

# Open Letter

To the voters of the Bethlehem School District

Our school budget was defeated on June 10 by only 223 votes. Of the approximately 11,000 potential voters, almost 5,000 (nearly 50%) could not vote because they did not register. The voice of the majority was not heard.

Now you are being given another chance to register and make your voice heard in support of your children's education, which is to say their future. If you have NOT already registered, you can do so at the Middle School on Tuesday, July 7 from 7 A.M. - 9 P.M.

We urge everyone to REGISTER and VOTE.

In order to have a basic operating budget on which to plan for the fall, the Board of Education voted to adopt a Contingency Budget of \$7,511,654. This amount includes those items mandated by the State Education Department and considered by the Board essential just to maintain the present standard of education in Bethlehem schools.

To maintain the present high level of excellence of your schools, the Board is offering registered voters a chance to vote on each of 9 specific items, which cannot be included in the Budget unless YOU pass them. These are -

### 1) EQUIPMENT (K-12)

This is to replace worn-out classroom and laboratory equipment such as typewriters, projectors, language records, bunsen burns, etc. The sum needed for this item is \$77,721.

### 2) SUPPLIES & TEXTBOOKS (K-6)

Included here are the paper, pencils, crayons, textbooks, and other classroom supplies essential for the basic learning of every child.

The sum required for the replacement and updating of textbooks is only \$14,000 of the total budget. If this item is defeated, parents of children in grades K-6 will have to pay a rental fee, for each book used by every child. The total required for Supplies and Textbooks is \$52,000.

### 3) LIBRARY BOOKS

This involves adding new books to the already under supplied school libraries. In a time when we are expecting our young people to be well-informed, mature and responsible at an even-earlier age, we must see to it that they have available to them for their schooling an up-to-date and comprehensive selection of books

covering our changing world. To do this will cost \$10,060.

### 4) INTER - SCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

An important part of every child's total education is the competitive sports program. Inter-scholastic athletics is an activity with which all students can identify and in which the entire family can participate. To continue this, \$25,671 must be approved.

### 5) TRANSPORTATION

One of the greatest fears of any parent is the possibility that his child might be injured in a school bus accident or be hit by a car while walking to school. Two buses now in use date from 1954 and 1955, and have been condemned by the Public Service Commission. To handle safely the number of children riding to school, these two buses need to be replaced and a third added.

If this option is not passed, there will be NO bus transportation for elementary or middle school children who live 2 or less miles from school or for high school children living less than 3 miles from school. The hazards of walking along major roads will be increased by the cars of those parents who will be driving their children to school. To continue the same level of transportation as last year, \$115,387 is needed.

### 6) USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

To fulfil their function truly, schools should serve as a focus of community activities. This provides students with experience in participatory citizenship which will serve as a model in their adult lives. Among the many groups who use the schools are the Red Cross swim programs, Senior Citizens and Garden Club. Continuation of this program of service will require \$17,000.

### 7) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

This item provides for the maintenance, operation and improvement of the physical plants. In urgent need of attention are facilities at Delmar Elementary, where \$15,600 of the total expenditure of \$28,245 is needed to bring facilities at long last up to par with those at all the other district elementary schools.

### 8) SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAMS

This item, unlike the other eight, requires no money at all, since the cafeteria is self-supporting. However, in order for our schools to participate in this program, the Board needs your approval. Passage of this item by the voters requires only your approval - it will cost you no extra money.

### 9) MEMBERSHIPS

An important part of any educational program is participation in a board sphere of activities that promote a continuing exchange of knowledge with other school systems and educational organizations. This participation currently includes membership in the Suburban Council (which sponsors athletics and co-operative programs in art, music and language); in CASDA (a council for studying programs and curriculum development); in Mohawk-Hudson Educational T.V. and in the N.Y.S. School of Music Association, as well as in debate contests. \$5,087 is needed to continue this important facet of the educational program.

In conclusion, we urge you, our fellow citizens, to REGISTER on June 29 or July 7 if you have not already done so. And we urge you to support your Board and your schools and vote YES on all nine propositions.

## New Principal

The Bethlehem Central Board of Education has approved the appointment of Miss Helen E. Hobbie of Cedar Hill, Selkirk, New York, as principal of the senior high school.

