## Santa Tale

There is a Santa Claus in Switzerland who takes bad boys and girls away in his bag to the woods, the third grade students of Glenmont elementary school in Bethlehem were told last week.

And the first thing the students wanted to know from the Swiss women who told the tale was whether or not Santa ever brings the children back. Verena Graf of Luzerne and Emmy Steiger of Zollikerberg admitted that they have never seen any children taken away in the bag.

But Santa does go from house to house in Switzerland, they told the pupils, and personally gives gifts to the small children.

Miss Graf and Miss Steiger, who are secretaries, have recently arrived from Switzerland as part of the Experiment in International Living. They spent the morning last Thursday in the classroom of Miss Marcia Pardoe.

The Swiss use real trees at Christmas and also real lighted candles on the trees in place of electric lights, Miss Steiger said. "But we are used to using candles so we are careful with them," she added.

The celebration of Christmas begins December first with the decoration of the home. Santa pays his visit on the sixth of December, not the night of the 24th, said Miss Steiger. Swiss homes light a candle on the table each week of the month so that four are burning by Christmas day.

Miss Graf played some tapes of yodding and some records of carols for the third graders. The carols were in German as that is the main language spoken in section of Switzerland, she explained.

## To France

A trip abroad to "bring their language study alive," is being planned by the Bethlehem Central language department for students of French and Spanish in grades 10-12.

Nearly 30 students have already signed up for the two week trip to France, which will take place during the Easter vacation, according to department chairman Miss Anita Palumbo.

Plans for the Spanish trip have

not reached the stage of sign-ups.

Because April is "of season" for travel to Europe, the rates are lower and under the co-ordinating auspices of the Suburban Council, a group rate is available. Bethlehem will be joining Shaker High School students to make up the necessary number of participants.

"The trip is based around materials that have been studied in class and the whole class, will benefit from the trip," Miss Palumbo claims, for the students who go will bring back information and material on France and French customs to discuss with students who do not go.

The all inclusive cost of the trip is \$430 for each student. Air France Jet fare to Paris and back, plus tours of museums, Normandy invasion beaches and churches are in the itinerary.

The students will also visit a French high school and have time for individual sightseeing in Paris.

to use the French language in a practical situation. More than just the value of the language experience is the educational value in seeing and talking with people of another country," the department chairman felt.

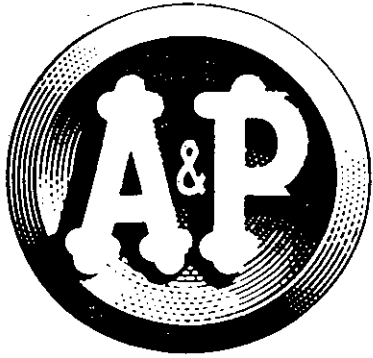

**New Lights?**

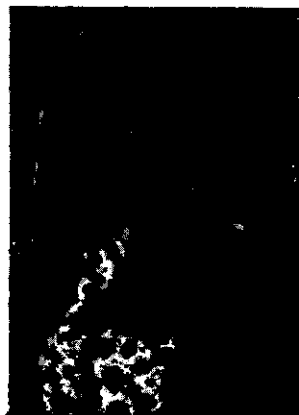
dog ordinance. He suggested the board take prompt action in formulating a "leash law" proposal for the village.

dustry and the news media attended.

Based on a study of all information gathered during the three year investigation, the Policy Committee arrived at the following conclusions:

1. Substantial numbers of striped bass egg and larvae would be drawn into the plant intake; however, these numbers represent less than 1 percent of the total number of eggs produced in the river and less than 3 percent of the larvae.

2. Young-of-the year striped bass are vulnerable to plant operations until they reach screenable size, and up to 6.2 percent of these fish could be withdrawn at Cornwall. Although this percentage appears high, it is negligible when related to the total population of this species in the Hudson River.

3. Withdrawal of fish species occurring as eggs, larvae, or young-of-the year in the Cornwall area will have minimal effects on their respective populations due to the widespread distribution of all species in the estuary. The only exception to the generality could be the bay anchovy which is subject to withdrawal for at least 2 years of life due to its small size; however, the Committee feels that these losses will have little effect on the total bay anchovy population.

