Rosary Society of St. Thomas Church, will be the fourth to the Town of Bethlehem, since the American National Red Cross has assumed full responsibility for the Blood Program July 1, 1967.

The Albany Area Chapter of the American National Red Cross is scheduling visits of the Bloodmobile throughout the

Northeastern National New York Red Cross Region and residents of the Town of Bethlehem may avail themselves of this opportunity by contacting any of the following committee members:

The Bloodmobile will be staffed by Red Cross registered nurses, trained technicians and aids and a volunteer physician will be present throughout the day. The Altar-Rosary Society will serve cookies and juice to donors and dinner to workers.

The Blood Donor Program is

an all-out effort of the community and in which members of all organizations of the Town are urged to participate. You are eligible to donate blood, if you are between the ages of 18 and 61, weigh more than 110 pounds and are in generally good health. You may not give blood if you have had hepatitis. Donors are asked to eat regular meals before donating blood, but to refrain from excessively fatty foods.

## Area Youngsters Saved Through Blood Program

Blond-haired, blue-eyed and only four years old, the little boy is playing happily this summer, without a care. His open-heart surgery last year was a success.

Another boy his age, a hemophiliac who underwent brain surgery last year, is equally happy and well today. His operation, too, was a success.

The boys, unrelated and in fact unknown by each other, have more than one common bond. Each was saved by the marvels of modern medicine, but there's more to it than that.

Each was the recipient of many pints of blood contributed under emergency conditions by friends, relatives and persons who never knew either boy and never will.

The blood was donated through the Northeastern New York Red Cross Blood Program, which begins its third year of service July 1 to more than one million area residents.

The program, one of 57 throughout the country, relies on voluntary contributions to meet the blood needs of 32 hospitals and 13 counties in Northeastern New York State.

So far, despite the need for many emergency appeals for donors, the program has been "a remarkable success" in meeting the area's need for blood, according to William G. Fraser,

chairman of the program since its start.

Fraser noted, however, that blood usage is continually increasing because of population growth, surgical and medical advances and expanded hospital facilities. It follows, he said, that contributions must also increase.

That little boy with the heart defect and the other boy with the brain damage were just two who benefitted from the blood program, Fraser said.

A nine-day-old girl's life was saved at Albany's St. Peter's Hospital in January when five area residents gave rare blood to replace the infant's defective blood. Her parents had four other children who died because of similar blood ailments. Last year, a patient at St. Clare's Hospital in Schenectady was saved when the blood program searched for, and found, the necessary number of units of a rare blood type, cellano negative. Just two persons in every thousand have that type.

Fraser said such instances as these, and many others which are never brought to the public's attention, support the program's contention that there is a constant need for blood.

"If more people would only stop to realize the need," said Fraser, "I'm sure many more would donate regularly." He added: "We'd be grateful if

those who do contribute encouraged others to give, especially in the summer, when many persons fail to find the time to make donations."

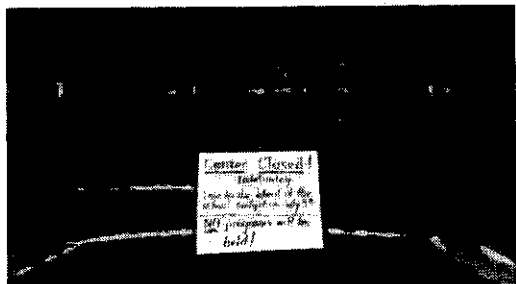
Anyone in good health between the ages of 18 and 66 can give blood, Fraser said. The age limit used to be 61 but was increased because of the

increasing need and because better nutrition and medical care is enabling older persons to remain healthy and vigorous longer than in the past, Fraser said.

