QUESTION: Why doesn't the Bethlehem Central School District have a summer school?

ANSWER: Operating summer school classes would require a substantial amount of money which would have to be included in the school district budget. Surveys taken in recent years have shown that there is not enough desire or need for such classes to warrant spending the funds required.

In past years, a few summer courses have been offered, funded by Title I grants. At present, the only course offered by our school district during the summer months is Driver Education — mainly because there are more pupils who sign up for this course than can be scheduled during the regular school year.

Another major reason why Bethlehem Central doesn't have summer school classes is that a number of neighboring school districts do — and those Bethlehem pupils who want or need them can enroll in them.



as attorneys and certified public accountants are qualified to practice before the IRS and may represent clients in the event a return is audited. "Preparers" are individuals operating on their own or employees of large tax preparation firms. They are not certified to practice before the IRS.

The BBB Committee warns that a commitment from a preparer to reimburse a customer for interest or penalty payment resulting from his error does not mean reimbursement for the difference between the initial tax payment and additional payment as determined by the auditor.





Selkirk Post Office: A History

LOUIS J. PICARAZZI, Postmaster of the Selkirk Post Office, compiled the facts for this brief history which starts in 1883 when Chester A. Arthur was President. The first Postmaster was Jacob J. Soop who served until 1888.

In 1883 under Postmaster Jacob Soop, the Post Office was set up at the old railroad station building and served a population of 200, until approximately 1889, when it was moved to John Vrooman's General store, after he became postmaster. Today this building is owned by Francis Elmore and is now the Riccardo Studios. In 1917, under Postmaster Lansing Vrooman, it was moved to a building next to the present Lehman's Garage. There it remained until the Lehman family put on an addition to their garage and again the post office had to be moved to make room for this addition. The whole building was moved to a new site in approximately 1928 to what is now the Selkirk Variety

Store. There it stayed until 1933, where, under William Winnie, it moved across the street to the old Gibbons' house, now the site of a two-story home now owned by Joseph Neri which has recently been moved behind the new post office of today. It stayed there for approximately seven months, then was moved up to William Winnie's home on Maple Avenue, now owned by Vincent Lyons. In 1963, under acting Postmaster Dottino, a new post office was built on Maple Avenue, which is now the present site.

The first Rural Free Delivery (RFD) was started on April 2, 1900, with one carrier at a salary of \$400.00 per annum, including horse hire. Edward K. Selkirk was appointed carrier, and William Selkirk substitute carrier. Edward Selkirk retired June 2, 1930 after having served 30 years, two months and three days.

In December 1930, under Postmaster Michael Mangine and President Herbert Hoover, Wilbur E. Hallenbeck was appointed rural carrier on Route 1, succeeding Edward K. Selkirk. To this date Mr. Hallenbeck has put in over 35 years with the Postal Dept. and this past year was awarded his 22nd straight year safety driver award.

Today this route serves 480 families and covers 33 miles six days a week. It serves much of the same route covered by the original route in 1900.

Route No. 2 was established January 1, 1917 with Maus Lamoreaux being appointed rural carrier. He held this post until July 10, 1932, when he retired. Although the original description for this route is not available, it covered much of the same route as today.

Clerks, before 1925, were considered as personal employees of the postmaster and no personnel records were kept. Funds for clerk hire were not authorized for this office until 1925.

Originally Cedar Hill and Beckers Corners had their own post offices. In 1902, after Rural Route No. 1 was established, both of these offices were discontinued. Thereafter, the mail was sent to the Selkirk office. The Post Office at Cedar Hill was located at the old Kinney Homestead now presently the Vagele home opposite the entrance of Winnie Road off of Route 144. John Kinney was the only known Postmaster at Cedar Hill. The Beckers Corners Post Office, as close as can be determined, was located at the now Becker Homestead and the Postmaster was Albertus Becker.

Today, there are seven employees in the Selkirk Post Office with a total of 113 years of postal service. 71 years of this total are shared by carrier Wilbur E. Hallenbeck and Edna Keim. Wilbur has completed 41 years and has an outstanding record with the Postal Dept. He has the longest time in service of any employee in the history of the Selkirk Office. This year he was awarded the Safety Driver award for the 27th consecutive year.

Mrs. Edna Keim has 30 years of service and a very outstanding record. She has trained and qualified more clerks, Postmasters and carriers than anyone in the history of this post office. She has trained or helped to train 12 clerks and 3 postmasters during her 30 years. Edna was recently honored with a Superior Accomplishment Award and a cash award by the Postal Service for her years of outstanding service.

Clerk Marge Nealand has 14 years of service. She is an efficient, pleasant and reliable employee and should be serving this community for many years to come.


Sub-carrier Marilyn Cross has now a total of eight years with the Post Office. She is very capable at her job and is our trouble shooter, being able to serve on either of our two heavy duty routes, a total of approximately 1400 families.

Clerk Rosemary Bardin has been with us for 3 years. You will find her behind the counter selling you stamps or you may find her on the route delivering the mail. Wherever you find her, she'll be giving you efficient and reliable service and she'll always be doing it with a smile.

The latest to join the family is John J. Dimler, "call him Jack", who is the R.D. 2 carrier. Jack has 11 years of dedicated service.

Mr. Picarazzi, the Postmaster, was appointed in 1964 and through the past 8 years he has established an enviable rapport with Selkirk postal patrons. In today's hurry-scurry living, there is always time for someone at the Post Office to answer any question a patron may have.