4. Finally, the Committee concludes that the evidence indicates that there would not be any significant adverse effects to the striped bass and American shad fisheries of the Hudson River from a pumped storage generating plant at Cornwall.

The Policy Committee also made the following recommendations to insure adequate protection of the fisheries:

1. Additional studies will be necessary if and when the Cornwall plant is constructed and operational to establish actual plant effects.

2. If these suggested studies indicate adverse effects not established in pre-construction surveys, then plant operation schedules should be modified to produce minimal effects on fish populations.

3. The cumulative effects of all plants requiring large volumes of water for operations could result in adverse effects not established in pre-construction surveys, then plant operation schedules should be modified to produce minimal effects could result in adverse effects to fish populations; therefore, the Committee recommends that coordinated studies of fish distribution at future and existing plant sites be made to permit evaluation of these total mortalities.

4. If an electrical screening device to reduce fish loss is successfully developed, it should be installed in relation to any project that takes water in quantity from the river.

Following presentation of the report, Policy Committee Chairman Albert G. Hall, who is Director of the Conservation Department's Division of Fish and Wildlife said, "I consider the meeting to have been successful and informative to all. During the course of this three-year study a tremendous amount of information concerning the Hudson River fishery has been gathered. All who have participated in making this report possible should be commended for their efforts."

Other members of the Policy Committee include representatives of the States of New York and New Jersey and U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife and Bureau of Commercial fisheries.

**Post-season Hunting**

The State Conservation Department today announced details of a special post-season deer of either sex hunt to be held weekdays in Suffolk County from January 5-9 and January 12-16, 1970. This shotgun only season will be the second successive such hunt in recent years. Prior to last year's hunt, there had been no open season for deer on Long Island since 1928.

The regulations for the hunt are similar to those of last year. Only big game license holders who were not successful during the regular deer season, which

ended December 2, may apply. The quota of 3,250 permits - although slightly larger than the 1969 quota - is still very limited in terms of the number of hunters in the New York City Metropolitan Area so an individual's prospects of getting a permit are extremely limited.

Permits will be issued on a quota basis for portions of five towns in Suffolk County. Town quotas are as follows: Brookhaven 1,000; East Hampton 500; Riverhead 750; Shelter Island 400; Southampton, 600.

To participate in the hunt, an applicant must first obtain a free application blank from the Department. Requests may be made by mail or in person to:

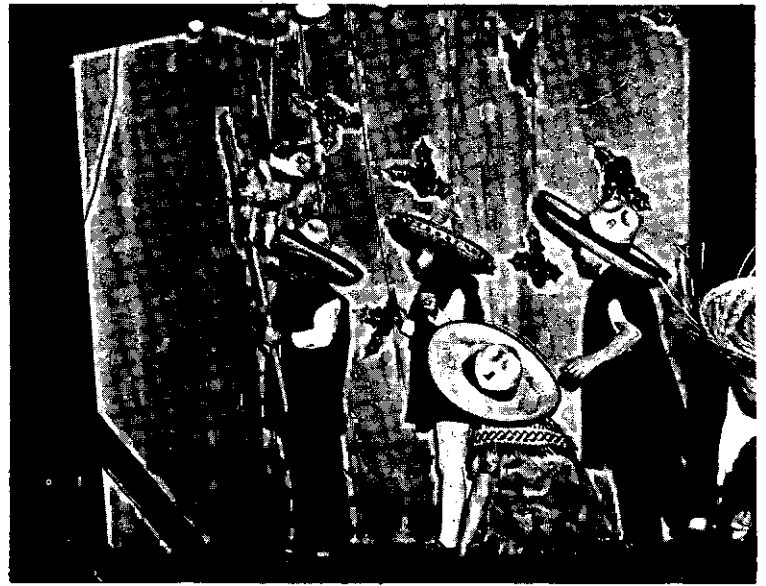
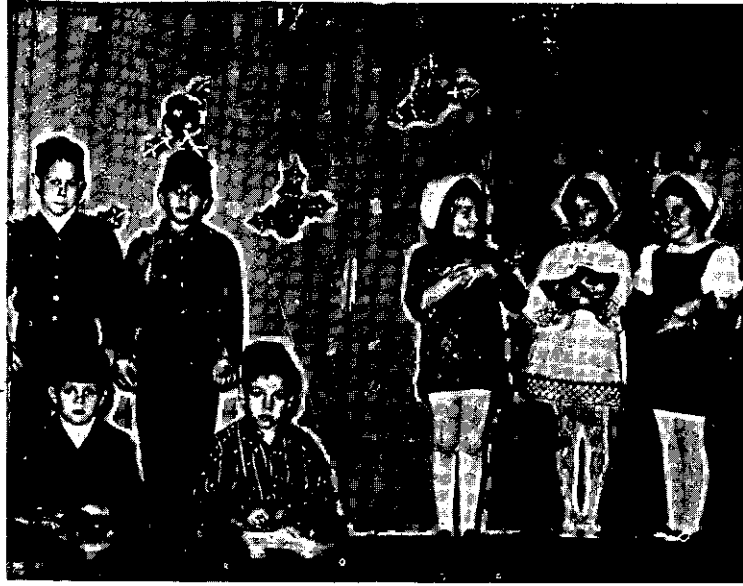

