To the Editor:

Although we are not able as yet to control very much of our air pollution we must make a start now. Effective last February 15, 1970, The Air Pollution Control Bureau issued a new directive forbidding open burning in the Town of Bethlehem. The directive states that "no person shall burn, cause, suffer, allow, or permit the burning of an open fire: of garbage, of refuse at a refuse disposal area, of rubbish for salvage, for on site disposal of rubbish generated by residential activities or by industrial or commercial activities, or generated by land clearing." In short, burning in the Town of Bethlehem has been forbidden since February 15, 1970.

It seems many people in town are unaware of this for they continue burning their rubbish. I would urge people to inform their neighbors who are burning that they are in violation. Some businesses are also burning. I would urge people to inform these merchants that you will not patronize them so long as they burn. If you will note the wording of the directive it says that no person will allow or permit such burning. If those around you do not wish to stop polluting your air, as well as their own,

Committee Report

The following is a report submitted to the school board on April 23, 1970 by the Ad Hoc Citizens Committee with respect to the controversy surrounding the dismissal of Paul Runge, principal of the high school. The committee spent about twenty hours with the officials and about 20 hours in committee deliberation.

This ad hoc citizen's committee was formed as a result of expressed concern by a majority of the high school students and faculty, as well as concern by many members of the general public, over the denial of tenure to High School Principal Paul Runge by Superintendent Richard Moomaw.

The committee set two rules for itself: first, to meet only with the superintendent, the principal, and the members of the board; and second, that our meetings would not be confidential.

The committee held separate meetings with Dr. Moomaw, accompanied by the school board's counsel; Mr. Runge; all the members of the school board collectively, together with their counsel; and with Dr. Moomaw and Mr. Runge together.

From the beginning Dr. Moomaw informed us that his decision not to recommend Mr. Runge for tenure was irrevocable and not open to discussion. He further advised that he would not disclose the reasons beyond a clarifying statement that the reasons were not grounded on immoral conduct.

The board made it clear to this committee that they supported Dr. Moomaw's decision not to grant tenure or to reveal the reasons for this decision.

Mr. Runge indicated to this committee that he was willing to have Dr. Moomaw make public the reasons for his decision; that he had not been told of any systematic or formal evaluation of his performance as high school principal; and that, despite discussion with the board, he was still unclear about the reasons.

At this committee's suggestion, Dr. Moomaw has expressed his intention to issue a statement affirming the continuation of pre-

sent high school policies.

As a result of our meetings with the concerned parties and as a further result of our deliberations together, the undersigned members of this committee have concluded that while the

procedures used by the board and the superintendent were legal, the following recommendations for the future would not only be legal but far more just.

1. The superintendent should obtain formal evaluations of a principal's performance from faculty and students preceding decisions about tenure.

2. Periodic written evaluations during the probationary period should be given to the principal by the superintendent.

3. Reasons for a decision not to grant tenure should be given in writing to the principal at his request.

We further recommend that the law which requires tenure status for a principal after the probationary period be changed.

Had these recommendations been followed, the present confusion and concern relating to this matter would have been avoided, and the community could have greater confidence in the justice of the outcome.

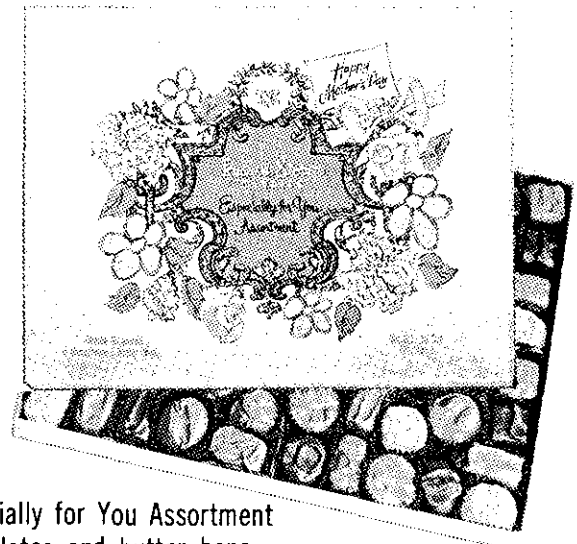

furnished the interior, and open the smartest club on Bourbon Street — the Al Hirt Club.

