- 3. Magazines, bundled and tied with string.
- 4. Un-needed but still reusable household articles (furniture, appliances, books, radios and TV's, tools, etc.).
- 5. Un-needed Clothing (Men's suits, jackets, trousers, shoes, hats, shirts, underwear, work clothes. Women's suits, dresses, skirts, sweaters, coats (fur and cloth), slips, sport clothing, etc. Children's suits, coats, shirts, dresses, play clothes, shoes, sweaters, baby blankets and layettes.

This collection service will continue on the fourth Saturday of each month. Bethlehem residents will now have a large scale collection service on a regular basis. In this way, your participation in the recovery and recycling program will not create a storage nuisance and fire hazard in your home.

The four collection sites will serve as supplements to Salvation Army's usual home collection service. However, due to the public's increased awareness of recycling, the free pick-up service has become inadequate as the only means of collection.

After the recovery operation, the recycling and reuse follows. The newspapers will be de-inked by a recently developed DuPont process and recycled, thus con-

serving a natural resource, pulp trees. The cardboard is also recycled.

Your un-needed household articles and clothing will provide rehabilitation opportunities for the handicapped and much needed furniture and clothing to low income families through Salvation Army's "Family Thrift Stores."

The profit the Salvation Army makes from its paper salvage and from the repair and sale of household articles and clothing supports the Salvation Army's Social Service Center for the Rehabilitation of Men at 452 Clinton Avenue, Albany. This Service Center receives no United Funds and operates wholly from the salvage and thrift store operations.

The Service Center's rehabilitation program offers good substantial food, sound sleep in a clean bed, clean clothing, rest and recreation, counseling, work assignment, medical service, and spiritual counseling for handicapped men and men down on their luck, regardless of creed or color.

Our greatest natural resource is our people and their potential as creative individuals and contributors to our society. The Salvation Army works to save and restore our precious human resources.

QUESTION: How is the Board of Education of the Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) elected, is membership on the board rotated among the 24 component school districts, and what is the length of a BOCES board member's term?

ANSWER: The Board of Cooperative Educational Services, of which Bethlehem Central is a participating district, has a nine-member board and members serve five-year terms, so there is usually a two-member turnover each year.

Members of the BOCES board are nominated and elected by the boards of education of the 24 school districts, with each board having five votes, at annual meetings. This year's annual meeting was held on April 8.

At present, Bethlehem does not have a representative on the BOCES board. However, Mr. John Glenn of Delmar was a member of the original BOCES board when it was formed in the early 1950's and he serves now as the BOCES board's legal counsel. Mr. Glenn is also a former member of the Bethlehem Board of Education.

Dollars for Scholars - Citizens' Scholarship Foundation of Albany, Inc.:

Scholarships which are granted under this program may be used towards first year expenses to any college, junior college, technical school or vocational school. Unlike many scholarships, those which will be awarded by the Citizens Scholarship Foundation will be available to "B" and "C" high school students.







Earth Day — 1971

As is true of many other special days during the year, Earth Day is a reminder of a very important idea that should be guiding our living the remainder of the year. The idea — for man to continue a life of human quality on this earth, he must do so in harmony with his environment and within the limits of the resources on this planet.

How do we, individually and collectively, live according to this idea? Each of us must ask himself and his institutions some searching questions about our behavior. The questions of our institutions are easy to ask because they seem to involve "them," not "me" — but each question asked of organizations is also a question to ourselves because "them" is but a group of "mes." The questions we must ask ourselves personally are perhaps even more disturbing.

What general questions should we be asking? Will governments be guided by the welfare of all rather than a few in regulating the use of our resources? But isn't this also a question to us? Are we willing to sacrifice an increased quantity of life for some of us for a better quality of living for all of us? Will business consider environmental effects as a normal part of production and emphasize the quality rather than the quantity of the product? But are we also willing to insist on products that make ecological sense and to sacrifice convenience for conservation? Will private institutions work as hard for the good of all as they do now for the welfare of the few? Does this also mean that we will support the activities of our own organizations that do not personally serve us?

What are some of the specific questions we should be asking ourselves?

DO I place safety and pollution control at the top of my



Are we willing to organize and work for action by government and industry to provide methods of transportation that are more efficient and less polluting, to reduce the ravaging of our environment by sterile monuments to technology, to base our production of goods on environmental principals? 



we going to insist that our technology be devoted to humanistic goals in the use of our natural resources? Are we going to demand less advertising of superficial improvements in our environmental quality and more fundamental research in how to produce some basic changes toward a better environment? Are we willing and able to basically change our own goals of living from essentially selfish to goals that will produce a better environment for all? Are we really going to try to live in harmony with our environment rather than always try to control

One last question must be answered: ARE WE BASIC-ALLY HUMAN RATHER THAN ANIMAL, ABLE TO SOLVE PROBLEMS BY REASON WHICH IS DIRECTED BY THE EMOTIONS THAT MAKE US HUMAN RATHER THAN ANIMAL?

With all the concern about pollution and the environment, many speakers have come around talking about ecology and other related subjects. All too often it has been all talk with no specific action that the public can do. But now there is something that you can do. Recycling of materials and the restriction of the use of pesticides are two





easy and helpful ways in which to practice conservation.

The recycling of cans, bottles, and paper serve three main purposes. It cuts down on unsightly litter, the filling in of expensive land-fill sites is lessened, and our precious natural resources are preserved for future generations. 



way the plies are constructed plays a major role in determining tire life.

B. Tire bodies are constructed in three ways:

1. Bias tires, once standard equipment on new cars, are made with two, four, or more plies of a synthetic fiber fabric - rayon, nylon, polyester - that crisscross beneath the tread on the bias, or angle, approximately 35 degrees to the center of the tire.

2. Radial tires, common on European cars, have fabric plies which extend from bead to bead (steel wires that hold the tire in place) across the sidewall and underneath the tread. For strength, two or more layers of material — called "belts" — are placed beneath the tread.

3. Bias-belted tires, standard on most new cars, are a combination of the first two types of construction. They are made with bias plies topped with two or more belts - most often durable Fiberglas® cord - beneath the tread for strength and longer life.