Mail requests for applications should be submitted in an envelope which is marked in the lower left-hand corner, "Suffolk Special Deer Permit," and postmarked not later than January 12, 1970. A stamped, self-addressed envelope must be enclosed along with the name, address and big game license number of the applicant.

With their application hunters will be given a hunt area map which they may use to locate a person who owns or leases at least 10 acres of land in the prescribed area. The landowner or leasee should be asked to sign the permission form as well as record the required deed information including book and page number, in whose name property is recorded and courthouse in which recorded.

Once the hunter has this information filled in on his application, he must then see the appropriate town clerk and — providing the town quota is not filled — obtain his permit for a \$1 fee. Town

clerks will begin issuing permits, on Monday, December 22. The permit is valid only in the town specified on it and only on the lands of the person who signed the application endorsement. A hunter may obtain only one permit.

Deer taken under the permit must be tagged with the regular big game tag and then taken by 6 P.M. to a designated check point, a list of which is furnished to each hunter. At the check point Department personnel will examine the animal and affix a self-locking metal seal which must remain attached until the deer is prepared for consumption.

Last year 3,105 permits were authorized and hunters took 162 deer. Game biologists would have liked to have seen more deer taken, but at least the hunt demonstrated that a deer hunt could be held in the heavily populated area without any serious problems. A harvest of 250 to 300 deer this year would greatly benefit the deer herd.

ber of deer taken last season was the condition of the animals. John L. Renkavinsky, Game Manager for Fish and Wildlife Region #9 described the deer taken as ranging from "fair size to the poorest deer imaginable." He cited a 29-pound female and a 36-pound male fawn taken in the Town of Easthampton as indicative of extremely poor range conditions.

Moreover these deer were only three or four months old when killed, meaning they had been born in September or October, instead of spring as is the usual case. This evidence of extremely late breeding by does is yet another indication of the overall poor condition of the herd, according to Renkavinsky.

## More DDT

Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne recently announced the first results of his department's new program of stepped up surveillance of New York State waters to determine the amounts of DDT residues found in fish. The Commissioner had announced the expansion of the pesticide residue monitoring program in late September.

The figures released covered a sample of coho salmon recovered from stockings in Lake Ontario and Lake Erie. In the former case, seven mature cohos, ranging in size from four to eight and one-half pounds were examined for DDT levels in the edible portions of the flesh. The DDT residue measured ranged from 1.45 parts per million of DDT to a high of 13.56 parts per million

