





Mr. Brossman is associate executive director of the New York State School Boards Association, and Mr. Streiff is director of regional services for the New York State Teachers' Association. Both are residents of Bethlehem township.

Moderating the program will be Prof. Vincent O'Leary of the School of Criminal Justice, SUNY who has children in the Elsmere School. The meeting, open to the public, starts at 8 p.m. Questions from the audience will be invited.

In presenting the viewpoints of their respective organizations, both speakers will draw on backgrounds of classroom teaching and administrative experience.

Mr. Brossman taught in high schools on Long Island, later became an associate professor of industrial arts at State University at Buffalo, and served as assistant to the director of the industrial arts division of the college. The School Boards Association, with which he has held his present position since 1958, represents 757 member school boards.

Mr. Streiff began his career in education as a teacher in Colorado public schools. He later became director of field services for the Colorado Education Association, and subsequently field representative for the National Education Association in Washington, D.C. He joined the New York State Teachers' Association in 1964.

QUESTION: If our school district were to adopt the extended or year-round school schedule, how would it be possible for all children in a family to have the same vacation periods?



## Poet Laureate

Dr. Robert S. Herman, Chairman of the Department of Economics at Union College, Schenectady, New York, recently was named Senior Poet Laureate of the National Association of Professional Bureaucrats (NATA-PROBU), an organization of corporate, academic and governmental bureaucrats dedicated to dynamic inactivism.

"Competition for this distinguished post was keen," said Dr. James H. Boren, NATAPROBU president. "In fact, Dr. Herman almost lost out because he failed to provide a security clearance and to fill out an application form."

Boren said that Herman's letter, although violating NATAPROBU philosophy by its infor-

mality, won the coveted post.

Boren noted that Herman did not ask to be poet laureate, but requested that he be made "a Deputy Commissioner in Charge of Developing a Conceptual Framework for Versifying the Infrastructure."

Also, Boren said, Herman promised, in submitting his two poems, that "If accepted I shall write more - after developing alternative means of reaching the objective, classifying these, sorting out priorities, optimizing the implications, implementing, and of course, doing an evaluation of the entire methodology."

Boren commented: "Who could resist a bureaucrat who so truly has captured the spirit of dynamic inactivism?"

The programs are a culmination of the efforts of Stanley Ringel, President of the Jewish Family Service, Joseph Bochever, Past President of the Jewish Family Service, Mrs. Samuel Wolk of the JFS, Mrs. Israel Michelore of JFS, Mrs. William Barrett, II, JFS, Ralph Insel, Executive Director of the JFS, Mrs. Charles Lieberman of the JFS and Center Board of Directors, A. Abba Koblenz, Center President, Samuel Kurzon, Executive Director of the Center and Jay Bachrach, Program Director of the Center.

The sessions are open to all members of the family in the community. The focus will be on the different roles people have in the family. How family members learn and assume these roles and the functions these roles serve. Emphasis will also be on the difficulties which ensue in a family when the various roles go awry.

The second program will be held on Tuesday, February 23 at 8:00 P.M. The programs will encourage questions and answers and discussion from all members of the family who attend; focus will also be on the difficulties families face in the troubled times in which we live. This includes problems of children growing up in the pressures of today as well as problems of aged parents.

The two leaders of the programs are well qualified for their assignment. Dr. Klein is Curriculum Chairman at the Social Work School at S.U.N.Y. Before coming to Albany, he was a professor at the Graduate School of Social Work at the University of Pittsburgh where he was a specialist in Human Behavior and Social Environment and Group

Work and was Chairman of the Curriculum Committee. He also has taught at the School of Social Work at the University of Toronto and the Boston University School of Social Work. Dr. Klein is also a lawyer with an LLB from the N.Y. State Bar. He received his masters degree in Social Work from Columbia University and is known nationally as an outstanding figure in the field, having lectured, written and participated in a wide variety of projects in the field of social work for the National Institute of Mental Health, Technoma Craig House for Emotionally Disturbed Children, the V.A., Child Guidance Clinics, Children's Bureaus and has been a consultant on Social Work Education in Hong Kong.