Miss Hobbie, who has served since 1956 as a teacher of mathematics at Bethlehem Central High School, has permanent certification as a secondard principal. Her appointment will take effect immediately.

A 1932 graduate of Glens Falls high school, Miss Hobbie earned her undergraduate and Master's of Arts degrees from New York State College for Teachers at Albany. Additional graduate work includes courses at Middlebury College, University of Buffalo, SUNY (Albany), and the University of Colorado.

Teaching assignments since 1936 have ranged from French, Latin, Math, English, and Mathematics, to a two year service as a Link Trainer Instructor for pilots during World War Two when Miss Hobbie was in the United States Naval Reserves as a WAVE.

The high quality of Miss Hobbie's professional performance have gained wide recognition. During the 1969 celebration of the 125th anniversary of SUNY at Albany, Miss Hobbie was presented with one of 125 Distinguished Alumnus Awards. In 1967 she was awarded the Bertha E. Brimmer Medal as an Outstanding Teacher by the Alumni Association at SUNY. From 1963 to 1966 she served as a member of the Regents Advisory Board for Teacher Education, Certification, and Practice.

Miss Hobbie is a member of Signum Laudis, the senior honor society at SUNYA, and Delta Kappa Gamma, the honorary Society for women in education.

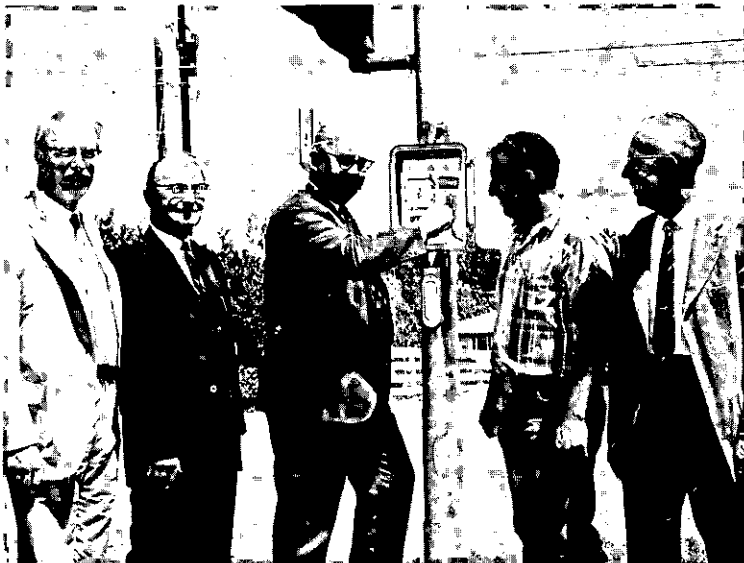

these dangers? Aetna has some advice:

You can start by having a "pro" choose the hitch you'll need and by letting him install it. This means the dealer who sells your make of car or some other well-established automotive expert who regularly handles this type of work. If you're doubtful, check with the dealer who sold you your trailer.

In other words, resist the urge to save a couple of dollars by buying the least expensive hitch or installing it yourself.

Next, and failure to take this step is probably trailering's most common error, cross the safety chains under the tongue of the hitch. This forms a loop that will catch the trailer tongue before it can dig into the ground should your hitch fail.

Also leave only as much slack in the safety chains as you'll need for proper turning of the vehicles.

On a recent weekend trip, a member of Aetna's engineering department found that 19 out of 20 people he saw pulling a trailer had their safety chains improperly installed.

Finally, read and believe in the instructions that come from the manufacturer of your trailer

and trailer hitch. Don't pull a heavier load that your rig was built for, and don't pull it under adverse speed, weather or road conditions.

If you'll just follow these few precautions, your summer travel plans should go off without a "hitch."