With fame came the inevitable attention from the critics. From the start, they had a difficult time classifying exactly what it was that Al Hirt elicited from

the trumpet. The music critic of the prestigious New Orleans Times-Picayune once wrote: "Al Hirt may very well be the finest trumpet player in the world today, but just what kind of trumpeter he is is not so easy to describe."

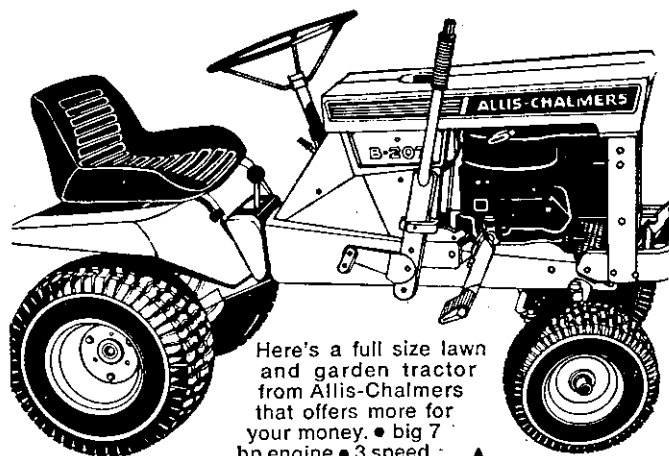

you desire. An agent is employed with handling a full time program in homegrounds, and in extreme cases, will visit the home when a serious problem arises. The agent is kept abreast of the new developments in the ornamental horticulture field by the experts at the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University. The U.S.D.A. operate a Federal Extension Service, which also aids the agent in some ways.

Phone hours have been established between the hours of 9-12 A.M., Monday thru Friday, at which time the agent handles trouble calls on homegrounds. One very helpful aid which all should send for (its free) is the "Diagnostic Checklist and Plant History" form. If homeowners diligently fill out the needed information and mail it back to the Extension Horticulturist, diagnosis of a problem is made with greater accuracy. Often times, it is very difficult to diagnose a problem over the phone and this frustrates both the caller and the agent.

Other important services of the homegrounds area are weekly newspaper articles, periodical radio spots, special newsletters to association enrollees, and the garden pages of the "Albany County News," the farm and home news available to enrollees. If you would be interested in obtaining information about becoming enrolled in the Home grounds Program, where you would receive timely homegrounds newsletters and other aids, then send your requests to: Cooperative Extension Association of Albany County, 209 Federal Bldg., 441 Broadway Albany, N.Y. 12207 - Phone 472-3137.

night, but you can expect to be busy.

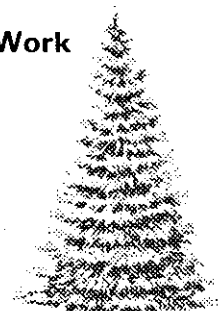

Profs. Gilbert A. Churchill Jr., Neil M. Ford, and Urban B. Ozanne of the Graduate School of Business analyzed data on 434 stations in the Pacific Northwest collected over 86 consecutive Friday evenings.

If it's a matter of price only, they found, stations that sell minor brands are a penny or more lower per gallon. Price differences between stations selling major brands are almost impossible to find. The big firms meet the competition by staying even.

Chances of getting a lower price are a little better where facilities, pumps, and restrooms are substandard, "a little shabby," the researchers noted. Lower prices also were observed at stations just outside the central business districts on heavily-traveled streets.

If trading stamps are given, the station is most likely to have prices on a level with the competition or slightly below, the experts learned.

Prices were collected for regular grade gasoline only.

Profs. Churchill, Ford, and Ozanne collaborated their findings in a scholarly article titled "An Analysis of Price Aggressiveness in Gasoline Marketing," published this month in the Journal of Marketing Research.

