## First State Police Patrol

A little more than a half century ago, Delmar saw the first New York State Police Patrol. The first two troopers assigned to this area were Sergeant Tom McQuade and Trooper Guy Moore.

Mr. McQuade, at 75, now lives on Wemple Road in Glenmont and is still very active in the building construction business. He was one of ten troopers picked by Doc Chandler, Superintendent of the State Police, to break the 250 wild horses which had been purchased and shipped here from the West.

He was second high man with a 98 average on the pistol range at the trooper camp in Syracuse.

Following his training Sgt. McQuade was assigned to the Lake George area. While stationed there he was kicked in the abdomen while feeding his horse. He was taken to Albany

Hospital where, after two serious operations and a six-month convalescence he returned to patrol duty — but no more horses — this time he was given a State Police auto — the year was 1918.

As a sidelight on Tom McQuade's life: he enlisted twice in the U.S. Army and was rejected in 1916 because of an injury received in boxing. He was a fine boxer who tried to break into the professional ranks at age 15 only to be thwarted by the efforts of his parents and Police Judge Brady.

Tom McQuade is an integral part of New York State's history and he has hundreds of true stories to prove it!

Dear Editor,

I strongly object to the article on the front of Spotlight, July 16, 1970. Although I agree with the writer's attitude (why was the article unsigned?) toward involvement, destruction, and several of the statements about the United States, in general, I feel that the comments about Communists were ill-founded, not thought out, and deeply erroneous.

The article said, "We must realize and never forget that we are engaged in a life or death struggle with a growing communist menace. Communists . . . would destroy freedom everywhere and enslave all mankind." These statements lack support, proof, and facts. When the American people adopt the attitude that another attitude other than democracy is wrong, then we threaten ourselves by inflicting hostilities. Americans are too often blinded by self-righteousness. The American democratic system is good. But that does not mean that we should say that no other political system is good. Communism offers a threat not so much to Americans as to Russians and Chinese.

The major reason why the United States is engaged in a war, now is because our fears of foreign countries, like Russia or China, prevent us from viewing the situation with reason. There is no logical reason why either Russia or China would want to turn their youth — their lifeblood — into a pointless war. Americans must take the first steps to reach out for peace. It is our responsibility to dissolve our bias and view the world and foreign nations with respect. For me to say that Communists are a threat is impossible. We are a threat to Communists. Hatred breeds wars. Hatred breeds de-

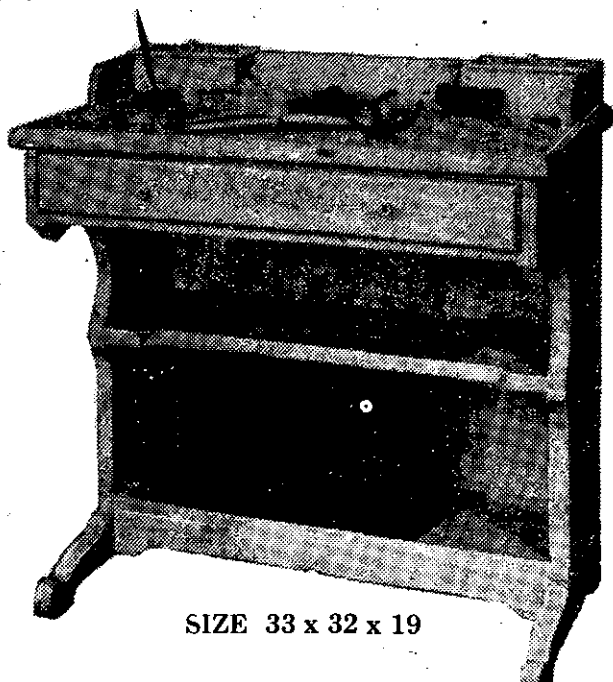

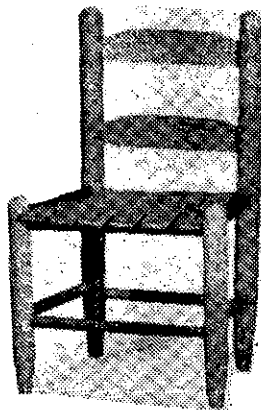

We must rely on ourselves, on the resources within our people and our country, to destroy the hatred which has risen. In conclusion, I would like to express the opinion that there is nothing which does more damage than the attitudes expressed in the Spotlight article. Don't be negative. Be positive. For once in modern times, yield support, not mistrust.

