Anne Frank was 13 years old when they went to the attic, and she kept a day by day diary of the people and events. At last they were found and dragged off to the camps. Anne herself died in a concentration camp, but her father survived the war and later found her diary.



Winning Season

The BCHS freshman football team concluded a winning year October 30 defeating Burnt Hills 16-14 to finish first in the Suburban Council with a five and one record.

The Young Eagles started fast by easily overpowering Columbia 24-0 in the first game. Not showing in the score was the way they were able to push Columbia around the field scoring two or more touchdowns that were called back after penalties.

The next game against Guilderland was much tougher and BC came from behind to score twice on long runs by Butch Levine in the fourth quarter to win 14-6. Then came a 22-6 win over Scotia before the roof fell in at Shaker. Unable to get any kind of offense going at all, the defense after holding off Shaker all day finally gave up a score late in the game and the Eagles lost their only game of the season 6-0.

That defeat by a Shaker team that hadn't won yet this year seemed to generate more life into the Eagles as they faced a big strong Schenendehowa team and playing their best game of the year won 22-6 behind some fine line play by Co. Capt. Mike Reagan. The big offensive play in that game was a 60-yard scoring pass from Bill Donlon to Butch Levine.

In the final game of the year BC seemed to have the game easily won as Greg Brannick ran 48 yards for one score and three plays later Jeff Young ran 45 yards with an interception for another. After that the Eagle line stopped anything Burnt Hills had with Jeff Vadney and Gary Manilenko doing a great job. However in the last few minutes of the game BC gave up the ball deep in its own territory three times on mistakes, leading to two Burnt Hills scores.

Outstanding for the Young Eagles this year were Butch Levine who scored seven touchdowns and a two point conversion for 44 points; fullback Greg Brannick whose constant hard drives into the middle set up Levine; defensive back Jeff Young; linemen Mike Reagan,





Bigger Season

New York State's big game hunters seem to be off to an unusually good season on the elusive black bear this year. During the special early bear season which ran from October 1 through 15, nimrods bagged 66 bruins, more than twice as many as were taken during the early season last year. The special early bear season was held in order to alleviate problems caused by bears destroying private property.

Two noteworthy bears were reported taken during the early season. One was an adult male estimated at 450 pounds, taken in the Tupper Lake area of Franklin County. The other bear was a 100 pound adult male taken in the Town of Colton, St. Lawrence County by an archer. Bears are difficult enough to get with a rifle, so taking one with bow and arrow is a real accomplishment for any hunter.





by telephone. A toll-free number has been established for this purpose with directions supplied to each big game hunter on his back tag. Successful hunters are asked to donate the bottom jaw of their trophy for examination. Since a realistic plastic substitute is used in most taxidermy mounts anyway, hunters are generous in making the jaws available for study. In fact, more than twice as many jaws have been collected this season than last.

The information collected will be used to help develop management practices to insure a sound bear population for future hunting and other enjoyment. The excellent cooperation of hunters in reporting their success has made the program extremely effective this year.

Examining the early season bear take by counties, we find Hamilton County leading again. This rugged Adirondack area represents the finest bear range in the State. The take was: Hamilton, 26; St. Lawrence, 14; Essex, 8; Franklin, 5; Warren, 5; Clinton, 4; Herkimer, 3; Oneida, 1. Lewis County was the only county open for the special bear season in which no bears were taken.

The hunter success ratio was also up during the special early bear season. An estimated 6,000

hunters, of 6,596 permit holders, took 66 bear. This was a ratio of one bear taken for every 91 hunters. The comparable figure last year was 1:159. Even though the chances of killing a bear are slight for any individual hunter, the odds are far more favorable than during the regular season when approximately one hunter in 350 bags a bear.

The regular bear season remains open through December 1 for most of the State. It remains open until December 16 in Greene, Sullivan and Ulster Counties as well as a portion of Delaware County. For complete details consult the 1970-71 Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide.

ABC BETHLEHEM CENTRAL Schools

QUESTION: Is any aspect of sex education included in the presently-used health curriculum? Is it true that teachers have been directed not to answer questions from pupils relating to sex?


ANSWER: State-mandated health courses are now being taught in the elementary schools and on the 10th grade level. Curriculum is being developed for a health course at the Middle School, also mandated, which will start next year.

Sex education is not included in any of the health courses. The health educators have been told not to discuss questions relating to sex education, and have informed their classes they cannot do so.

The present policy of the Board of Education (adopted July 1, 1969) is that no sex education is being taught in our schools.

As previously publicized, however, study groups made up of persons from the community are now investigating what — if any — aspects of sex education should be re-introduced in the school curriculum. The study is expected to take about three months, after which time specific recommendations will be made to the Board of Education.

QUESTION: We are a retired couple with a total income of more than \$5,000 per year, so we do not qualify for a school tax exemption up to 50 per cent of the assessed valuation of our property. Wouldn't it make sense, however, to extend this exemption policy so that, for

example, those with an income of between \$5,000 and \$7,000 might be exempted up to 45 per cent, those with an income of between \$7,000 and \$9,000 exempted up to 40 per cent, etc.?

