





To the Editor:

Albany County's Sewer District #1 has announced that its two secondary treatment plants will be operational by the fall of 1973. But until a plant is built to serve the cities and towns just across the Hudson River, we in Albany County won't be getting full benefit from our tax outlay, nor will the river be useable for riverfront parks and boating. This is only one reason the League of Women Voters supports the State Environmental Quality Bond Issue, which will be on the ballot in November. The Rensselaer County Sewer District's proposed plant is on the priority list to receive funds from the \$650 million allotted for sewage treatment facilities. Areas in Albany County designated for sewage treatment funds are Altamont, Guilderland, Colonie, Green Island, and Watervliet. Bethlehem is receiving money for this purpose from the 1965 Pure Waters Bond Act.


Other uses for the total \$1.15 billion Bond Issue will be to help curtail air pollution from state and municipal sources; encourage better facilities for solid waste disposal; including recycling where feasible; help lands; and save some unique natural areas throughout the state.

We cannot afford to wait to protect the environment for ourselves and our children. We urge all voters to vote YES on Proposition One, the Environmental Bond Issue. The League stands ready to talk to any and all groups on this subject.

Williams, manager of Pinkerton's Albany office, said its "Op TOT" program is designed to alert parents to potential hazards that exist on Mischief Night and Hallowe'en-Monday, October 30, and Tuesday, October 31and to consider preventive plans of action. He cited increased reports of barbiturates and sleeping pills in trick-or-treat bags and candy that has been "boobytrapped" with foreign objects, and outlined precautions that should be taken to protect child-

"Some parents are concerned about letting children go out at all, because of past experience and the publicity given to the ever-widening problem," Mr. Williams stated.

"Many communities are coping with the growing threat by hosting parties at schools and churches. Such parties offer supervision in addition to refreshments and entertainment. It is not unusual to charge a small admission if necessary to defray the costs," Williams added.

Acknowledging that most parents and children will observe the traditional practice of trickor-treating, he suggests the following precautions:

Instruct children making rounds not to eat any of the candy or fruit received until they return

When children return home, all fruit should be opened and/or inspected to be sure it has not been tampered with and to be

sure that it contains no foreign

Make sure that all candies are in sealed wrappers; that the wrappers have not been opened and that the manufacturer is a recognized brand name.



lowing safeguards:

Try to have an adult chaperone children on their rounds; one adult for each ten children is suggested.

Make sure children wear a light-colored jacket over their costume if it is dark in color. Trick-or-treaters should be readily visible to motorists in the twilight hours.

Costumes should be short enough so that children can move freely and easily.

Limit the perimeter of their rounds to homes in your immediate neighborhood where you are known.

There is an additional hazard from accidental fire, Williams said. This can be minimized, according to the security experts by using flameproof costumes and lighting pumpkins with flashlights instead of candles. Parents are also cautioned in the purchase of halloween makes and wigs. "The mixture of water, borax and boric acid is widely used to make costumes fire retardent, but it has serious limitations when used on cotton and rayons." Williams continued.





juries and property damage up to stated amounts. The proof is usually in the form of liability insurance.

In New York, motorists involved in an accident must prove they can meet the state's liability limits of "10/20/5" -- meaning they must be able to pay up to \$10,000 for one person injured, \$20,000 for all persons injured and \$5,000 property damage.

However, if a New York driver (who carries lower limits of insurance than required by other states) were involved in an accident in another state such as Connecticut, where the liability limits are "20/40/10", he would have to post a bond for the additional amounts if his policy did not contain at least these amounts of liability coverage. Other states in this part of the country with higher limits than New York are Maine, 20/40/10; New Hampshire 20/40/5; New Jersey 15/30/5 (effective Jan. 1, 1973) and Maryland 15/30/5.

When the program becomes effective, ISO said, persons who already have or who purchase new auto policies with ISO companies adopting this program are automatically covered.

WE'RE FOR IT — The proposition on this year's ballot seeking local approval to extend the term of our Supervisor and Town Clerk we believe, should receive a "yes" vote. The two-year term has been replaced by the four-year in most elective offices. The main reason is still a valid one: many plans (no matter what office) take longer than two years to complete; a four-year term would, therefore, allow (especially the Supervisor) for better long-range planning with an opportunity for follow-through.

It amuses us to see some of the arguments put forth against the proposition. Those opposed intimate that a two-year term is too much for an incompetent officeholder — so why take a gamble on four? The history of the Town of Bethlehem shows that our Supervisors over a 25-year period have all been competent men whose dedication to doing the right things for Bethlehem have always overshadowed any desire for personal gain. During the past quarter century not one of these men has ever used his office for a stepping-stone to anything higher; there has never been even a breath of scandal; not one investigation; the State of New York (which audits Town, City and County operations) has never leveled a criticism at a Town of Bethlehem administration. During all of these years, the GOP has been in power — small wonder that the Republicans point with so much pride to their past record.

This is not to say that we should lengthen the term of office only in the event of an assured Republican victory. We feel that the Democrats have also run some very dedicated men for the Town's highest office — and if the Democrats are victorious at some future date, the man who takes over for them surely deserves four years to prove himself.


It seems to us that rather than a political question, this is one of common sense — and a "yes" vote should give both parties added confidence in their electorate.