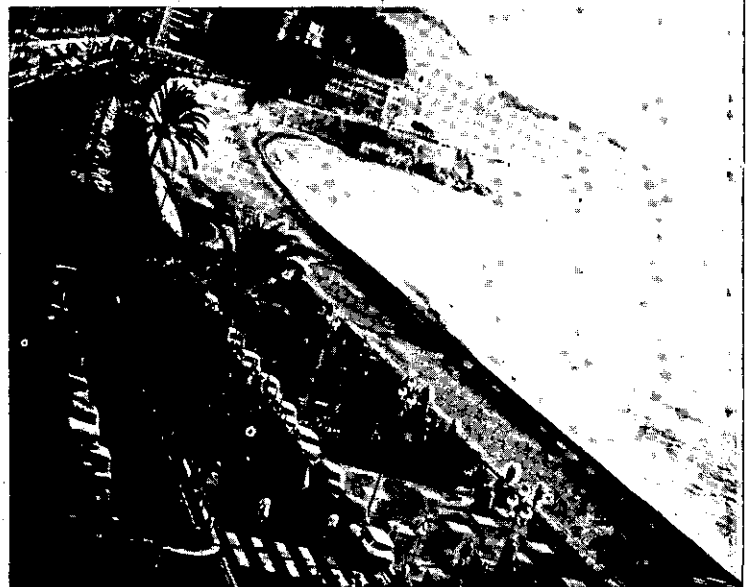
The picture was taken from the



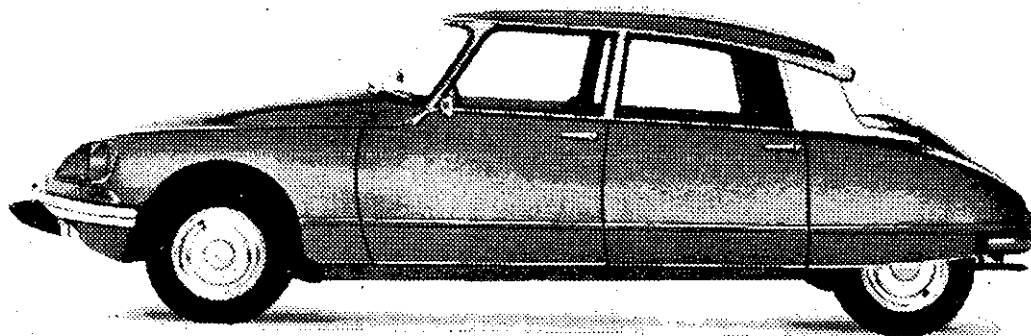

The board of directors of the Rensselaer County Historical Society has announced the appointment of Mrs. Breffny Ann Feely Walsh as the new director of the Historical Society.

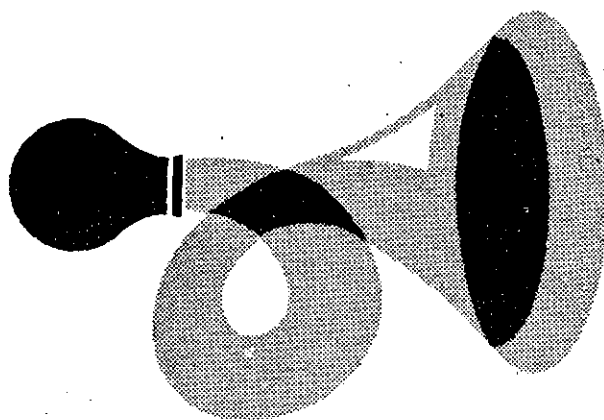

### ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM TO CONTROL THE DISPOSITION OF RUBBISH AND GARBAGE WITHIN THE TOWN.