Dr. Donald Filippi is the Chief of Child Psychiatry and Associate Professor in the Dept. of Psychiatry of the Albany Medical College. Prior to that, he was with the Department of Preventive Psychiatry and the Children's Division of the Menninger Foundation where he consulted with the Topeka, Kansas public schools and St. Vincent's Home, a residential treatment center. He also trained psychiatric residents and fellows in an out-patients' clinic. He has served as a mental health consultant to the Topeka children and youth project. From 1963 to 1967, he was a research child psychiatrist with the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration and prior to that was with the Kansas Treatment Center for Children and Family Service and Guidance Center, a child guidance clinic and family service agency in Topeka.

He is certified from the Menninger School of Psychiatry in general and child psychiatry. He is a fellow in the American Psychiatric and the American Orthopsychiatric Association and a member of the Academy of Child Psychiatry and the Academy of Psychotherapy.



helping New York apple growers produce bigger and better quality crops.

Known as "Alar" in the trade, the chemical keeps apples on the tree in prime picking condition beyond normal harvest time, thus enabling growers to stretch their busy harvest schedules.

Predicting wider use of this growth regulating chemical in the immediate future, Prof. Louis J. Edgerton, chairman of the Department of Pomology at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture Cornell University, said the method represents one of the major technological innovations for the fruit industry.

Cleared by the government for commercial use on apples in 1968, Alar has been used increasingly by growers during the past few years; thus far it has been used mainly on McIntosh, the most popular fresh market variety widely grown in the state.

The problem with some varieties such as McIntosh is that fruit ripens fast and drops off the trees before growers have time to pick the crop at the peak of harvest time.

If harvest is delayed, loss resulting from premature drop is as much as 25 per cent and sometimes up to 50 per cent or more in severe years.

Alar delays fruit maturity, thus preventing costly fruit drop for as long as one to two weeks, Prof. Edgerton explained. In addition to controlling fruit drop, the chemical increased the red color, promotes firmness of fruit at harvest, and delays the development of water core in certain varieties.

Now found useful for other varieties, including certain varieties for processing, Alar, however, has some drawbacks unless it is used properly, the Cornell pomologist pointed out.

Two major side effects Alar produces are a heavier fruit set on Alar-treated trees the following year and inadequate control over fruit drop in some orchards, he said.

These problems, he said, can be prevented if Alar is used properly, and the advantages and benefits from its proper use far outweigh the occasional deficiencies growers have experi-

enced during the past few years.

**New Name**

The Conservation Department, an integral department of the N.Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell University, since 1948 has been renamed the Department of Natural Resources.

The new name reflects a change in both academic programs and public attitude from one of conserving renewable resources in an unchanging state to one of utilizing these resources in a wise and effective manner.

Prof. Dwight A. Webster, head of the department, explained that the name change was effected because "the term conservation is an ethic rather than a subject, and, as such, has undergone changes in meaning during the past few decades. Too often it is identified primarily with preservation rather than with use and management."

Natural resource studies at Cornell began around the turn of the century with programs in general natural resources, forestry, fishery, biology, wildlife and soil and water conservation.

In 1948 the Department of Conservation was formally established and work with fish, wildlife, and farm forestry was transferred from the Departments of Zoology, Entomology and Limnology, and Forestry to the newly created department.

Today, the natural resources department has several areas of concentration including: fish and wildlife science; the management of natural resources such as wild lands, forests and the aquatic environment; planning for resource development; control of injurious species of wildlife; international programs; and others. There is also a broad extension program to serve state and private needs.

The department is located in Fernow Hall on the Cornell Campus. Their teaching and research facilities include a fishery laboratory near the campus, a biological field station at Shackleton's Point on Oneida Lake, and the 4,000 acre Arnot Forest a few miles south of Ithaca, near Van Etten.

The name of the Department

of Entomology and Limnology has been changed, also, by removing the term "limnology." The action was taken because Cornell's Division of Biological Sciences was given the assignment of developing limnology and no further support for it was going to the Department of Entomology and Limnology.

