The Alumni Reunion of the Bethlehem Community Ambassador Project held Nov. 15 in the Delmar Reformed Church, was a delightful occasion. Some eighty-five alumni of the organization, two from as far away as Toronto, gathered in a room beautifully decorated by Mrs. Frank Lane and her committee, who used artifacts from many countries to set an international theme. The buffet dinner, to which each attending family contributed a delicious foreign dish, was followed by a very interesting talk by Dr. John A. Wallace, Executive Vice-president of The Experiment in International Living, on the subject of the broadening interests and some of the problems of The Experiment. Dr. Wallace then presented, on behalf of The Experiment, a plaque honoring the local organization for its work in bringing to Bethlehem six Incoming Ambassadors. This plaque, according to Mrs. Barbara Rau, will be displayed in a prominent place in the Delmar Public Library for all to enjoy. General Chairman and Coordinator for this outstanding evening, was Mrs. John Cunningham, former Bethlehem Community Am-

bassador to Turkey.

The project in Bethlehem sent out its first Community Ambassador in 1955. By 1969, fourteen Ambassadors had been sent to as many different countries in Europe, South America, Africa, and the Orient. Six Ambassadors and ninety-two members of eleven groups had come to the area, involving as hosts alone sixty-nine families, many serving in that capacity several times. Innumerable other community residents have been involved in planning, transporting and entertaining these delightful visitors. By means of this program alone, Bethlehem has had some contact with people from every continent except Australia.

Soon plans will be formulated for receiving a group of Experimenters and an Incoming Ambassador in the spring and summer of 1971. It is hoped that by the continuation of this program, many more residents of Bethlehem will be able to experience the pleasure of sharing their homes with visitors of other countries and cultures. To quote The Experiment, "People learn to live together by living together."

Seniors - Glenmont Parent-Teachers Association Scholarship Grant

The Glenmont Parent-Teachers Association announces its annual competition for a scholarship award of \$500 to a Bethlehem Central High School senior who completed grades five and six, in the Glenmont Elementary School.

Applicants for this award must have been accepted for admission, or have applied, to an educational institution which grants as a minimum a two year Associate Degree. 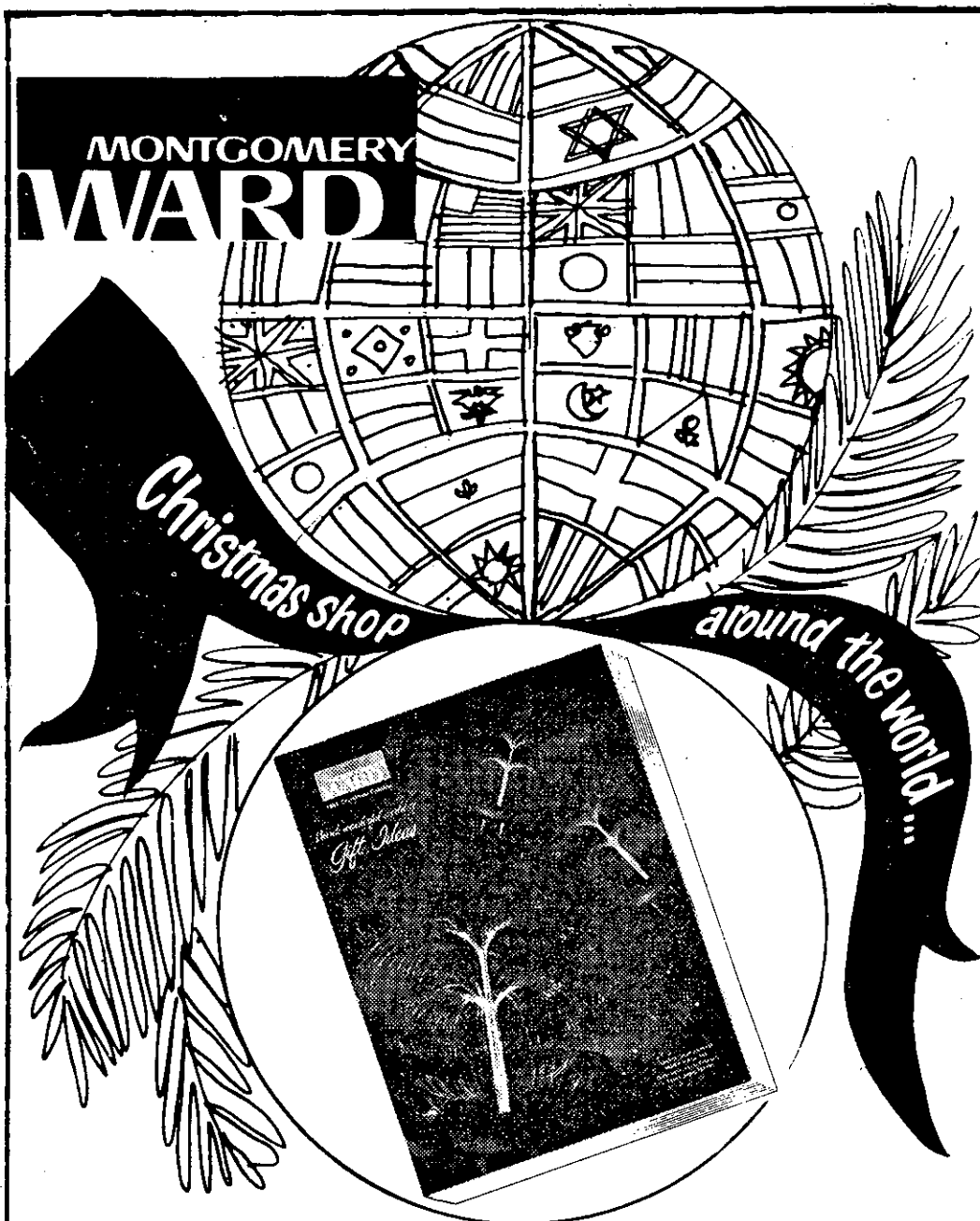

