

# THE PERISCOPE

When the Capital Cities Newspapers move into their new multi-million-dollar plant near Exit 3 on the Northway, one of the things we can expect is to have our evening paper delivered earlier.

Just in the last few years the delivery time has been moved up from mid-afternoon to 11:15 A.M. and it wasn't so many years ago we didn't get the paper until 5 P.M. That was in the days when the local evening paper, whose name I can't recall at the moment (the one they delivered in Delmar before the Schenectady Union Star), used to delay its news deadline until early afternoon.

The potential of getting our afternoon paper (the word evening paper has been rendered archaic by television) two or three hours earlier is exciting indeed. Think of how wonderful it would be to have tonight's news at breakfast this morning, or, if it didn't quite make breakfast, at least you could take it to work and read it during the first coffee break.

Getting the paper read early in the day frees up the cocktail hour for conversation, and in some houses, enables followers of Ann Landers, Mark Trail and Charlie Mooney to get the dishes washed earlier and thus get to the TV (or even a committee meeting) earlier and without rush.

This glowing prospect, however, isn't all gravy. There is the complication, for instance, of the morning paper. The morning paper, which through the years has always been delivered in the pre-dawn hours to greet the rising subscriber, would now have to rearrange its deadlines and schedules to reach the subscriber before bedtime instead of in the wee hours.

But if the Union-Knickerbocker-Star can slice five or six hours off its deadlines in the heart of the day, The Times Union ought to be able to cut back its deadline from say, midnight to 6 P.M. in order to accommodate the readers.

Perhaps you think all this is unimportant in the scale of things but Jean and I place considerable emphasis on public communica-

tion and keeping abreast of current events and commentary. This has become increasingly difficult since the Knick News has ceased to cover the Tri-Village area and has substituted pages and pages of Schenectady, Glenville and Schoharie news.

We talked to a former newspaperman the other night, and he said it was less than 10 years ago that the Knick's home edition went to press at 2 P.M., which made it a bona-fide afternoon paper. The present deadline is 9 A.M., so it's hard to know what kind of a publication it is — a weekly review published daily, perhaps.

The trend is, of course, toward less "spot news" coverage and more features. Newspapermen used to compete aggressively and proudly against radio and TV news, saying, "You can never replace the printed work." But now they have surrendered quietly and completely by making up the "afternoon" paper the day before, holding open Page One until 9 A.M., and giving subscribers at supertime a printed summary of the preceding night's 11 P.M. news.

I wish I'd never stayed home that day with a touch of the prevailing virus. I haven't felt the same since I discovered the Knick-Star got to our house before the mailman in the morning. I guess we'll stick to the weeklies from now on.

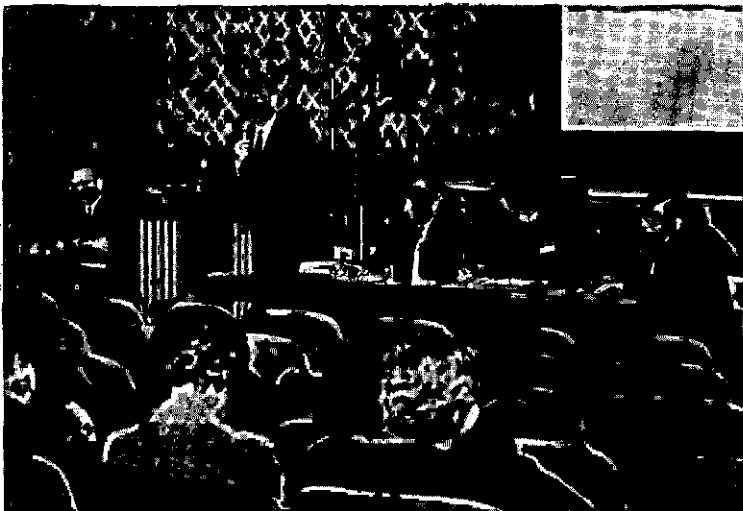

## Shopping Center

"Southgate" will be the name of a sizable multimillion-dollar shopping center to be developed on a 114-acre tract at the Delmar Bypass and Route 9W by Fort Orange Realty which is buying the land from Norman's Kill Farm Dairy Co.