Less than an hour is required to give blood, Fraser said, and the procedure is virtually

# Bethlehem Youth Center Recreation Program



**Youth Center Closed**  
 After 16 years of operation, the Bethlehem Youth Center has been closed for an indefinite period of time. Due to the recent defeat of the Bethlehem Central School District Budget,

the Citizens' Advisory Commission reluctantly voted in favor of closing the Center, effective Thursday, July 10th. The supervisors of the Youth Center were paid their salaries during the period of July 1 to

July 9 by the Citizens' Commission that governs the monies collected at the Center through admissions, snack bar operation, juke box and membership cards.

The CAC is hopeful that funds will once again be made available to pay for the supervision of the Youth Center, as soon as possible, either from the Board of Education or the Town Board, so that the doors of the Center may be re-opened.

**Attendance**  
 Attendance at the Playgrounds during the first two weeks of the 1969 program has

increased by more than 500 participations. Although the weather was wet and rainy during the first three days of the summer program, the swim attendance has also increased. The major area of attendance in the swim program has been in the instructional area. As the weather becomes warmer and clearer, the attendance figures should continue to increase, and top previous years totals.

**Tennis**  
 The 7 week summer instructional and community tennis team program has been well received by the participants. Presently morning instruction is being held on the high school courts while the Jr. High Courts are being refinished. The community team has won 2 of 3 matches and has 5 additional matches planned for the balance of the program.

**Performing Arts**  
 This year, under the leadership of Richard Feldman and George Harris, a Summer Performing Arts Program has been scheduled as part of the Recreation Program. Students meet at the Jr. High School, 4 days a week to study all aspects of performances they are scheduled to see. Trips will be taken to the Saratoga Performings Arts Center, Jacob's Pillow, Colonie Summer Theatre and Lake George.

painless. Donors can contribute five times a year, or every eight weeks, and some do just that, Fraser said, noting that the record shows donors who have given as much as 13 gallons of blood without incident.

Carl H. Braley Jr., administrator of the blood program, asserted that one of the most critical services made possible by local blood donors is the production of a clotting agent, cryoprecipitate, which is vitally needed by persons suffering from hemophilia, the "bleeder's disease."

The area served by the program has "a very high incidence" of hemophilia, Braley said. "More than a hundred units of cryoprecipitate are needed each week," he said, "and it requires one donation to produce one unit of cryoprecipitate."

The blood-clotting agent must be extracted from each

pint of blood within eight minutes from the time it is donated, Braley said, and for this reason many emergency appeals have been made during the past two years to provide fresh blood for hemophiliac cases.

Among these, of course, was that four-year-old boy who underwent brain surgery.

There are several hemophilia sufferers in area hospitals at almost all times, Braley said. Because of this, coupled with the usual slump in donations during the summer, each Friday during July has been designated as a day for donors who wish to give specifically for the manufacture of cryoprecipitate.

Donors may visit the Regional Blood Center from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Braley said, to help combat the bleeder's disease.

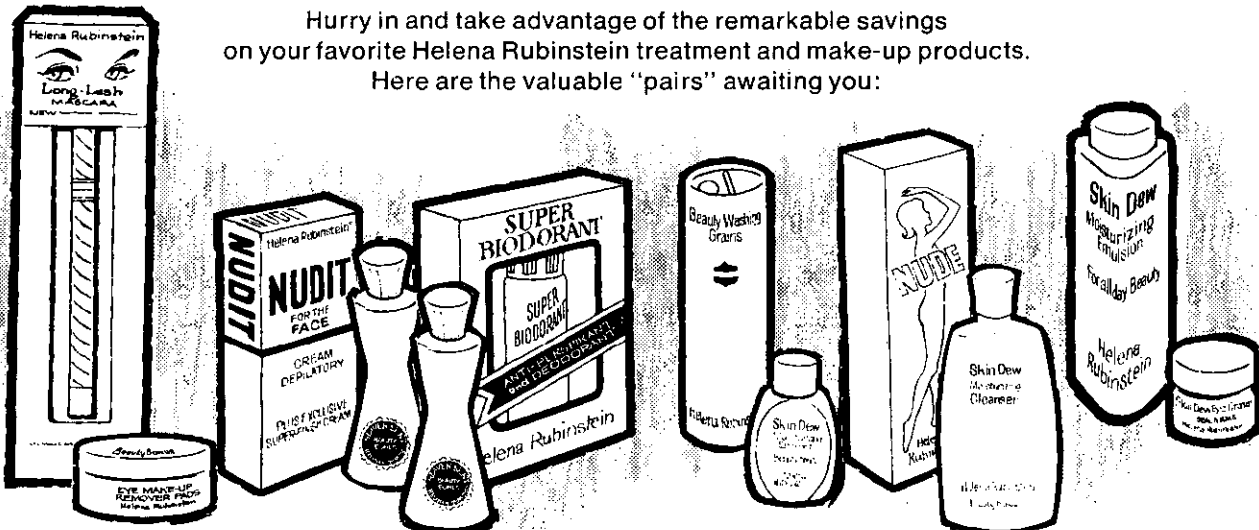
Perhaps those donations will help save the life of another four-year-old boy.

