NANCY STELTMAN



Highlighting its continuing effort to foster live music on a local level by lending encouragement to young student musicians, the Delmar Community Orchestra will present as guest soloist for its 12th Annual Spring Concert, Nancy Steltmann of Elsmere, a talented second-year scholarship student of the Juilliard School. Miss Steltmann, now studying under famed 'cellist Leonard Rose, will play the Concerto No. 1 in A minor, Opus 33, by Saint-Saens. She is a 1969 graduate of Bethlehem Central High School and was first exposed to the 'cello in the fourth grade string program of the Elsmere School under Edward Rice. She continued her studies with Mrs. Nancy Winn of Slingerlands, and during her high school years, studied with 'cellist Arthur Catricala of the Schenectady Symphony and played with both the Schenectady and Delmar orchestras while in high school.

At Juilliard, Miss Steltmann is a member of the Theatre Orchestra as well as the New Chamber Players. The latter group has made a number of appearances in the metropolitan area during the past year at schools and churches as well as a recent performance in Juilliard's Tully Hall concert series.

During the summer of 1970 she was chosen as a member of an orchestra made up of Juilliard musicians who performed as the opera orchestra for the annual five-week opera Festival of the Two Worlds in Spoleto. Italy.

In the nearly 35 years of its existence, the Delmar Community Orchestra has sought to maintain two primary objectives: the fun and good fellowship of its members in making music together and the promotion of live music on a local level. As a natural outgrowth of these objectives, its character has changed from an exclusively men's group to a community orchestra welcoming both women and student players.

Underlining the community aspect of the orchestra's work, these annual spring concerts have been presented for 12 years under the joint sponsorship of the Bethlehem Kiwanis, Lions, and Rotary Clubs.

This year the Spring Concert will be presented at the Bethlehem Central High School on Thursday, March 25, at 8 P.M. Typical of the music the orchestra plays, the program will range from classical through semi-classical to light, familiar tunes. Included are works by Saint-Saens and Tschaikowsky as well as the overture to the opera "Lucille" and the popular novelty "Lassus Trombone," featuring two talented student trombonists, Peter Harvey and David Langlitz, and one of the long-time orchestra members, Dr. Lester Stanley.

The orchestra is conducted by Samuel Bozzella, Supervisor of Music for the Bethlehem Central School District. Dr. Samuel Kantor is concertmaster and Miss Vivian Granato is orchestra pianist.






"The Club" was also the organization who tried unsuccessfully to sponsor a representative of "The Gay Liberation Front."

QUESTION: Why can't winter vacation be eliminated and the week added to spring vacation? The kids don't really have much to do during the winter time. At least at Easter time, the weather is better.

ANSWER: In drawing up our school calendar, we follow the recommendations of the State Education Department. Week-long vacations in February are also observed by most school districts in the state, including all the Suburban Council Schools. Teachers are particularly in favor of the winter break because they feel children need their vacation times spread out throughout the school year.

QUESTION: Why are the demands of the teachers and the offers of the Board of Education on salary and other contract terms not made public before the annual meeting in May? How far apart are the parties on the contract for next year?

ANSWER: There is a confidentiality clause in the present contract which states that, once negotiations have started, neither party shall publicize anything about its proposals or where matters stand. It's not possible at this time to guess "how far apart" the negotiators are, because no one can predict how readily agreement can be reached on any particular contract item. Negotiations are now being conducted, and the board is hopeful that contract agreement will be reached by budget voting time.

QUESTION: Why are the children within walking distance of their schools not provided with transportation on these terribly snowdrifted and icy roads when the weather is bad?

ANSWER: School district officials are as concerned as parents

Our buses can't accommodate any more children, and it isn't feasible to have extra buses to be used only on the few days when weather conditions are so bad.