An 80,000 square-foot Jamesway Department Store will be the prime tenant in the 200,000 plus square foot inverted mall

shopping center in the Town of Bethlehem where town officials have already received the application for rezoning to light industrial.

The Center will have a 600-seat Hellman Theater, a 25,000-square-foot supermarket, a 9,000 square-foot National Auto store, a Schatz Stationery Store, a 3,000-square-foot drug store, a Gregg's Hair Stylist shop and sauna, a liquor store, dry cleaner and laundromat, paint store, drive-up bank, candy store; and beauty store with Samuel Frangella as proprietor.

Jason Minik, president of Fort Orange Realty, is negotiating with Friendly Ice Cream Co. and several specialty firms.

The shopping center will be the first phase of development on the huge tract. Nearby will be a 150-unit motel and convention hall operated by a national concern. A catering mall and a service station will also be on the shopping center site.

In other sectors of the property, plans call for multiple housing, research and development buildings and warehousing.

"We shall be ready to open in time for the 1970 back-to-school season," Herbert Fisher, chairman and president of Jamesway Corp., said.

Leonard L. Canter, senior vice president, said the design of the store would follow somewhat the new concept as its Greenville, Ohio, store, adding "but this one will be updated even more."

Monroe J. Simon, vice president of store operations, said the company has 15 stores plus two under construction.

Among the Jamesway stores in Capitaland are facilities in Saratoga Springs, Hudson and Catskill.

The Jamesway store in Southgate, Seymour Heiss, vice president of merchandising, said, will feature a full line of men's, women's and children's apparel as well as a complete hardware department.

The 100 employees with the exception of the manager, will be hired locally, James officials said.

The other Jamesway officers

include Jerry Jay, vice president in charge of advertising; Arlie Lazarus, vice president and controller; and Andrew Loconti, vice president of real estate.

Jamesway headquartered in New York City, last year reported sales of \$29,881,558. The company's stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange.

The Southgate property has about a 2,700-foot frontage on Route 9-W. The long-vacant Norman's Kill Farm Dairy buildings are not earmarked for demolition. Instead, they will be redesigned to become a furniture store, pottery shop and other retail stores.

Robert Tennenbaum of the Richard P. Browne Associates engineering, planning and architectural firm in Columbia, Md., carried out the site planning for Southgate. It was Tennenbaum