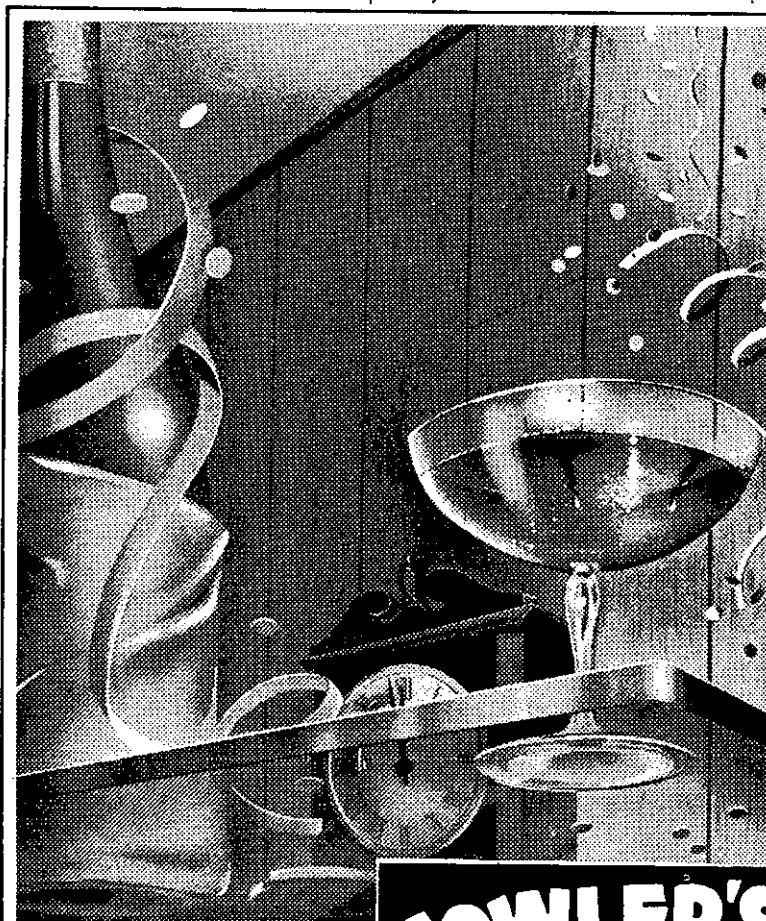

DDT, with an average concentration of 7.84 parts per million (ppm).

This compares with an actionable level of 5.0 ppm of DDT established by the Federal Food and Drug Administration. Under its regulations fish exceeding this level can be condemned and destroyed if offered for sale on the open market.

The complete listing of DDT measurements for the seven Lake Ontario cohos examined are as follows:

- 1 - 1.45 ppm
- 2 - 6.27 ppm
- 3 - 6.67 ppm
- 4 - 7.49 ppm
- 5 - 8.56 ppm
- 6 - 10.90 ppm
- 7 - 13.56 ppm

Average - 7.84 ppm

As indicated above, all but the first fish sampled were above the 5.0 ppm level and that fish, although mature, was extremely low in fat content which is unusual for the fast-growing coho salmon. These fish grow very quickly once they enter the large bodies of water in which they mature. Much of the coho's diet in the Great Lakes consists of alewives and smelt. Both of these smaller fish feed extensively on small aquatic organisms, each of which contain minute amounts of DDT. As the alewives and smelt feed

on these organisms they concentrate the DDT and the cohos feeding on them magnify it still more, resulting in the high levels recorded.

The level of DDT concentration in Lake Erie mature cohos examined is much lower. Five fish examined averaged only 2.31 ppm and ranged from a low of 1.27 to a high of 5.61 ppm, with only one fish above the 5.0 ppm level. The complete listing of these fish was:

- 1 - 1.27 ppm
- 2 - 1.44 ppm
- 3 - 1.44 ppm
- 4 - 1.78 ppm
- 5 - 5.61 ppm

Average - 2.31 ppm

These DDT levels for mature coho salmon, however, are not representative of jacks or early maturing coho salmon which return to streams the same year in which they are stocked. Jacks, averaging two pounds, were examined in both 1968 and 1969 from Lakes Erie and Ontario and consistently were found to be well below the 5.0 ppm of DDT level.

Commissioner Kilborne said that Conservation Department biologists are continuing to monitor several thousand fish samples taken from more than 100 streams and lakes in the State. Other findings will be reported

The Commissioner also noted that these high levels of DDT measured emphasized the importance of control of DDT and other hard pesticides as recommended by the State Pesticide Control Board. Early last summer the Board proposed legislation to tightly restrict the use of "hard" or long-lived pesticides and urged greater utilization of degradable pesticides - those which lose their toxicity relatively soon after application.