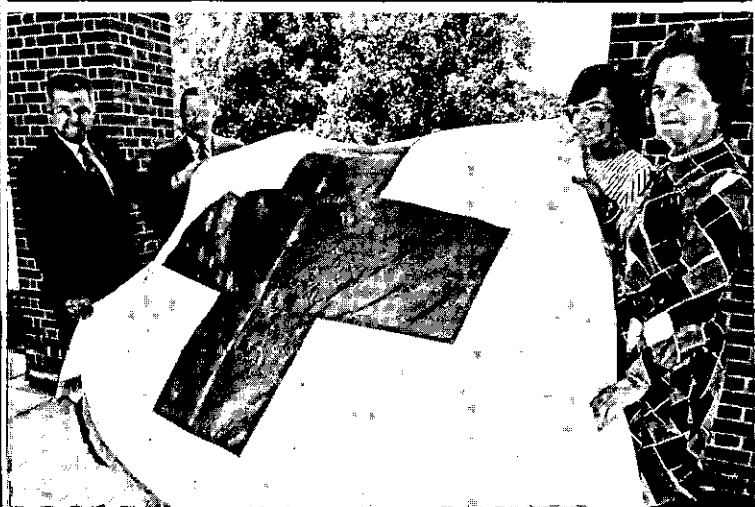

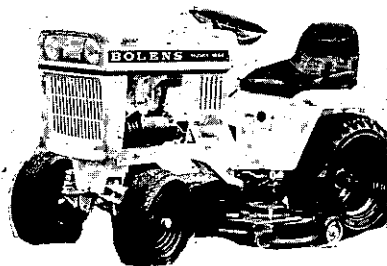

**Bugged Turkeys**

The State Conservation Department's Wildlife Research Unit has something new to crow about — a highly successful bit of "bugging" or electronic surveillance of turkeys by radio-telemetry. For the past 10 years the Department has been trapping and transferring as well as trapping and tagging turkeys in an effort to spread these magnificent game birds into all suitable habitat in the State.

One of the most important factors that had to be determined was just what constituted suitable habitat for turkeys. Initial predictions were that turkeys might be restored in approximately one-third of the State, principally in the Southern Tier woodlands and areas surrounding the Catskills and Taconics. The projections have proved to be accurate, but in addition, experimental "plants" have become established in the Adirondack foothills country of Fulton County — and, they seem to be spreading.

Joe Dell, Chief Wildlife Biolo-

gist for Research, explained that researchers have finally overcome one of their most difficult problems, keeping close tabs on birds after they have been liberated. Streamers and other visual markers have severe limitations in that observers have to move into the birds' territory to find them and in addition to being extremely difficult to do, this also disturbs the birds during critical breeding and nesting periods.

To get the needed information, research biologists utilized a light-weight radio transmitter to attach to birds when they were liberated. The transmitters were field tested for four years. Difficulties became evident in field use which could not be anticipated in the laboratory.

Dell said that one major shortcoming in the equipment was that the tiny whip antenna was vulnerable to the bird's pecking at it and thus putting the transmitter out of action. This year the transmitter was redesigned with the antenna built inside the harness — and it worked. Five hens were trapped in Fulton County in late winter, before the earliest breeding activity would begin. Using vehicular-mounted and hand-held receivers, the birds' position was established by triangulation. Monitoring over a period of several months established the following:

— The hens remained in their winter flocks until breeding season when they split up to follow their choice of toms;

— Location of a nesting hen was accurately determined shortly after she began incubating;

— After a long period of egg-laying and incubation, the oldest hen in the group hatched 15 of her 16 eggs on the evening of June 8;

Two days later, by carefully zeroing in on the hen with hand-held receivers, observers actually spotted the hen and nine of her young. According to Dell, an ardent bowler, "This is the equivalent of rolling two 300 games back-to-back."

The other four hens in the flock, conforming to anticipated patterns, nested later than the older, more mature hen. They are now incubating their clutches



of eggs and monitoring their locations is proceeding routinely.

Although only a small sample of turkeys in a given range are captured and "bugged," tracking them by radio-telemetry enables many additional visual sightings to be made. Making visual sightings ordinarily is a difficult matter since during breeding activity turkeys may be at any point in their average three - or four-square-mile range.

Having successfully demonstrated the effectiveness of the transmitter in locating and following birds, researchers will be able to more certainly identify suitable habitat and keep track of flock survival and breeding success. In turn, this will contribute to better management of this valuable wildlife resource, Dell concluded.

## Conservation Comments

### Black Bass

The fishing season for black bass opened statewide on Saturday, June 20, except for a few waters where it opened earlier. A bill passed this year brought Lake George, which has traditionally opened on August 1, in line with the rest of the State.

