## Police Pension Plan Approved

Beginning July 1, Bethlehem police will be covered with the same "guaranteed" career retirement plan other Bethlehem town employes now enjoy.

The Bethlehem Town Board some time ago voted increased pension benefits for town employes, but did not know that separate Board action was needed to include policemen, explained Supervisor Bertram Kohinke.

Last night, the board unanimously approved the police pension plan that will provide a policeman with half-pay at age 55 if he has served 25 years with the department, in accordance with its regulations.

Patrolman Leo E. Dorsey, a juvenile officer with the Bethlehem Police Department, was praised before the Town Board by Supervisor Kohinke for his recent appointment to

the Albany County Youth Bureau and his work with youngsters.

The board appointed Ralph Warne to the summer playground staff as a supervisor in soccer and basketball. Special Patrolmen Charles LaRose and Frank Morrison will guard the children's crossings at Elsmere and Delmar Schools from 8:30 a.m. until noon, Monday through Friday during summer playground hours, with board approval.

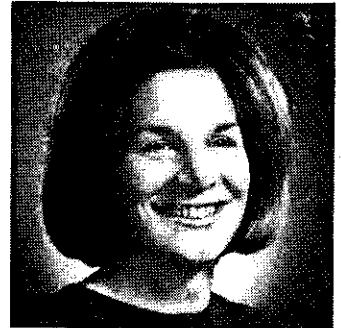
Without question, the greatest need for people in

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## Delmar Man on Board

D. David Brandon of Delmar was appointed to the state local government advisory board by Governor Rockefeller today.

The governor also announced the reappointment of Joseph H. Murphy, former state tax commissioner, to the advisory board.

Both positions are unsalaried and are subject to senate confirmation.

Brandon, director of the Office of Planning Coordination, succeeds Charles T. Lanigan, who resigned when he became Republican State Chairman. Brandon's term expires March 31, 1971.

Murphy recently resigned the tax post, but has agreed to serve an additional term with the

advisory board. The term ends March 31, 1972.

## Bethlehem to Offer Cultural Course

Bethlehem has introduced a new activity to its summer recreation program - the performing arts.

Town Recreation Director William Fuller announced the six-week program will involve the study of music, ballet, opera and drama, and will include field trips to area summer theaters, in addition to the Lake George Opera and the Jacob's Pillow dance festival.

Mr. Fuller indicated that registration will be limited to 40 Bethlehem youngsters, 11 through 16 years. A \$30 fee will be required at registration to cover field trip transportation and purchase of tickets. Students may register with Mr. Fuller at the junior high school or by calling 439-4984.

Teaching the course will be Richard Feldman, Bethlehem Junior High English teacher, and George Harris, who teaches in the Ravene-Coeymans-Selkirk School District.

Mr. Feldman has directed and choreographed musicals at Albany Civic Theater, summer stock in Maine, plus musicals at Bethlehem Senior High.

The course is designed to teach pupils the technique and terminology of the arts, plus the steps preceding a performance, explained Mr. Fuller. "They will be doing actual voice and dance warm-up exercises and they will study the music that will be performed at the performances they are going to attend," he said.

In addition, pupils will be instructed in basic acting techniques and will learn to analyze orchestral backgrounds, composer, inspirations, choreographers' interpretations of music and their transitions to dance and other art forms, Mr. Fuller noted.

The sessions will be held daily, Monday through Friday, beginning July 7 and continuing until Aug. 15.

All classes will be from 10 a.m., until about noon, except on field trip days, Mr. Feldman said. Trips will involve student matinees between 1 and 6 p.m., and include six events at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. Tentative plans call for visits to the Stockbridge and Colonie Summer Theaters.

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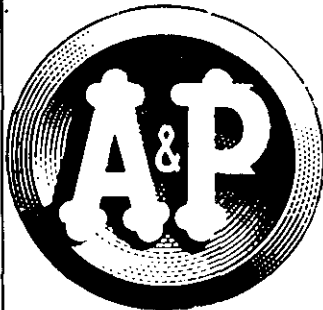

## Third Vote Slated by Bethlehem Board

The Bethlehem Board of Education will try again.

After much indecision, the board decided at 12:30 a.m. July 11, to present a revised district budget to Bethlehem voters, tentatively during the week of July 28.

The move came as an emergency board meeting that seemed like a marathon session to participants and onlookers last night in the superintendent's office at the senior high school.

By a 3 to 2 vote, the board decided to develop a modified school budget for 1969-70, close to a contingency budget, and place it before the public with the options to be voted on separately; transportation, athletics, recreation, operating expenses for use of school property, audit education, and cafeteria.

