Dear Editor:

The Executive Committee of CRISIS on behalf of our membership urges community support of the budget adopted of May 14 by the School Board.

We are not persuaded that dis agreement with Board action or individual budget items or with the outcome of the issue on ten ure for Principal Paul Runge should be the basis for a vote against the budget on Wednes day, June 10. Every vote against the budget runs the risk of being interpreted as a vote to re duce the quality of education The next step in improving our schools is to pass the budget or June 10 by as large a margin as possible.

We firmly believe that the best interest of our schools and our community calls for passage of the budget on June 10. The budget is a tight one, essentially maintaining the status quo. Members of CRISIS have supported a number of modest improvements which were not adopted. A systematized preventive maintenance program and other worthwhile proposals of the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee have been deferred. The average class sizes in the elementary and middle schools are to continue but the average will increase in the high school.







Unique Honor

Perfection is hard to achieve, but in the May 8 New York School Music Association Festival held at Columbia High School, East Greenbush, the Bethlehem Central High School Concert Band, under the direction of Samuel Bozzella, music supervisor for the Bethlehem Central district, achieved this rare and very thrilling success when they received a perfect score of 240 for an A rating of their performance of the most difficult category of music, grade 6.

At this Festival music organizations were judged according to NYSSMA state-wide standards and were evaluated on six aspects of performance: tone, intonation, technique, rhythm, balance, and interpretation. Two judges working independently gave the band straight A's in all

categories for a perfect total score of 240 points. When asked just how unusual such a rating is, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the New York State School Music Association, Mr. Dean L. Harrington, commented, "It has been achieved before but very, very rarely."

The personnel of the band deserve commendation for their dedication and hard work that obviously was necessary for the development of the skill and musicianship they demonstrated.

The Bethlehem Senior High School is also proud of the senior high ninth and tenth grade choirs, the Centraliers, under the direction of Mrs. Magdalene and the Senior High Symphony Orchestra directed by Mr. Salvatore Gangi, all of which received A ratings in grade 5 music.



Wildlife Pets

Memorial Day unofficially marks the start of the summer picnicking season. Each year sees more and more people pack up and head for the out-of-doors whenever possible. With parks filled to overflowing, many people find their way into the remote sections of the hills.

This springtime surge of humanity to the woods is accompanied by an unfortunate and unnecessary by-product — kidnapping of wildlife youngsters. Usually the foster parent's intentions are good, for the little animal is assumed to be an orphan and is being saved from starvation of the jaws of some predator.

Many birds will put on quite a show to draw intruders away from their young. Mammals, on the other hand, use a different approach. They will hide their young in a safe spot and trust on camouflage and the youngster's

ability to remain motionless to prevent detection. The adult fades into the background so as not to leave any visible clud around.

The absence of the mother leads to the assumption that the youngster is an orphan. Occasionally some fate has befallen the mother, but unless circumstances are known she should be assumed to be alive. Kidnappings so outnumber findings of true orphans that more suffering is caused than prevented.

There is no provision in the Conservation Law to issue permits to possess young of protected species even if they are known to be orphans. Conservation Officers have the unpleasant task of confiscating every one coming to their attention. They have the problem of caring for and properly disposing of the animals.

Fawns and raccoons are the two animals most often victimized by kidnappers. After being held until they are capable of caring for themselves, coons can readily be returned to the wild, but this is not the case with deer.

A fawn requires milk for three months to grow preperly. By that time it has lost all fear of man and cannot be safely released in the wild. The usual fate of a released deer is an early death due to unwitting exposure to dogs or hunters. This is properly very fortunate, for during the fall a buck can become extremely unpredictable. Even pets that have been feeding out of hand all year may turn without warning on their benefactor with their sharp antlers or hooves.

Because they cannot be released safely they must be kept in confinement the rest of their lives. Zoos, city parks and similar places which will take them are far too few to handle all the fawns that the "helpful" public will pick up during the next few weeks.

Many people believe that once a fawn has been touched by a human that its mother will abandon it. Human scent is so common in most of our deer range, however, it is just an ordinary part of the day's smell. One farmer told me of finding a fawn in a field that he was plowing and moving it to the end of the field where

it would be out of the way. Later that afternoon his children found it and brought it to the barn. He hurried it back to the edge of the plowed field where he thought the doe would come out. Before dusk he saw the doe come out to plowed field where she shortly found the fawn and they disappeared into the woods.

Many lessons about Nature's ways can be learned from wild pets. They need not be large pets, but can be small, easy to care for things like little snapping turtles, snakes, pollywogs, or even large insects. The care and housing of these small creatures is simple compared with much greater demands of raccoons or fawns. When the urge to keep the pet runs out - and even caring for a fawn can become tiresome to a youngster and his parents - snakes, praying mantises, toads or most of these little animals can be released in the back yard with no problem.

Switch-Plate

Researchers at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture at Cornell University are on their way to isolating one of the key "switchplates" that allow all nerves to turn on and off.

The search, led by college neurobiologist Richard D. O'Brien, is one of only four or five of its kind in the world. Successful isolation can have far-reaching effects on treating mental illness and understanding how drugs work on the mind, according to O'Brien

The switch-plates are known to scientists as "receptors" because of their ability to respond to chemical "messages" to the nerves.

"Many chemicals that affect the brain, whether they are used medically or to produce

mood changes, do so by combining with the receptor," O'Brien explsined.

Receptors are so little understood at this early stage that conflicting theories exist about their very nature. Some scientists argue that the receptors are really part of the fabric of the nerve. Others, Prof. O'Brien among them, feel that they are special units built into the fabric that researchers can remove and analyze.

"The fact is, receptors seem to be easily destroyed when attempts are made to isolate them, but our opinion is that this is because they are very sensitive structures," O'Brien said.

The Cornell research has progressed to the point of finding significant evidence to support the sensitivity theory. In work on electric eels and skates, it turned out that the never cells containing the receptors were made up of a fragile and complex combination of fatty and protein tissue.

The task then was to find a source of nerve tissue equipped with receptors made of protein alone. Such tissue would be both more stable and simpler to iso-


