Players' 'Home' Playhouse to Open with "Exit the King"





The Lobby

The Slingerlands Community Players will inaugurate an intimate ninety-seat theatre at The Playhouse in Unionville on September 8. The Playhouse is on Delaware Turnpike (Rt. 443) about two and one-half miles southwest of the Bethlehem Central Senior High School. This theatre provides an opportunity for the players to broaden and diversify their activities beyond their traditional schedule of three major productions at the senior high school.

The Players purchased The Playhouse in 1968. They have remodeled the front portion of the first floor to convert this area to a ninety-seat arena with adjoining lobby. The cost of major productions, we well as limited availability of the high school auditorium, preclude expansion of this segment of the players' activities. Now, free access to their own theatre will allow production of a greater diversity of plays with smaller budgets. More productions also broaden opportunities for a greater number of people to exercise their creative talents. The Players expect too that productions at their theatre will provide training in all phases of community theatre for ambitious but untried novices. Finally, the theatre will serve as a laboratory for testing new production concepts.

The Playhouse is a charming old structure that bears the marks of a century or more with quiet dignity. Handhewn beams joined with wooden pegs, hand-made iron nails in the molding and wide plank flooring attest to its age. Local folklore says that it was a hotel when horsedrawn wagons and stages plied the roads into the Heldebergs and beyond. Later it became a social center where the local gentry gathered to dance in a spacious room on the second floor. It served as a polling place during general elections and housed a post office. Most recently it was a private residence.

The inauguration of the theatre marks the opening of the Players' twentieth consecutive season of community theatre. A modest first season in 1951 consisted of a single production in the gymnasium-auditorium of the Slingerlands Elementary School. The next season found them in the auditorium of what is now the middle school on Kenwood Avenue; since November of 1955 all major productions have been presented at the senior high school. The number of major productions has grown to three and the Players plan to continue these at the high school.

WMHT (Ch. 17) will present a television preview of the Playhouse tonight on "Dateline" at 10:30. The preview will include scenes from "Exit the King," the first production to be presented at the Playhouse.



IS ORGANIC GARDENING ECOLOGICALLY NECESSARY?

Organic gardening today is an ecological necessity to the well-being and health of the entire nation for four big reasons:

- 1. The present need to care for the land, to conserve its remaining vitality, and to restore what has been taken from it.
- 2. We must bury and recycle our refuse, unless we, in turn, wish to be buried by it.
- 3. We must stop the progressive deterioration of our health being brought about by constantly eating pesticide poisons.
- 4. Gardening organically, working with nature, gives a sense of personal satisfaction unattainable from any other activity.

The Land MUST Be Saved

There are about 20-25 million American homes each with a front yard, a back yard, and a side yard. It would be a tremendous step in the right direction if 20 million families were to give their grounds organic treatment. Pressure could be brought to bear by all these backyard organic gardeners forcing the legislatures to pass laws outlawing destructive farming practices which are leaving future generations a land eroded bare of all topsoil and completely devoid of organic matter.

Our Garbage Is Burying Us

In 1969 2.2 billion tons of organic wastes from agriculture and animals were "disposed of." Now then, if we turn all these quantities of organic wastes back to the soil, we kill two birds with one stone: rather than being wastes to be disposed of, this material could be recycled, and secondly, these humus-producing wastes would restore fertility to depleted soils. Another factor in home recycling that must be stressed is the use of the family garbage. Kitchen refuse is a prime source of garden fertility. It can literally spark the compost heap with its bacterial life, consuming and converting grass clippings, prunings, cuttings, and plant residues into fertile soil. Is organic gardening ecologically necessary? Ask your garbage man that ridiculous question as he wrestles with your daily refuse of five pounds per person! Almost half of that could go into your garden.

And finally, leaves. We have more leaves than we know what to do with. Right now, our town dumps the leaves in a sanitary landfill which is quickly filling up. Other alternatives, used by other localities include open dumping, or worse than that, incineration. It seems ironic to me that the raw materials for rich fertile natural soil are used to pollute our environment.

Not Breeding For Flavor or Nutrition

"A whole generation of Americans is growing up that does not know what good food and produce taste like; they're just getting them and have no standards to judge by." The gentleman who said this is a seedsman who is selling packets from coast to coast. He added, "We're not breeding for flavor, vitamin count, or nutritional value." His geneticists are working to create and develop plant varieties that fruit at uniform heights from the ground so that they can be harvested mechanically. Fruits and vegetables coming from his company's nurseries and hotbeds are rated choice when they are almost uniform in size and shape. They pack and ship better that way. Following this reasoning, square tomatoes, oranges and cabbages should be the perfect foodstuffs, just right for quick supermarket sales!

Or would you rather grow your own fruits and vegetables organically? How about eating some fresh-from-the-garden to-matoes, corn, strawberries, cucumbers, and peas that come to the table right from the planting row, picked right from the plants just before dinner, and absolutely free of chemical poisons and sprays. This is the kind of food you and your family should be eating, fresh, home-grown produce, raised in your own soil and nurtured by your own recycled waste residues. Organic gardening is definitely necessary from the health point of view.

Finally, there is the sense of achievement that organic gardening bestows on the homeowner. Organic gardening is a complete operation that gives the man or woman the feeling he or she has done something, not only for himself or herself but for our environment. I'm quire sure that many people reading this article have their own non-organic garden, and understand the personal satisfaction involved. Imagine now all the additional satisfaction to be gotten knowing that you are recycling your wastes, helping spread the gospel of a more environmentally sound way of farming, and perhaps most important of all, you are protecting yourself and your family from poisonous pesticides.

Is organic gardening necessary? It sure is!