The Town Board of the Town of Bethlehem does hereby ordain and enact the following ordinance:

Section 1. Legislative Intent. A clean, wholesome, attractive and healthful environment is decreed to be of importance to the health and welfare of the residents of the Town, and such environment is deemed essential

to the maintenance and continued development of the economy of the Town. It is further decreed that the unrestricted disposal of rubbish and garbage as herein defined, is a hazard to such health, welfare and economy necessitating the regulation, restraint and confinement thereof.

Section 2. Definitions. The term "person" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include an individual, society, club, firm, partnership, corporation or association of persons.

The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include waste material including papers, cartons, tin cans, scrap metal, bottles, plastic and cardboard containers, waste or discarded wood and lumber and any and all similar substances and articles.

The term "garbage" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include offal, waste good, dead animals or fowl or parts thereof, vegetable matter of any kind and any other waste or discarded matter which shall be either in-

flammable or capable of fermentation or decay.

Section 3. No person shall place or deposit, or permit or cause to be placed or deposited, any rubbish or garbage outside any building within the Town of Bethlehem, unless the garbage is properly and carefully contained within a covered metal, wooden or molded plastic receptacle, and the rubbish is properly contained within a covered metal, wooden or molded plastic receptacle or placed in an adequate solid (opaque) enclosure, which receptacle or enclosure shall be capable of holding the contents thereof within the confines of the said receptacle or enclosure so as to prevent the same from falling out, being blown about or in any way removed from the said receptacle or enclosure except for transmittal to a proper place of disposal.

Section 4. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent any person from placing any of the aforementioned articles, except those set forth under the definition of "garbage," on his


### Serious Maple Problem

It has been brought to my attention by concerned homeowners that there is an infestation in some parts of the Albany area of the maple leaf petiole borer. This little insect causes the base of the petiole (that section of the leaf that is attached to the twig of the tree) to be severed from the twig. The leaves fall off, and a tiny groove can be seen where the sever took place. To control this pest, spray the tree with sevin as soon as the damage is noticed, and at two-week intervals until mid-August.

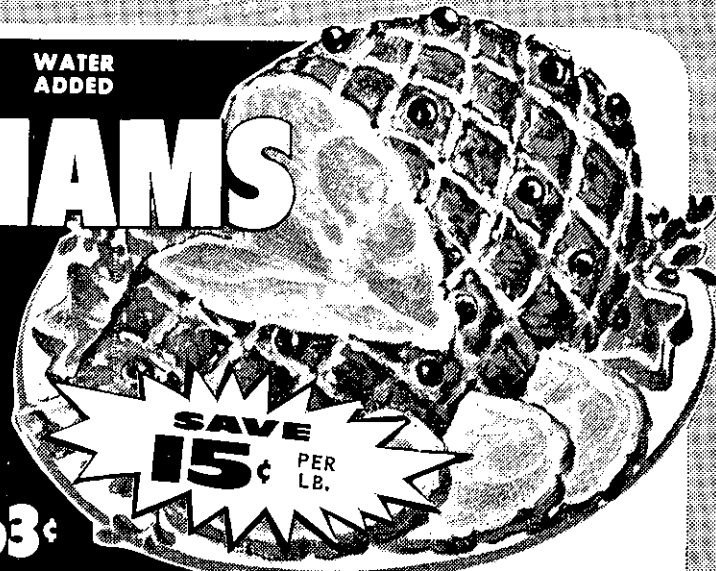

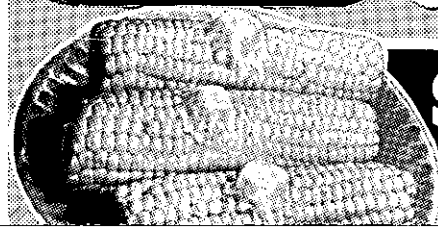

**Summer Storm Damage**

Severe winds during summer storms can cause much damage to trees and shrubs. Limbs can be broken, leaves torn and discolored, and bark shattered. After a bad storm, check for snapped limbs and remove them. Shape the wounds caused by these limbs by removing the bark to form an elliptical shape around the area. Then paint with a wound paint. Remove unsightly torn leaves where possible.