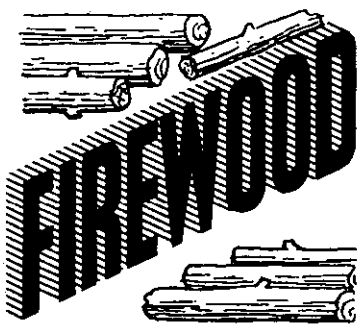
Gift Shop Day

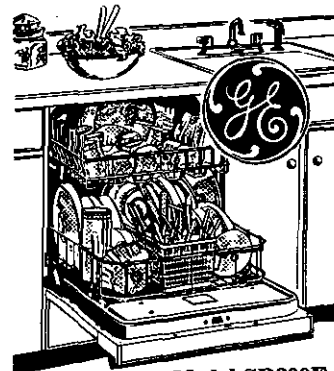

Local Art Show

The major art event of the area began this week with the official opening of the Bethlehem Art Association Third Annual Juried Art Show. The collection can be seen at the First Trust Company Bank in Elsmere during banking hours. The B.A.A. members submitted 90 works of

which approximately 30 were accepted. This number was dictated by the space available for the exhibition. The selection was made by Thom O'Connor and Ruth Funk (see photograph) who have been achieved prominence in their field and are well

known in the area. Mr. O'Connor took his B.A. at Florida State and his MFA at Cranbrook Academy of Art. He received several grants and fellowships during visits to different university art departments and his work is represented in more than thirty

different collections in this country and Europe. It has been included in major national museums, ranging from the Museum of Modern Art in New York to the Rijksakademie in Amsterdam. He is presently associate professor of art at SUNY where he has been since 1962.

Ruth Funk was born and educated in Texas. She received her B.S. and M.A. from Texas Women's University and became a registered occupational therapist. She has travelled and studied in Europe and studies painting under Hans Hofmann. She taught art in both New York State and Texas and exhibited in both areas. Mrs. Funk was one of three organizers of the 327 Gallery, and at present is engaged in coordinating art exhibits for business organizations.

Name Changed

The Board of Trustees of The College of Saint Rose has announced its decision to undertake a search for a new name for the College. A committee, named by Sister Margaret Keeshan, president of the College, will present a list of names to the Board of Trustees, who in turn will make the final decision.

Named to the five member committee are: Sister Emily Joseph Daly (chairman); Julian Kolod, assistant professor, Department of Mathematics; Peter Laurenzo, a member of the Class of 1971, and ad hoc member of the

Community Council; Diane Nowak, president of the Class of 1972; and Gayle K. Matthews, alumna, class of 1959.

This committee will submit its suggestions to the Board of Trustees by March 19, 1970.

The statement noted that the opinions from all sectors of the college community — faculty, students, graduates, benefactors, friends — had been heard before the Board reached its decision.