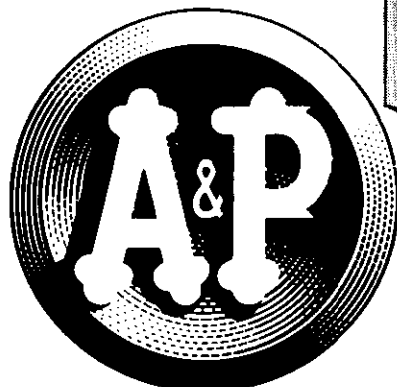

# Bethlehem School Board Member Clarifies Position

I was greatly surprised to read a short article in both the Altamont Enterprise and the Bethlehem Spotlight incorrectly quoting me as stating that the Clarksville area had been designated as a poverty stricken, culturally deprived rural community by the Bethlehem Central School District. This, of

course, is not true: Clarksville is not such an area, nor has it been so designated by the School District, and most emphatically I did not make such a ridiculous statement about my own community.

The article in question was given to the Enterprise and the Spotlight as a news item and

purports to be a factual account of a recent school board meeting wherein I spoke in favor of continuing the Pre-Kindergarten program at the Clarksville Elementary School. In fact, however, the article contains a number of errors and misleading statements.

I spoke in favor of the program, which is funded largely by the State, because I feel it is a good program designed to help children.

I am aware that some parents are reluctant to allow their youngsters to attend school at such an early age and certainly they are the best judge as to whether their children should attend or not. Since it is a voluntary program, parents have the right to enroll their children or not as they see fit. Since two of my own children have had the benefit of attending the program, I know from personal experience that Pre-Kindergarten can be very worthwhile.

The article seems to have been written by someone who feels that the program gives Clarksville a bad reputation. Such an interpretation has no basis that I can see. If anything, the program helps Clarksville kids, and I'm all for that, especially when the cost to local residents is minimal.

As for the article, it appears to be calculated to misinform Clarksville readers and offend their sense of pride in our community apparently so as to foster an anti-pre-kindergarten point of view. Unfortunately, this is done at the expense of children who could benefit from

the program.

I consider this as serving no worthwhile purpose and only adds unnecessary confusion. The program must stand or fall on its own merits and this type of behind the scenes intrigue has no place when we are dealing with the education of our children.

If the writer would care to contact me, I would be happy to listen to that point of view and rethink my position on the Pre-Kindergarten program; but for now I know of no valid reason to be against a good program which can benefit Clarksville Children - and as I see it that's the purpose of my serving on the school board.

Clarksville is a very fine old community with many wonderful people. I strongly resent the use of my name to suggest that I would be in favor of any school decision which would cast Clarksville in an unfavorable light. We are not a "poverty stricken, culturally deprived rural community" but on the contrary we have a rich heritage and tradition of which we all can be proud. Our record of independence and self-reliance goes back over a hundred years to the Anti-Rent Wars when local residents asserted their right to be free and manage their own affairs. We are still just as proudly independent.


Any suggestion that the Village of Clarksville is a depressed area is purely imaginary and downright nonsense.

