



#### Herb Shop Opens

There is an exciting new shop in Delmar. It is called Shuttle Hill Herb Shop and it is tucked away behind Mullen's Pharmacy next to the A&P on the corner of Delaware and Elsmere Avenue. You can tell that you are getting near it by the enticing aromas that waft from the open door. They come from the herbs, spices, teas and other "smellgoodies" that are a part of the varied stock in the shop.

The most fragrant of all come from the Salisbury Road, Elsmere, garden of the proprietor, Martha Kurland. She is the wife of Dr. Norman D. Kurland, Assistant Commissioner for Planning in the State Education Department. Mrs. Kurland has been growing herbs and studying their uses for more than twenty years. Under her gracious guid-

ance a trip to the shop can be a tour of the herb and spice lands of the world, and a lesson in the culinary delights that can be concocted with them.

She is delighted when custo-

mers ask about the uses of the varied foods because, as she says, "Many people don't know of the many simple ways that herbs, spices and sauces can make good cooking even better and spark up

diet meals without adding calories or harmful additives. If I can help them learn, I have added spice to their lives and, hopefully, gained a regular customer as well. And for those who care about such things, everything is organically grown."

Some are even growing right there in the shop window and the potted plants are also for sale. One of the surprises is the variety and beauty of the dried plants on display. Many, Mrs. Kurland confided, are "weeds" cut along the roadsides all over the Capital District.

The most fragrant plants — lavender, roses and the like — are put up in attractive bags or available in a variety of potpourri arrangements. With them any home can have the gentle natural aroma that gives Shuttle Hill so much of its appeal.

Why name an herb shop Shuttle Hill? The clue is in the hand loom which stands as another point of interest in one corner of the shop. Mrs. Kurland is also a handweaver. That facet of her interest is represented by

Another of Mrs. Kurland's special interests is cats. For them she has a collection of goodies including a number of catnip products that throw cats into ecstacies of delight. If tri-village cats become catnip addicts, we know where the blame will lie.

One of the rare treasures for sale is a collection of fine reproductions of master drawings from European art museums that exactly reproduce the paper and colors of the originals. At \$2.50 and \$3.00 a piece, they are a bargain for anyone wanting a unique adornment for his walls or an unusual gift.

Speaking of gifts, Shuttle Hill has come to the area just in time to solve many a Christmas gift problem. "I hope to have interesting containers," Mrs. Kurland said, "so that people can pick out items they want and make the container a part of the gift."

All of the merchandise is displayed in a way that is a delight to the eye as well as to the nose. (Incidentally, Mrs. Kurland would welcome visits from the blind for whom the shop should have a special appeal.) Items for sale are set off against a backdrop of American antiques and primitives, many of culinary origin, that add a note of nostalgia to the overall decor. #### Safe Hallowe'en

To ensure the safety of human lives and properties during this year's Hallowe'en revel, Pinkerton's, Inc: today urged parents and property owners to participate in "Operation TOT."

Edward A. Williams manager of Pinkerton's Albany office, said "Operation TOT (Trick or Treat)" is a campaign to alert people of the vandalism and maliciousness which have replaced harmless pranks associated with the Hallowe'en holiday.

"In recent years, these traditional pranks have given way to more serious crimes against properties and individuals," Williams said. "Precautions must be taken early enough to avert potential harm and financial losses."

The manager cited increasing instances of children receiving dangerous pills, including barbiturates and sleeping tablets, in trick-or-treat bags. "I urge parents to instruct their children not to eat the treats until they return home — and then, only after they are thoroughly inspected," Williams said.

Additional ways to prevent injuries and accidents include:

- Cut fruit and candy bars into pieces to make sure they do not contain razor blades or metallic objects:
- Permit children to eat only those candies which are packaged and wrapped by the manufacturer; check them to make sure they have not been tampered with;
- Accompany children on their neighborhood rounds to lessen the threat of older children accosting the younger tots.