The College is in its first year as a fully coeducational institution. Sister Margaret remarked about the effect of coeducation upon the decision: "On the threshold of a new half-century, the student body at the college has been modified. The campus has become coeducational. It is not surprising that the young male students, eager as they are for the coeducational benefits they will receive, find it difficult to identify with a college which offers them as patron the decidedly feminine Saint Rose."

Making Food

New research findings that may eventually lead to crop varieties that are better at the magic of changing air, water, and sunlight into food has been reported by a Cornell University researcher.

Green plants, unlike animals, utilize carbon dioxide in air and "drink" water through the roots to manufacture life-sustaining substances with the aid of sunlight.

The rate of such a food-making process, called photosynthesis, is partially determined by microscopic holes, or stomata, that cover leaf surfaces, said Roger M. Gifford, a graduate student in agronomy at the N.Y.

State College of Agriculture, Cornell.

He said that the findings put agronomists one step closer to better understanding of the controlling factors of photosynthesis in corn.

Gifford said that uptake of carbon dioxide by plants depends on how wide the leaf holes remain open rather than on the number of such holes involved.

Located on both sides of the leaf, these holes automatically open and close in response to stimulation by changes in light,

water content, and carbon dioxide concentration, among other factors.

"Photosynthesis rate is maximal when these pores open all the way," Gifford said. "In other words, the rate is regulated closely by the size of the aperture of the leaf holes."

Using a plastic casting technique, the Cornell student was able to count the number of microscopic holes on corn leaves. A sample as small as a dime from the underside of the leaf, for example, has as many as 10,000 holes,

while the other side of the "coin" contains about 8,000 in comparison.

Gifford's study is one phase of a long-term research project in progress at Cornell under the direction of Prof. Robert B. Musgrave in an attempt to unravel nature's secrets that control the efficiency of photosynthesis in corn.

Since the photosynthesis rate has bearing on crop yields, the study is aimed at developing a new tool for plant breeders in tailoring crop varieties that are highly efficient in the food-making process.

Winter Bouquets

Nature offers a wealth of material that can be collected this time of year for winter bouquets

and dried arrangements to provide new, changing accents in household decor during winter months.

"The materials that can be gathered are limited only by one's imagination, creativity, and time," says Prof. Raymond T. Fox, a specialist in flower arrangement at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell University.

Dozens of different, intriguing kinds of seed pods, dried foliage, flowers, cones, nuts, and branches are but a few examples that await picking from the garden, open fields, and woodlands.

If the garden is not cleaned up yet, a variety of flower seed pods such as those of Oriental poppy, peony, iris, lily, canna, Dictamnus, yucca, castor bean, mallow,

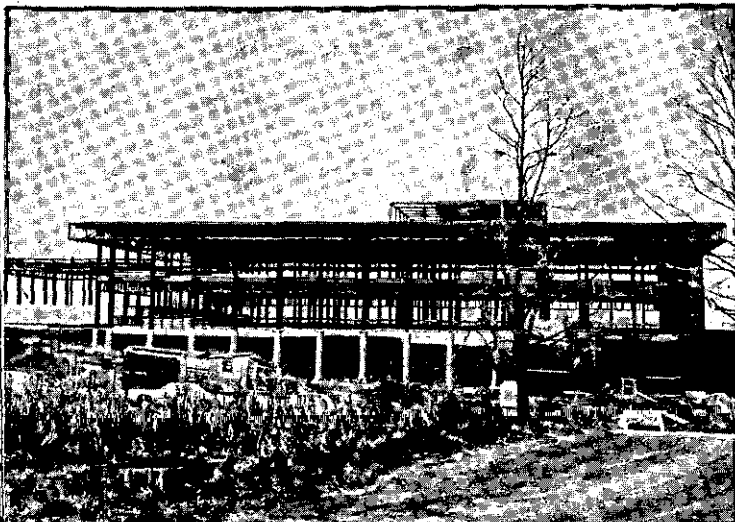

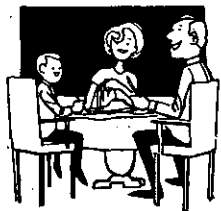

Baptisia, and Lunaria may be collected.