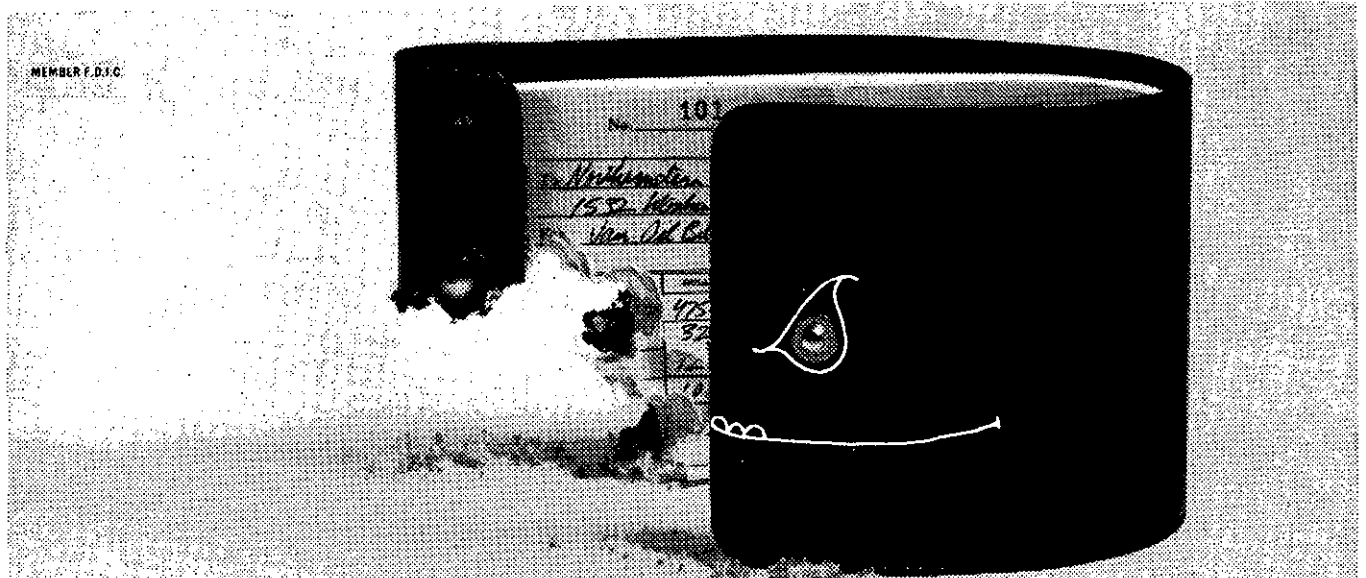

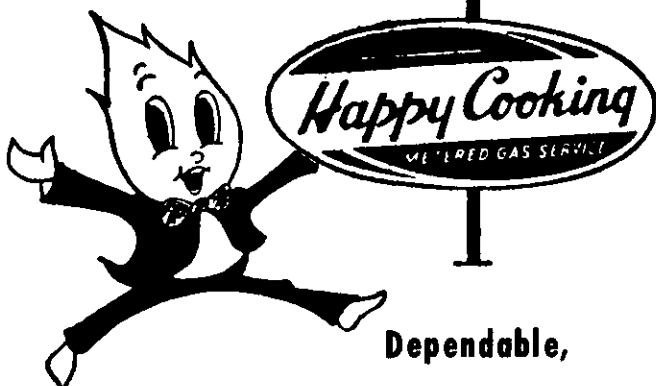



## New Zoning Plan

The Bethlehem Planning Board changed a recommendation for zoning on Delaware Avenue in Delmar that had brought protests at a public hearing earlier this year.

At the request of the Town Board to reconsider the section, presently unzoned, but recommended in January for commercial development, the planning board reviewed the area.

The new suggestion by the board was to zone a smaller section, including a medical building, for commercial use, but to leave the disputed areas between Van Dyke Road, Brockley Drive, and a creek, for residential use.