On the subject of safety in Hallowe'en costumes, Williams suggests:

• Light-colored costumes are more easily seen by motorists;

- Shorten costumes so children can walk with ease:
- Purchase only "flameproof" costumes as indicated on the labels:
- Light jack-o-lanterns with flashlights rather than with the traditional candles.

"In addition to protecting children, thought must be given to curbing the vandalism which is contributing substantially to the problems of the business' community, especially on Mischief Night (October 30)," the manager said. This year, Pinkerton's will provide businesses with more than 1,000 uniformed quards to discourage vandals.

Williams cites automobile dealers with open car lots, nurseries with shrubs displayed outdoors, and all-night establishments such as laundromats as particularly vulnerable hoodlumism. The manager said churches, synagogues and cemeteries are other areas for which security personnel should be considered during the Hallowe'en weekend.

"Because the holiday falls on a weekend this year, we expect vandals will be more numerous than before," Williams said, "but we have found uniformed guards to be most effective deterrents to mischief-makers." Hallowe'en is one of many special occasions when uniformed guards are used on a short-term contract basis.

"We at Pinkerton's hope that everyone will remember the catch-phrase 'Operation TOT' as a time to be concerned that young and old alike will enjoy this year's 'Hallowe'en by taking some precautions." he said.

gram was prepared by Mr. and Mrs. James Gersitz.


The next training session will be held on Wednesday, October 21, in the Methodist Church on Kenwood Avenue.

#### Geraniums

We have received a few calls concerning carrying geraniums over the winter and there are two possible solutions to this problem: either store them for

the winter or propagate new plants now from cuttings.

When storing, lift geraniums from the flower bed, cut back all shoots to three or four buds. Then prune the longer roots and pack close together in deep boxes with moist peat moss covering the roots. Place containers in a well lit, ventilated spot and water occasionally when the soil dries out. In spring, pot them up again for setting out in May.

To propagate by taking cuttings, use your old plants. The Agricultural Division of the Albany County Cooperative Extension Association states that for best results use new, healthy terminal wood about five inches in length. Treat lightly with a hormone powder (which is available from nurseries and florists or garden stores), and insert in pots or flats containing a sterilized media. When properly rooted - in about four to six weeks - transplant to individual pots. At this time, pinch out the terminal shoot and keep in a sunny window during the winter. If you do not pinch out the terminal shoot, then the plants will become tall and spindly. Pinching will cause a sturdier, bushy plant.

Remember, if a frost is predicted and you wish to keep the geraniums and other annuals from freezing, then drop a cloth over the plants before sunset and remove the next day before mid-morning. This will protect the plants and enable you to enjoy them for a longer period.



#### Quarterly Report

April's Project HYE (Help Your Environment) air pollution survey may be found in THE CONSERVATIONIST for August-September 1970. A slightly longer report, also written by Dr. Volker Mohnen, Director of Project HYE, will shortly be mailed to the 5000 volunteers living in the circular area with 15 mile radius centering on the Albany Air Port who placed sedimentation foils in their yards or on school grounds.

The weights of the individual Project HYE sedimentation foils which were exposed for the 30 days of April in over 150 locations in the Town of Bethlehem are now being plotted on a large map of the Town which will be displayed in a window of the A&P store in Elsmere for a two week period beginning October 7. Locations of the foils had been chosen on the basis of geographic spread

and population density and, of course, depended also on the location of the homes of those volunteering for the project.

The average weight of non-water-soluble particles adhering to the foils exposed in the Town of Bethlehem for the month of April was 7.9 mg. per foil exposed surface of 25 square centimeters. This is relatively low as compared, for example, with the average value of 12.6 mg. for Coeymans or 15.2 mg. for Watervliet. Individual foil weights varied from a low of 1.9 mg. to a high of 24.0 mg.

The Bethlehem Project HYE volunteers proved to be both interested and reliable. At the end of the foil exposure period they returned 95% of the sedimentation foils assigned to them — the highest percentage of the entire project area. Only two of the devices had been stolen, two had

For the 174 regular sedimentation foils and 22 special control foils assigned to Bethlehem there were 175 more volunteers than needed, another indication of interest in the project and concern for the environment.