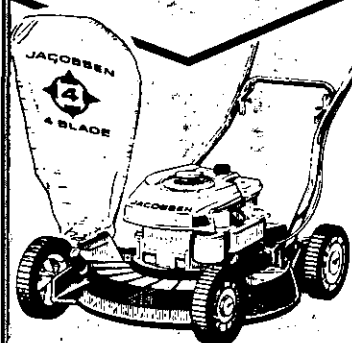

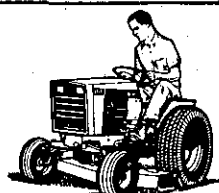
Singing Woodcock

The late arrival of spring this year slowed up the annual courtship show of the woodcock, but now that the snow is just a memory in most of its nesting area, male timberdoodles are doing all they can to attract their ladies. They don't give two hoots for what the females do with the eggs, but will continue to maintain their singing grounds in hopes that some late nesting female will drop by.

The dependability of the males singing on their well-established courting grounds from the time of their arrival until mid-May has made it possible for wildlife biologists to get a fairly accurate index of the population trends over the years. Each spring many woodcock inventories are conducted throughout Northeast by the same biologist covering the same route and stopping at the same listening points. The sum total of all the changes of these small counts shows the trend.

These calling spots are very definite and easy to locate. Out-

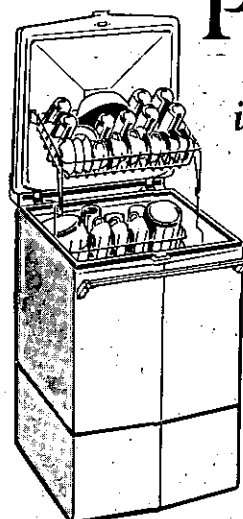

door enthusiasts who have been introduced to the timberdoodle on the singing ground make it an annual pilgrimage to return and watch this odd little fellow strut his stuff.

Since the main food of woodcock is earthworms, they are found in similar situations in both spring and fall. The alder or aspen thicket where the gunner flushed the bird is probably again harboring woodcock during the day. The singing ground will be nearby but must be open, with little ground vegetation to interfere with the performance. Moss, poverty grass or other fine grass matted down by the winter's snow will serve as a stage. Poorly drained submarginal farmland where woody vegetation is invading but has not yet taken over is the most likely site.

To locate a singing ground, be in prospective woodcock cover about 30 minutes after sunset. Drive along the back roads, stopping to listen every quarter of a mile. The ground call is referred to politely as a "peent," but to most people it sounds more like a little Bronx cheer. For those unfamiliar with the woodcock's call, it is sometimes difficult to separate it from the other evening noises of toads and frogs. Once properly identified it stands out clearly.

When a calling woodcock has been located, wait until the Bronx cheers stop and replaced by a sweet twittering sound as he spirals overhead singing his courtship song. He will circle overhead for about 20 to 30 seconds permitting you to move rapidly toward the area where you heard him. The clue to freeze is the intensified twettering as the singer starts his descent. It will usually require three or four advances to properly locate the singing ground.

The woodcock will continue to strut and call, interrupted by periodic flight songs, until at least one hour after sunset. Moonlight, however, will extend the show and bright moonlit evenings will keep the amorous timberdoodle active far into the night. Starting from scratch it may be too dark, without the aid

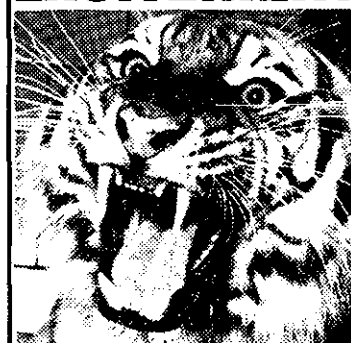

of a light, to really see the show when the singing ground is "zeroed in," but he will be back in the same spot every evening until about mid-May. Surprisingly, the beam from a powerful flashlight will only startle him momentarily, and he will quickly resume his strutting, though he may drift away from the source of light.

Woodcock-watching is an ideal way to teach youngsters about the fascination of wildlife. Groups of eight or 10 children can participate in these woodcock hunts. Their curiosity and enthusiasm make them surprisingly cooperative in this new adventure. The woodcock is busy with his own activity and is very tolerant of limited wiggles and giggles. However, the chances are good that sooner or later the giggles will win out as the kids watch the silly performance only yards away. More than once I have seen one of them laughed off the stage.