ANSWER: The local taxing unit, in this case the school district, cannot make such changes in the exemption statute. Local taxing units may or may not adopt the tax exemption policy as spelled out by the state, but if they do adopt it, they must follow it without any changes.

In previous years, the maximum permitted income for the tax exemption has been \$3,000. After a hearing held last Thursday night, the Board of Education acted to adopt the \$5,000 figure, made possible by a change in the statute this year.

QUESTION: What does the school social worker do?

ANSWER: Mrs. Betty J. Lornell is employed by the school district on a part-time basis as a social worker. She provides direct service to children and families who have serious problems.

Although Bethlehem is regarded as a privileged community, there have been many referrals where food, clothing, and shelter were primary problems which have needed to be corrected in order to improve a child's attendance and achievement.

Alcoholism, use of drugs, broken homes and other emotional disturbances are also serious problems affecting children who have required the services of the school social worker.

As a member of the Pupil Personnel Services Staff, the social worker serves as a liaison person with the schools, homes, and community agencies. During the past school year, she had direct contact with 81 pupils, visited 71 homes, counseled with 32 parents at schools, and made 98 contacts with other community agencies.

According to Mrs. Lornell: "My main concern is to help school children whose development is affected by social problems." All of her records are completely confidential.

Snowmobile Law

Owning or operating snowmobiles will be a little more complex after January 1, 1971.

One aspect of the new law affects youthful operators. "On and after October 1, 1971, no person 10 years and over and who has not reached his sixteenth birthday shall operate a snowmobile in the state, except upon lands of his parents or guardian unless and until he has received safety training as prescribed by the commissioner, and has received the appropriate safety certificate issued by the commissioner."

Albany County 4-H, in coopera-

tion with the New York State Division of Marine and Recreational Vehicles, has scheduled a Snowmobile Safety Instructors Institute for all interested adults on Thursday, November 19, at 8 p.m. The meeting will be held at the Guilderland branch of the National Commercial Bank & Trust Company, corner of U.S. Route 20 and Route 155, Guilderland.

Mr. Arthur Dunn, representing the New York State Division of Marine and Recreational Vehicles will conduct a meeting covering, four basic areas: 1) a review of the Snowmobile Law, 2) the safety training program, instructors, sessions, etc., 3) forms and teaching material available, and 4) tips for instruction of the youthful operator.



New Project

Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation and William J. Donlon, Administrative Vice President of Niagara Mohawk's Eastern Division

signed contracts today for a research project that will look into possibilities of using thermal discharges from electric power generating stations as a means of climate control. It is hoped that the information obtained will indicate how thermal discharges could be used for raising animals and growing crops under controlled temperature conditions.

The project, an outgrowth of the Beneficial Uses of Thermal Discharge Conference held in Albany in September, is the first of its kind undertaken in New York State by a utility company and is the first major assignment of the Department's recently formed Office of Recovery, Recycling and Reuse. The research will be conducted by Ronald Stewart of the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center at the State University of Albany and will be under the direction of John Mathur, Director of the Department's RR&R unit.

The project, which is expected to take a year to complete, is funded by a \$25,000 grant shared by the Department of Environmental Conservation and Niagara

Mohawk. The funds will be used for a researcher, instrumentation and a 10 by 40 foot air structure. Students will participate in the actual research work.

Heated water will be piped from Niagara Mohawk's Glenmont power station to the structure which will be near the plant. The heat will be fed through pipes in the soil, dry heat exchangers and sprayed into the air inside the structure.

Commissioner Diamond said, "One of the keys to solving our environmental problems is re-using and recycling waste products. I'm pleased that our Department has entered into this agreement with Niagara Mohawk to investigate ways to convert waste heat into an environmental advantage," Diamond said. "Without Niagara Mohawk's cooperation this kind of project would not have been possible."

Mr. Donlon said, "While we are aware of our obligations to provide reliable electrical energy whenever and wherever it is required, we are equally aware of our role in the enhancement of the environment in the use of our electric facility. We are glad to participate in this unique project."

"If thermal discharge is going to be considered for climate control by individuals or industry," Commissioner Diamond said, "then data on the possibilities

and limitations of this procedure must be available. This is what we want to learn from this project,"

Interior door handles are recessed. All four doors are fitted with safety locks. As an added feature, child-proof safety catches are utilized on rear doors to prevent them from being opened accidentally.

Interior comfort is assured with a powerful heating and ventilation system. In addition, there is a flow-through ventilation system with upper level vents in the instrument panel. These vents are adjustable for both direction and air volume. Air flows through the passenger compartment and out extractor vents, which are located just behind the rear doors on the pillars. The system may also be operated when the car is standing still, with the blower fan providing ventilation.

Big, wide windows insure excellent all-around visibility. Forward vision is particularly good because of the sloping hood. An effective windshield defroster and long-blade wipers provide superior visibility under adverse weather conditions.

The instrument panel is designed to collapse progressively under impact and both the instrument panel and steering wheel are padded for safety. The rear view mirror is designed to break away under impact.