## New Classes

The Childbirth Education Association of Albany announces two new series of classes for expectant parents. These classes are to be taken in the last two months of pregnancy. A Monday night series will begin on February 1, and a Tuesday night series on February 2.

Each series will consist of five weekly sessions dealing with the anatomy and physiology of pregnancy, labor and delivery. Exercises from the Lamaze Method of Educated Childbirth will be demonstrated. Both husbands and wives are encouraged to participate. Visual aids and open

discussions are an integral part of the program.

The classes are taught at the Albany Medical Center Hospital by registered nurses who themselves have experienced educated childbirth. They are Mrs. Paul Donnelly of Delmar and Mrs. Dennis Collins of Voorheesville.

"Where Service is Important"

While the state leads the nation in setting air quality standards, there are still problems right here in Albany County, study leaders reported. Ten companies are considered major air polluters, though the county health department says their cooperation is fairly good.

"Still, if you want clean air, you'll have to go to the Helderbergs." Suburban air in the county is rated two, with air quality in Albany, along the Hudson at the lowest permissible level of three. Because of building demolition, the city of Albany's air now has an unusual amount of dust and soot.

Mrs. Eric Leighton of Delmar headed the committee which studied the air pollution situation. She pointed out that three ingredients are necessary to see that air pollution does not continue - standards, money and controls.

"Industry is in a panic at the thought of emission standards." These would test air at the smokestack. Air is tested in two ways, ambient - general atmosphere - and at the point of emission.

Albany County's ambient air tests show an improvement since 1967 when the tests were begun.

A handy reference for those interested in air pollution is "Congregation of Vapors," a publication of the League of Women Voters Education Fund.

Following the presentation, consensus was taken on standards, controls and public participation. This consensus, developed from opinions of LWV's all over the country, will form the basis for legislative action by the League.

**Safety Tips**

The burgeoning use of snowmobiles for recreation and transportation has created a new safety problem. As use of the lively vehicles increases, so do the number of accidents involving them, warns the American Red Cross.

In order to get the most fun and utility out the speedy winter conveyances, the Red Cross advises drivers and riders to first learn how to operate the snowmobile correctly and recognize its limitations.

There were 338 snowmobile casualties recorded last year of which 74 were fatal. Thirty per cent of the fatalities involved motor vehicles, 28 per cent fixed objects and 22 per cent drownings. Of the 284 non-fatal injuries, 21 per cent involved fixed objects, 20 per cent motor vehicles and 13 per cent involved other snowmobiles.

Like automobiles, two of the more common accidents in snowmobiling involve excessive, uncontrollable speed and following other vehicles too closely.

Extreme caution should be used in event a road must be crossed. If following a trail, one should stay on it so that he may more easily be located in case of breakdown or injury. Lakes or streams should never be crossed without first checking thickness of the ice. Following railroad tracks is a dangerous practice and should be avoided even if it is believed they are unused. The driver should be alert to observe the terrain ahead of him. Snow-covered obstacles, fences and low-hanging branches are accident-provokers.

The Red Cross warns snowmobilers to keep track of their fuel. Half of the gas must be used to get back to the starting point. A person can travel farther into the wilderness on a snowmobile in an hour that he can walk in a day.

Weather conditions should always be checked in advance. If conditions are unfavorable, such as heavy snow, fog, slush or light fluffy snow, postpone the ride for a better day. A person should not go into deep woods or on an extended trip alone. In any case, a snowmobiler should tell a responsible person where he plans to go and an approximate time he expects to return.



This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) How do you decide which tax package to send people?

A) These decisions are based on last year's returns. Each taxpayer is sent a package containing schedules he used to prepare his 1969 return.

Q) Why did my tax withholding change?

A) There are a number of reasons, some of them increased withholding while others decreased withholding. Withholding rates for social

security tax increased from 4.8 to 5.2 percent effective January 1. This would increase withholding for all taxpayers covered by Social Security.

Income tax withholding rates were lowered beginning in January for single persons and those with low incomes. These changes result from the Tax Reform Act of 1969.