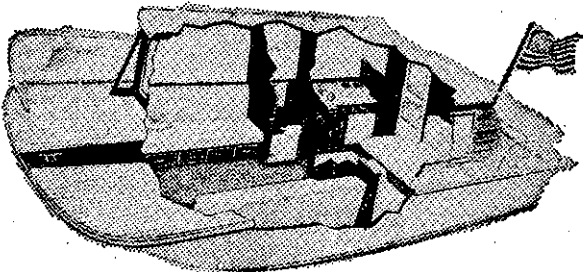

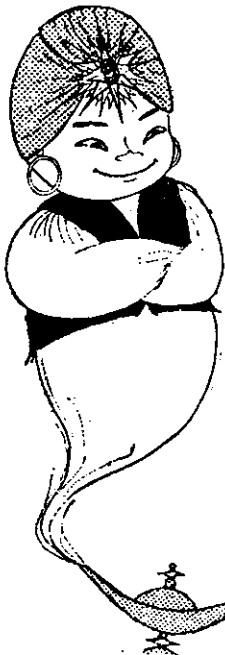

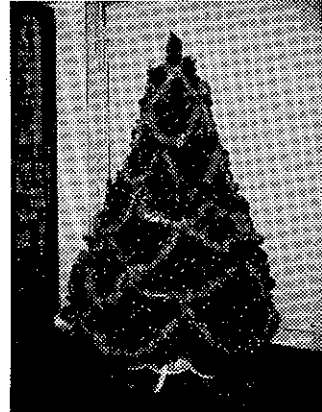

- Do inspect all wiring insulation for possible deterioration, especially if it has been stored for an indefinite period.
- Do use rubber light socket gaskets where provided and replace if needed.
- Do make certain lamps are not loose in their sockets.

should be stressed: overloads and physical inspections.

Overloads are primarily created by placing more current on a wire than it can handle but not enough to cause a fuse to blow. At Christmas this is usually due to placement of too many bulbs on a single extension cord. Result: overheating; melting insulation; exposed wire; shock, electrocution or fire. Hence, always look for the capability of the wiring supplying the lighting.

Examination of insulation is a minor task but one of major importance. Wiring that has been stored in attics or cellars for a long period of time can become vulnerable to the elements. Consequently, varying temperatures can easily affect the insulation to the point of being incapable of serving its protective purpose.

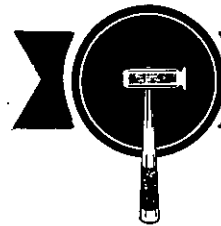

Richly illustrated with 135 photographs, drawing, and maps, the book gives much new, previously unpublished information. Supported by the most recently obtained radiocarbon dates, the author has synthesized all earlier published material to draw inferences which give an overview of the nature of these early inhabitants, where they came from, and how they lived.

Between 1964 and 1967, with support a National Science Foundation grant, Dr. Ritchie each summer took a small party of graduate and undergraduate students from universities all over the country to Martha's Vineyard. Their purpose was to try to determine a sequence of cultures in New England which would tie into New York State. This would help in understanding the archaeological problems in eastern and southern New York State, and also determine if possible how the Indian groups became adapted to a coastal ecology. No one had ever before studied this phase of southern New England prehistory.

The archaeologists excavated six stratified sites in different parts of the Island. They discovered a succession of new cultures completely unknown before and for which they were able to obtain radiocarbon dates for most

that ranged between 2270 B.C. and A.D. 1565.

The content of these excavated shell midden sites revealed that the earliest inhabitants were mainly forest-adapted hunters who came from the Cape Cod mainland over 4,000 years ago, chiefly hunting the white-tailed deer.

Successive cultures over the years shifted their economy from forest hunting to living almost entirely from the sea, at first on the shellfish of the coastal waters, to which they later added off-shore hunting and fishing.

Dr. Ritchie's pioneer work in this area resulted in his latest book, "The Archaeology of Martha's Vineyard; A Framework for the Prehistory of Southern New England. This 270 page book has 74 illustrations.