Shrubs such as lilac, rhododendron, leucothoe, roses, silverbell, bayberry, and pearl bush as well as the flower border also offer a wealth of interesting seed pods. Trees such as catalpa, locust, alder, and witchhazel all provide pods, as do wisteria and trumpet vine, and, of course, the beautiful bittersweet berries and red staghorn sumac fruit.

Open fields and roadsides yield plenty of pods of all kinds: teasel, wild verbascum or beardweed, dock, plume grass, plantain, mullein, and milkweed. In addition, the soft gray-green winter rosettes of mullein foliage can be gathered at this time of year.

A close look at trees and shrubs around the home as well as a short walk in the open country may result in an interesting collection of dried branches that may form the basis of an attractive line design, according to Prof. Fox.

Scotch broom and pussy willow have slim lines that can be flexed to graceful curves. Winged euonymus and sweetgum have ridged branches of an unusual form. Larch, witchhazel, thornapple, and magnolia all have distinctive line patterns. Even gnarled branches from old apple and pear trees can provide an unusual and distinctive line.

"Dried arrangements should not be considered permanent ones," Fox advises. "Most dried arrangements should be kept no longer than four to six weeks because they get tiresome. After a few weeks, dismantle the arrangement and recombine the materials with others to make a fresh new design."

Good Work!

There has been a gratifying response by many of the nation's leaders, newspapers and broadcasters, and by other Red Cross societies throughout the world, to American Red Cross efforts to "gain humane treatment for U.S. prisoners of war in North Vietnam."

A concurrent resolution has been introduced in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives "to prove and endorse the resolution adopted at the twenty-first International Conference of the Red Cross to insure humane treatment of prisoners of war."

The prisoner of war resolution was adopted without a dissenting

vote early in September by the representatives of 77 governments and 91 Red Cross societies attending the International Conference of the Red Cross in Istanbul.

Sponsors of the resolution in Congress were Senator George McGovern, of South Dakota, and Representative E. Ross Adair, of Indiana. Both urged their fellow members to back the Red Cross in its attempt to have the North Vietnamese honor their commitments under the 1949 Geneva Conventions, to which the Hanoi government is a party.

"This effort needs the strong support of the American people and their elected representatives," Senator McGovern said. "In violation of the 1949 Geneva Conventions, the government of North Vietnam has refused to provide the names of American prisoners and to permit the flow of mail between prisoners

and their families. This is a matter which has nothing to do with the wisdom of U.S. policies in Vietnam. No American, irrespective of his views on the war, can condone the North Vietnamese handling of prisoners of war."

The South Dakota Senator's remarks paralleled those made earlier by Senator J. William Fulbright, of Arkansas. He said, that regardless of the nature of the conflict which leads to the imprisonment of a serviceman, his captor should be mindful that the prisoner is in his hands as the result of circum-

stances independent of the prisoner's own will.

Senator Fulbright pointed out that as called for in the International Conference resolution and the Geneva Conventions, prisoners should be promptly identified, afforded an adequate diet and medical care, be permitted to communicate with other prisoners and with their families at home, be promptly repatriated if seriously sick or wounded, at all times be protected from abuse or reprisals. The POW Convention also states that a neutral intermediary, such

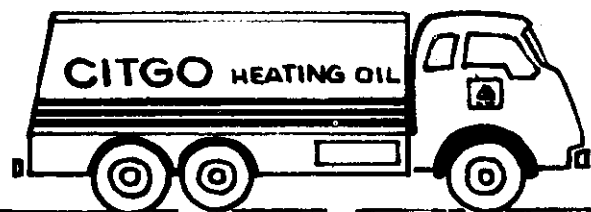

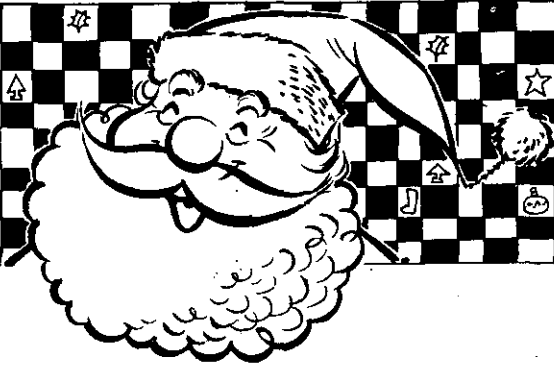

as the International Committee of Red Cross (ICRC), should be afforded free access to prisoners of war and their places of detention.