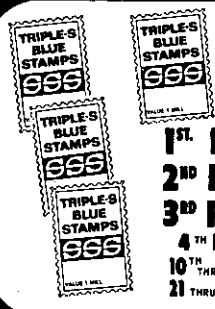

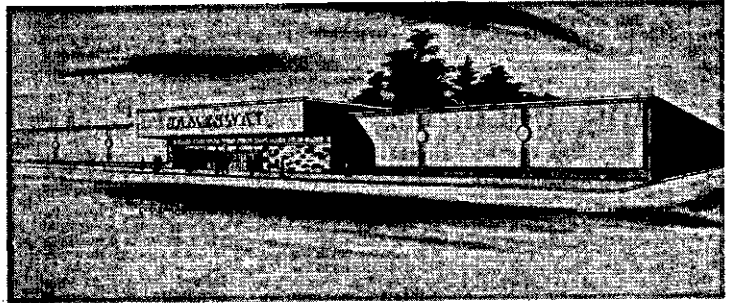

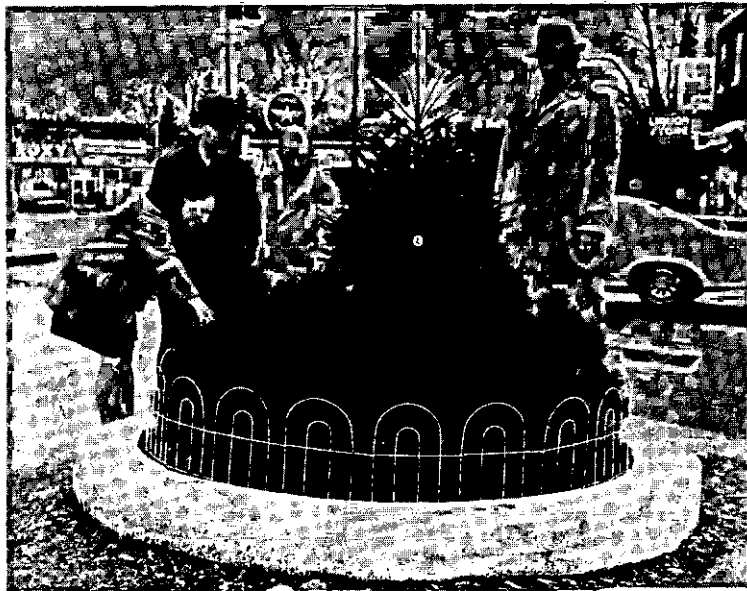
All Grades - Kiwanis Club Career Conference

**Seniors - College Applications**

If you plan on attending college in September 1970, you should now be in the process of applying.

As a rule of thumb, we recommend that you apply to three colleges, but your personal situation may make it wise for you to deviate from this general policy. At any rate, be sure to consult your counselor to take advantage of his specialized knowledge in the area of college admissions.

**Nursing Student Loan Program**

You are eligible to apply for a Nursing Student Loan when you have been accepted for enrollment into a school of nursing as a full-time student pursuing a course of study leading to a bachelors degree, an associate degree or diploma in nursing.

In determining the amount you may borrow, the school of nursing will take into account the degree of your financial need and the availability of money in the school's fund, financial need by the Federal Government. However, the maximum amount which you may borrow for an academic year is \$1,000.

Loans are repayable to the school at 3% interest over a ten year period which begins one year after you have completed your course of study.

In addition, up to 50% of your loan - plus interest - may be

anceled for full-time employment as a professional nurse in any public or non-profit private institution or agency. The rate of cancellation of your loan obligation is 10% of the total amount of the loan - plus interest - for each year up through five years that you are employed in this capacity.

Obligation to repay the loan will be cancelled in the event of death or permanent disability of the borrower.

Further information and loan application forms are available from schools of nursing throughout the United States.

**Senior Girls - Union College Marian Osgood Fox Scholarships**

Scholarships worth as much as \$3,500 each, depending upon the financial need of the recipients, are being offered to daughters of Union College alumni who enter the first coeducational class in September, 1970.

Three additional Fox Honor Scholarships of \$100 each will be awarded, regardless of need, to the outstanding alumni daughters in the Class of 1974.