When planting in the future, try to avoid putting fast-growing,

weak plants in exposed windy areas without the benefit of a windbreak. A few plants to avoid are poplar, catalpa, willow, and silver maple.

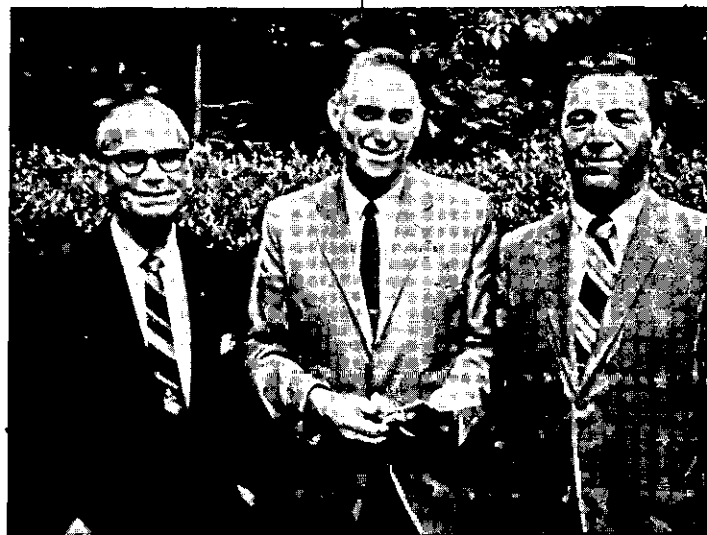

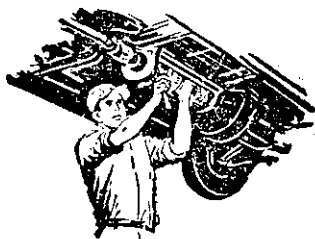

The State Court of Appeals recently enjoined the plant from continued pollution but provided that the injunction could be lifted upon determination of the cost of acquiring a permanent easement on the properties involved in the suit. The injunction has not been enforced in absence of this determination.

## For the Defense

A group of Ravena women who feel that reports of air pollution from Atlantic Cement Co. are exaggerated are forming the organization to improve the public image of the plant and town.

Mrs. Maye Driscoll, of 26 Central Avenue, Ravena, said that over 40 women, many of whose husbands work at the cement plant, have already attended two organizational meetings.

While the women admit the plant contributes to pollution they believe criticism of Atlantic Cement is out of proportion.

Mrs. Wesley Muller, of 64 Orchard Avenue Extension, Ravena, the wife of an employee at the cement firm, said she believes

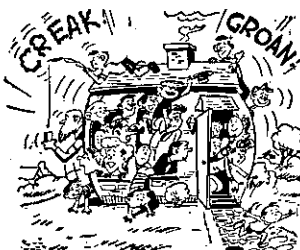

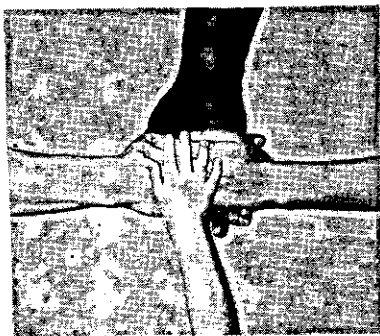

Persons attending the Institute may either live in at the Center or may commute during the five day program, although as Sister Paulet-

