
Here's an electrical safety quiz for kids that most parents can't pass.

Many electrical accidents involving children could be prevented by teaching them to recognize and avoid dangerous electrical hazards.

So we designed this little quiz to test your children's knowledge of electrical safety and to teach them to avoid some of the more dangerous electrical hazards.


Before having your children take this quiz, try it yourself. It's not as easy as it looks. (Answer "True" or "False" to all questions.)

Q. Never fly a kite near electric power lines because it's against the law?




A. False. Although it's not against the law, flying a kite near electric power lines is extremely dangerous. If the kite gets snagged on a line, and if the string is wet, or it's a damp, wet day, you may get a nasty shock. A good safety rule to remember: Always fly kites in open fields away from electric wires.

Q. When you're in the tub or shower, you can plug in a radio as long as the radio is turned to the "off" button?



A. False. Always avoid touching electrical appliances when your hands are wet, or when you're standing on a wet floor. Remember to keep electrical appliances well out of reach when you're in the tub or shower.

Q. If you spot a downed power line, the first thing you should do is poke it with a stick to see if it's "live," then call the nearest office of Niagara Mohawk?




A. False. Never under any circumstances touch a downed power line. The first thing you should do is call Niagara Mohawk and give the location of the fallen line. Then, stand by until help arrives, warning others away.

Q. The sign "Danger—High Voltage" on Niagara Mohawk substation fences means the fence is electrified?



A. False. The warning signs and the high fences are there for just one reason. To keep everyone away from the high-voltage equipment on the other side of the fence. It's not even necessary to touch the wires on a high-voltage line or equipment in a substation to be injured; just getting close can cause an arc—a blinding flash—which may inflict severe burns. When this happens high on a pole or tower, the flash can cause a fall which in itself may cause death or serious injury.

Q. Since wood is a poor conductor of electricity, it's not dangerous to climb trees near electric power lines?



A. False. While it's true that wood is a poor conductor of electricity, people aren't. Occasionally, power lines run through the tops of trees, and you can easily mistake a wire for a branch.

A passing score is having all answers correct. If your children missed some of the answers, go over the quiz with them again. Remember, having your children know and recognize all these hazards could one day prevent a needless accident.



Dear Friend:

Because President Nixon has received over 100,000 expressions of support from Americans such as yourself, it is impossible for him to personally respond to each one of them individually.

The President has asked me to thank you for your message about the decisive military action he has ordered to hasten the end of the fighting in Vietnam. As he stated in his May 8 address, the enemy can bring these measures to an end by returning our prisoners of war and joining in an internationally supervised ceasefire throughout Indochina. The United States will then begin a full withdrawal of military personnel from Vietnam, to be completed in four months.

This has been the longest, most difficult war in our nation's history. All our citizens look forward to a lasting, honorable peace. That day is near — and will surely be brought even closer if the great majority of the American people who support the President's decision convey these views to their elected representatives, friends and neighbors, and local newspapers. Such a display of unity will make it unmistakably clear to the world that our country will not

faller in its just commitment to South Vietnam or in its resolve to safeguard the lives of 60,000 American servicemen and secure the release of U.S. prisoners of war held throughout Indochina, to include a complete accounting of those missing in action.





GUIDANCE counselor at Bethlehem Central High School are considered "helpfull and needed" by a great majority of persons who took part in a recent survey of the High School Guidance Department conducted by a visitation team of the Capital District Personnel and Guidance Association.

Dr. Harold Bookbinder, Director of Guidance and Curriculum Development for Bethlehem Central Schools, summarized the team's findings at a public

Board of Education meeting held June 6.

Those who participated in the survey, through questionnaires and interviews, included students, parents, administrators, counselors, teachers, other school staff members, and members of the Board of Education.

Among other conclusions reported by the visitation team were: 1) General agreement that school course planning is and should be one of the most important functions of the Guidance Department, 2) Personal and social concerns of pupils should be given greater emphasis, 3) The heavy pupil load presently being assumed by the five High School counselors has created a "problem of inaccessibility" for pupils.

While the visitation team's report emphasized that it's work should not be viewed as an evaluation, but simply attempt by outside professional to help the school district assess its strengths and weaknesses, some specific recommendations were included in the report.

The recommendation included: 1) Employment of an additional counselor, 2) Use of other areas of the school and office to facilitate more informal counseling, 3) Do more for the non-college bound pupils, 4) More use of group counseling, 5) Greater counseling help and attention to ninth-graders throughout the year as they adjust to the High School, and 6) A developmental approach should be developed for the providing of vocational information.

In regard to the last recommendation, Dr. Bookbinder announced that an application has been made for federal grant which would provide funds for employing a vocational counselor and make possible an ongoing program of vocational guidance and placement.

GARAGE SALES have become increasingly popular among families about to move to new cities, according to a recent survey among members of Inter-City Relocation Service, the nation's leading real estate referral organization.

As many as 75 per cent of families on the move use such informal sales to reduce the quantity of personal effects they must have moved to a new home, several ICRS members reported. An average of member responses

on the percentage of their clients who conduct garage sales indicated that about a fifth sell belongings to their former neighbors.

"Sixty per cent of members responding to the survey reported increases in the number of garage sales in the past two years, and 77 per cent reported more of their clients have conducted garage sales in the last five years."

In addition to reducing the quantity of goods that must be moved by sale of personal effects and furniture that no longer are needed, a garage sale can help in marketing the house, too, Albright added. "It's a good idea to clear the house of surplus furniture because it will show to greater advantage," Albright pointed out.