To be included in the new budget will be provisions for equipment, library books, textbooks, supplies and materials for pupils for classroom work.

Neither administrators or board members could determine immediately what the new modified budget total might be. This determination be the immediate project of school officials and department heads, it was indicated, with the results announced sometime early next week.

If the new modified budget is defeated at the polls, which would make the third time voters had rejected a fiscal plan, (or austerity budget) would be mandatory.

The school district actually has been operating on a contingency budget since July 1, Superintendent Richard Moomaw pointed out.

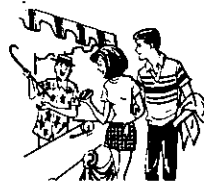

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

## Solid Accomplishment Cited In Report On R C S Schools

Within the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School district, the 1968-69 school year "has been one of solid accomplishment," according to Prescott D. Archibald, Board of Education President.

Today R C S district voters will determine if the new school year will be as progressive, for much depends on adoption of the proposed 1969-70 fiscal school budget totaling

\$3,772,250.88. "Your board has worked hard on this budget," Mr. Archibald told 42 persons who attended the annual school district meeting. He emphasized the board's belief that they have reduced it to an acceptable level.

### Cite's Harmony

The board president noted with pride that during recent teacher salary negotiations, R C S was one of the few districts which did not need the services of an outside mediator.

Mr. Archibald said that one of the results of the amicable teacher-board negotiations is that R C S will remain on a par next term with any school district in the area. He warned, however, that the district must stretch funds despite increased pupil enrollment and that continued cuts in the state aid to education may eventually total 25 per cent.

In view of such belt-tightening, Mr. Archibald urged residents to make the Legislature aware of how such cuts in state funds are affecting, and will continue to affect, the quality of local education.

In his annual report, the board president said temporary classrooms at Pieter B. Coeymans School would be used another year; that despite an expected 23 per cent increase in pupil enrollment, no additional

teachers had to be added, thanks to team teaching.

### Team Teaching

Team teaching is a concept whereby about 120 pupils are grouped into four sections, each averaging 25 youngsters. Four teachers, representing the math, English, science and social studies fields, rotate from group to group.

Team teaching will be expanded to include both seventh and eighth grades this fall, and the method will be evaluated this year to determine if it should be used in the new junior high school, the board official noted.


In other changes cited by Mr. Archibald: vocational education pupils will attend classes in the morning instead of afternoon; the remedial reading program is being expanded; mid-year exams were eliminated this year to ease pressure on pupils; the Honor Society will continue its tutoring program.

These Shaker students, many of whom do not participate in athletics, will be ringing door-bells and asking voters in the BCHS district for their support in making sure athletics is assured at their school in 1969-70.

Another meeting is scheduled at Bethlehem.

"An experimental program of pre-kindergarten education for children in disadvantaged areas was begun in 1966. The purpose was to enable Boards of

Education and the State Education Department to develop quality programs and to study the effectiveness and the problems with educating the young children (3-4) in the public school which are traditionally directed toward educating older children (5-6). 48 school districts are conducting experimental pre-kindergartens for a total of 15,000 children to the tune of \$5,631,441.00 (allegated for 68-69) and \$8,000,000.00 (recommended for 69-70)!

Now, I for one do not quibble over helping underprivileged children, I am also aware of programs for these purposes namely Welfare, Aid to Dependant Children, Day Care Centers, Project ABLE (for culturally deprived children) which are all fine and dandy. However, pre-kindergarten is

## IRS News

Employers have an important tax deadline on July 31, 1969, according to Donald T. Hartley, District Director of Internal Revenue Service for Northeastern New York State.

This is the last day for reporting and paying both social security and withheld income taxes for the quarter ending June 30, 1969.

Employers should report these taxes on the IRS preaddressed Form 941 mailed them. They have until August 11, 1969 to file their return provided their quarterly tax liability has been fully and timely deposited in a Federal Reserve or authorized commercial bank.

If the balance due with the return is more than \$100, it should be deposited in a Federal Reserve Bank or authorized commercial banks, using Form 501. Lesser amounts can be sent with the return.

The completed Form 941 should be mailed to Internal Revenue Service, 310 Lowell Street, Andover, Massachusetts, 01812.



## Parent -Teen Skirmish

Our society can not afford to let the skirmishes that result from the so-called generation gap develop into an "out-out war."

This was one speaker's comment to about 900 youths attending the N.Y. State 4-H Congress at Cornell University, June 25-27.

"The generation gap must be bridged. Society today needs both the idealism of youth and

the experience of age," said Mrs. Eleanor D. Macklin, lecturer and research associate in the department of child development and family relationships at the N.Y. State College of Human Ecology, Cornell.