Said Representative Adair: "The House of Representatives should strongly support the action of the 21st International Conference of the Red Cross. All Americans, regardless of their views on the Vietnam War, should strongly support the action of the 21st International Conference of the Red Cross. All Americans, regardless of their views on the Vietnam war, should support the Red Cross declaration in the name of humanity. We should make it crystal clear to Hanoi that on this issue we are united."

The government of North Vietnam will not permit ICRC dele-

gates to visit prison camps where Americans are being held and has also declined to provide the names of American prisoners or to permit a regular exchange of mail between the men and their families in this country.

The Department of Defense reports that 413 American officers and enlisted men are known prisoners of war in North Vietnam and 918 others are missing and believed captured.

Both through the World Red Cross organizations and diplomatic and other channels, the American Red Cross has made every effort since the beginning of the Vietnam war to assist U.S. prisoners.

In light of the Hanoi government's continuing failure to abide by the Geneva Conventions, the American Red Cross on October

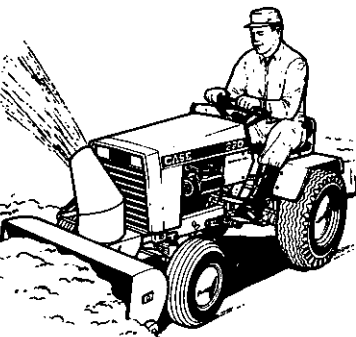
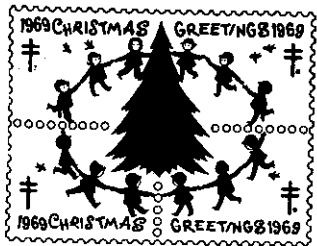

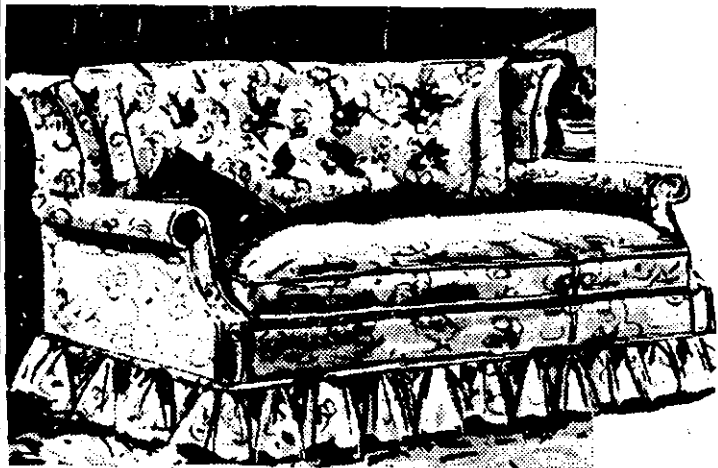

More Hunting

Deer hunters interested in some additional hunting opportunity in the central Adirondacks may now obtain special antlerless deer licenses for the Moose River Area at either of the two entrances. Until November 10 these licenses were available only by mail from the Conservation Department's Albany Office.

The Moose River Area is situated near Indian Lake or from the west at Limekiln Lake near the village of Inlet. Overpopulation of the winter ranges in the Area makes it necessary to obtain a greater deer harvest. This overpopulation — which is strictly in terms of the winter range — has depleted food supplies resulting in deer that are in relatively poor physical condition

and very significant starvation losses.

Approximately 3,000 special licenses are still available. Each entitles the holder to take an antlerless deer from the Moose River Area in addition to deer he may take on other licenses or

permits. An applicant need only present his big game license at either the Cedar River or Limekiln gate and pay the \$1.00 license fee. Hunters are reminded that they are entitled to hold only one special license during a calendar year.

Although the chances of seeing deer in the Moose River Area are not as good as in some of the better deer ranges of New York, studies by the Conservation Department reveal that there are many deer there for the taking. The effect of lower than desirable harvest of the deer herd over the years is evident in the fact that only four of the 114 deer tagged by Department trappers last winter have been recovered by hunters up to this point of the season. The total harvest in the Area from the October 25 opening through November 9 stands at 188 deer. The Department would like to see the season take exceed 500 deer.

Past studies have shown that the hunter success rate is higher during the latter part of the season, especially if snow accumulations encourage deer to concentrate in the wintering areas. Hunters traveling to the Moose River Area are advised that although the road network through the Area is comprised of good quality gravel roads, regulations require that cars and trucks, other than all-wheel drive vehicles, must have tire chains.