Present at the meeting was Maurice Groves, a resident of Brockley Drive residential area, who claimed to be one of the principals in opposing the larger commercial designation. He told the planning board that he felt the new recommendations would probably be acceptable to the residents who had signed petitions on the issue.

The new suggestions will go again to the Town Board for consideration.

James Michaels presented the board with plans for a new section of his previous development, Colonial Acres. The land, beside Feura Bush Road, would be a simple subdivision with eight lots and similar in design to the Colonial Acres' early American style homes.

The only objection of the board to the preliminary plans rested upon the size of the radius of the turning circle which, by regulations covering sub-divisions, must be larger.

In a question presented by Jason Minick, who is developing the Meadowbrook apartments, the board ruled that a change in the footage of set-back, of his apartment from the road, was legal.

The reduction from the original accepted plan, with 60 feet of set-back, was changed when a steep bank of land altered the course of a road along the property.

All age groups are taken on regular weekly trips to various neighboring areas such as State




parks for overnight camping. Older boys and girls are also taken to the Saratoga Performing Arts, to the Colonie Theatre and other cultural Centers.

## Concludes Air Force Career

Senior Master Sergeant Eugene J. Sippel, an inventory management superintendent with the Air Force Deputy Inspector General for Inspection and Safety, Norton Air Force Base (AFB), Calif., has scheduled his retirement after 21 year's service. He will be on terminal leave until Aug. 31.

In his position with the Deputy Inspector General, Sergeant Sippel was responsible for equipment and supplies amounting to more than a third of a million dollars. His responsibilities included budget preparation and purchase of supplies and equipment exceeding \$75,000 yearly. He also was a member of a Headquarters USAF inspection team that inspected the Air Force's civil engineering resources management program.

Sergeant Sippel entered the service initially in 1942 from St. Cloud, Wis., and worked in logistics and supply management throughout his military career. Starting with the manual supply accounting system used in World War II, during which he saw action in New Guinea, he has been involved in automation of the Air Force supply system. In his supply management assignments at Chennault, Malstrom, and March AFBs he used the latest computer and data processing systems. At these Strategic Air Command bases and overseas in Okinawa and Italy Sergeant Sippel was responsible for maintaining accounting records and ordering

millions of dollars worth of supplies ranging from paper clips to aircraft and missile components. During a break in service from 1952 to 1956 he attended Milwaukee School of Engineering, Milwaukee, Wis., majoring in electronic technology. Military schooling has included classroom courses in personnel management, on-the-job training, and supply management and an IBM course in computer wiring and operation. From the Air Force Extension Institute he has taken officer candidate and supply officer courses.

Sergeant Sippel has been awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, Army and Air Force Good Conduct Medals, Presidential Unit Citation, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with two battle stars, National Defense Service Medal, Longevity Service Medal, Expert Marksmanship award, and World War II Victory Medal. Other overseas assignments have been in Australia, Philippines, Johnson Island, and Hawaii.

Sergeant Sippel is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin F. Sippel of St. Cloud. On July 6 the elder Sippels' five sons, two daughters, 39 grandchildren, and three great grandchildren will gather in St. Cloud to celebrate their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

After the reunion, Sergeant Sippel and his family will leave for the Albany, N. Y., area to make their home. He is married to the former Margaret M. Sullivan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Sullivan of Delmar, N. Y. They have four children, Robert, 9; Richard, 8; Marianne, 6; and Stephen, 4.

