


Committee Formed

College Board for Juniors - March 6, April 17 (SAT only) and May 1 (Achievement only) - In planning for College Board tests this year, we recommend that eleventh graders take the morning Scholastic Aptitude Test in March or April and the afternoon achievement tests in May. Please note that only the SAT is offered on April 17 and only the Achievement tests on May 1. This is a difference from last year. Test applications are available in the Guidance Office and you must plan on registering at least one month in advance.





their research by writing to various universities and state departments requesting material and literature. There was an overwhelming response on the part of the universities and the other Ecology agencies. Among the many who responded are: the Conservation Department of New York State, University of Notre Dame, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, New York University and the Environmental Studies Institute of Syracuse.

Various members of the community were impressed by the students' displays and posters and offered to give their time for lecture periods.

The displays included posters, bulletin boards, research material, pamphlets and three dimensional objects. One popular place was a "pollution garden" filled with papers, auto parts, dead trees and surrounded by a can and bottle fence. Detergent bottles and boxes were lined up in the school windows to show those which are high in phosphate content.

The sixth graders also prepared various talks, art works and tests for grades kindergarten through 8. Groups of children taught each class facts about air and water pollution and reinforced concepts with posters, pictures and talking robots.

Mexican Pottery

Miniature pottery figures in typical poses of people of the Mexican countryside are on display currently in the Bethlehem Library. These dolls are from Tlaquepaque, a small village near Guadalajara in Mexico. Originally, this town (pronounced Tuh-lack-y-packy) produced some lovely pottery, but much of its current products have deteriorated as its popularity with tourists has increased. However, 10 of these figures were located in the fall of 1969 with diligent search and careful selection. The other three shown were purchased 20 years earlier, when the owners lived in Mexico, and the faces of the older dolls seem to be even more minutely sculptured than the newer group, perhaps indicating that this will soon be a lost

art. Comparison of the two ragged old men in particularly rewarding, for the current one's clothes seem much more artificial, and the patches less natural, though both heads are excellent.

It is intriguing that the same poses are still being produced over all these years, with slight variations. The charcoal vender, the water carrier, the flower girl - each represents an activity that still exists in the rural areas of Mexico. This fine clay sculpture is particularly fragile, being so delicate, but this is also true of most Mexican pottery, for a number of reasons. Unless it is produced in a factory, or well-organized studio, much pottery is fired only once or twice at night in wood or charcoal burning kilns, in order to gauge the temperature from the color of the flames, and is thus soft and breakable. In addition, even the Mexican craftsmen are extremely skillful, and could easily produce more durable pottery, they perhaps unconsciously don't want to, for historically religious rea-

sons, when plate-breaking was a religious ceremony. One author, James Norman, wrote in his book "In Mexoco: The fragility of their ware, I believe, is deeply rooted in their sense of tragedy and fatalism which dates beyond pre-Columbian times, and which still affects their psychology."

The dolls are in the display case along with 2 hand-loomed "re-boxos," or stoles, in brilliant Mexican shades, serving as a background for a black lacquered hand-painted tray from Uruapan, a nearby town in the state of Michoacan. It illustrates the type of "charola" that one of the older dolls carries in his back-pack, but whose trays have sadly been broken over the years.

The collection was brought in by Mrs. F. W. Montanari, a library staff member, who lived in Mexico from 1949-53, while her husband was assigned there with the U.S. technical aid program, helping with water and public health problems. They returned

again for a month a year ago, when he was doing some consultation work for the Pan American Health Organization, at which time the new additions to this collection were purchased.

Fish Safe

Lake Champlain ice fishermen got some good news today from Henry L. Diamond, Commissioner of Environmental Conservation. "Smelt, eight inches and under, are safely below the 0.5 parts per million of mercury," he said. That figure is the "actionable level" set by the Federal Food and Drug Administration. Fish above this level may not be offered for sale.

Smelt fishing through the ice is a very popular winter pastime on Lake Champlain for several reasons. Chief among these is the fact that these fish are top-notch table fare. The news that most of those caught are con-

sidered safe for eating is welcome indeed.

After exhaustive testing of fish taken from Lake Champlain, Department of Environmental Conservation experts report that the vast majority of smelt taken, 90 percent or more, are under eight inches in length and well below the 0.5 ppm mercury level. Larger fish need not be wasted, however, they may either be used as bait or returned to the water for breeding.

The general mercury warning issued last year by the Department for Lake Champlain still remains in force and anglers are cautioned that the green light has been given solely for this one species - smelt.

Safety Program

Three area residents involved in accident prevention programs are scheduled to participate in a safety program of the New York State Health, Physical Education and Recreation Association at the Concord Hotel in Kiameshia Lake from January 14-17.

Dr. E. Wayne Harbinger, state chairman of the committee on physical fitness and sports medicine for the New York State Osteopathic Society, will discuss and demonstrate first aid for injuries acquired in athletic events.



Answers about..... BETHLEHEM CENTRAL Schools

QUESTION: What is the present situation with regard to the availability of Driver Education instruction for High School pupils, and is anything being done to make this course available to more pupils?

ANSWER: At present, the school district employs one fulltime Driver Education teacher, John Nyilis, and is in the process of expanding the course offering by either 1) Hiring another full-time teacher as of the second semester of this year, or 2) Initiating after-school classes as of the second semester.

Only seniors are permitted to take Driver Education during the regular school year and a total of 72 have signed up to take it this second semester. They can all be accommodated through either of the above-named alternatives. If a qualified instructor is approved by the Board of Education within the next few weeks, he will be hired on a full-time basis.

To be admitted to the Driver Education course, pupils must be 16 years of age at the time of registration and must have a driver's permit. They will not be admitted if they already have a driver's license.

School district teenagers also have the opportunity to enroll in a summer Driver Education course. There will be three, and possibly four, teachers for the Bethlehem Central School District for Driver Education instruction next summer. With three teachers, 96 pupils could be accommodated.

Pupils are enrolled in the summer courses with seniors given first preference, juniors next, and sophomores last.



2. Never leave dead elm wood or brush on your property.
3. Have drain tubes installed in any of your elms that have wetwood (Slimeflux) condition.