Aircraft To Set New Comfort Standards



A new aircraft is coming to America, to be introduced by Eastern Airlines in November of 1971. It is a remarkable aircraft, but not in the usual ways. It isn't going to be the biggest, nor the fastest. It can't fly the farthest or the highest.

But this aircraft - the Lockheed 1011 - which Eastern calls Whisperliner, does two things of vital importance for the public.

1. It is going to be the most personalized and comfortable aircraft in service. The seats were specially designed for maximum comfort, the ceilings are eight feet high, the two aisles are wide and probably most important of all, there is no longer a middle seat. Every first class or coach passenger is on an aisle, or the next seat over. It is the right size: spacious yet intimate - with all of the warmth of your own living room.

2. It is going to be a good neighbor aircraft. Unlike some of the very large aircraft, the Whisperliner can operate economically and efficiently from medium-size airports as well as span the nation non-stop. Its three high bypass ratio fanjet engines will reduce smoke, pollution and noise considerably below that of present aircraft which, in turn, were a major advance over the first generation of jet aircraft.

Starting late in 1971 it will serve many millions of people in this country, while respecting the rights of people on the ground.

The Whisperliner will accommodate 268 passengers.


Food service promises to be the best and most efficient yet, with quick-heating infrared ovens in a lower level. Elevators will bring the fresh, hot food to the passenger level, where flight attendants will distribute it by carts designed to do their job graciously without getting in the way.

A variety of passenger services innovations have been developed especially for the Whisperliner, including soft interior lighting and polarized windows which adjust from full daylight to blackness by the push of a lever. Individual over-head racks will secure wig boxes, gifts and other precious carry-on luggage, while outer garments are safely stored in special clothing compartments, or near at hand in between-seat coat racks. With increasing family travel in mind, Whisperliner will also provide private baby changing facilities.

Eastern has such faith in this aircraft that it plans to receive 50 of them, at \$15 million each, and has established the special training and support operations for this vast new fleet.

A Child's Eye View



A child's world is a place he can see, touch, hear and feel; a world of concrete, tangible things. He learns by looking, holding, asking, exploring . . . and then draws his own imaginative conclusions. But his observations often resemble nonsense to the logical adult intellect. It takes some attentive listening and observing, patience and flexibility. How often do we — as adults — employ an often-used word assuming a young child understands it? "Till one day, at the dinner table, we're shocked to hear a bright four-year-old asking "Mommy, what does it mean to 'waste'?" He's been admonished often enough "don't waste" this or that. We took it for granted he knew the meaning. Following a simple explanation, it may become virtually unnecessary to again remind him "don't waste" anything. Fur-

thermore, it's delightfully amusing to eavesdrop while he's scolding the cat about his fussy eating habits.

QUESTION: I want to add a \$25,000 life insurance policy to my present \$25,000 (I also have a \$15,000 group policy at the office). Could you tell me roughly what this might cost me?

ANSWER: It depends on your age and on the kind of policy you buy.

Some policies pay the \$25,000 only if you die.

Other policies (which cost more) pay the \$25,000 even if you don't die, provided you reach the age stipulated in the policy—60, 65, or some other age, depending on the policy you buy.

Some policies have a dividend. The dividend can be used to reduce your premium or used for several other purposes, but the net effect is to reduce your premium payment whatever end use is chosen.

Other policies have no dividend but smaller initial premiums.

Some policies will pay \$25,000 no matter when you die. Other policies pay this sum only if you die the first year. They pay less if you die the second year after taking the policy, still less the third year, and so forth. This kind of policy obviously costs less than the \$25,000 no matter "when" kind.

Tips On Upholstery Care

Time spent keeping upholstered furniture clean today will pay dividends in longer life and better looks. Upholstered furniture represents a substantial investment, and it merits planned and careful care. Soil and stain unattended soon become difficult, if not impossible, to remove. Here are some tips for keeping your upholstered furniture in like-new condition:


CARE BEGINS BEFORE YOU BUY . . . Before you buy any upholstered furniture, ask yourself, "How will it wear and clean?" Most fabrics used today are blends of different yarns. Durability and shrinkage cannot be determined for every blend on the market and do not correspond with the characteristics of fabrics rated individually. Generally, tighter fabric weaves indicate quality and give longer wear.

ROUTINE UPHOLSTERY CARE . . . Vacuum once a week and reverse cushions. Keep furniture away from direct sunlight. Brush with "soft" brush only (stiff bristles can damage fabric fibers). Remove spots immediately. Use partial slip covers (on arm and head rests since they receive the most wear).

RECOMMENDED CLEANING PRODUCTS . . . For synthetic fibers and cotton you may use light-duty detergent foam (but this is risky because the liquid may cause over-wetting and also must be rinsed). Or use Upholstery Shampoo specially formulated to dry into solid, hard crystals for easy removal by vacuuming. For leather, use saddle soap, paste wax, leather preservative or Upholstery Shampoo. For plastics, use a mild detergent and water solution or Upholstery Shampoo. For fabric over foam rubber, use Upholstery Shampoo (never use spirit solvent cleaning fluids because they can damage the rubber padding.)