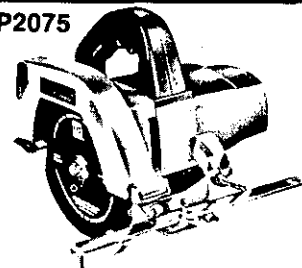

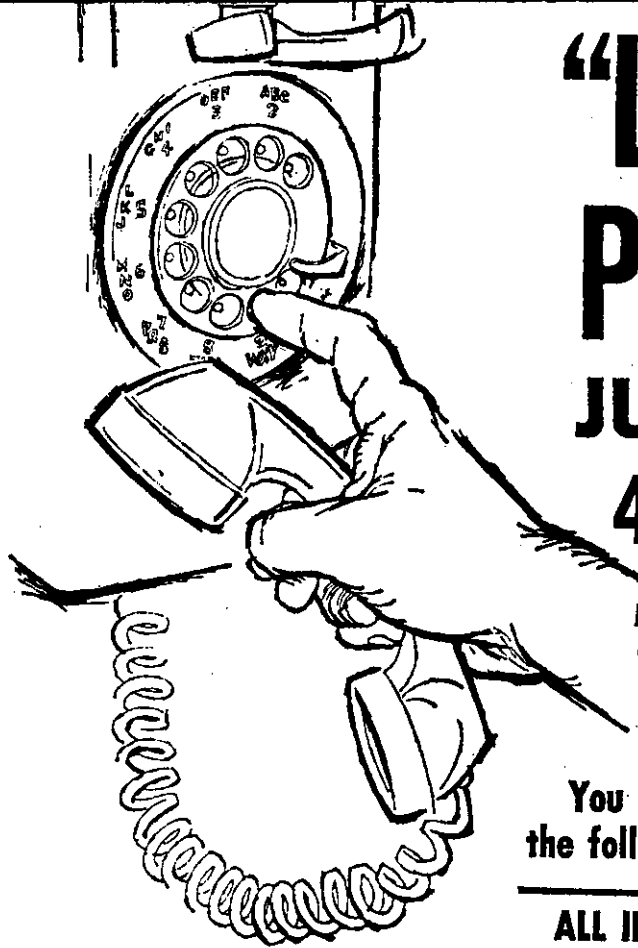

is first necessary to know the facts about this disease. Horticultural experts from Cooperative Extension have listed these basic facts about the Dutch Elm disease.

1. It is a fungus infection, fatal to elm trees, and there is no known cure once a tree has become infected.

2. Healthy trees get the disease when fed upon by elm bark beetles which have hatched out of infected elm wood nearby.

3. Once established, the disease will build up in a community, and can destroy all or most of the elms in the area.

4. The suppression of elm bark beetle populations by removing and destroying all recently dead

or badly weakened elm wood is the main preventive control for this disease.

5. Spraying as an addition to sanitation can help control the spread of the bark beetles. However, spraying alone can not control this disease.

Until science can find a cure the only control for this disease is to control the beetle that spreads it. To date, the best way to do this is remove and destroy all dead, dying, unhealthy elm wood. This wood must be destroyed before early April, when the beetles leave the infected trees and go to nearby trees.

This means that diseased trees must be removed and destroyed as soon as possible. Methods of destroying the wood and the beetle include burning the entire wood or removing and burning the bark and burying the wood at least a foot below the soil surface. If this wood will be used for fuel, remove and burn the bark first.


To really control the elm bark beetle, and the Dutch Elm disease, community action is re-

quired. It does little good for one person to try to control this disease if his neighbor does not. ## Cold Corn

Cornell University plant breeders are making an all-out attempt to breed a new family of "super"

corn that can withstand crop-killing frosts in early spring and fall.

In discussing progress made so far, Prof. Clarence O. Grogan and Melvin V. Splitter, graduate student, both at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell, revealed that several corn lines carrying different types of resistance to cold have been discovered.

The Cornell researchers tested nearly 500 lines for their ability to germinate at abnormally low temperatures, seedling growth rate, and resistance to frost conditions at a later stage of growth.

Some lines germinated well despite cold temperatures (below 50 degrees F.), while others did not germinate well but grew well when they were in the seedling stage at temperatures between 55 to 60 degrees.

Still other types, when they grew to the five-to-six leaf stage, or about six inches tall, showed no adverse effects even when the young plants were kept in a cold chamber for 24 hours at sub-freezing temperatures (32 to 28 degrees).

Although each of these promising types has some resistance to cold at one or another stage of growth, none carries tolerance to all cold conditions during the three different stages of growth, Splitter reported.

The challenge ahead, he said, is to put all these factors responsible for cold resistance into one "package" and come up with a variety that will do well at low temperatures in all three stages of growth.

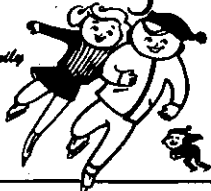

Plant scientists have made many germination studies at low temperatures, but Cornell's work is unique because the researchers are tackling all the factors associated with cold tolerance during the various growth stages.

Such a variety, if developed, said Grogan, could be planted as early as March or early April, so farmers could make their spring plantings earlier than they now do. Varieties now used in upstate New York normally do best when planted in May.

More importantly, many parts of the world, including Canada, Russia, and Asia, and many areas with high elevation around the globe could be put into corn production, the Cornell plant breeder said.