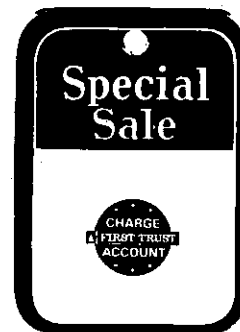

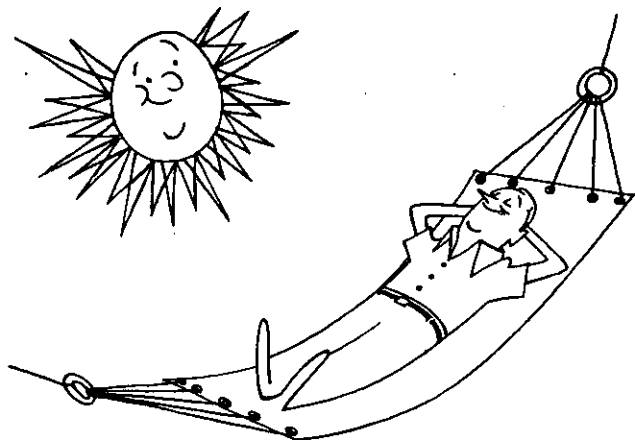

### Research To End Bread Staling

Stale bread, that perennial enemy of the human taste buds, may become a thing of the past if a Cornell University research project is successful.

The one-year study, financed by a \$9,732 grant from the U.S. Army, has implications for homemakers, public and private institutions such as schools and hospitals, and the armed forces, where bread that stays fresh would be more acceptable as a field ration.

Director of the project is Prof. Thomas J. Schoch, of the food and nutrition department at the N.Y. State College of Home Economics, Cornell.

The immediate objective of his research is to develop a bread that will remain fresh for a week or longer.

"With the right combination of ingredients, it's possible that we can produce a bread that will stay fresh indefinitely," Schoch said.

"At present, commercially baked bread shows signs of staling after only two days," he pointed out.

If the project is successful and the findings are adopted by bakeries, the price of bread undoubtedly would rise, but this would be offset by less waste and better taste for the consumer, Schoch noted.

He described the three characteristics of bread staling as: hardening, loss of moistness, and deterioration of flavor and aroma.

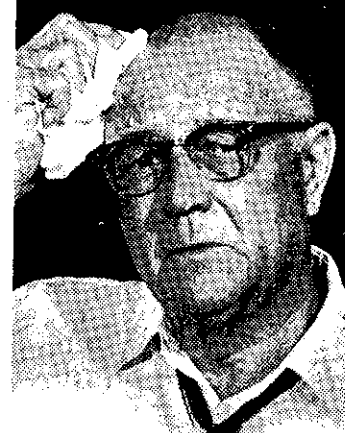
Flour, yeast, sugar, and water are the four main ingredients of bread. "We are primarily concerned with the flour since its starch composition

determines the rate of staling," Schoch said, adding that stale bread is caused by an interlocking of starch molecules.

He and an assistant hope to produce non-staling bread by developing a synthetic flour that contains three major elements -- two types of starch and gluten, a protein that gives bread its spongy structure.

One starch will be chemically modified to resist staling, while the other will provide the bread with the desired soft, elastic texture, according to Schoch.

## Army Retires Military Service Numbers

The United States Army has taken another step toward computerizing the modern soldier. Beginning July 1, the familiar military service number faded into history. Henceforth, members of the active, retired and reserve components of the Army will be identified by their social security account numbers only.

Two groups of newly enlisted or inducted Army personnel from this region share a unique distinction, as a result of this modernization of operations, according to Lt. Colonel Bronislaus Gill, Commanding Officer of the Albany, New York Armed Forces Examining and Entrance Station (AFEES). One group consists of 33 young men, the last individuals to be assigned service numbers when they were sworn into the Army the last week of June at the Albany AFEES.

The first Army service number was issued 51 years ago to an enlisted Man. Master Sergeant Arthur B. Crean received ASN-1 on February 28, 1918. Officers were not issued identification numbers until June 1921, when General Pershing, then Chief of Staff, received number O-1.

Since a social security account number has no prefix or suffix, the soldier's identification number no longer will indicate grade, sex, active or reserve component, or method of entry.

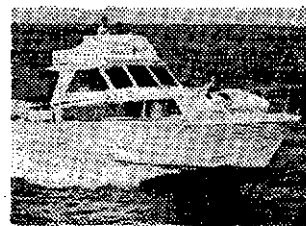