She urged her audience to demand the opportunity for more meaningful participation in the affairs that directly affect them.

Efforts must be made to improve communication between the generations. Parent and teen-agers must learn to treat each other with mutual respect, to listen to others more closely, and to explain themselves more clearly, she said.

She feels that the generation gap may not be as pronounced as teen-agers and their parents think. For instance, research shows that the political, religious, and social values of youths and their parents are usually quite similar.

Much of the conflict between the two generations arises from the superficial problems of daily living, according to Mrs. Macklin, who believes that some conflict between teen-agers and their parents is inevitable and to some degree desirable.

Until he reaches adolescence a child tends to idolize his parents, but as he enters the teen-age years it becomes necessary to cut many of the apron strings. "At this age, he must cease to idolize his parents so that he can dare to relinquish them," Mrs. Macklin said.

It is important to realize how difficult this "emancipation"

period is for all concerned—particularly for parents, the 4-H'ers were told.

One reason many think the generation gap is wider than it is is because both parents and their children tend to emphasize what displeases them, and say little about what pleases them, Mrs. Macklin declared.

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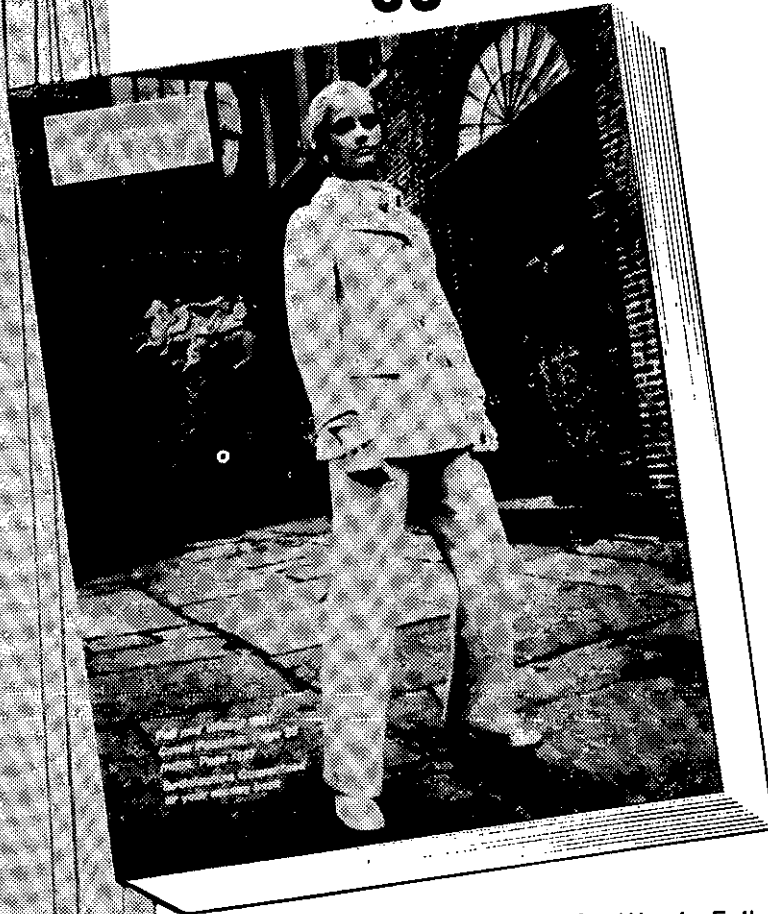

## Fire Prevention Stressed by AWB

President Nixon is signing a proclamation designating July 20-26 as Farm Safety Week, noted that although American agriculture has made great strides in production it nevertheless remains the nation's third most hazardous industry.

Mr. Nixon stated that "the

strong hands and management skills of our farm people have dramatically increased farm production to the point where a third as many farmers are feeding twice as many American families."

While their accomplishments have increased production, observed Mr. Nixon, "our farm people have suffered a tragic toll of accidents." He urged all farms families to help make their farms and communities safer.

Each year, says William E. Borst, manager of the Adequate Wiring Bureau of Eastern New York, farm fires alone result in the loss of 500 lives and \$200 million in property damage. He particularly stresses prevention of farm fires since fire damage to farms and rural property is three to six times greater than the average city fire.

Mr. Borst urges all farm families to support National Farm Safety Week by checking their farm wiring systems to make certain they are adequate and in proper working condition. "Make certain that both house and farm building wiring systems are large enough to cope with the great electrical demands placed on them. Look for possible hazards. Don't use fuses that are too large. And, of course, don't overload circuits."