Fortunately, both the largemouth and the smallmouth bass are treated alike, for as obvious as the names are, the difference in size is relative, and really of little value without something to compare with. Compared with some fish the smallmouth actually has a fairly large mouth. The key point of comparison is the center of the eye. If the mouth extends behind a point directly below the center of the eye, it is a largemouth. If it stops short of the center of the eye, it is a smallmouth. A white spot at the rear of the gill cover is a good field identification mark characteristic of the smallmouth. A further check can be made by counting the scale rows on the cheeks; the largemouth has 11 rows and the smallmouth has 17 rows. They have different habitat

likes too, and even though they may both be in the same pond, they normally are in different portions of it. Look for the smallmouth where there are clear gravel bottoms to the lakes and streams. On the other hand, expect to find the largemouth over mud and in more sluggish conditions.

These habitat preferences adapt the largemouth to farm ponds. They also give the largemouth better potential for survival as waters are degraded with silt and heat pollution. Both fish must keep their eggs free of silt and prefer gravel or clean sand, but if none exist, the largemouth is adaptable enough to clean off firm bottom debris or roots like those of the cattail or bullrush on which to lay their adhesive eggs to keep them out of the underlying silt.

The male bass will guard its nest and fan it to keep it free of silt. Even after the young have emerged from the eggs and left the nest, he will remain with them for a short time, still vigorously defending them. Normally by the opening day, he has completed these duties and is off on his own again. By this time he has reverted to character and will readily cannibalize his own young. The slow start that spring got this year may have resulted in enough delay in spawning in some waters so that the males may not have all completed their parental duties. This should not seriously affect the overall production of young bass.

This aggressive attitude makes them a dominant fish in many waters they have invaded. This is particularly true of marginal trout waters, where they can drive out or eliminate the preferred trout. In the more limited space of trout streams, with colder water, and competing with others of their kind, they often produce only stunted populations. To counteract this, numerous streams and ponds are listed in the Hunting and Fishing Guide where they may be taken any time, or at least any time during the trout season.

Bass are long-lived fishes. Scale analyses for both species show some fish have survived 16

winters, with those reaching a dozen years not unusual. The largemouth, which lives in warmer water, usually grows a little faster, making the 10-inch legal limit in two years under good conditions, compared to three years required by smallmouth bass.

Most fishermen agree that the smallmouth puts up a better fight, but this may in part be because it comes from deeper cooler water. The largemouth is a real bulldog when first caught, but in the warmer shallow tires more quickly. When taken in cool water, however, it can keep up the struggle longer.

Studies of the mercury and DDT content of the flesh of bass are still underway, but initial samplings show that in most waters bass under 17 inches are within the safety tolerance for DDT. In Lake Ontario, bass 15 inches in length exceeded the tolerance level for DDT. The mercury level in fish from Lakes Erie and Ontario, the Niagara River, the Oswego River, and Seneca River below Onondaga Lake and Lake Champlain is under investigation. The Department does not recommend eating fish from these waters until more detailed information is available.

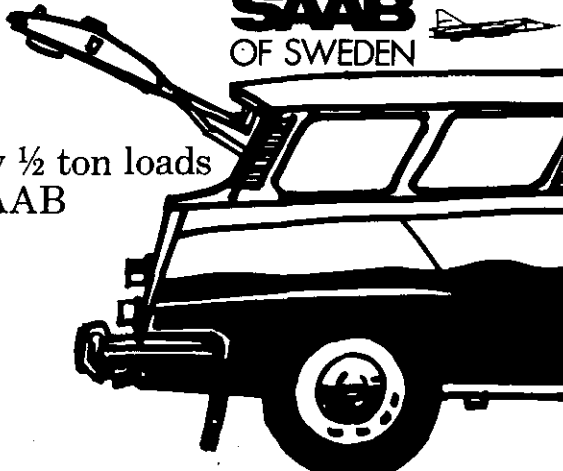

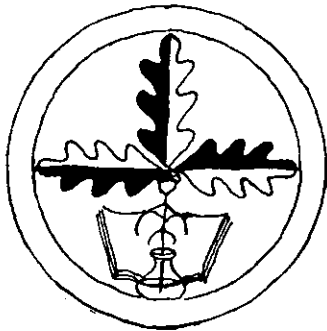
