GAA has named Marnie Kiley as its chairman.




To show the slides, Mrs. Leddick will use a wooden projector which was used at the White House during the Lincoln era. Such slide presentations as this were very popular in America during the 19th Century, and President Lincoln himself viewed many showings of them.


students and their parents are informed of the possibility of beginning the study of a foreign language? Will there be a class in elementary Latin next fall at the High School? Will the students who are completing second year Latin this year have an opportunity to continue in Latin without being bused elsewhere?

ANSWER: Course selection sheets, listing all the courses that will be taught the following semester, are now being distributed to all High School pupils. They are to indicate their

choice of courses, and parents are encouraged to assist and guide them. Both Latin I and Latin III are listed, with an asterisk explanation that they will be offered only if enough pupils sign up for them.


The course selections will be tallied by April 1, but before then it won't be known whether enough pupils want to take these courses to warrant the expenditure. (There is no Latin I class being taught this year, because not enough pupils signed up for it. There is one class of Latin II, with an enrollment of 13 pupils).

According to Miss Helen Hobbie, High School principal, she is exploring ways in which pupils from other area school districts who wish to study Latin can be combined in classes with those from BC who want it, probably through BOCES. The trend of lack of interest in taking Latin courses is not peculiar to our school district — it is just as apparent in most other area High Schools. Of course, it would be less desirable to have to bus any pupils to Latin courses, but the expense of paying a teacher for just a few pupils can't be justified, in the opinion of the Bethlehem Central Board of Education.

Applicants must be good swimmers and at least 15 years of age. Graduates of the course will then be qualified as lifeguards or assistant swim instructors.




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HELLO, SELKIRK

Picture #2 shows Howard Jr. with the first car he leased when he first received his auto leasing franchise from Leasco.




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How to Select

A Remodeling Contractor

JUST LIKE BUYING A HOUSE is the biggest investment made by most families, so is having your house modernized to the changes that times brings to a family and keeping your home updated.

Your First Step - Know the contractor you expect to do business with. Try to find out how long he has been in business. If possible, see what kind of work he has done in your own neighborhood. Perhaps a telephone call to a previous customer will give you all the answers you are seeking. If the contractors you are getting quotations from have an office or showroom, visi it and see if he operates a sound business. If the job is an expensive one, you should check with your local Better Business Bureau or with the local bank to determine what kind of business man the contractor is.

Your Second Step — Get more than one bid. Most homeowners find that bids are advisable. Contractors will give you differen ideas and often your original thoughts will be changed by the recommendations of a contractor. Always remember that you get what you pay for. No remodeling contractor gets his materials free. In every remodeling job, remember that you only rarely get the best job for the lowest price.

Third Step — When you are ready to have the job done, get al of the details in writing. By this time you have spoken to a num ber of remodelers and you may not remember what each said he would do. When all details are in writing, you will know exactly what will be done and the contractor will know exactly what i expected of him. Remember, any changes in the written agree ment should be discussed prior to its signing.

Fourth Step — You'll find that remodeling contractors are re sponsible businessmen, as a whole. They usually work within one given neighborhood or area. They cannot afford to have dissatisfied customer, since a large part of their business come from customer referrals. If you find something that was no done as agreed, call your contractor immediately. If you wai too long, there could be extenuating circumstances. You'll find your contractor wants to satisfy you.

Fifth (and last) Step - Be careful of the firm that is unknown in your neighborhood; likewise, the contractor who does not have an address at which he can be reached. If you first determine exactly the kind of job, materials and workmanship, as well a price, and then have it all put in writing, you'll have the kind o job you will be happy with.

These Five Points, as outlined above, will save you untold day of aggravation. Whether you want a new storm window, siding a new roof, your kitchen modernized, or other type of home re modeling, interior or exterior, it will be wise to use the five step above as an outline to closely follow.

T'S OLYMPIC TIME — If our country has gone so far to the dogs, how come emigrants from other nations haven't chosen other destinations? All one has to do is watch the Olympics and notice that the teams from England have English names, from Japan only Japanese, from Russia only Russian, etc. But the names of our team members will encompass almost every nationality in the world — the only such country. Probably these present Winter Olympics will prove us wrong — but we're sure you get the point: the United States must still be **the** country in the world toward which most emigrants from all nations turn.

ON JANUARY 18, Gov. Rockefeller gave his State of the State message before the New York State legislature. Other than some advice to President Nixon, he made no constructive effort for effective control of drug use and abuse in New York State. Here is the **complete** text of the entire section devoted to the drug problem:

. . .

"c. Drug Abuse

"Of major importance to the health of the Nation is the necessity to find answers to drug abuse, which is devastating the bodies, minds and spirits of so many of our young people.

"The time has come for the United States government to meet head-on this rising threat to the dignity and well-being of our young people. The very survival of our Nation could be at stake. The situation therefore demands a total national commitment, the all-out mobilization of the best brains in every field, backed by whatever resources are necessary to find the answers to the scourge of drug abuse.

"This total approach is not new to our country in solving the insoluble. President Roosevelt launched the Manhattan Project, which resulted in the development of the atomic bomb that hastened the end of World War II. President Eisenhower launched an all-out effort to develop the nuclear shield so vital to preventing World War III. President Kennedy achieved a total mobilization of resources to reach the moon. President Nixon has called for a total mobilization to find a cure for cancer.

"Unlike the Manhattan Project to develop the atomic bomb, a total mobilization by the United States to save the youth of the world from the devastation of drugs would not have to be carried out in secrecy. Instead, this effort could bring together the best and most creative minds in the world to work together in one common effort for humanity.

"I base this call for national action on our experiences in New York State. This State has spent three quarters of a billion dollars in pursuing every possible approach to drug abuse that showed promise, more than the Federal government or all the states put together. Still, no real answer to the drug problem has been found. We need a national commitment, on the scale of the Manhattan Project, to find the answers to the national control of drug abuse, and we need it now."