By correlating the finds of the Martha's Vineyard excavations with the records of excavations on the mainland, Dr. Ritchie has been able to trace linkages between the Island groups and those of the little known southern New England cultures. The account presented in this book, according to Dr. Ritchie, "is the first overall perspective of prehistory on Martha's Vineyard, its indicated extension to much of southern New England.

Dr. Ritchie has conducted field work on more than 100 major archaeological sites in the north-eastern United States and Canada, and he has written more than 150 articles on the archaeology and paleopathology of the Indians of the Northeast.

He received his B.S. and M.S. degrees in archaeology from the University of Rochester and his Ph.D. degree in anthropology from Columbia University. He also holds an honorary Sc. D. degree from Waynesburg College.

He is the author of "The Pre-Iroquoian Occupations of New York State" and a Fellow of the American Anthropological Association, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the New York State Archaeological Association.

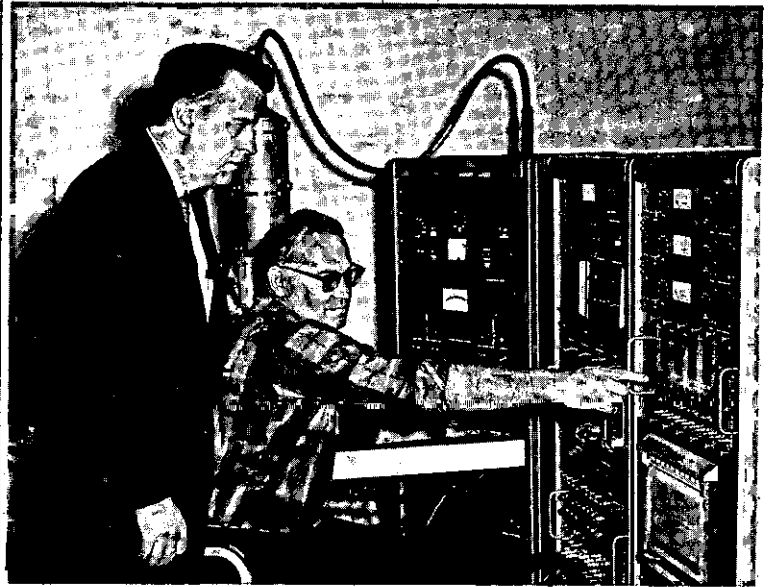

## New Research

The oldest building at Watervliet Arsenal is now the scene of some of the most advanced research presently taking place in the installation's Benet Research & Engineering Laboratories.

The microprobe is far more effective than chemical analysis as it not only indicates the quantity of an element present, but also determines its distribution microscopically, thus enabling arsenal researchers, to obtain an image of the two-dimensional distribution of chemical elements on the surface being examined.



Research chemist, Joseph F. Cox (1032 Winne Rd.), Schenectady, who directs the activity, says the ancient arsenal building is particularly well-suited for it's new role as its tremendously thick walls provide substantial shielding for the high levels of radiation associated with the microprobe and other instrumentation to be installed.

RESEARCH CHEMIST William J. Heffernan (l.) (13 Gardner Ter.), Delmar, and physical science technician Joseph W. Hart (Monroe Ave.), Albany, use the microprobe analyzer to determine the level of the chemical element antimony present on the surface of a test specimen in the arsenal's activation analysis Lab.

Behind the four-foot walls of Bldg. 119, erected in 1828, as an ammunition magazine, super-sophisticated equipment is analyzing material to detect conditions which might impair its effectiveness when fabricated into gun tubes and other weapon components.

The major instrument in the newly established activation analysis lab is a scanning electron microprobe analyzer which de-

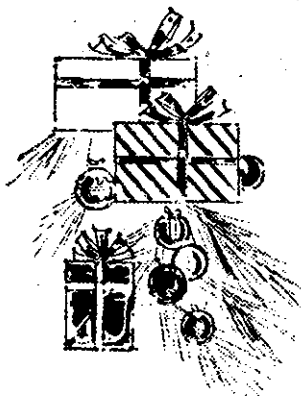