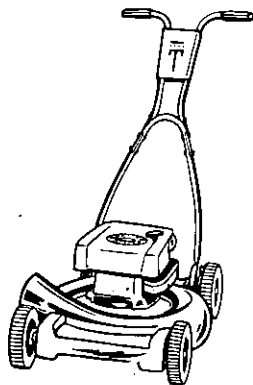

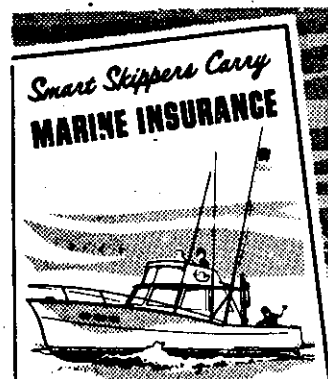

# COMPUTERS THAT SPEAK MAY SOON HELP YOU TRAVEL

The day may not be far off when you visit a travel agent, watch him dial an airline for reservations, hear a sweet, feminine voice tell him whether space is available on the flight you want—and realize that your travel agent is talking not to a girl, but to a computer!

Talking computers already exist.

And computer-aided systems are expected to confirm your reservations, order food for you, issue tickets, route your baggage, admit you to your plane, perform all the billing, and take care of many other details.

Before these Super-jet seventies are over, Jet Age Joe may use his touch-tone telephone to request a seat, speci-

fying flight number, class of service, departure city, destination and travel date. A gracious voice will immediately tell him if his seat is confirmed. And if Joe doesn't happen to speak English, the computer may talk to him in Spanish, French, German, Japanese, or some other language.

Joe may zip from the city to the airport on a computer-controlled monorail. Near the entrance to the terminal, he inserts his airline credit card into a passenger check-in device linked to a giant computer hundreds of miles away. After the electronic brain verifies that the card is not lost or stolen, Joe pushes several buttons, and his ticket and baggage tags, completely

printed, appear.

Joe places his bags on a conveyor belt which carries them to his flight. He then moves to the boarding area on a monorail or moving walkway, and inserts his ticket into a slot.

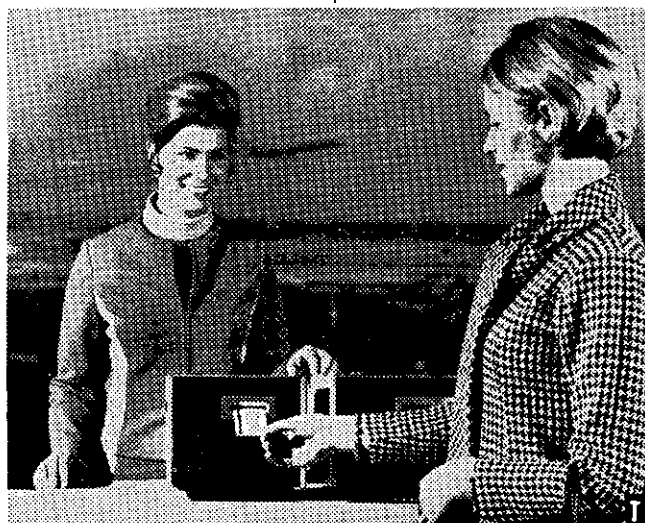
"Welcome aboard," says the soft, feminine voice, from the computer, as the gate opens automatically. A short walk down an enclosed ramp has Joe comfortably aboard an aircraft less than 30 minutes after he made his reservation.

Millions of Joe Jets will benefit from computer-aided

systems being developed by airlines to ease the people crunch at airports as air travel continues to boom and bigger and mightier super-jets enter service. An estimated 273-million people will travel by air in 1970. By 1975, the figure is expected to exceed 450 million passengers.

Comments E. C. Schwanke, national manager of airline marketing for Sperry Rand's Univac Division:

"In the 1970's, computers will expedite almost every facet of airline operations,

from reservations and ticketing to baggage handling, inter-airline communications, runway traffic, navigation and air traffic control.

"Univac, in conjunction with the airlines, is already developing automated or semi-automated passenger processing systems. These could include automated devices to verify credit cards, print tickets and boarding passes, and admit passengers to planes."