Today's mechanized farms are using more and more electricity to do their work faster and more efficiently. Having adequate wiring, therefore, is a necessity. Many farms are still using outmoded wiring systems that should be up-dated to ensure proper performance from electrical equipment and eliminate the potential hazard of fire. Mr. Borst reminds farmers that FREE wiring inspections are still available through Adequate Wiring Bureau member electrical contractors. AWB member banks are happy to finance any required wiring with convenient monthly payment loans.

"Look for hazards" is the theme of the 1969 National Farm Safety Week program. "To avoid accidents," says Borst, "use a little foresight and planning. Safety is a year around job."





## Albany United Fund Officers Named

I promise to do my best to carry on the organizations important community role."

Several major accomplishments were scored by the United Fund during Peters' tenure, the most recent being the reorganization of the Community Chest into a United Fund. The United Fund support of summer programs and the community's Urban Affairs program has come about within the last two years. The Camp Opportunities program was also a recent United Fund supported program.

Peters was the second general chairman of the community's Joint Appeal fund campaign in 1963. He indicated that he expects to remain deeply involved in the affairs of the new United Fund for some time to come.

## Shoplifting is A Crime

The booklet is designed to warn young people of the serious consequences resulting from a crime which is too often looked upon and carried out as a prank.

## State Bank of Albany Report

State Bank of Albany reports Net Operating Earnings of \$4,773,921 or \$2.02 a share for the first six months of 1969, a 21 per cent increase over \$3,931,229 or \$1.66 a share reported for the same period a year ago.

Deposits were \$635,851,371 on June 30, 1969, compared with \$669,440,487 on the same

date last year. Total resources this year were \$726,283,732 compared with \$746,719,702 on June 30, 1968.

Capital funds as of June 30, 1969, totalled \$65,188,715, up from \$59,263,382 one year before.

This announcement was made by Hollis E. Harrington, President.

## Third Budget Vote Set

On July 31, Bethlehem residents will go to the polls for the third time to vote on a 1969-70 school budget.

The budget has again been revised by the Board of Education, in an effort to further lower the tax rate increase. In the new budget, the amount to be raised by local taxation has been reduced by \$179,310; which lowers the tax rate increase to \$4.45 per thousand assessed value in Bethlehem and \$6.74 in New Scotland.

At the end of a five hour

meeting last week, Board President Lindsay Boutelle said that the tax reduction had not been achieved without cutting into the educational program. All new teachers for next year have been eliminated, which means that classes will be larger and some courses must be dropped. The extra guidance counselor, planned to provide full counseling service to students in the Middle School, has also been dropped. The Pre-Kindergarten class in Clarksville will be eliminated, as will summer Music courses.

A number of services provided for the community also had to be eliminated in order to lower the budget. All adult education classes, except those for Senior Citizens and the Safe Driver class, have been dropped. The cost of the recreation program has been cut by 1/2, and school support will therefore terminate as of January 1, 1970. Steps have also been taken to make use of school buildings by community groups self supporting. A fee will be charged for utilities and custodial fees.

Copies of the new budget are now being prepared for mailing to all voters, and open meeting will again be held the night before the election at 7:30 P.M. on Wednesday, July 30. Superintendent, Richard Moomow, urges all residents to attend this meeting in order to get the facts about the budget and schools programs for next year.

Dr. Moomow also indicated that his office will be open to answer any questions by residents between now and the election on July 31.

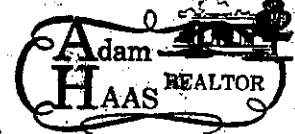

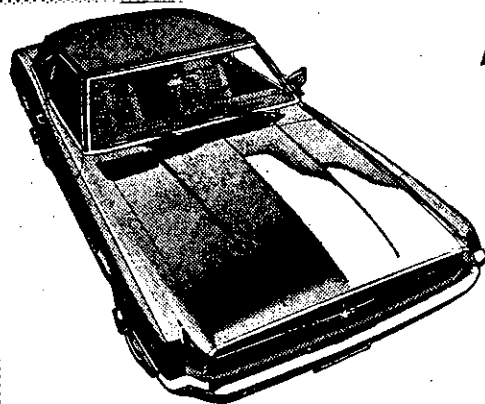

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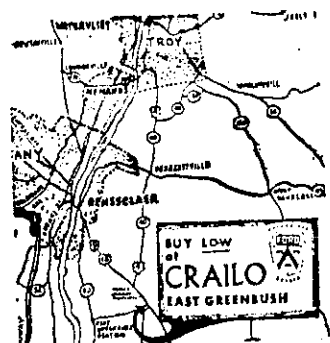