Credit cards and tickets or boarding passes would carry magnetically stored information which could be ready by special sensor equipment attached to computers, Schwanke adds. This equipment could obtain, directly from information on a credit card, all facts necessary for reservations and billing. Similar automatic gear at the gate—where the biggest bottlenecks occur—would quickly read data on tickets or boarding passes.

The credit card and ticketing devices could be placed at many remote locations outside the terminal, Schwanke points out. You could pick up your ticket, for instance, at travel agencies, hotels, or even the airport parking lot. This would mean that many people could bypass potential crowded areas.

"Within five years, self-service may be an established part of the airline industry," Schwanke asserts. Such systems, however, are expected to enter use gradually, partly to allow time for psychological adjustment.

Major airlines around the world are already using computers for reservations, inventory, passenger name records, flight operations, accounting and communications. An airline agent, for example, can confirm a reservation in a few seconds with a keyboard-equipped visual display device called a UNISCOPE. Queries to the computer—and the computer's responses—appear on the display.

In the decade ahead, computerized airline information systems will become more comprehensive and efficient. Vast, extremely-high-speed

computer-based data communication networks will allow instant exchange of information among the carriers, travel agencies, corporations and other organizations. To accomplish such results, airlines are expected to double their computer investments in the next five years and, perhaps, triple them within the decade.

Univac, because of its real-time communications expertise, has been an industry leader in providing computerized systems for the complex requirements of airlines. In 1958, it installed systems handling seat availability and flight information for Northwest Airlines, Eastern Airlines and Capital Airlines. Advanced systems using Univac computers are now operating successfully for eight airlines in the U. S. and eight international carriers, and are being installed in Federal Aviation Administration air traffic control facilities at 62 high density terminals throughout the country.

As air travel has boomed, computers have also become faster, and capable of handling many more tasks. Giant computer systems developed by Univac can now make as many as eight million calculations a second, handling reservations, billings, and many other functions simultaneously.

The computer may have to come up with an explanation for Jet Age Joe's wife. For the day is coming when she'll ask, "Who telephoned, dear?" and Joe will answer: "Just the computer, honey. She wanted to let me know which movies are available on tomorrow's flight."

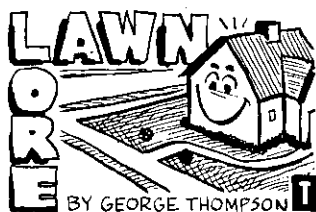

a fine quality turf with a cleaner cut. They generally are adjustable from one-half to two and one-half inches and spread clippings uniformly without leaving rows of cut grass behind. Reel mowers are more adaptable to grass-catcher attachments, are usually self-propelled but are harder to adjust for height of cut.

A rotary mower will tear grass if its blade is dull. Though it tends to scalp the lawn where there are small mounds, it is better suited to cutting tall vegetation. It's easier to trim around trees with it and in the fall a mulching attachment can be snapped on to pick up fallen leaves. Rotary mowers can be dangerous if not operated properly. The lawn should be free of rocks before mowing and hands and feet should be kept clear of the blade. Never let a child operate the mower, and never let watchers close by.

A good trimming shear is necessary to complement whichever mower type you should decide on. The shear is used around shrubs, trees, patios and sidewalks where your mower can't or shouldn't be operated. Here too, you have a choice—a manual tool or the Disston Cordless Electric Grass Shear. **Sprucing Up Your Lawn**

If the old sod has gone to seed—  
And you're plagued by devil weed—

If these spruce-up tips are heeded:

1. The best time to renew your lawn is between August 15 and September 15 in the North, or between early spring and summer in the South.

2. Set your mower to cut one inch above the soil and go over the entire lawn. Use the rechargeable Disston Cordless Electric Grass Shear where the mower can't go.



3. Lift crabgrass runners and thatch with rake, then rake again at 90 degrees to first raking. Mow again at one inch setting, remove debris and prepare soil for seeding.

5. Apply lawn food after seeding, but at half the normal rate. Select a lawn fertilizer with equal amounts of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. Too much nitrogen fosters tender top growth that is too easily winter-killed.
